Cardinal Ritter's Appointment By Pope Acclaimed

Visited Culver Several Times

The elevation of the Archbishop of St. Louis, Joseph E. Ritter, to Cardinal by Pope John XXIII last Friday was greeted here by the many friends he made over the years.

As guest of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer A. Steffen at their East Shore home on Lake Maxinkuckee, he was also welcomed throughout the community for his ever-present smile and friendly manner.

This latest high priest of the Roman Catholic Church is a most kindly person and delighted to mingle with Lake and town folks.

Enjoyed Local Hamburgers

He particularly liked Lottie Marshall's tavern hamburgers and said they were the best he ever tasted. The late Charles Lambert and Frank Menser were always there for good conversation, when he and Elmer Steffen, and sometimes W. Kerfoot Stewart, another East Sider, gathered for a chat or two.

Observed Birthdays Here

Joseph Cardinal Ritter, always tried to be in Culver on his birth date — July 19 — until his pressing duties as Archbishop forced him elsewhere.

Attended Maxinkuckee Playhouse

He was an attendant at the Maxinkuckee Playhouse, and would walk down the Lane greeting persons, many of who wondered "just who was that nice little fellow, wearing an inconspicuous sport shirt?"

Loved Kyle's Raspberries

The Robert Kyles' garden was another favorite stop, attracted especially by the red raspberries of which he is particularly fond.

This writer recalls he and Mrs. Kyle once found him on his hands-and-knees — scrubbing the Steffen kitchen floor. It was his last day at the Lake. Mr. and Mrs. Steffen were ill that summer, help was at a premium, so the Archbishop pitched in and did the household chores.

Ardent Baseball Fan

He is a baseball fan and the always welcomed guest of Gusie Busch, who owns the St. Louis Cardinals and is president of Anheuser-Busch.

Native-Born Hoosier

He was born at New Albany, educated at St. Meinrad Abbey in Southern Indiana, and became a parish priest in Indianapolis. He followed Bishop Chartrand as bishop, and became archbishop when that diocese was enlarged, and was later transferred to St. Louis.

Beloved In Indianapolis

In Indianapolis he was known to hundreds in all denominations and walks of life, often seen walking the streets with his frequent companion, the late Father George Dunne, talking with everyone, and darting in and out of stores and offices.

Denounced Segregation

Cardinal Ritter was the first high churchman of any denomination to denounce school segregation, and threatened with excommunication any member of his church who attempted it.

Culver Indians Beat Rochester By 68-62 Score

Foot Injury Forces Dillon Out Of Game

The Culver Indians exploded in the second half last Friday night to defeat the Rochester Zebras, 68 to 62, on the losers' home floor. The victory sent the Indians' season record over the .500 mark at 4-3.

Rochester, who now has won three and lost four, started well against their guests, jumping to a 16 to 11 first quarter lead, while Culver was trying to figure out the foreign goals. The In-

dians began whittling away at the lead in the second period until senior guard Gary Dillon was forced out of action with a severely sprained foot. With no one else hitting well, Coach Tom Benbrook's forces fell behind 35 to 25 at halftime.

But then Lance Overmyer and Larry Davis took over. The two senior front line men led a quick third quarter surge that put Culver back in the game. Both boys rebounded magnificently and scorched the nets constantly throughout the second half. By the end of three periods, Rochester's lead was 48 to 47. Tom Boswell and John Benedict both were

