"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

Albert U. Rupel - Forgotten Indiana Aviation Pioneer

BUT FOR A PECULIAR, pedal irony, Albert Ulysses Rupel, an ingenious, small-town Hoosier, might have been one of aviation's great pioneers.

Rupel's feet were strangely entwined in his tragic destiny. One foot injury thrust him into early aviation, a second into an early grave . . . on the brink of success.

RUPEL WAS born July 1, 1880, at Wall in Jay County, northeast of Muncie near the Ohio line. Once Wall had a post office, two general stores, and a saloon but now it's off the map.

After his schooling, Rupel found an outlet for natural mechanical talents in the great Hoosier oil-and-gas boom that flourished as the century turned.

Engines fascinated young Albert. When he wasn't working on big ones in the gas fields he was making little ones at home to run outter churns, washing machines, and whatnot.

THEN ONE sad 1903 day a huge gas engine flywheel slipped and crushed Rupel's foot. While immobilized, he studied stationary engineering . . . and began to read about early flying machines.

"I've built kites and engines," mused Albert one day. "Why not an airplane."

WHEN RUPEL'S FOOT healed, he tackled the task. No crackpot or fool, he first poured his skill and ideas into a small, kite-like test model with an eight-foot wing-spread.

Ingeniously built of pliable hickory strips, oilcloth, glue and wire, Rupel's model had wings resembling a searing bird's and a sort of pigeon tail.

RUPEL TESTED his model by affixing a long, strong cord and running it into the air, like a boy launching a kite.

It flew — wobbly at first, then with greater and greater stability as Rupel skillfully adjusted the wing angle and tail upturn. Then he added test loads of heavy bricks and perfected the craft's balance.

"Now," vowed Albert, "I'll build an airplane that will carry me."

A SCANT FEW MONTHS after the Wright brothers made their first powered flight, ingenious, self-taught Albert Rupel began building his airplane, bit by laborious bit.

This time he fashioned a strong frame of iron and steel tubing, covered wings and tail with eight-ounce duck. Four 14-inch wheels with pneumatic tires supported the craft.

Rupel planned to use two four-

87% Of Aubbeenaubee Voters Sign Petition Favoring Consolidation With Culver-Union Township Schools

We, the advisory Committee of Aubbeenaubee Township, Fulton County, with the overwhelming support of our people, present the following plan for your consideration:

Aubbeenaubee Township to merge with Union Township, Marshall County.

Richland Township to merge with Walnut and Green Townships, Marshall County.

New Castle Township and Henry Township to merge with Kosciusko County Unit.

Union Township to merge with Caston District.

Liberty and Wayne Townships to remain in Caston District.

Rochester City and Rochester Township to remain as one unit.

We feel that this plan would be the most acceptable to the majority of the townships involved, and that the transition could be made with the least friction.

One other plan was discussed. Although not as large a vote was represented, we believe the second choice of our people to be a five-township merger combining Aubbeenaubee, Richland, Newcastle, Henry, and Union.

Having talked to several people who have had experience in forced consolidation, they all stated that it takes at least one generation to unify a school where force was used.

The decision you render will affect every family and taxpayer in Fulton County.

We, of Aubbeenaubee, would like to point out that the recommendations of several of the townships do not represent a true and accurate picture of the will of the people.

When we had our first meeting approximately 150 people attended and voted in a vast majority to merge with Union Township (Culver), Marshall County. However, we felt that this number was not sufficient so we carried a petition to the people to get as many of their ideas as possible. To this petition we received 463 of the registered voters of Aubbeenaubee Township (87%).

Now let us compare this to the voting of the rest of the townships.

Henry Township — 149 of 1,529 registered voters — 9.08%

Newcastle Township — 80 of 511 registered voters — 15.65%

Union Township — 23 of 953 registered voters — 2.32%

Liberty and Wayne Townships did not release any figures but since they had an election in which they voted to consolidate in the Caston District this proved that a majority in both townships were in favor of such action.

