Funeral Services Held Monday For Ralph Thornburg

Ralph D. Thornburg, 70, Route 1, Culver, died suddenly of a heart attack in the yard of his farm home in the Rutland Community at 4:30 p.m. Friday, May 11. He had not been ill.

Mr. Thornburg was born Feb. 15, 1892, in Union Township, in the same home where he resided all of his life. His parents were Celestian E. and Laura Grossman Thornburg.

On Dec. 31, 1918, he was married in Culver to Hazel Reed who survives. Mr. Thornburg was a lifetime farmer.

He was a member of the Culver Methodist Church, the Henry H. Culver Masonic Lodge, and was a 40-year member of the Farm Bureau.

Surviving with the widow are a daughter, Mrs. Alfred (Barbara) Donnelly of Culver; three grandchildren: a brother, Dr. Harvey D. Thornburg of Modesto, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. R. E. (Gladys) Dinsmore of Lawrenceville, Ill., and Mrs. J. R. (Laura) Snyder of Holtville, Calif.

A son, Lt. Ralph Wayne Thornburg, was killed in 1943 while serving in the U.S. Air Force during World War II.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday at the Grossman Funeral Home in Argos with Rev. Kendall Sands, pastor of the Culver Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Poplar Grove Cemetery.

Dean John W. Henderson Honored For Outstanding Service To CMA



CULVER MOTHERS CLUB PRESENTS OIL PAINTING

Dean John W. Henderson, an administrative staff member at Culver Military Academy for 43 years, has been honored through the creation of a new college scholarship and the presentation of an oil painting to the Academy.

The announcements were made during a recent meeting of the Culver Mothers Club during which the Academy, alumni, and parents paid tribute to Dean Henderson for his long years of service to Culver.

Robert J. Clendenin, president of the Edward Arthur Mellinger Educational Foundation, Inc., Monmouth, Illinois, announced that a four-year John W. Henderson scholarship will be granted annually to a "typical" member of the graduating class at Culver. The scholarship will be made to the college selected by its recipient. Clendenin said the creation of the scholarship was made because of the interest shown by Dean Henderson in the many boys he introduced to Culver in the 27 years he served as dean of admissions.

The oil painting of Dean Henderson was the gift of the Mothers Club, and was given the Academy by Mrs. Frank Carpenter, president of the Mothers Club. The portrait, painted by Edmund Brucker, Indianapolis, was presented to Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (Ret.), superintendent.

"Culver has been blessed with many highly capable and dedicated men who have chosen to serve the Academy in teaching and administrative positions," said General Spivey. "Certainly among the finest of these is Dean Henderson. Much that is good about Culver today is the result of his excellent and untiring efforts."

Dean Henderson is known to thousands of Culver cadets and their parents because of the years in which he served as dean of admissions. When he retired in 1959, he was given the title of Dean of Admissions Emeritus, and he remained on the staff as special assistant to the superintendent. He has continued to work with the Culver Fathers Club, founded in 1936, and the Mothers Club, founded in 1959. Dean Henderson helped establish

both organizations. He has also remained busy as an important staff member in Culver's PROGRAM FOR EXCELLENCE, a \$4,995,000 development fund to improve teachers' salaries and for scholarships.

As a school teacher, Dean Henderson taught in one-room country schools in Sullivan County, Indiana, and in 1912 was principal and teacher in grade school at Dugger, Indiana. He is a graduate of Indiana State College, class of 1917, and served as principal of Riley Township (Ind.) Grade and High School until he went into the U.S. Army during World War I as a 2nd Lieutenant.

Dean Henderson came to Culver in 1919 as secretary of the Y.M.C.A., which played a large part in cadet activities for many years. He was "Y" secretary until he went into admissions work in 1932. He held the positions of commandant of the Culver Woodcraft Camp and director of enrollment and publicity. He was named director of admissions in 1934 and dean of admissions in 1951. He has also served as chairman of the scholarship committee and still serves as institutional representative for the Boy Scouts of America.

Along with his work at Culver, Dean Henderson has been involved in many other activities both on the state and national level. He was a member of the National Y.M.C.A. Council, chairman of the youth committee of the Indiana State Y.M.C.A., commander of William A. Fleet Post, American Legion, Culver; a member of the Commission on Colleges and Universities of North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, first vice-president of the Indiana State Y.M.C.A., and a member of the National Y.M.C.A. Youth Committee.

