Local Girl Qualifies For "Miss America" Contest At Atlantic City

Superb Performance Excels 16 Others At Thrilling Michigan City Pageant

Civic pride has reached fever heat in Culver since 11:05 last Saturday night when our all-around All-American girl, Tommye Lou Glaze, wearing the colors of "Miss Plymouth," virtually walked off with the "Miss Indiana" title before a sell-out crowd of 1,500 at the Tivoli Theatre in Michigan City.

Besides winning a \$1,000 Pepsi-Cola college scholarship, Miss Glaze is the recipient of a 10-day trip to the colorful Minneapolis Aquatennial July 15-24 and an all-expense trip, with her chic mother, Helen Glaze, to the great "Miss America" pageant in Atlantic City, N.J., Sept. 5-12.

Tommye Glaze is definitely "big league" with her God-given beauty, magnificent mezzo soprano voice, erudite mind, and radiant personality, and her proud sponsor, the Culver-based monthly magazine, *Indiana Business and Industry*, of which Chester W. Cleveland is publisher, is confident that at Atlantic City she will outdistance her talented competition just as she did so convincingly at the Plymouth and Michigan City pageants with their combined 34 finalists.

HEAVY TRAFFIC OVER INDIANA TOLL ROAD DURING 4-DAY HOLIDAY

An estimated 199,900 motor vehicles traveled the Northern Indiana Toll Road during the four-day July 4th holiday weekend.

Although the estimated vehicle count for the four-day period did not set a record, there were more than 3,400 patrons on the super-highway than during the comparable Independence Day holiday a year ago.

The record for the largest single day vehicle count is 64,962 established on August 10, 1958.

Friday, July 1, was the peak day during this year's holiday with an estimated 55,724 travelers using the toll facility.

There were no traffic fatalities. Although the concentration of traffic was extremely heavy, there were only 22 accidents resulting in just one serious personal injury case.

Kenneth L. Cole, of Williamsport, Ind., has been named as the new principal of the Culver-Union Township Schools, according to Trustee Eugene G. Benedict and his advisory board, consisting of Ralph A. Osborn Jr., Wayne Kline, and Maurice Nelson.

In order to accept his new Culver post, Mr. Cole has resigned as principal of the Williamsport-Washington Township Joint High School, a position he has filled successfully for the past eight years.

Fine Educational Background

Mr. Cole, 40 years of age, holds the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education from Ball State Teachers College at Muncie and a Master of Science in Education degree from Indiana State Teachers College at Terre Haute. He is currently attending Purdue University where he is completing the requirements for a superintendent's certificate.

Following active duty with the Navy in the Pacific area aboard a high speed mine sweeper during World War II, Mr. Cole since has coached both football and basketball, and taught English, health and safety, physical education, and psychology.

The Coles and their children, Sue Eloise and Stephen Leroy, hope to establish residence in Culver early in August.