Richland Township also did not release any figures on their voting but since the attendance was low it is only logical to say that their percentage was low, too.

As for Rochester City and Rochester Township, they gave a unanimous vote to Plan (1), but

since no election and voting choice was offered to the people we feel that this is just the Committee's idea and not the people.

We feel that 87% of the people who have signed this petition does constitute a true and accurate picture.

In view of the facts, we of Aubbeenaubee feel that we can not and will not be bound to any other plan by the vote of such a small minority.

OTHER REASONS FOR SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION

To further support our claim of distance to school being a great factor:

A single unit such as Plan (1) would undoubtedly place the school in the vicinity of Rochester, and comparing the distances of the two towns, Rochester is 12 miles from Leiters Ford while Culver is 7 miles. This is a difference of 5 miles, (one way).

It would take two busses to transport our children to a school. This multiplied would be an average of 20 miles per day. Figuring 180 school days times 20 miles times 35 cents per mile it would cost the taxpayer \$1,260 per year in additional transportation alone. This saving could be returned to the taxpayer in the form of lower taxes or added to the curricula to improve their education to the standards required and demanded by the State reorganization committee.

Also consider the type and condition of the roads leading to these two towns. The hazardous condition of the Fulton County roads; they are not adequately maintained in the winter. Many school days will be lost by rural students as well as the great physical risk during transportation. The major portion of the road to Culver is a new state highway that is kept clear all the time.

Also the extracurricula activities of our children in Culver would not work as great a hardship on the parent because of the time-saving element in personal transportation. This would allow the student much more opportunities.

Next the farm boy who is expected to help at home. He would be available to help about 30 minutes more each day because of the shorter distance and time saved on the bus.

The law so states and it is the parents obligation to protect the welfare of the child. We think this should merit your grave concern in any plan you consider and adopt.

Proposed Consolidation Of Aubbeenaubee School Township Of Fulton County and Union School Township Of Marshall County

In support of our Petition to the Fulton County Committee for the Reorganization of School Corporations asking that Aubbeenaubee School Township be permitted to consolidate with Union School Township in Marshall County, Indiana, we desire to submit the following facts and information to justify our request.

I. Chapter 202 of the Indiana Acts of 1959 states in part:

- "It is the sense of the Indiana General Assembly, now assembled; that local electors have an interest in the boundaries of the school corporation in which they reside and will exercise privileges as herein provided, to the end of establishing an efficient and economical reorganization plan, but suited to local conditions.
- "Each Community school corporation shall be as nearly as practicable a natural social and economic community."

II. Consolidation of these two townships is reasonable, logical, and feasible because:

Proposed Consolidation Of Aubbeenaubee School Township Of Fulton County and Union School Township Of Marshall County

1. These townships constitute a natural geographical area and are knit together by a system of improved county roads and state highways.
2. The pupil population would be about One Thousand (1,000). The assessed valuation per student would be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or twice the minimum requirement. The total area included would be Seventy-eight (78) square miles. These factors are adequate to it possible to support an excellent educational program make it possible to support an excellent educational program for this area.
3. Culver is the natural trade area and social center for the two townships. It has a Twenty-Three Million Dollar (\$23,000,000) bank. It affords several churches, both Catholic and Protestant. Lake Maxinkuckee is located in Union Township, as is the Culver Military Academy. Excellent fire protection is provided for both the suburban and rural areas.
4. Excellent educational opportunities would be available for all students. The Culver High School holds a first commission issued by the State Department of Public Instruction and has held membership in the North Central Association, which is a combination of several schools and colleges, continuously for over thirty (30) years.
5. Aubbeenaubee Township has Five Hundred Sixty-three (563) registered voters, and Four Hundred Sixty-three (463) have signed the Petitions for this consolidation. Any other solutions would be in direct opposition to the wishes of our people.
6. The role of extra curricular activities in the total educative process increases each year. Most of such activities are carried on outside the regular school day. Any consolidation that makes it difficult for students to participate in these desirable activities is unwise and will result in many pupils being denied the benefits of the training they deserve.
7. Desirable parent-teacher relationships can be attained in a school, only if the school is located in the shopping, banking, religious, and social center of its patrons.
8. This consolidation would in no way adversely affect the consolidation of other school corporations in Marshall and Fulton Counties because of the general location of these two townships.
9. The intent of the law is to provide an efficient and adequate educational opportunity for all the pupils in grades one (1) through twelve (12), and the proposed consolidation would make this possible.

