"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

Our Columnist Calls On An Interesting Fellow At Rochester's Lake Manitou

(A Vacation Reprint)

FLOYD (JACK) MATTICE, the big, amiable Hoosier lawyer who helped send Japan's Tojo to the gallows for war crimes, left a typical chore when I came to chat at his Fulton County home.



Jack, a broad-chested six-footer with bristly gray hair and a genial, time-lined face, was splitting tough oak logs into fireplace wood. In two days, he'd split two cords.

That's a lot of axe-swinging for anyone and Mattice is 76. Even so, he was mildly apologetic. A year ago he fell and badly broke his right arm.

"It mended perfectly — but I still must favor it," Jack said. "Slows my work!"

THE ARM WON'T keep Mattice from enjoying his favorite sport this winter, however. He'll be ice-skating, as usual, on Rochester's Lake Manitou, where he lives.

And next summer he's tempted to mark the 50th anniversary of a youthful feat by doing it again. In 1909, Mattice was the first man to swim the 3 1/2-mile length of Lake Manitou. His time: one hour and 55 minutes.

Could he repeat next year at 77? Jack thinks so.

"But," he confessed, blue eyes twinkling, "I suspect I'd need more than two hours this time."

SURPRISINGLY, Jack Mattice's robust durability isn't the product of a physically active career. Before retiring in 1956, he practiced law 50-odd years.

But unlike most barristers who settle and root in one spot, Jack wandered widely.

Born and reared in Ohio, Mattice finished high school and learned law in Granfather Julius Rowley's office at Rochester and the University of Michigan.

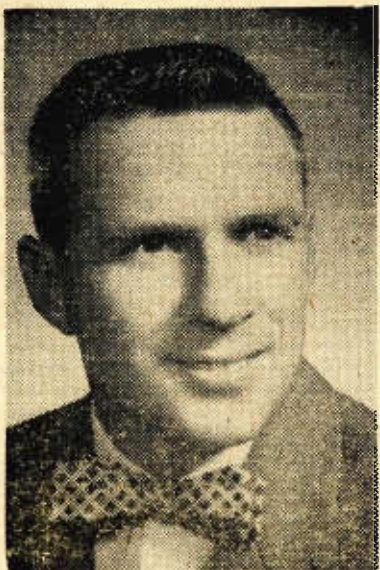
GRADUATING IN 1905, he joined Rowley's firm and a year later was elected Fulton County prosecutor. Re-elected in 1908, he wed Charlotte Kellem and prepared to spend a settled life in Rochester.

World War I changed everything. The U. S. Bureau of Investigation (now the FBI) badly needed lawyers with criminal trial backgrounds.

So Jack accepted an Indianapolis post in 1917, shifting a year later to the U. S. Attorney's staff. After GOPs won in 1920, Jack, a Democrat, decided to practice in Indianapolis.

Erudite Author Of "The Gazetteer, 1735-1797"

Writes New Book On Journalism In England

The following story from The Chicago Tribune concerns the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Haig, Sr., of 2358 East Shore Lane, who is in residence in England and will not return to the United States until next August:

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 21 — Prof. Robert L. Haig Jr., University of Illinois department of English, is the author of a new book on 18th century journalism in England to be published by the Southern Illinois University Press.

The work is entitled, "The Gazetteer, 1735-1797," and deals with the history of the then most famous daily newspaper published in England.

Prof. Haig has studied the files of the newspaper itself and his book is illuminated with extensive quotations from its columns.

More significant for the history of English journalism is his use of a group of manuscript records and accounts, discovered as recently as 1952, which provide a more fully documented report of the management and production of The Gazetteer than has hitherto existed for any newspapers of the period.

In junior varsity competition, the Academy reserves won both games, defeating Howe, 48-35, and LaPaz, 53-22. The Academy freshmen Saturday won over Argos, 36-23.

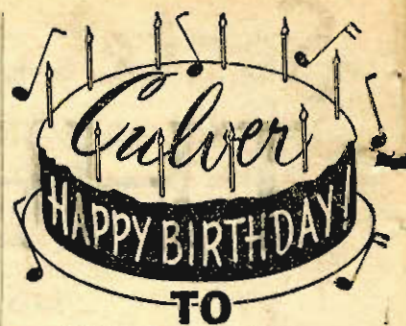
Services will be held in the Foster and Good Funeral home in Rochester at 2 p.m. today with Elder Forrest Myers of South Bend, officiating.