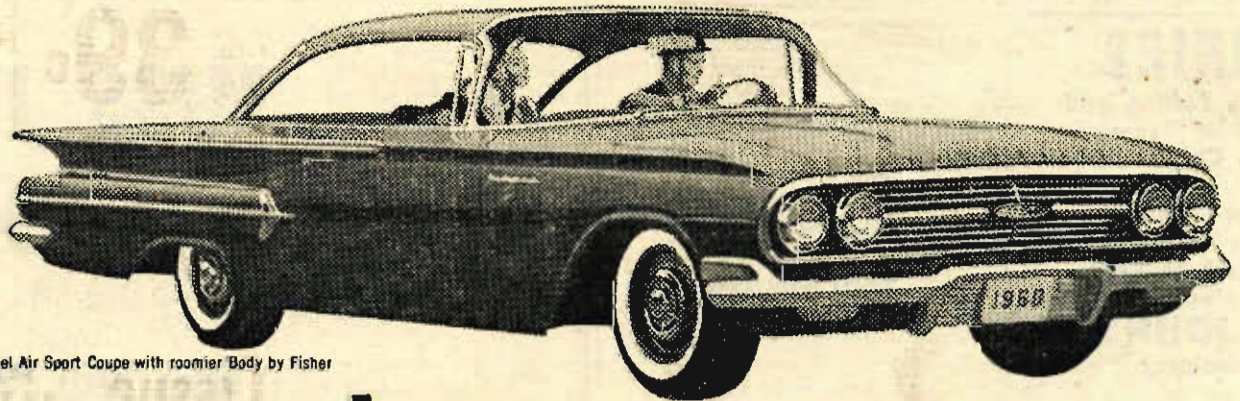

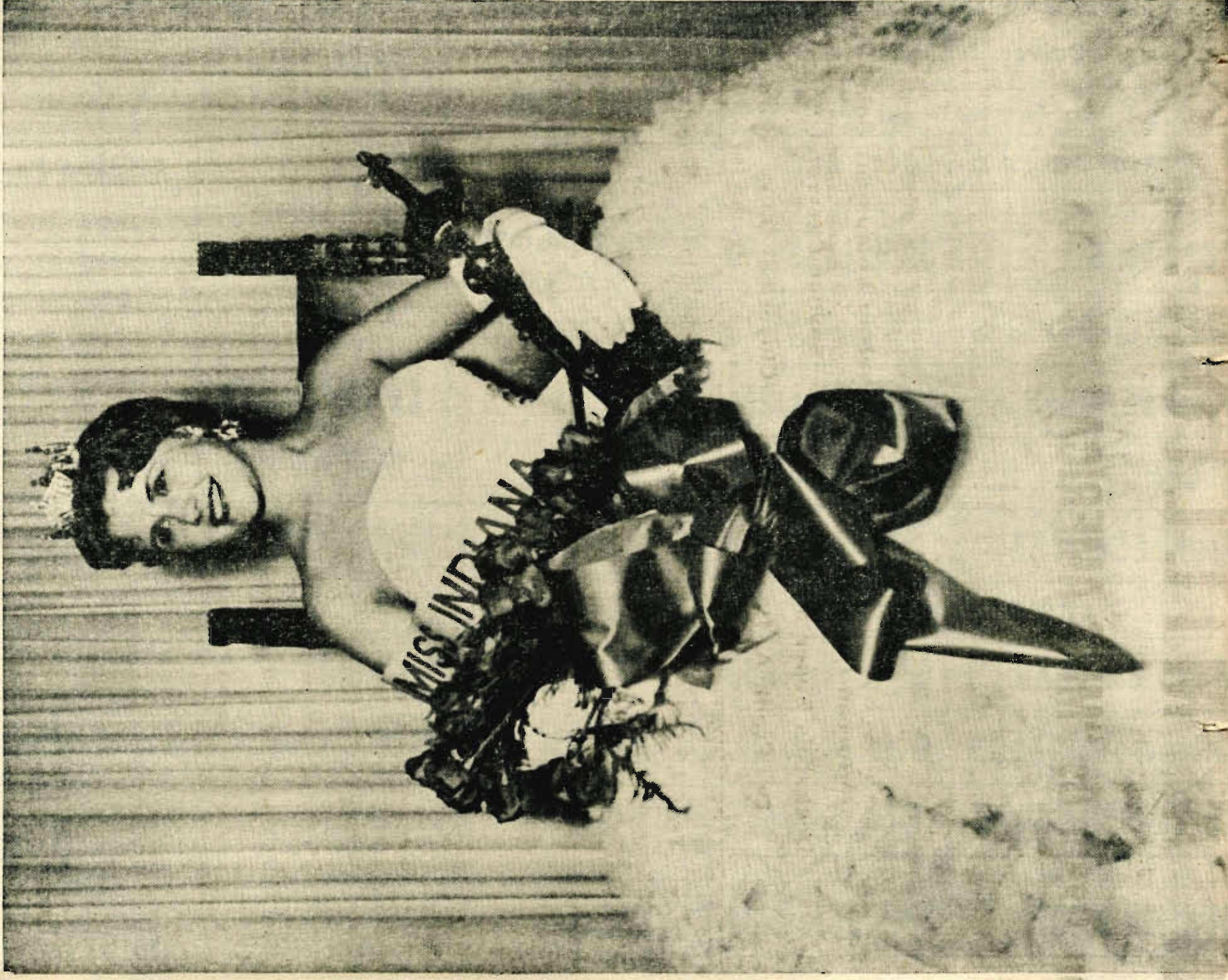

nior Division; Robert Richey, director of the university summer sessions, and Ray Fry, director of library service for the F. E. Compton and Company, encyclopedia publishers.

