R. W. Babson Discusses The Stock Market

Rallies Caused By Bargain Hunters

Babson Park, Mass. — During the past week, almost everyone has been asking what has happened to the stock market. The newspapers have said "nothing like it since 1929." Yet the Dow-Jones Industrial Average is off only about 20% from its all-time high which occurred at the start of 1962. The Industrials have suffered the most; the utilities have suffered less; while the railroads have suffered the least. On the other hand, almost everything has suffered somewhat.

Real Estate, Automobiles, and Commodities

The newspapers, television, and radio have made so much of the big break that people are getting it into their heads that everything should go down in price. Therefore, whether they are looking for houses, automobiles, or even orange groves, they expect bargains, and they pay no attention to the prices of a month ago. This especially applies to used cars of which there is a surplus and the dealers are trying hard to convert them into cash.

The banks are getting frightened and have begun to ask their customers to reduce loans. They really have no reason for being frightened; but bankers are easily scared because it is not their money which they are loaning, but rather the money of their customers. They do not know when their customers will want to use their money to buy bargains themselves, and hence the bankers must be prepared to take care of them. Most bankers were much disturbed by President Kennedy's actions when he lost his temper over the price of steel. They feel that President Kennedy is against business and profits, and, perhaps, is too favorable to the labor leaders. Even the brokers are beginning to feel this way, owing to the SEC investigations. Some brokers are even unjustly saying that the past week will go down in history as the "Kennedy Break."

Mutual Funds

There has been a great sale of mutual funds during the past two years. It is reported that over 75,000 salesmen are selling mutual funds today. Most of the exchange firms are indulging in the sale of mutual funds. They are allowed a commission of one-eighth of one per cent on listed stocks, and cannot afford to have their salesmen go out and solicit small investors for this fee; but they get about 5% on the sale of mutual funds which commission they can divide with the salesmen.

When a salesman sells a thousand dollars worth of mutual funds, the operators of the Fund must enter the stock market and buy a certain amount of listed stock. This has bolstered the stock market during the past two years. It will be more difficult to sell mutual funds and redemptions will increase until the news of the recent stock market break is forgotten. When a mutual fund holder turns in his shares to be redeemed, the Fund operators must sell some of their listed stocks. I believe these mutual funds are perfectly safe; but they must go down in price when a break such as we have had occurs. Therefore, the selling by mutual fund operators has been one cause of the decline in the stock market. The dividends on mu-

Richard Mackey Awarded Scholarship To Naval School

He qualified for membership in the National Honor Society, surpassing the minimum 3.0 average, as a freshman. The scholarship was given for the first time four years ago to Thad Overmyer, also a student at Culver High School. Overmyer was graduated from the Naval School last August.

Contracts Let For State Road Repair By Commission

The Indiana State Highway Commission recently let the following contracts for highway repair in Marshall and Fulton Counties.

Fulton and Marshall County SR 25 and SR 110 — Bituminous coated blended aggregate resurfacing 2.75 miles from the north city limits of Fulton to 2.75 miles north of Fulton; and 9.7 miles in Marshall and Fulton Counties from 1 mile east of SR 17 to US 31.

Marshall County US 31 — Hot asphaltic concrete resurfacing 5.3 miles from the north city limits of Plymouth north to the Jct. of new US 31.

Fulton County US 31 — Hot asphaltic concrete resurfacing 6.8 miles from north city limits of Rochester north to the Fulton-Marshall County line.

Contractor's bids for the US 31 repair jobs totaled \$131,639.60. There were no bids below the engineer's estimate for SR 25 and SR 110.

Rev. R. C. Williams Named Successor

Rev. Kendall E. Sands, pastor of the Culver Methodist Church, has been transferred to the Wesley Methodist Church in Indianapolis. It was announced last Sunday at the 111th annual Northwest Indiana Conference of the Methodist Church. He will be succeeded by Rev. Ronald Williams, who comes from the Lafayette Brown Street Methodist Church.

Reverend Sands has been pastor of the Culver charge for the past 7 1/2 years, coming here from LaCrosse. He and his family will move to Indianapolis this week where he will succeed the Rev. Forest W. Howell who has been appointed to head the Lebanon District.