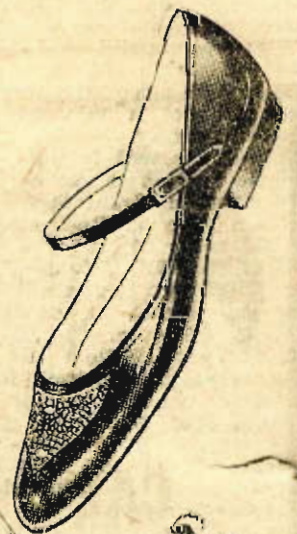

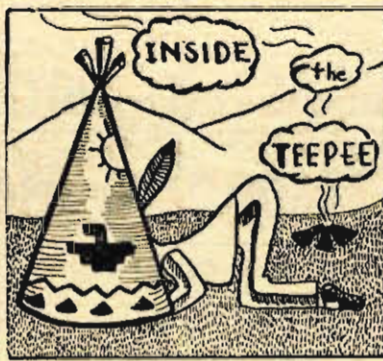

I have found that a good reputation is a great thing. Whether a man realizes it or not, his reputation is either working for him or against him. When asking for a job or as a qualification for college, a recommendation tells not only your qualities that are suited for the job but also your traits of character. Your reputation will determine the amount of help and consideration people will give you when you are having difficulties. 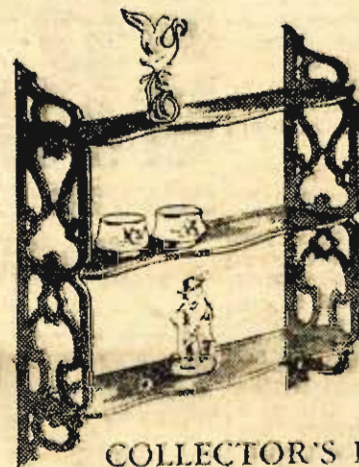

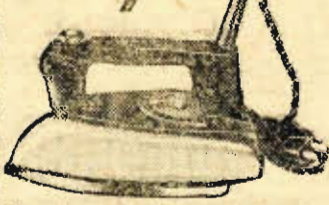

The company's tax payments this year are \$786,269.04 higher than in 1959.

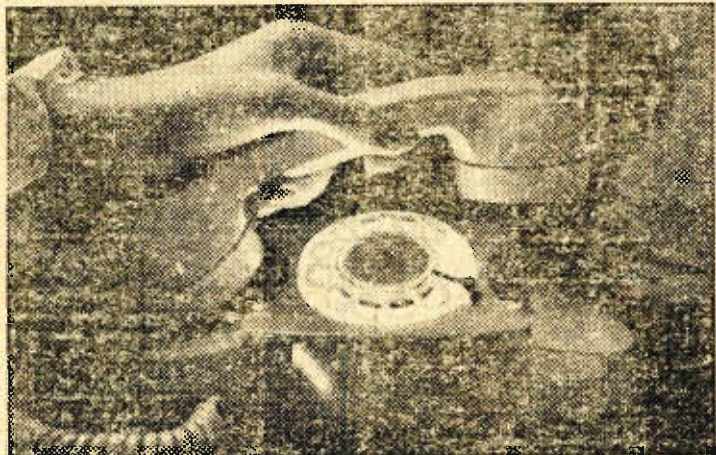

IN THE '30's, he served four years as Marion County's chief deputy prosecutor, and four more as Indianapolis city attorney. In 1942, Mattice moved again — this time to Washington to be chief counsel of U. S. Senator Fred Van Nuys' Judiciary Committee. After Van Nuys died, Jack was grabbed by the Justice Department to prosecute war contract fraud cases all over the U. S.

BY THEN, the only Mattice child — now Mrs. Glen O. Marsh of Bluffton — had married. Jack enjoyed the work and Charlotte the travel.

Then one day early in 1946, Attorney General Tom Clark phoned Jack in Chicago and asked, "Like to go to Japan?"

"Why not?" chuckled Mattice. "You've sent me everywhere in the U. S."

Loaned to the War Department, Mattice was flown to Japan to prosecute Premier Tojo and 27 like-ilk war criminals.

"The trials lasted almost three years," Mattice recalled. "Tojo and six others were condemned to hang and all but one of the rest got life."

That settled, Jack returned to his former work. In 1953, he qualified for compulsory retirement while handling some critical cases.

TO KEEP MATTICE on the job — as a retiree — President Eisenhower had to sign an executive decree. That tickles Jack.

"Imagine — and me a staunch, lifelong Democrat, yet!" he chortled. "Besides, they kept me self-employed long enough to qualify for social security — so now I get two pensions."