Those selected for the Deans' Honors Lists are invited to participate in the annual Founders' Day Program in May when the University marks its birthday with tribute to scholastic excellence.

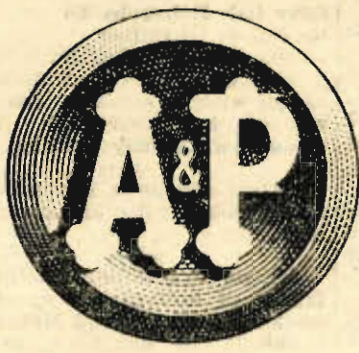

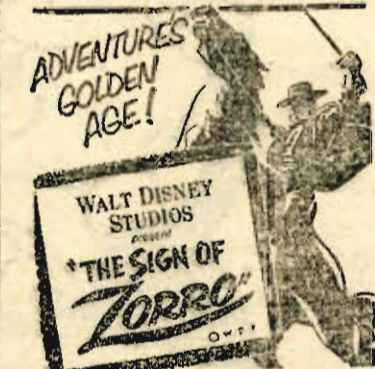

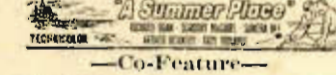

August 2, 1950 —

Culver clinched the county baseball title and finished the season with a record of 6 wins and 1 loss. Joann Kantzer of Logansport swam the length of Lake Maxinkuckee July 29 negotiating the 2.6 mile course in 3 hours and 40 minutes. Marilyn Bryan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Bryan of Culver, and R. Winston Fitzgerald were united in marriage July 30 in the Culver Evangelical United Brethren Church.

July 31, 1940 —
Ben Oberlin has sold the Ben Franklin Store to F. D. Amond, of Ambrose, N. J. and will give possession on Aug. 1. How Russell McCarty escaped with his life from one of the worst wrecked cars ever seen here, remains a mystery. The accident occurred on the Maxinkuckee Road. Harry Edgington is reported to be improving satisfactorily after undergoing an emergency operation for a ruptured appendix at Parkview Hospital. Mrs. Lavina Burch, 68, widow of Charles Burch, died at Parkview Hospital, Plymouth, July 26. George W. Davis, 80, resident of the vicinity of Culver for 50 years, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. D. Heiser, near Culver on July 31. The annual McLane reunion was held July 28 in the Town Park with 60 present. Dale Brown, Dick Hoesel, Ernest Starr, and Sammy Schrimsher are attending the second period of Boy Scout Camp at Lake of the Woods. Arthur Kemple will remain at the camp as assistant waterfront director.

July 30, 1930 —
Wind of unusual velocity visited this vicinity July 27 and 28, but little damage was done. The brunt of the storm hit Logansport, where telephone, telegraph, and electric lines were torn down. Ervin Nelson, golf pro at the Academy and Mike Milliser, pro at Plymouth and Bass Lake courses were in Anderson July 28 and 29 taking part in the Indiana Professional Golfers Association tournament. Local Boy Scouts have been admitted as guests to the Woodcraft Camp in the Culver Summer Schools for a period of one week. Thomas Woodbridge attended last week and Richard Behmer and William Staddon are attending this week. Immediate relief from speedboat nuisance has been promised vacationers. The enforcement of the law has been lax in the past. Due to the severe drought, the hay and oats crops in Indiana will fall below average. Phil McLane is the winner in the city checker tournament, beating Cecil Young. He will play the state champion August 1.