Dr. Ronald Williams is a Hoosier by birth, and received his bachelor's degree from Indiana University in 1953. He then entered Drew University in Madison, N. J., where he pursued advanced studies in theology. He graduated from Drew University cum laude, and was awarded the Dorr F. Diffendorf Prize in Homiletics for his outstanding ability in the field of preaching.

Dr. Williams served as a minister in the New York East Conference of the Methodist Church before he and his wife left to travel extensively throughout Europe. Upon their return, they moved to Indiana, where he is now actively engaged in the ministry.

Dr. and Mrs. Williams have two children — Pamela Dawn, age two, and Matthew Reid, eight months.

Dr. Williams is the author of a book entitled, "Prayers for Every Occasion" which was published by Exposition Press, Inc. His home town is Columbus, Ind.

Road Officials To Attend 10-County Road Meeting

County road officials from a 10-county area will meet in two separate one-day sessions at the Knox House Hotel in Knox, June 19 and 20, to review bridge programs and cost record procedures. ATTENDING SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR FRENCH TEACHERS

IRRIGATION PRACTICES

Hot dry weather causes gardeners and farmers to start thinking about the need for irrigation, comments Don Sisson, Purdue University agricultural engineer.

However, a word of caution is in order. If irrigation is expected to be a profit making practice, this investment should not be made on an emergency basis. A portable sprinkler irrigation system may cost \$100 per acre for a farm and even more for a small acreage. Only after concluding that irrigation can be profitable over a five to 10-year period

should you make such an investment, Sisson says.

Growers of high value fruit, vegetable and nursery crops can expect irrigation to be highly profitable in Indiana on all kinds of soils. In fact, some processors will not contract with a grower

to produce certain vegetables without irrigation. The improvement in quality of these crops is often an important factor. On drouthy soils, such as sands and sandy loams, the response from irrigation will be greatest on any crop. On silt loam and clay loam soils irrigation of such field crops as corn and soybeans may not be profitable except under very high level management, if at all.

Once an irrigation system is purchased, irrigation should be used as a production tool each year as needed. If the irrigation system is used only one year out of five as an emergency practice, the profits from irrigation would not be great enough to offset the cost of owning the equipment.

