"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

This Former 4-H Dynamo From Deer Creek, Indiana, Is One For The Book!

RARE IS THE FAT steer that doesn't end up sizzling on hot platters after a short, well-fed life.

Rowdy, a butterball shorthorn, is that rarity—because a thoughtful Texan chose to mend a pretty Hoosier girl's broken heart.

ROWDY CURRENTLY disports on Charles Meade's green pastures in Carroll County, south of Deer Creek.

Until he dies naturally, this 1,600-pound, on-the-hoof assortment of fine steaks will be the spoiled, special pet of Patricia Ann Meade, Charley's 19-year-old daughter.

NOW ANYBODY knows that a grown steer is about as useful around a farm as an unemployed brother-in-law. That would seem to make Pat a dizzy doll with a dubious penchant for ponderous pets.

Far from it! Tiny, trim Miss Meade is eminently stable, sensible, wholesome, and practical. Then what lets Rowdy free-load the rest of his carefree days? "For one thing," smiled Pat, "he's earned it—and more. Sure, some sentiment is involved. But Rowdy has a useful role. He's a sort of symbolic inspiration..."

OBVIOUSLY A STORY lurks behind all this, so let's get at it. Charles Meade, a Purdue grad, teacher and oil man, went back to farming with his ailing dad, Monroe, in 1943.

Monroe, an Angus raiser, had a grade herd. His hull was registered, but not his brood cows. After Monroe's death in 1944, Charley began switching gradually to a registered herd. His first pedigreed cow was Eulima 191.

In 1949, when 9, wee Pat began 4-H work with a big win the first time out. Her Tubby, one of Eulima's calves, became the State Fair's champion 4-H heifer.

FOR A DECADE thereafter, petite Pat was a 4-H dynamo. She completed nearly 100 projects—18 in one year. At local and state fairs, she won top honors for sewing, food, freezing, home improvement, and other 4-H work.

But Pat's specialty was prize cattle. Through the years she groomed so many champions that the Angus Association named her Indiana's 4-H Girl-of-the-Year in 1954.

A year later, sights now set on a truly lofty goal, Pat entered a champion Hereford steer at Chicago's International Livestock Exposition, world series of the prize cattle league.

THE HEREFORD, which had topped its class at the State Fair, placed 10th in a field of 47 at Chicago. In 1956, Pat's Angus steer, a local grand champion, fared worse at Chicago.

These early failures simply stiffened Pat's resolve and launched a sharp-eyed search for a steer with big league potential.

Parents of Marshall County school children have cause to rejoice in the recent re-election of Frank McLane of Culver as county superintendent of schools because he is one of the best qualified men ever to fill that challenging and responsible post.

Mr. McLane first was appointed county superintendent to fill a vacancy in January, 1952. He was elected to his first four-year term in 1953 and was chosen for another full term in 1957.

The recent vote to give this outstanding educator and administrator another four-year term was 6 to 2, two county school principals receiving one vote each.

Township trustees constitute the Board of Education and The Culver Citizen cannot understand why their vote in Mr. McLane's case was not unanimous in view of his outstanding service in a field in which he has become an expert.

Rev. V. L. Palmer Dies Week After His Retirement

E.U.B. Pastor Past Four Years

Victim Of Heart Attack

Rev. Vernon L. Palmer, age 61, whose retirement from the active ministry of the Evangelical United Brethren Church because of ill health was chronicled at length in last week's issue of The Culver Citizen, died at 12:30 a.m. Monday in his new home in Oakwood Park, Syracuse, Ind., to which he had moved just last Saturday from Culver.

Rev. Palmer had served the E.U.B. Church in Culver faithfully for the past four years, concluding 40 years of service to the Indiana Conference of his church which began in 1921. Through the years he also held pastorates in the Hoosier communities of Porter, Peru, Elkhart, Evansville, Bremen, and New Paris.

He had suffered with a heart condition for the past two years.

Born Near Delphi
Born June 9, 1900, six miles southwest of Delphi in Carroll County, he was the son of Benjamin and Emma DeLong Palmer.

On Aug. 3, 1921, Mr. Palmer was married to the former Miss Edith Garpow, who survives.

Other survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Howard Hoover, Monticello; Mrs. LeMoine Keim, Syracuse; and Mrs. Richard Messenger, South Bend; two brothers, Harry and Charles Palmer, both of Wabash; two sisters, Mrs. Charles Grindel and Miss Carolyn Palmer, also of Wabash; and seven grandsons.

Funeral services are being held at 2:30 p.m. today at the Bremen Salem E.U.B. Church with Dr. Wilson Parks, district superintendent, and the Rev. F. E. Kuebler, pastor of the Bremen Church, officiating.

Burial will take place in the Bremen Cemetery.

