NIPSCO workers had shut the power off in the high-voltage lines held up by the utility pole while onlookers worked to free Cihak, so there would be no danger if the lines happened to snap and fall against the car, but just as Cihak was being pulled from the car and being put on a stretcher, the power came back on and the lines began arcing above the rescuers' heads where the impact had caused the wires to wrap around each other. When sparks and fire shot through the sky overhead bystanders and rescue workers raced away from the overhead lines fearing one of the lines might burn in two, but when officers saw that no lnes had broken they rushed back to aid in moving Cihak to the ambulance.