Since retiring in June, 1956, Mattice and his wife have lived winters in the Marsh's home on Lake Manitou. Summers they travel.

As we chatted in Jack's pleasant study, Mrs. Mattice came in for something and Jack began tapping the table with his pipe.

"What'd I tap, dear?" Jack asked.

CHARLOTTE'S EYES smiled as she replied, "That's our secret."

My puzzlement amused Mattice. "I tapped 'I love you' in Morse," he chuckled. "Among other things, I'm an old telegrapher, you know . . . and I think I'm the first man to 'broadcast' a college

football game — way back in 1903."

That started a whole new story!

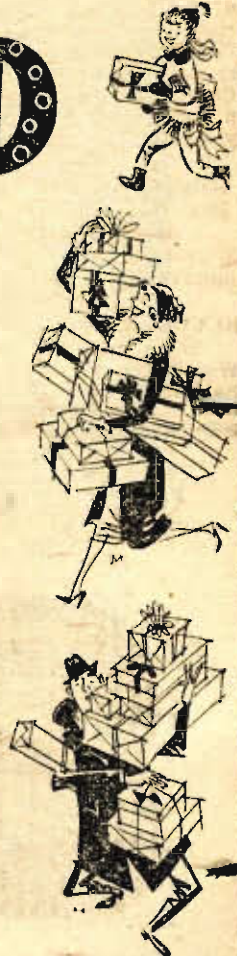

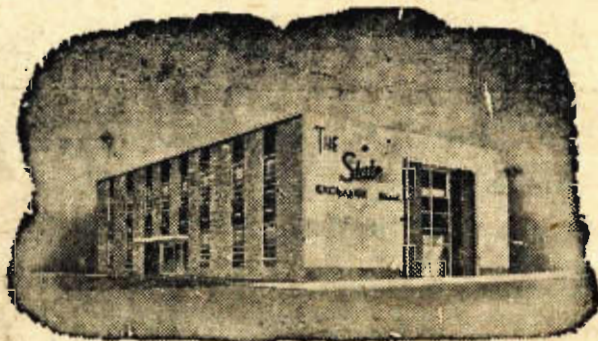

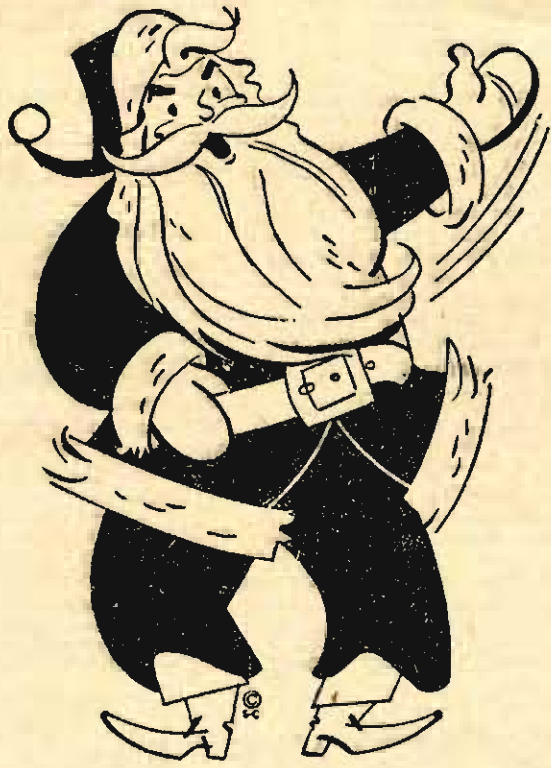

Culver Indians Lose To North Judson, 47-38

Meet Bourbon and Knox On Weekend

The Culver Indians were side-tracked Tuesday night by the North Judson Blue Jays on the winners' home floor, 47 to 38. The loss evened Culver's record at 2-2 for the young season.

Both teams held the opponents' big gun far below his average. Culver, overloading its zone defense on Ray Gundlach's side, held the jump-shooting senior to seven points. However, Culver's Gary Dillon, who carried a 19.7 ppg average into the game, was covered all night, and was held to 8 markers. George Watkins of Judson and Culver's Tom Boswell shared scoring honors with 12 points apiece.

Culver's B-Team once again showed definite signs of improvement, but were beaten, 51 to 35. George Herr and Rick Ervin led the Papposes with nine points each, but Emil Distel and Jerry Trinosky had 13 apiece for Judson's Baby Jays.

Friday night the undefeated Redskins of Knox visit the local gymnasium for what should be a great game. Saturday night, Cul-

ver completes a very busy week with a visit to Bourbon.