CMA Work Week Reduced To Five Eight-Hour Days

Coffee Breaks Discontinued

Under date of June 19, 1961, Maj. Gen. Delmar T. Spivey, superintendent of Culver Military Academy, issued the following memorandum to all employees on the subject: Basic Work Week for Non-Faculty Personnel:

General Spivey's Memorandum
"For a number of years the basic work week for non-faculty personnel has been 5½ eight-hour days or 44 hours.

"Effective June 30, the basic work week will be reduced to 5 eight-hour days or 40 hours.

"There will be no reduction in base pay and to counterbalance the reduction in working hours, the hourly rates for those paid on an hourly basis will be raised 10%.

"The basic work week will be Monday through Friday, but may be modified by department heads to meet their commitments. Personnel in departments which must be in operation every day or which are so linked to cadet activities that they are required on Saturdays will, if possible, have their work week adjusted to give compensatory time off. Some such activities are: the Powerhouse, Stables, Dining Hall, Health Center, Tailor Shop, Q. M. Store, Laundry, Administrative Offices, Cashier, Telephone Switchboard, Building Custodians, etc. In any case where employees' normal work week cannot be reduced to 40 hours by means of careful scheduling, a request for exemption from these instructions will be made to the Superintendent by Department Heads, and compensation will be adjusted.

"Under the new, shorter work week there will be just as much work to be done as before and we must get it done as well, or better, in less time. To do this I count on the cooperation of each employee.

"In order to make the most effective use of available time in the shortened week it will be necessary to discontinue the present time out for coffee breaks. While I recognize the beneficial effect provided by the coffee break as a rest from work which is extremely strenuous, repetitive, or requires close concentration, I hope that the same relief from tension can be accomplished by a momentary and occasional change of pace. Those who want coffee may bring a thermos of coffee from home to consume on the job.

"Supervisors should discuss with Department Heads and Employees the significance of these changes."

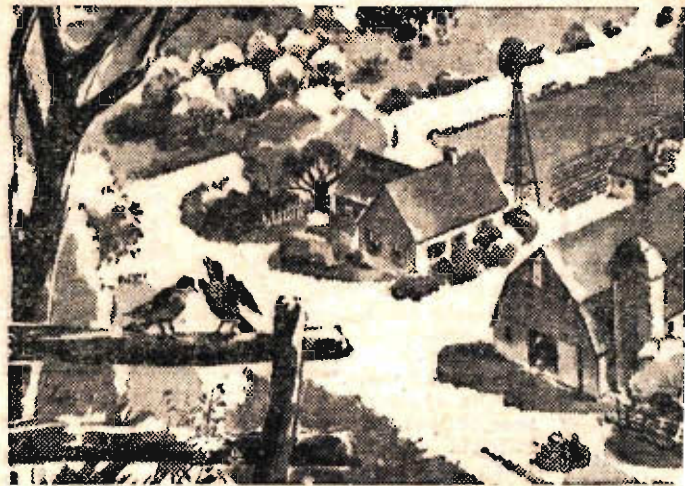

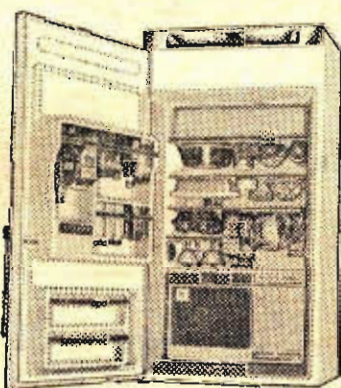

CHICAGO MILK PRICES PAID TO FARMERS

Dairy farmers shipping to the Chicago Order 41 market received a minimum of \$3.72 per cwt. for base milk and \$3.13 per cwt. for excess milk delivered in May to plants within the 55- to 70-mile price basing zone. Harry L. Edwards, director of marketing, Pure Milk Association, reported today.

The prices reported by Edwards are for milk of 3.5% butterfat. The differential for each one-tenth of 1% of butterfat above or below 3.5% is 7.3 cents per cwt.

In addition to these prices, most dairy farmers receive a minimum bulk tank payment of 15 cents per cwt. on bulk milk shipped to market to help compensate them for their heavier investment in equipment and quality production. In some areas farmers received additional marketing adjustments, such as location premiums.

The minimum Federal order prices, as announced by the market administrator for May, were \$3.53 per cwt. for base and \$3.13 per cwt. for excess milk.

The \$3.72 base price includes a superpool addition of 19 cents per cwt. This is the result of handler payment of a superpool premium of 46 cents per cwt. above the Federal order price on Class I (bottled) milk and a 20 cents per cwt. premium on the fluid cream portion of Class II milk.