Dean Henderson received two other awards within recent years. The Indiana Y.M.C.A. honored him for his 43 years continuous work for youth in 1961, and in 1958 he was awarded the Shattuck Centennial Citation for outstanding contribution toward the advancement of secondary education by the Shattuck School, Faribault, Minnesota.

Baccalaureate On May 20; Diplomas For 50 On May 25

Commencement exercises for the 50 members of the Class of 1962 of Culver High School will be held in the Community Building, Friday, May 25, according to announcement by Principal Kenneth L. Cole.

Senior final examinations are set for Thursday and Friday, May 17 and 18, while the annual Junior-Senior Prom will be held the night of Friday, May 18, in the Community Building.

Baccalaureate services will be in the Community Building at 8 p.m., Sunday, May 20, with Chaplain Allen Bray delivering the sermon. Rev. C.L. Haney and Rev. Beckner will assist in the service. Special music will be provided by the Senior High School Girls Glee Club under the direction of Richard Hambrook.

Underclass final examinations are scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, May 22 and 23. Students will not attend school on Thursday, May 24, as it has been set aside as grading and records day for teachers. Students will pick up their report cards at 1 p.m. Friday, May 25. Busses will pick up students in time to get them to school at this hour and will return them to their homes after cards have been secured from the home room teachers.

The sixty-second annual commencement exercises will be held in the Community Building at 8 p.m. Friday, May 25. Reserved seats may be obtained at the high school office, although unreserved seats will be available to the public the night of the ceremony. Talks will be given by four members of the graduating class, and diplomas will be presented by Trustee Eugene G. Benedict.

Firemen Have Busy Weekend

The Culver Fire Department had a busy Friday and Saturday this past weekend. A total of three runs were made, two on Friday and the other Saturday.

First call Friday was about 3:45 p.m. to the CMA dump, to extinguish a burning dump truck. The truck, driven by John Campbell, of Culver, was backing to the edge of an embankment, in preparation to dumping the load. Too near the edge, the truck upended, falling into the pit, and bursting into flames.

Campbell was able to jump from the truck in time to keep from being pinned in the burning truck. He was uninjured, but the damage to the truck was estimated at about \$500.

The second run was made about 10:50 Friday evening to the campus of the Culver Military Academy to extinguish a fire of undetermined origin which started in the tent units. The fire destroyed four complete units.

The blaze was discovered by Ervin Taylor, an employee of the Academy, who turned in the alarm. Chief David Barns stated. The tents were erected recently in preparation for the Woodcraft division of the CMA summer school. The four tents would have housed 16 boys.

Academy officials stated the loss was covered by insurance and no estimate of the damage was given. Academy officials stated this is the last year for the use of tents in the Woodcraft program. Beginning with 1963 summer classes, the Woodcrafters will occupy permanent buildings now being erected at another site on the Academy campus.

Chaplain Bray To Speak At CHS Baccalaureate

The Rev. Allen F. Bray III, chaplain at Culver Military Academy, will deliver the baccalaureate address for the graduating class, parents, and guests of Culver High School at 8 p.m. Sunday, May 20.

The Rev. Mr. Bray joined the Culver staff as chaplain and director of religious activities in February, 1958. He is a native of Taunton, Mass., and he trained for the ministry at Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., and Virginia Theological Seminary. Chaplain Bray holds the degree of Master of Sacred Theology from Seabury-Western, Evanston, Ill., and he has done additional studies at the Washington (D.C.) School of Psychiatry.

The Rev. Mr. Bray served with the U.S. Marine Corps overseas during World War II. He holds the rank of lieutenant in the Chaplain Corps, U.S. Navy Reserve. Prior to joining the Culver faculty, Chaplain Bray served as assistant chaplain at Trinity College, rector of St. John's Parish at Accokeek, Md., and lay assistant at St. Mary's Church, Manchester, Conn., and St. Andrew's Church, Meriden, Conn.

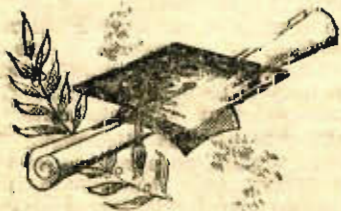

Memorial Services For Eugene C. Eppley At CMA

Memorial services for Eugene C. Eppley will be held at Culver Military Academy Saturday, May 19.

The ceremonies will be known as "Eugene C. Eppley Day" and will be attended by members of the board of directors of The Eugene C. Eppley Foundation, Omaha, Neb. Also on campus at the same time will be members of the board of directors of The Culver Educational Foundation, who will be holding their annual spring meeting.

