"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

Another Hoax! "The Stone Man" of Middlebury, Elkhart County

IN 1860, some sly, ingenious con men foisted the fantastic Cardiff Giant hoax upon a very gullible America.



Near Cardiff, N.Y., they unearthed a "petrified" giant so cleverly contrived that it exploded a sensation and fooled learned scientists.

Even that wise, cynical old showman, P. T. Barnum, was taken in. So were thousands of shekels at exhibitions — until the swindle was exposed.

A SCANT 25 YEARS later, some Hoosier smoothies almost got away with a reasonable facsimile of the Cardiff Giant.

Indiana's was dubbed the Middlebury Stone Man.

THIS HILARIOUS Hoosier hoax began in August, 1894, when trench diggers on John Kelsey's farm three miles northwest of Middlebury in Elkhart County spaded into something big and rocky.

When a part was uncovered, one digger gasped, "Holy smoke — it's a big human foot, turned to stone."

Word spread and a crowd assembled to watch the remaining excavation.

Wide eyes soon looked down on a "petrified" body well over six feet tall, with the right arm hooked across the chest and the left amputated below the elbow.

REPORTERS GALLOPED to Kelsey's, gawked, studied, and wrote glowing early accounts.

Said one: "The body was so remarkably preserved that finger and toe nails could be traced with the eyes. Even skin pores were visible. . . It appeared the left arm was amputated in life."

Another thought the body might have been an Indian the explorer LaSalle had flushed into terrified flight one night in 1679, concluding:

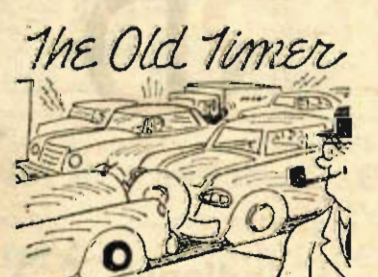
"History doesn't record when he stopped running, but tradition has it that in jumping from bog to bog across the Middlebury swamp he missed his footing and sank out of sight . . ."

THESE STORIES lured such throngs that Kelsey farm work was disrupted — so the stone man was hauled to Middlebury and exhibited in a vacant store.

For a small fee, of course! The old Elkhart Review's journalists weren't as gullible as the rest, however. They snooped skeptically and soon assembled a dossier of dubious facts, to wit:

1. For several weeks, a coffin-like box had reposed at the rear of Henry Sanger's pool hall in the nearby town of Bristol — then mysteriously disappeared.

19% Population Gain Registered In 3rd District

Marshall County Increase Is 10%

Indiana's Third Congressional District, which includes Culver, now has 470,773 persons.

The complete preliminary report, released by Peter D. Trone, Census District Supervisor, shows an increase of 74,927 — 19% over the 1950 total of 395,846.

The last county in the district to be completed — LaPorte — has a preliminary total of 94,344. Michigan City shows 36,069 and LaPorte City 20,904.

Elkhart County up 26%. According to John Calvert, District Technical Officer, Elkhart County shows the largest percentage increase with almost 26% more persons than in 1950.

LaPorte has gained 22%. St. Joseph more than 15%, and Marshall almost 10%.