The May superpool base price is 9 cents lower than the April price and is 9 cents higher than the superpool base price in May, 1960. The superpool premiums, negotiated by Federated Dairy Cooperatives through Pure Milk Association leadership, returned over \$700,000 above the order prices to Chicago area dairy farmers in May, Edwards said.

May is the third of four successive months, under Order 41, in which the excess price is quoted

at 40 cents below the base price announced by the market administrator. In March, April, May and June the superpool premium is added to the announced base price, widening the spread between base and excess.

In the other 8 months the average price on the market is used as the excess price. In these months the spread between the superpool base price and the excess price is determined solely by the superpool premiums collected on Class I and Class II milk.

Approximately 52.8% of total producer milk under Order 41 in May was used for Class I and Class II purposes.

Total producer milk delivered under Order 41 in May was 512,136,864 pounds. This was more than 7.3 million pounds or 1.46% greater than production for the market in May 1960.

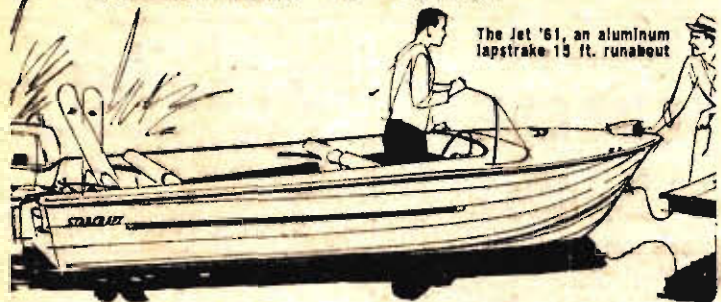

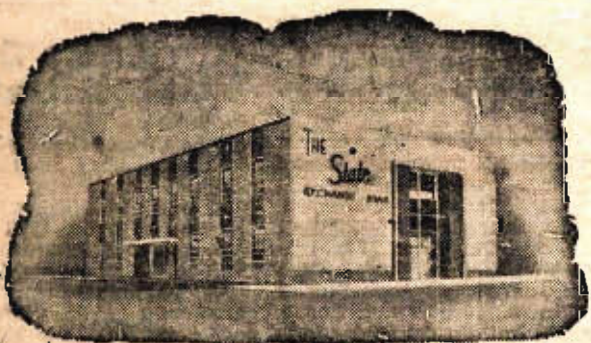

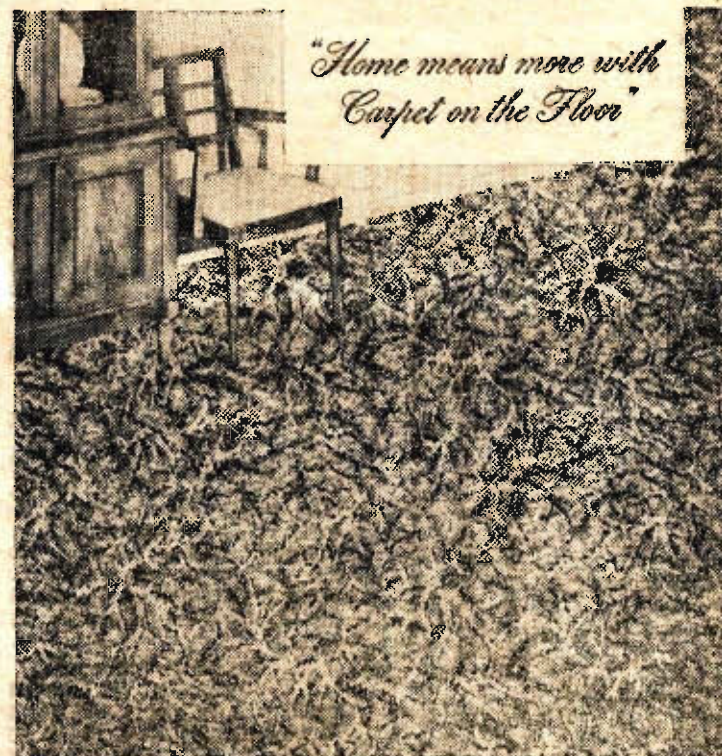

APPLICATIONS MUST BE FILED BY JUNE 30 FOR 1962 WHEAT ALLOTMENTS

The ASC county office is accepting wheat allotment applications for certain farms. A producer who intends to seed wheat for harvest in 1962 on a farm for which a 1959, 1960, or 1961 allotment was not established, irrespective of whether or not wheat was seeded for harvest as grain in one or more of these years and who wishes to be considered for an allotment, must make application for an allotment according to Carl W. Price, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

Application forms are available in the ASC county office for use in filing a request for an allotment.

The producer must apply in writing not later than June 30, 1961.

Farmers who are taking part in the 1961 Feed Grain program should be ready soon to have their acreage checked, according to Carl W. Price, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.
