"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

Marshall County Couple Has Visited The Graves Of All U. S. Presidents

FOREST and ELLEN LEHMAN, two middle-aged youths with four home towns, are a determined pair who usually get what they go after.

Like autumn a year ago when Forest went after a photograph of Cataract Falls down in Owen County, Indiana.

Stepping gingerly onto a moss-draped rock, he slipped and took a nasty nose dive that knocked him cold. When he awakened instants later, the dazed shutterbug tenderly explored his pains. Then, remembering his mission, he scrambled to his feet and photographed the falls.

"I went to the hospital with three busted ribs," he recalls, "but I got my picture."

Equal — though less painful — persistence was displayed often by Ellen and Forest during a unique five-year project, i.e., collecting slide-photographs of every American Presidential grave.

CURIOSITY ABOUT this off-beat hobby led me to the Lehman's cozy farm home along U. S. 6 in Marshall County — a fertile, 40-acre tract situated east of Walkerton (their mailing address), west of LaPaz (their phone exchange), north of Tyner (where Ellen teaches second grade), and south of Teegarden (where Forest's farming business centers).

"Any way you look at it," Forest shrugs, "we're smack-dab in the middle. Never have figured out which town we belong to."

IN 1953, the Lehmans used their vacation weeks to compile a photographic slide-study of Abraham Lincoln's life.

Camera clicking, they traced Abe's path of life through Indiana, Kentucky, and Washington. Trail's end was his tomb at Springfield, Ill.

COLLECTION COMPLETED. Ellen and Forest felt mixed emotions. They were gladdened by their accomplishment, yet saddened by the end of a fascinating experience.

Then they had a happy inspiration. There were 29 other Presidential burial places. Why not visit and photograph them all?

This began a painstaking project that took the Lehmans 9,000 miles through five summer vacations into 17 states. Spare hours at home were devoted to itinerary planning.

SEVEN CEMETERY SITES were visited by Forest and Ellen in 1954. A quick trip took them to the graves of William Henry Harrison in North Bend, Ohio.

Consolidation Of Schools Given Encouragement

Three Townships In Agreement

Citizens of Marshall, Fulton, and Starke Counties have been legally notified by the trustees and advisory boards of Union, Aubbe-naubbee, and North Bend Townships of their intent to form a school corporation of the three townships.

At a joint meeting on Oct. 11 they adopted a resolution declaring their intention to consolidate the respective school corporations into a new school district to be known as the Culver Community Schools.

Create Five-Man Board

In the resolution the committee declared the corporation shall be governed by a five-man board of trustees.

One person would be appointed from each township, one from the Town of Culver, and the fifth member would be appointed by the advisory board of Aubbe-naubbee Township and North Bend Township for alternate periods.

The consolidated school would be under the direction of a superintendent selected by the board. The members of the board to be first appointed would take office on Aug. 1, 1961.

Based On 1947 Legislation

The committees resolved to consolidate their respective school corporations pursuant to Chapter 123 of the 1947 Acts of the Indiana State Legislature, as amended by the Acts of the 1949 Legislature.

Chamber's Road Committee Makes Another Report

Reject Repairing Of Route 10

The Culver-Union Township Chamber of Commerce met at The Culver Inn last Monday noon.

The Chamber's Road Committee chairman, Don Davis, reported on the activities of that group during the past few weeks. Mr. Davis and other members of the committee met with the Indiana Highway Commission in Indianapolis last month.

The condition of the State Road system in and around Union Township was discussed, as were future plans for improvement of the roads.

Commissioners' Terms Expiring

Mr. Davis stated that the Commission made no promises, as their terms of office will expire with Governor Handley's administration in January.

During the last week, according to the Road Committee, inquiries have been made by the commission to determine if the people of the community want Indiana 10 to be improved, from Bass Lake to new 17, or would be content with re-surfacing at the present.

Against Temporary Repairs

After some discussion it was evident that those members present felt that we should ask for a complete improvement of the route, as any temporary measures would only delay major work.

A vote was taken and the Chamber showed itself to be solidly in favor of a major improvement of Road 10.

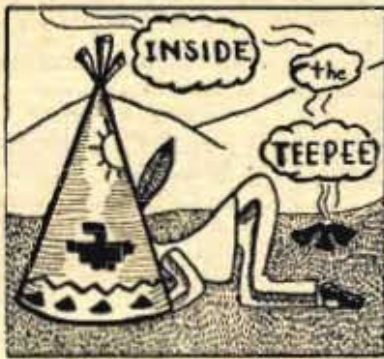

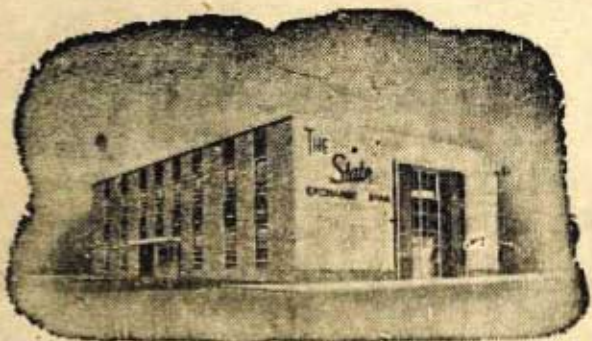

A longer Ohio excursion included visits to plots holding Harding at Marion, Garfield at Cleveland, McKinley at Canton, and Hayes at Fremont.

In Buffalo, N.Y., they photographed Fillmore's resting place. **WILSON'S WASHINGTON** crypt was the starting spot for their '55 travels, followed by Taft's grave in Arlington National Cemetery.

At Mount Vernon, they documented Washington's life and death. Two Presidential plots—Tyler's and Monroe's—were found in Richmond, Va. Also in Virginia, they saw the burial places of Madison, near Orange, and Jefferson, at historic Monticello.

NEW ENGLAND Presidential graves were on their 1956 agenda. The Lehmans visited the two Adams' adjoining crypts in Quincy, Mass., Coolidge's plot at Plymouth, Vt., Pierce's at Concord, N.H., Cleveland's at Princeton, N.J., and Buchanan's at Lancaster, Pa.

They also photographed five burial sites in New York—FDR's garden plot at Hyde Park, Teddy Roosevelt's on Long Island, Arthur's at Menands, Van Buren's at Kinderhook, and Grant's celebrated tomb in Gotham.

A final trip in 1957 wrapped up their unusual collection. They saw Polk's monument in Nashville, Tenn., and Jackson's nearby plantation plot. At Greenville, Tenn., they visited Johnson's grave—and ended their travels at Taylor's tomb in Louisville, Ky.

BESIDES ENRICHING their historical knowledge and amassing a fine collection of photographic color slides, the Lehmans assembled many odd, intriguing facts about our deceased Chief Executives and their final resting places.

But that's another story . . . for the readers of next week's Culver Citizen.