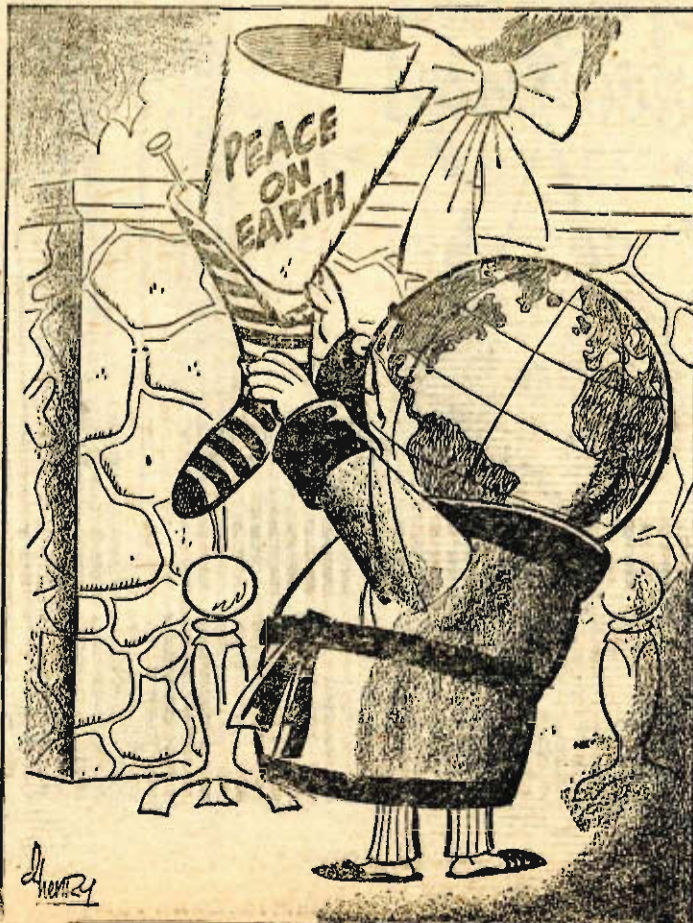

Scholarship Fund At CMA Is Increased

120 Cadets Get Financial Aid

Culver Military Academy announced today that 15% of its student body is receiving scholarship aid amounting to \$120,550.

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (Ret.), superintendent, said the 120 scholarship students attending the Academy are an increase of 35 over those of a year ago. Additionally, the amount of funds available for scholarship aid has been increased by \$34,200 over the total in 1959-60.

"These increases are part of an accelerated program at Culver to place more boys on scholarship each year," General Spivey said. "In our democratic society, Culver feels the responsibility of making available its educational facilities to potentially good students irrespective of their ability to pay."

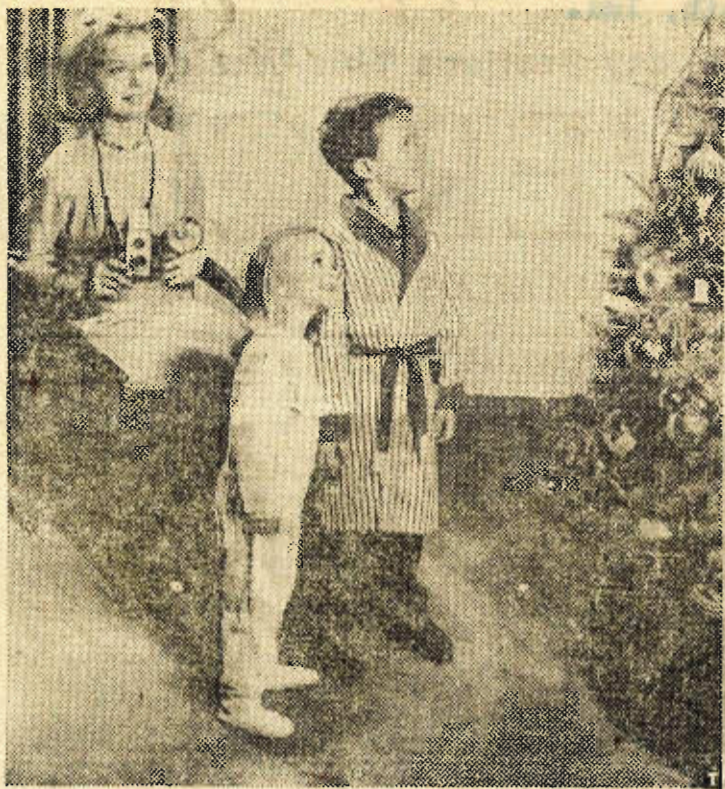
Future Goal

"Our goal in the future," the superintendent added, "is to place 25% of our student body of \$25 on scholarship. The presence of these boys is a stimulus to the entire student body. We find in nearly every case, scholarship recipients are the leaders in all phases of our school life."

