

The Culver Indians exploded in the second half last Friday night to defeat the Rochester Zebras, 68 to 62, on the losers' home floor. The victory sent the In-dians' season record over the 500 mark at 4-3.

Rochester, who now has won three and lost four, started well against their guests, jumping to a 16 to 11 first quarter lead, while Culver was trying to figure out the foreign goals. The In-


The Culver Indians lost to Walkerton in a red hot game, Tues-day, Dec. 20 by a score of 81-69.

Scholarship Fund At CMA Is Increased

120 Cadets Get Financial Aid

Culver Military Academy an-nounced today that 15% of its student body is receiving schol-arship aid amounting to 8120,-

General Delmar T. Major Spivey, USAF (Ret.), superintendent, said the 120 scholarship students attending the Academy are an increase of 35 over those of a year ago. Additionally, the amount of funds available for scholarship aid has been increased by \$34,200 over the total in 1959-

These increases are part of an accelerated program at Culver to place more boys on scholarship each year," General Spivey said. "In our democratic society, Culver feels the responsibility of making available its educational fa-cilities to potentially good students irrespective of their ability to pay.

Future Goal

"Our goal in the future," the superintendent added, "is to place 25% of our student body of 825 on scholarship. The presence of these boys is a stimulus to the entire student body. We find in nearly every case, scholarship re-cipients are the leaders in all phases of our school life."

The increase in funds available for scholarships is due largely to the continued success of the Investment in Youth program, initiated in 1957 with the primary objectives of improving teacher salaries and increasing the number of scholarships to the Academy and Summer Schools. Gifts amounting to \$395,040 from alumni, parents, friends, and foundations received during the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, supplement the scholarship endowment funds provided by alumni, patrons, and friends of the Academy and Sammer Schools.

Within the best pheasant range, the northern third of the State, the pheasant population is generally the same as last year. Within the counties of Newton, Benton, and Warren, increases in the pheasant population ranged from slight to considerable. Slight increases were also noted in other localized areas. A decrease was noted in the observed adult population, especially cocks, which is not alarming, since the number of juveniles observed increased 15 per cent over 1959. The dashing and stunningly handsome James Byrd contributed toward, the fashioning of American history. Born free, he served as a non-commissioned officer in the Union army to put an end to slavery and to mold our country one nation, under God, indi-

He took his lovely bride, Jane, to the "Winter Wonderland" of Michigan, in the town of Cassopolis. There nestled among the many glacial lakes and majestic virgin forests, they made their home, begot and raised nine beautiful chil-dren. There the old family home yet stands — a monument to freedom and a symbol of happy fam-

The elder Byrds became affectionately to be known as Mother and Daddy Byrd, the home the nest of the Byrds, and all the nine happy children as the Byrdlings.

The second of the Byrdlings as Nancy Ann, born July 10.

In the early 1920's, when her wings were strong enough, be-decked in gay plumage, with graceful posture and a happy song, Ann flew away to Carmelby-the-Sea, in sunny California. With the industricusness and the energy and the wisdom and the optimism characteristic of the Byrds, a successful business was there established.

In nearby Del Monte, Anna became a member of the St. John's Episcopal Church, which mem-bership she never moved.

In 1943 the business in Carmet was dissolved and Anna moved to San Francisco, Here she met Frank Deggs and on Dec. 29 of that year the couple was joined in matrimony.