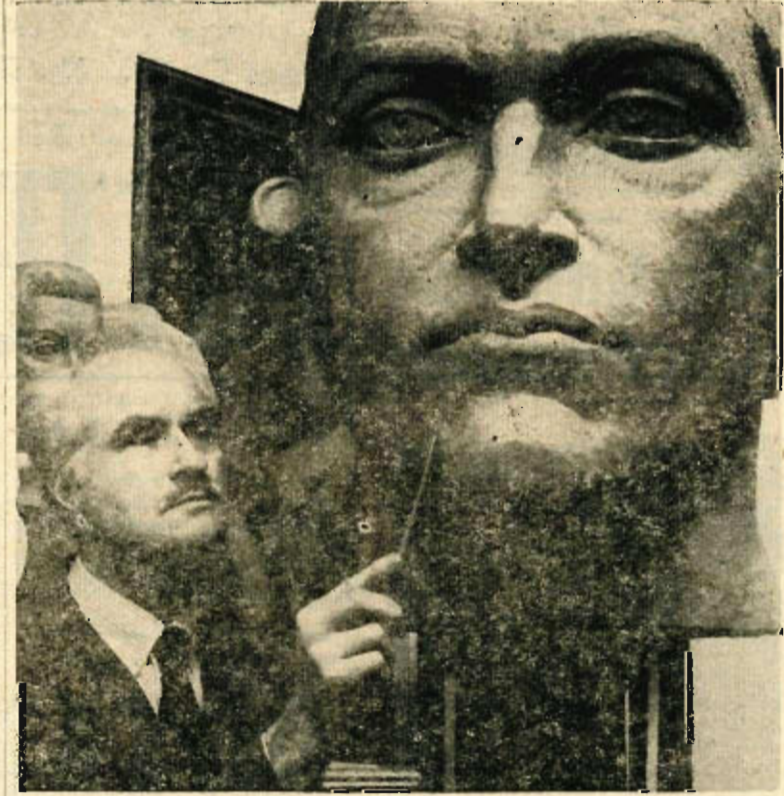

Official announcement of population will be made at a later date by the Director of the Bureau of the Census.

It was created for the sesquicentennial celebration of the town's incorporation. The town was founded by Henderson before he died in 1785. Henderson is located across the Ohio River from Evansville, Indiana. Incidentally, Mr. Williams' bas-relief portrait of THOMAS G. MASARYK, former President of Czechoslovakia, was dedicated in the Bohemian Cemetery at Chicago on May 27. It becomes a part of a great new memorial to the famed Czech patriot which is being erected by his grateful countrymen.

Noted Churchman Baccalaureate Speaker

The Rev. Dr. Theodore O. Wedel, Canon of Washington Cathedral, Washington, D.C., and Warden of the College of Preachers of the Episcopal Church, will be the speaker at the baccalaureate service at Culver Military Academy in the Memorial Chapel at 10:45 a.m., Sunday, June 5.

Canon Wedel is a native of Kansas. After graduation from Oberlin College, he received his M.A. in the field of classical languages from Harvard. He won his Ph.D. in English literature from Yale and holds honorary degrees from Seabury-Western Seminary (S.T.D.), Brown University (D.D.), Trinity College (D.D.), Oberlin College (D.D.), and Carleton College (L.L.D.).

Professor At Yale From 1918 to 1934, Canon Wedel was a professor at Yale University, the University of Texas and Carleton College. He was ordained to the ministry of the Episcopal Church at the age of 28.

He served as Secretary for College Work of the National Council of the Episcopal Church from 1934 to 1939, when he was made Canon of the Washington Cathedral. He was appointed Warden of the College of Preachers, a Cathedral institution devoted to post-ordination training of Episcopal clergy, in 1943.

Canon Wedel is the author of several books, including "The Coming Great Church," "The Christianity of Main Street," and "The Pulpit Rediscovered Theology."

He was honored during the triennial General Conventions of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Boston in 1952, Honolulu in 1955 and Miami in 1958 by election as President of the Convention's House of Deputies.

Canon Wedel's interest in the Ecumenical Movement is evidenced by his serving for the past seven years as Chairman of the Working Committee of Evangelism in the Study Department of the World Council of Churches.

179 Cadets Will Graduate Candidates for graduation include 179 cadets from 28 states, nine foreign countries, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia.

Illinois leads in the number of graduation candidates with 31. Other states with a large number of candidates include Indiana with 29, Michigan with 19, Ohio with 18, and Texas with 12.

Seniors at the Northern Indiana college preparatory school and their guests will hear two distinguished speakers during the festivities.

The Rev. Dr. Theodore O. Wedel, Canon of the Washington Cathedral, Washington, D.C., and Warden of the College of Preachers of the Episcopal Church, will be the speaker at the Baccalaureate Service, at 10:45 a.m., Sunday in the Academy's Memorial Chapel.

And Dr. Charles A. Thomas, chairman of the board of directors of Monsanto Chemical Company, will speak at the Commencement Convocation Monday at 10:45 a.m. in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium.

scientific achievements in 1923, when he joined the General Motors Research Corporation as a research chemist. While there, he contributed substantially to the development of the tetraethyl lead compound used in "Ethyl" gasoline. Later he was transferred to the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation as research chemist.