The increase in funds available for scholarships is due largely to the continued success of the Investment in Youth program, initiated in 1957 with the primary objectives of improving teacher salaries and increasing the number of scholarships to the Academy and Summer Schools. Gifts amounting to \$395,040 from alumni, parents, friends, and foundations received during the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, supplement the scholarship endowment funds provided by alumni, patrons, and friends of the Academy and Summer Schools.

Rank First Academically

Figures released by Frank M. Bryant, dean of admissions and chairman of the scholarship committee, support the superintendent's statement. In the last grading period at Culver, scholarship students were ranked first academically in three of four classes. In the other class, a scholarship recipient was second. Dean Bryant also points out that of seven Culver cadets recently named semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship competition, five are attending Culver with fi-

financial assistance.

Scholarship recipients for grades 8 through 11 are selected by a faculty committee of five, which reviews the background of each applicant and selects those who best meet Culver standards.

Rigid Entrance Requirements

"A scholarship applicant," says Dean Bryant, "must meet rigid entrance requirements. He must be well qualified in every instance with a good school record that places him in the upper quarter of his class. Many recipients of scholarships come from the upper 10 per cent of their classes."

"There must be a need for financial assistance. This need is shown by the parents who submit a confidential financial statement prescribed by the School Scholarship Service, established in 1957 by a group of independent schools and colleges interested in a more orderly procedure of awarding secondary school and college scholarships."

Average Scholarship Grant

The average scholarship grant to Culver amounts to \$1,000 but the grants of assistance range from \$200.00 to \$1500.000 according to need and qualification. Outstanding boys, their parents,



Claims Kennedy Disappointed By Close Vote

Expected Mandate From The People

By ROGER W. BABSON

Babson Park, Mass. — This is not an article on the election, as its outcome has been covered fully by the newspapers, the broad casting companies, and the magazine's during recent weeks.

This is a column strictly on the personality of Senator Kennedy.

Being a Massachusetts man, like him, and knowing his father, I can write frankly about him personally at the present time.

A Tremendous Worker
Senator Kennedy is a tremendous worker and very few rich men would make the sacrifices which he has personally made to secure his election.

His industrious effort started four years ago when he came near getting the nomination for the Vice Presidency on the Democratic ticket.

He then laid plans and built up an organization unequalled in any Presidential campaign.

The great crowds which he attracted, and his personal advisers, led him to believe he would win by a landslide. On the strength of this, he made many statements as to what he would do during the "Kennedy honeymoon" of 100 days.

He's Really Disappointed
Although Senator Kennedy is naturally pleased to be elected President and move into the White House in January, yet in his heart he is a much disappointed man.

He will have the honor and

prestige of being President; but he will not have the influence and power which he had expected.

Other than making appointments, both in the diplomatic service and at the head of Commissions, about the only real power he will now have will be that of the veto, and even then Congress may pass legislation over his veto.

Although Senator Kennedy won a majority of the electoral votes, these were not even unofficially confirmed until many hours after the polls closed.

His greatest disappointment was the very close popular vote, which has not yet been officially determined.

I will not discuss the legal aspects of the electoral versus the popular vote, but I do wish to make an important statement.

Although the popular vote in the recent election has no legal status, it has a great moral influence. It surely will cause Mr. Kennedy to remodel the Democratic Party and the Presidency.

May Regret Some Statements
He may now be sorry he made certain of his statements during his campaign, as he may be forced to back track on many of them.

His influence with Congress will be much less than if he had won with a fairly good popular margin and were taking office with a mandate from the people.

Therefore, after the tremendous crowds which met him at every city, he is especially disappointed by his failure to capture a majority of the popular vote.

