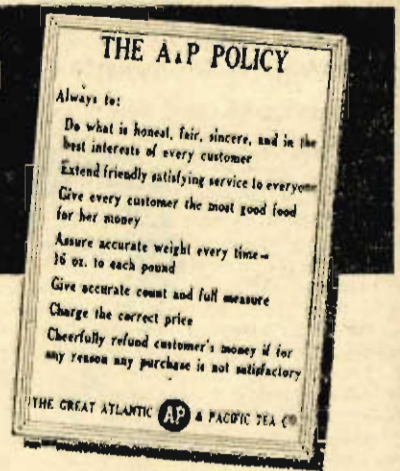

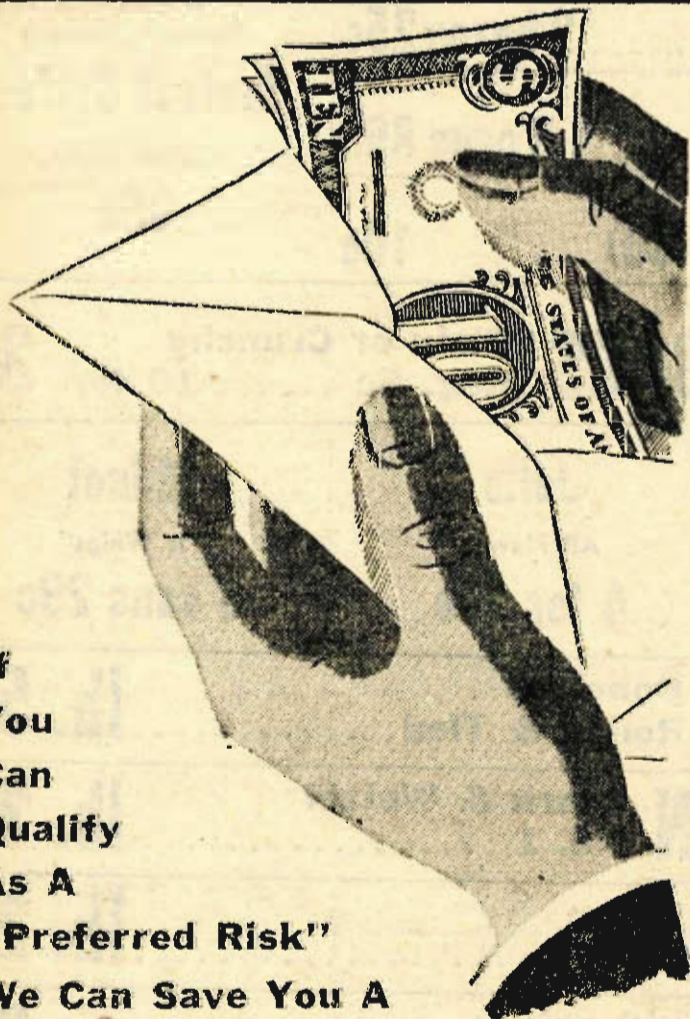


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Charles E. Lucas and Robert Lucas Plan Trip Around-The-World

Charles E. Lucas, 74, Bass Lake, and his son Dr. Robert E. Lucas of Michigan State University, both former residents of Route 2, Culver, have completed arrangements for an around-the-world tour which will take four months and take them into 22 countries for scenic and historical sight seeing.

All the major travel from country to country will be by plane, leaving Los Angeles, Calif., on March 8.

Charles Lucas was employed from 1910 to 1917 by the Bureau of Education in the Philippines. He has already been extended a hearty welcome by his former students to visit them while in the Islands. He can number among his former students, men and women of prominence and leadership, the Hon. Carlos P. Romulo, Ambassador to the U.S., for one.