Famed For His Research
In 1926, with Dr. Carroll A. Hochwalt, he organized the Thomas & Hochwalt Laboratories at Dayton, Ohio, which specialized in research work for industrial organizations.

Thomas & Hochwalt Laboratories were acquired by Monsanto Chemical Company in 1934, and Dr. Thomas became central research director of Monsanto. He joined Monsanto's board of directors in 1942 and was elected vice-president and a member of the company's executive committee in 1945.

Two years later he was elected executive vice-president and a member of the finance committee. He was elected vice chairman of the executive committee in 1948 and became its chairman the next year.

He was elected president of the company in 1951 and chairman of the board in 1960. Dr. Thomas continues to serve as a member of the company's finance and executive committees.

Worked on Atomic Bomb

During World War II, Dr. Thomas was one of the principal scientists in the development of the atomic bomb. He was in charge of the final purification and metallurgy of one of the bomb's elements, plutonium. In recognition of his wartime work in this field, Dr. Thomas was one of a group of scientists who received the Medal of Merit from then Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson.

Dr. Thomas was one of the five co-authors of the 1946 "Report on the International Control of Atomic Energy," prepared for the Secretary of State's Committee on Atomic Energy. The report, commonly known as the Acheson-Lilienthal Report, proposed a master plan for the international control of atomic energy.

Since World War II, Dr. Thomas has been engaged in numerous other government activities. They include the chairmanship of the Scientific Manpower Advisory Committee of the National Security Resources Board, and consultant to the President's National Security Council. He is now a member of the Business Advisory Council of the Department of Commerce, and of President Eisenhower's Committee on Civilian National Honors.

Among the honors Dr. Thomas received are the Perkin Medal, the highest award for achievement in American industrial chemistry, and the Priestly Medal, highest award of the American Chemical Society.

Dr. Thomas is a member of the American Chemical Society. He served as its president in 1948 and as its chairman of the board from 1950 to 1953.

He is a director of the Chemstrand Corporation, Plax Corporation, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., St. Louis Union Trust Co., the First National Bank in St. Louis, and the Rand Corporation. He is also a trustee of the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

A Phi Beta Kappa
Dr. Thomas is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and a life member of both the Corporation of Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the American Institute of Chemical Engineers. He is also a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi.

The St. Louis scientist is the author of many scientific papers and the holder of a number of U.S. and foreign patents, largely in the field of organic chemistry. A book he wrote, "Anhydrous Aluminum Chloride in Organic Chemistry," is a standard text in that field.

Sanger, a sharpie, told vague and varied stories about the box's contents and disposition.
2. Jake Leatherman, who had a farm south of Bristol, revealed he'd been propositioned to bury — and subsequently "discover" — the stone man.
3. An almost identical stone giant had been exhibited in 1893 in a slideshow at Chicago's World Fair.
"The Middlebury stone man is a fake, made in Chicago and buried by parties scheming to make money," The Review concluded flatly.

Sanger, who had the exhibit, took the 19th century equivalent of the Fifth Amendment — but it was noted that his spels easily called the giant a "stone man" — not a "petrified man." Sanger knew swindle laws!

AFTER THE REVIEWS' exposure, Sanger didn't spiel long. Interest swiftly faded — and presently so did the giant.
Where the Middlebury Stone Man went, no one knows to this day.

William S. Rea, who has been teaching in Stonington, Ill., is home for the summer.

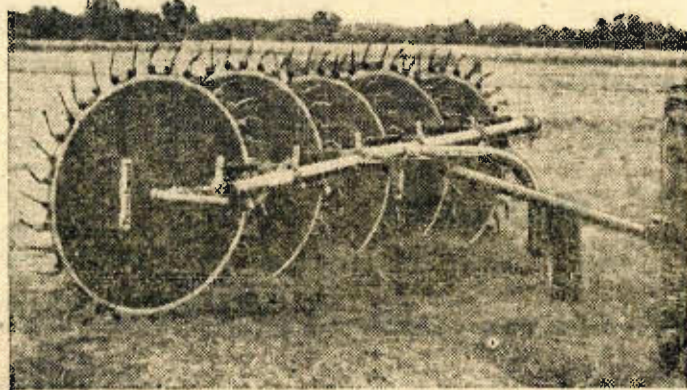