It will be very difficult to persuade Congress to pass any radical program, even though the Republicans are in the minority.

A Congressman takes his club from what the people in his district think. Every Congressman has figured out carefully what the popular vote shows as to Senator Kennedy's popularity in his respective district.

A "Do Nothing" Congress
Senator Kennedy's campaign speeches said that if Vice President Nixon were elected, we would have a "do nothing" Congress during the next two years, and perhaps during the next four years.

Unless something happens which cannot now be foreseen, the next four years under President Kennedy could record a "do nothing" Congress.

Hence the great disappointment to him, as well as surprise to most Democrats. This is why Mr. Kennedy will go into the White House veiled somewhat by the noticeable absence of an "unrestricted franchise" from the people.

Khrushchev's Influence
Unfortunately, what happens during the next two years or more may be very largely in the hands of Mr. Khrushchev. One cannot tell whether he is serious or merely bluffing about Berlin and his relations with China and other countries such as Cuba.

He surely does not want a nuclear war; furthermore, he may be replaced by Mr. Molotov, or by someone else either more or less radical than Mr. Khrushchev.

On the other hand as Mr. Eisenhower pointed out in his famous Pittsburgh address, a war could start from some accidental and unwanted incident due to the unpremeditated psychotic action of some flyer.

Another War President?
As World War II made Mr. Roosevelt, so another World War might make Mr. Kennedy; but I am sure he does not want it to happen in this manner.

CHAMPION COMMUTER
Some one may dispute his title but Walter W. Bailey of Union City thinks he's the world champion commuter. Every working day for seven years he has driven from his home in Union City, in Randolph County on the Indiana-Ohio border, to Columbus, O., where he is employed in the U.S. Army Engineer Maintenance Center. The round trip is 250 miles.

The average Hoosier taxpayer will work the equivalent of 112 days in 1961 for the tax collector — 8 more days than he did in 1960.

That was the report of the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce as it issued its new 1961 "Indiana Tax Calendar" with reminder dates on federal, state, and local taxes.

The 112 days will mean it will be April 23 before Hoosiers "start earning" for themselves. This compares with an April 14 date, or 104 days of earning to pay taxes, in 1960, the Chamber said.

A Sobering Thought
The April 23 date was set out on the Tax Calendar with this notation: "Approximately 30.7 per cent of the total personal income of individuals goes to meet total federal, state, and local tax bills

in Indiana. On this basis on the average, income for 112 days of the year is required to meet tax costs."

Those 112 days of earning to pay taxes will include 78 days, federal; 16 days, state, and 18 days, local governments.

"Mr. Welsh expressed his appreciation of this promise of cooperation in a joint news conference he held with me in my office immediately after the meeting."

Governor Handley and Mrs. Handley left Saturday for a two-week good will mission in South

America, along with the Governors of more than 40 other states.

The trip was planned months ago by the Conference of Governors, along with the U.S. State Department, and is expected to help considerably in the "getting to know you" program of the American government.

This week will be spent in Argentina. Next week will be devoted to Brazil. The Governors will return to the U.S. on Nov. 27.

"Numerous Hoosier citizens, as individuals and as members of special parties interested in an exchange of cultures, business information and education, have visited Latin America in the past."

"The result has been an increasingly important traffic of Latin visitors coming to Indiana to see our factories, our farms and our schools."

Governor Handley will return to open the pre-legislative seminar for members of the Legislature. At this meeting both hold-over and new members of the 1961 Legislature will receive background briefings regarding numerous legislative problems.

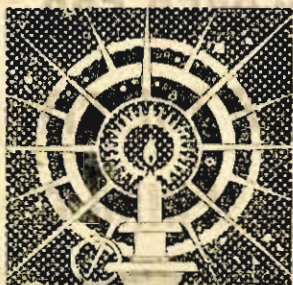

In its application, the utility said it proposes to extend its gas transmission and distribution facilities, at an estimated cost of nearly \$1,250,000, to provide gas service to approximately 2,400 additional rural customers.

