Chaplain Bray To Speak At CHS Baccalaureate





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A Tenth Second **Keeps CMA From Regatta Win**

While Roosevelt High School's victorious crew heads into the national championships at Philadelphia May 26, Culver Military Academy oarsmen pondered to day their heartbreaking second place finish in last Saturday's Central States Schoolboy Regatta here.

Only a tenth of a second judges said it was a matter of three feet — separated the two teams as they flashed across the finish line near the Naval Build-ing in Saturday's blue-ribbon var-sity eight-oared event. Both times were better than the course record of 5:20, but the race was actually short of a mile.

Roosevelt, which placed second in the national race last year at Philadelphia, could be one of the favorites this year with the same crew returning. The Wyan-dotte, Mich. crews took all but one of the races Saturday. They won a disputed decision in the junior varsity race because of a bad start. Roosevelt's junior crew won the race with a time of 5:49.7. Culver was second at 5:56.8, and Chicago Weber was next at 6:00.8. Protests came from Culver and Weber because from Carrier and Weber because of an early advantage given Roosevelt when cosswains of the second and third place crews did not hear the starting signal. The Academy was entered only in those two events.

Roosevelt won the fours with coxswain, the fours without cox-swain, and Roosevelt's Jerry Kreeger won the singles when three of his competitors swamped in rough water. A doubles team from south St. Paul (Minn.) High School was the only other winner.

Friday, as a preliminary to the Regatta, Culver's crews won easily in their traditional races with St. John's Military Academy. The Eagles took the varsity race and then both junior varsity boats won the second event. In other competition, the golf