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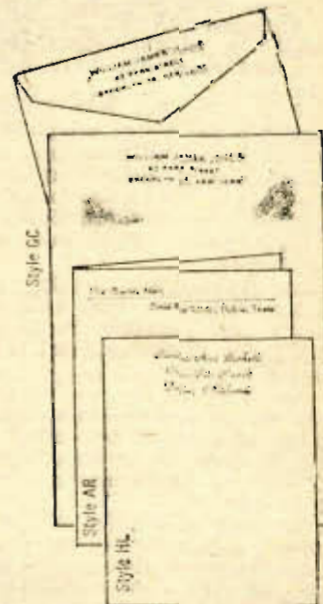

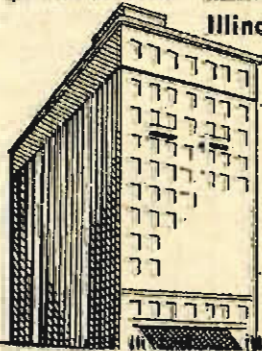

Commander Spivey cited the growth in the organization's membership as an indication of public awareness and acceptance of the Legion's community service activities as well as its programs in the interest of the nation's wartime veterans. He explained that Legion enrollment in 1959 reversed a six-year trend by showing an appreciable gain over that of 1958 and that all indications pointed to an even bigger year for membership in 1960.

Nine Cadets Named Finalists In Merit Scholarship Test

Nine Culver Military Academy cadets were named finalists in the 1959-60 competition of the National Merit Scholarship program, and have been awarded certificates of merit, according to E. B. Benson, Dean of the Academy.

They are Robert S. Benson, Thomas L. Douglass, Timothy B. Flynn, Robert C. Goodwin, Roger M. Mills, James N. Pytkas, William J. Sconce, David W. Stapleton, and Larry M. Stolberg.

About six-tenths of one per cent of the seniors in each state received the awards. A national total of 10,000 students were so honored.

They are all that remain of the 950,000 that were tested in the competition, which began last April. The Merit Scholars will be selected and announced this spring from the 10,000 finalists. They, and the colleges they have chosen, will share in the several million dollars in Merit Scholarship funds to be offered. Winners will be announced on about April 27.

\$2.5 Million In Value

Previous experience indicates that the finalists will be offered some \$2.5 million worth of freshman-year scholarship assistance from colleges, universities, and other scholarship agencies, in addition to the awards made to those selected as Merit Scholars.

Merit Scholarships are four-year awards, and carry stipends that range from \$100 to \$1500 a year, individually determined on the basis of need. No Merit Scholar may accept any other major scholarship assistance in addition to his Merit Scholarship stipend.

Plymouth Wins Sectional Tournament

Culver Loses To Plymouth, 64-48

The Plymouth Pilgrims nipped Rochester, 43-41, Saturday night to capture their third sectional basketball crown in four years on their home court. Plymouth had moved to the championship game with a 64-48 victory over Culver and a 41-38 win over Tippecanoe. Rochester had advanced with victories over Bourbon, 63-51, and Richland Center, 62-56.

In the tourney opener, Talma's Tigers eliminated Argos 48-45, on Dale Gordon's two last minute baskets. Gordon led the winners with 13 points, the same total as Argos' Jim Duff. The Dragons ended their season with a 6-13 record.

Richland Center walloped West Township, 71-44, in Wednesday afternoon's second contest. Reserve John Keele led the winning Wildcats with 16 points, while West, whose season mark was 3-17, was led by Chuck Brooker's 14 points.

Wednesday evening, Rochester's hot-shooting Zebras ripped Bourbon, 63-51. Ronnie Zent hit 18 of his 22 points in the first half, connecting on his first six tries from the field. Jim Rhodes led the losing Comets with 17 points, as Bourbon completed its season with a 12-9 mark.

Richland Center Wins
 Richland Center joined Rochester in the semi-finals by slaughtering Talma, 87-58, Wednesday night. Jim Kerr and Dave Evans had 23 and 21 points, respectively, for the Wildcats, and Wally Pfeiffer led the losers with 19. Talma's record was 12-9 for the 1959-60 season.

Thursday afternoon, the point parade started by Richland Center's 87 tallies, continued as Tippecanoe bombed Tyner 96-66. The red-hot Police Dogs, boasting a well-balanced, veteran starting five, were led by Doug Hunsberger's 27 markers, while lanky Alann Metheny added 21, including 13 free throws. Rick Skiles led the Redmen with 23, as Tyner was eliminated with a 6-15 record.