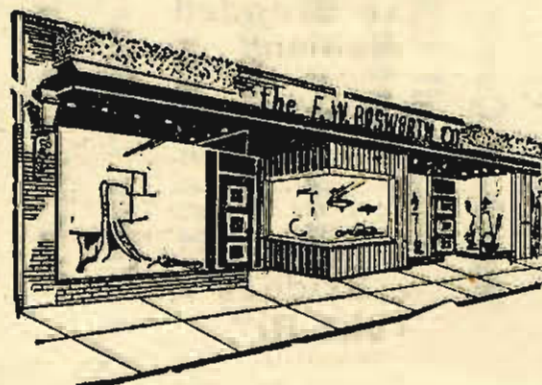

The Week With Governor Handley

Medical Help For Old Folks Who Can't Afford It

INDIANAPOLIS, July 11 — "Barring some unexpected jolt to the vigorous Hoosier economy," Governor Harold W. Handley said here today, "we should have a balanced state budget for 1961-1963 without any increases in state taxes."

"Unless the 1961 Indiana Legislature votes a run-away appropriations bill, we should be able to meet all state government needs with present tax rates and yet maintain a safe working balance in the general fund."

"The 1961 Legislature will receive a far-reaching proposal for local tax reform from the Indiana Tax Study Commission. By an equitable modernization of local taxes any Indiana community should be able to take care of necessary additions to its educational facilities without increasing the proportion of state help for local schools."

Tax Burden Reaches Limit

"Certainly we have reached the limit on the burden of property taxes. In 1957 this administration repealed the state property tax, yet local property taxes have continued to rise in too many places."

"The Legislature should now devise ways whereby counties and municipalities can readjust property taxes so that everybody shares local taxes in the same manner that state taxes are paid by all."

Governor Handley returned from the annual Governors' Conference at Glacier National Park, Montana, in time to act as marshal of the July 4 parade in his home city of LaPorte.

On Wednesday he addressed the national Townsend Plan convention in Indianapolis and held an important news conference. On Friday he made an inspection tour of Indiana State Prison at Michigan City.

Active At Governors' Meeting

Governor Handley played an important part in the conference of the Governors of the 50 American states and of America's outlying possessions. He was a mem-

ber of the executive committee, a member of the nominating committee, a discussion leader in the debates regarding national security and the problems of the aging and the aged.

Medical Help For Aged

"Every Governor at the Glacier Conference recognized the great need for medical help for elderly citizens who cannot afford it," Governor Handley reported to the Townsend Plan convention. "We differed only in the ways such a program should be financed."

"I am very reluctant to ask the worker's pay check to carry any more of the load of government. And certainly no plan or program is going to be of genuine help unless the value of the dollar is stabilized."

Our No. 1 Problem

"That is our nation's No. 1 problem today, and the Reds know it. Lenin predicted many years ago — and Stalin and Krushchev agreed completely — that the way to destroy America is to destroy the buying power of our currency."

"Every American should be vitally concerned in a sound dollar."

"There is no security for any of us — and there is no dependability in any pension or endowment or saving plan — unless we can know that tomorrow's dollar will be worth as much as today's. "We all recognize the need."

Lake Association Installs Buoys As Safety Measure

Forty brilliant red and white buoy markers have been placed around the lake by the Lake Maxinkuckee Association under the supervision of Enforcement Officer Don Wainscott of the Indiana Department of Conservation.

These markers are anchored 200 feet from the shoreline, and indicate that all boats must run at reduced speed (not more than 10 miles an hour) inside these markers at all times.

This is in accordance with the new boat safety regulations of Indiana, conform to the rules of the U.S. Coast Guard which have been adopted for all inland waters.

Can Be Fined \$40

Officer Wainscott pointed out that the law provides for a heavy fine up to \$40 and costs and a possible jail sentence for any removal, defacement or destruction of these markers.

All power boat operators are requested to respect the law in regard to speed inside these markers, for the protection of swimmers and others using the waters of the lake close to shore.

Lake patrol officers Raymond J. Ives and James R. Cox, assisted by Officer Wainscott and Don Trone, secretary of the Lake Maxinkuckee Association, placed these attractive and easily seen markers last week.

Another Association Service

They were purchased by the Lake Association, and are another of the fine services provided by the organization for the safety of everyone who enjoys the lake.

Due to the great increase in boating and the use of more powerful motors, as well as the growing popularity of water skiing and skin-diving, the strict observance of all sections of the new Indiana Water Safety Law is required. Copies of the complete boating regulations may be obtained at any of the local boat houses or from the Lake Patrol enforcement officers.