The late Mr. Eppley was a graduate of the Academy, class of 1901. Culver received in gifts through the Eppley Foundation \$3,600,000 for construction of two academic buildings, the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium, and the endowment of six academic chairs. Mr. Eppley died Oct. 14, 1958.

From 8:20 to 11:40 a.m. Saturday, members of the Eppley board will attend demonstration classes conducted by Eppley Chairholders. Members of both boards will take part in 12:30 p.m. memorial ceremonies at the Eppley Grave in Culver Masonic Cemetery. The board members will lunch in the Dining Hall and then attend a special military review at 2:15 p.m. Members of the Eppley Board will join Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (Ret.), superintendent, on the reviewing stand.

A tea for faculty and members of the two boards will be held at 3:30 p.m., and the directors will dine with General and Mrs. Spivey at 6 p.m. The final event of the day will be a 8:15 p.m. student production "No Time for Sergeants." Sunday, Eppley Memorial Services will be conducted at 10:20 a.m. in Memorial Chapel.

A gift of \$1,200,000 was used for the construction of the Eppley Halls of Humanities and Science. The Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium was constructed at a cost of \$1,400,000 and contains a 1,550-seat main auditorium, a 200-seat Little Theater, and complete dressing room and office facilities. A third gift from the Eppley Foundation of \$1,000,000 was used in the endowment of six academic chairs. These chairs are held by: Dr. George O. Johnson, chemistry; Arthur G. Hughes, English; Dr. Preston W. Slosson, history; Dr. Raymond W. Wheat, foreign languages; Ray C. Jurgensen, mathematics; Walter W. Strait, physics.

Mrs. G. Landis Is Cited For Work In Mental Health

Mrs. Gordon Landis, Logansport, has been selected as Indiana's psychiatric aide of the year.

The citation from the National Association for Mental Health and the Indiana Association was presented recently at the campaign survey-membership dinner at the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis. This is an annual event conducted by the Indiana Association for Mental Health to encourage higher standards of ward treatment for mentally ill, to focus public attention on the important role of psychiatric aides in providing direct services to patients, and to help gain adequate recognition and acceptance for those engaged in this profession.

Mrs. Landis has been employed at Logansport State Hospital since 1955 as a psychiatric aide. In presenting the certificate and a \$50 Savings Bond from the Indiana Association for Mental Health, Carlton C. Wilson, chairman of the Psychiatric Aide Awards Committee, said, "Mildred Landis is by nature a motherly person who has a high degree of understanding of people. She learns quickly and was able to influence the patients' behaviour with soft words and by example rather than with dictatorial measures. With her drive and interest the patients on the ward showed a decrease in the amount of sedation required. It became possible to assign them to many vocational activities and our Gold Ladies became more interested in serving on her ward. No miracles were performed but the atmosphere of the ward was dramatically changed."

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A Tenth Second Keeps CMA From Regatta Win

While Roosevelt High School's victorious crew heads into the national championships at Philadelphia May 26, Culver Military Academy oarsmen pondered today their heartbreaking second place finish in last Saturday's Central States Schoolboy Regatta here.

Only a tenth of a second — judges said it was a matter of three feet — separated the two teams as they flashed across the finish line near the Naval Building in Saturday's blue-ribbon varsity eight-oared event. When the final results were recorded, it was a duplication of last year's finish at Chicago's Lincoln Park Boat Club; Roosevelt first, the Academy second.

Though the same two teams battled for the title two years, it will be many years before the Central States Regatta features as close a race as the one Saturday. Well aware that it would have to go all out to beat Roosevelt, which had the same crew as last year, Culver sprinted in the final stages of the mile race. Roosevelt was hampered by the fact that it was off course midway in the race, but had enough to pull back on course, so that moving into the finish, both boats remained close. The Academy boat was still closing the gap when the race ended, Roosevelt with a time of 5:16.4, Culver with 5:16.5. Both times were better than the course record of 5:20, but the race was actually short of a mile.

Roosevelt, which placed second in the national race last year at Philadelphia, could be one of the favorites this year with the same crew returning. The Wyandotte, Mich. crews took all but one of the races Saturday. They won a disputed decision in the junior varsity race because of a bad start. Roosevelt's junior crew won the race with a time of 5:49.7, Culver was second at 5:56.8, and Chicago Weber was next at 6:00.8. Protests came from Culver and Weber because of an early advantage given Roosevelt when coxswains of the second and third place crews did not hear the starting signal. The Academy was entered only in those two events.