Bremen advanced to the second round by bombing LaPaz, 82-62, after a first half scare by the Vikings. Everett Walterhouse hit 24 points for the Lions, while Ken Becker led the losers with 18. LaPaz ended their season with a 6-15 mark.

Plymouth had little trouble with Culver, 64-48, after both teams suffered a cold first half. Big Jack Price, on the bench with three fouls during most of the first half, came back to score ten third quarter points, and help pull the Pilgrims out of rear. Larry Hamell's 17 were best of the game, while Dennie Geiger led the losing Indians with 14. Culver, playing without junior guard Gary Dillon, sidelined with a leg injury, was eliminated with a 10-12 record.

Tippecanoe Beats Bremen
 The first major upset of the tourney occurred Thursday night when Tippecanoe surprised Bremen, 68-58. The spirited Police Dogs entertained the fans with a fine attack, led by Hunsberger and Metheny with 16 each. Bremen, eliminated with a 15-8 record, was led by Walterhouse's 17 points.

Saturday afternoon Rochester advanced to the final game by toppling Richland Center, 62-56. The Zebras opened a 28-21 half-time lead and had stretched to more than 20 points early in the second half. But the Wildcats, employing a full-court press, slowly chopped away at the lead, but found the deficit too much to overcome. Larry McConkey led the Zebras' attack with 16 points, matching the total of Center's Ed

Norris. Richland Center was ousted with a 15-9 record.

Tippecanoe's battling Police Dogs almost pulled one of the biggest upsets of the year, as they bowed to Plymouth, 41-38, in the second semi-final game Saturday. The losers held a 32-28 lead after three quarters, but Larry Hamell and his teammates were too tough to hold down in the final period. Three baskets by Hamell, a basket by freshman Tim Connell, and three free throws by Glenn Starr iced up the Pilgrim victory.

Final Game
 So the stage was set for the finale, the battle between perennial rivals, Rochester and Plymouth. The Zebras held slim leads throughout the first half, as McConkey, a 5-8 senior guard with a pretty, long one-hander, scored 14 points in the first two periods. After trailing, 25-24, at halftime, Plymouth broke in front on Glenn Starr's one-hander at the start of the second half. After trading three point leads, the Pilgrims grabbed a 37-34 third quarter margin on two baskets by Jack Price. In the final period, play slowed down. Rochester took a 41-40 lead on Ronnie Zent's long one-hander. With approximately a minute to play, Dick Alcock sent Plymouth ahead with a close-in jump shot. Rochester worked for an open shot. Phil DuBois got it, but missed. Hamell was fouled, and hit a free throw with six seconds left. McConkey missed a running one-hander as the gun sounded, ending the sectional for another year.

Plymouth, coached by Bob Hileman, will meet host Elkhart in the Elkhart Regional next Saturday.

an unsuccessful try to pull the car away from him, it became necessary to force the wreckage apart to get him out.

NIPSCO workers had shut the power off in the high-voltage lines held up by the utility pole while onlookers worked to free Cihak, so there would be no danger if the lines happened to snap and fall against the car, but just as Cihak was being pulled from the car and being put on a stretcher, the power came back on and the lines began arcing above the rescuers' heads where the impact had caused the wires to wrap around each other. When sparks and fire shot through the sky overhead bystanders and rescue workers raced away from the overhead lines fearing one of the lines might burn in two, but when officers saw that no lines had broken they rushed back to aid in moving Cihak to the ambulance.

George C. McLaughlin, Plymouth manager of Northern Indiana Public Service Co., reported to The Citizen that due to the accident the current was turned off in the Culver and Burr Oak area on Monday evening for a total of 23 minutes.

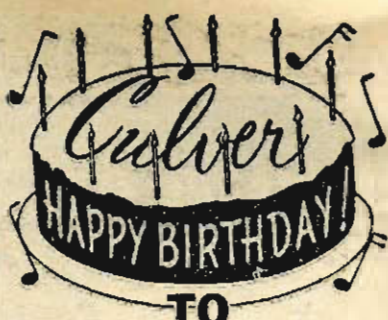