Since October 1959, when huge new supplies of natural gas first

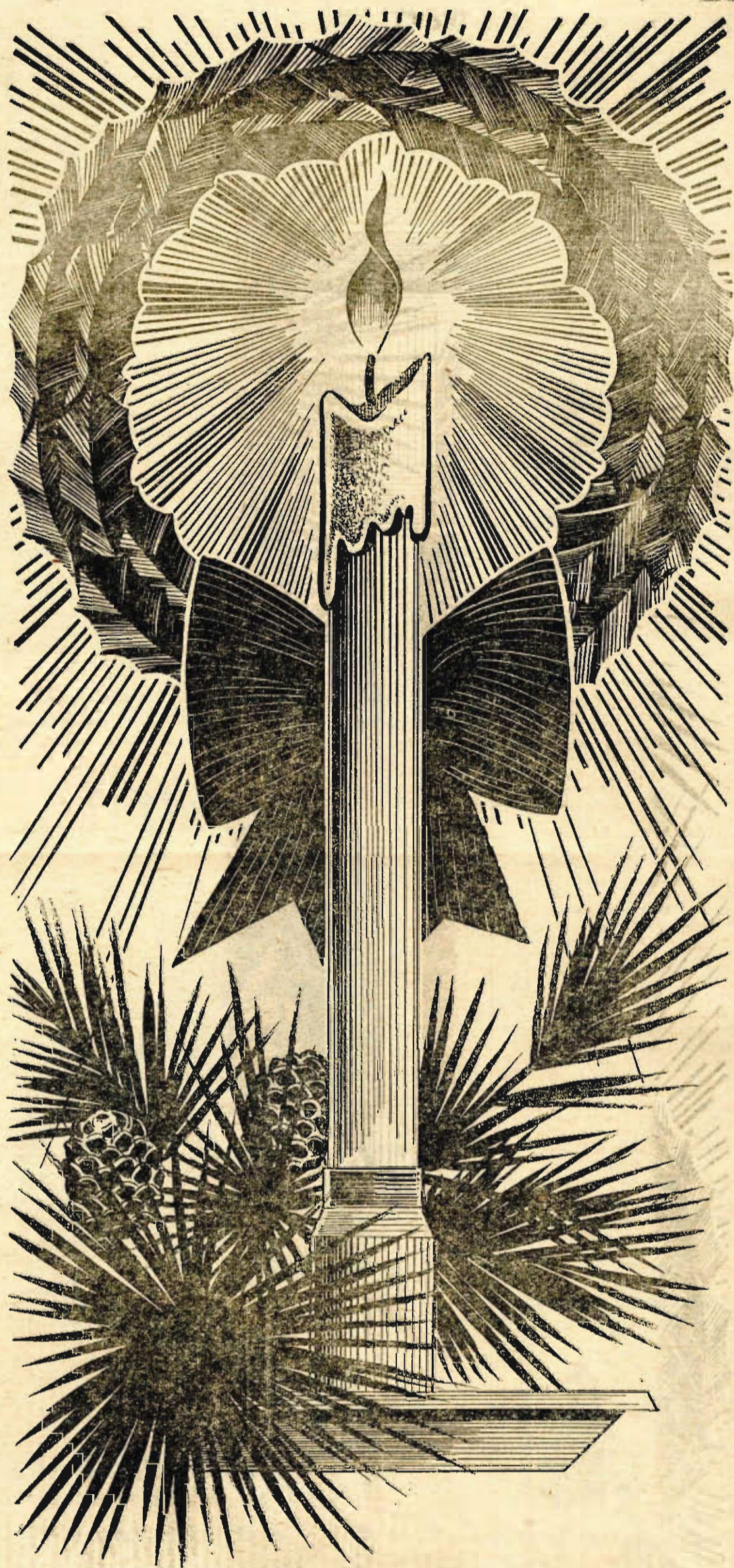