August 4, 1920 —
Willard R. Zechiel has been appointed county agricultural agent for Cass County. The Huntington-Mantion-Culver trail is said to be the best marked of any in the state. The initials H-M-C are painted in 18 inch white letters on the telephone poles.

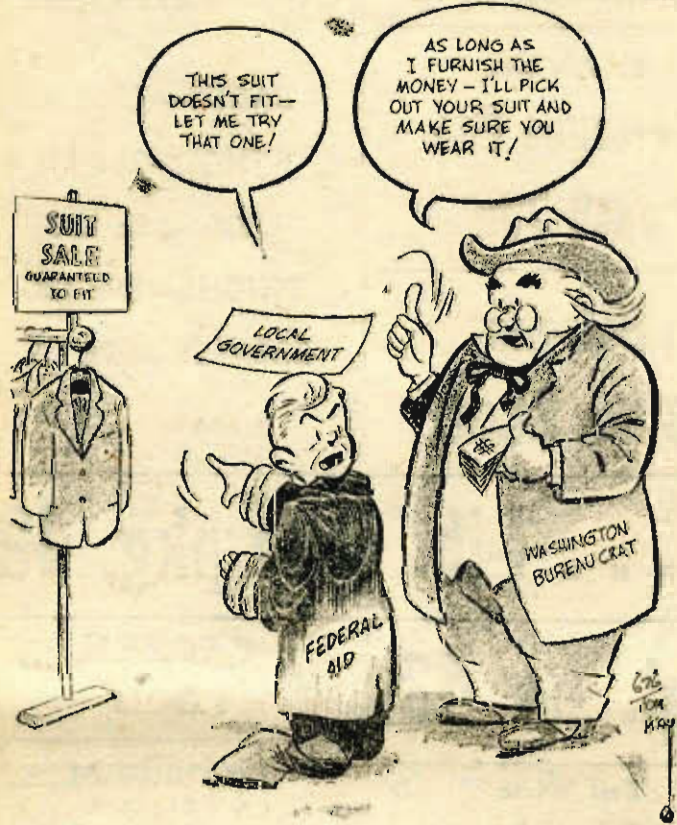

Colonel Payson says that the band regrets it cannot visit the South Shore of the lake because of shallow water in that area.

Lake residents with boats are invited to follow alongside the FOWLER to enjoy the concert. However, Colonel Payson urges that power boats not be used or, if it is necessary to use power boats, their noise must be kept to an absolute minimum. He particularly requests motors be silenced while in the vicinity of the FOWLER.

Other residents and visitors are invited to listen to the concert from the shore or piers extending into the water.

bladed, optimum-pitch props, chain-driven by an engine mounted under the pilot's seat.

But he hit a snag trying to find a light, powerful engine. Only heavy marine motors were readily available and Rupel knew they wouldn't do.

SO HE DECIDED to flight-test his plane and tackle the power problem later. If necessary, he'd build his own engine.

Rupel tested his airplane in October, 1904, only 10 months after Orville Wright's flight. At first, everything went wrong.

Towed by a car across an open field, Rupel's craft was just getting off the ground when a gust dipped one wing and crushed two of the fragile wheels.

Undismayed, Rupel removed all four wheels and substituted skids for a second try. This time the tow car stalled.

SO JIM HOLLINGSWORTH of Winchestery nitched Rupel's flying machine to a team of draft horses and whipped them into a fast gallop.

Like an eager bird Rupel's craft soared above the tree tops and returned smoothly to earth. Turned around and horse-towed anew, it flew perfectly a second time.

Satisfied, young Albert Rupel folded his plane's wings, stored it for the winter, and began scouting for the right engine.

Early the following summer, he refined and improved the craft and was on the verge of puzzling out the problem when the aforesaid peculiar, pedal irony occurred.

A crushed foot had thrust Rupel into aviation. On Aug. 12, 1904, he stepped on a rusty nail. Five days later he was dead of tetanus.

RUPEL'S PLANE, which might have carried him to fame in aviation's pioneer days, never flew again.