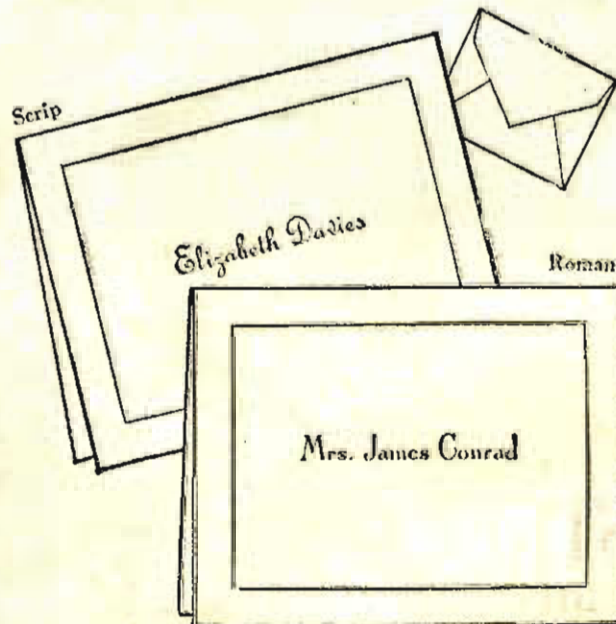

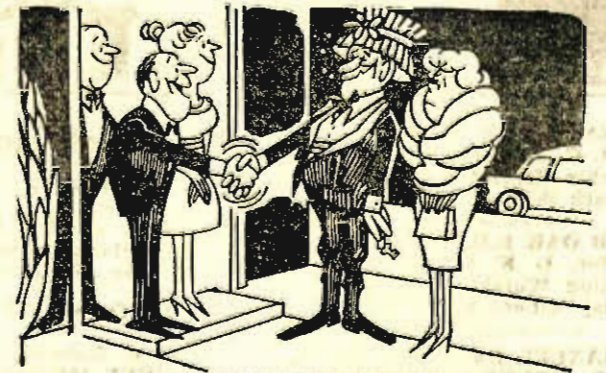

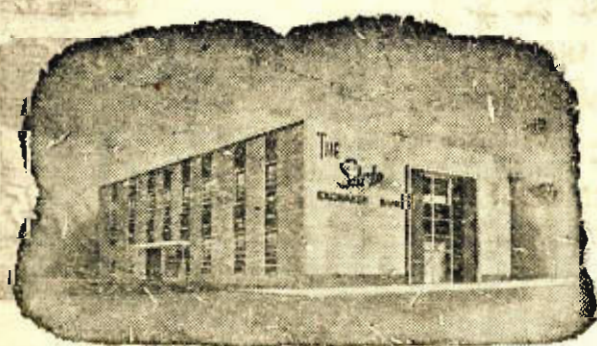

Every homeowner would like a weed-free lawn. Weeds like dandelions and plantain not only look ugly, but they rob water and fertilizer from your grass. Purdue University turf specialists point out that you can easily kill dandelions and plantain chemically with 2, 4-D.

If a sprayer is available, it is probably the most economical and efficient way to apply 2,4-D. However, many companies market dual purpose fertilizer and 2,4-D mixtures for spreader application. War bars for pulling over the lawn, and various spot treating "canes" serve special purposes.

Turf specialists advise being careful in applying 2,4-D. This chemical will not kill established lawn grasses, if properly used, but will kill many other plants—tomatoes, beans, grapes and many flowers. Avoid spraying on windy days and use a low pressure sprayer to lessen the drift. Be sure to clean your sprayer thoroughly after using 2,4-D, or better still, have one sprayer for 2,4-D use only. Always read the label and use 2,4-D according to directions.

A vigorous turf will crowd out weeds. Be sure you apply fertilizer in the spring and again in the fall — and cut your lawn at a two-inch height for turf vigor.

(Continued from Page 1) tual funds may not be reduced, excepting the so-called bonus dividends which result from capital gains . . . which the Funds may not get for a while.

What Will The Stock Market Do Next?

It is evident that there have been many bargain hunters who have bought stocks the past week. This has caused some rallies. I, however, do not believe that all is well. There are many sore spots to be cleaned up by foolish investors, although general business is continuing good.

As I have mentioned many times before in this column, there is too wide a gulf between the high prices that stocks have been selling at and their dividends. These low yields are unnatural and must be corrected. I had hoped to see it corrected by a gradual and orderly decline. Readers, however, should give much more attention to what stocks are yielding. Recent low yields cannot continue indefinitely; without a great improvement in business and dividends, the situation can be corrected only by reducing the price of stocks. I advise against selling investment-grade stocks today, but I question whether the time has

come to resume investing in the stock market. I say this notwithstanding that the market has rallied and is acting more normally.

BUSINESS TREND IN FARMING

A Purdue University agricultural economist believes the nation's business will continue its somewhat sluggish recovery throughout the remainder of this year and into 1963.

However, Ronald H. Bauman points out there's little evidence the country is on the threshold of a business expansion, the economist observes, listing them as:

" . . . rather slim profits for many businesses, taking into account bigger volume of trade.

"The increase in rate of government expenditures is not expected to be as great as in the past year.

"Considerable uncertainty as to how much increase will occur in business spending for plant and equipment . . .

"A lag in business investment which may pick up in the months ahead.

"About a 12 per cent drop in the stock market, most of which took place in recent weeks, from the high point reached last December."

The economist says he believes the trend in business investment will be motivated more by a cold analysis by businessmen of their chances of making profits rather than government policy on price and wage stabilization.

Of the decline in the stock market, Bauman says he considers it "a correction in an over value of stocks" rather than a symptom of a business recession.

Bauman notes these bright

spots on the current economic scene:

"Personal incomes are rising. Consumer spending is at a high level. First quarter retail sales rose 6.5 per cent over year ago figures . . . The automotive industry is rolling at high speed, with the likelihood of a sales year second only to the record of 1955.

"Unemployment has been declining. The index of industrial production reached a new peak last March . . . Inventory stocks are relatively low . . . Building should pick up in the months ahead. And if prospects for tax relief on business materialize, this should spur business investment."

Red Cross School Opens At Culver Military Academy

The American Red Cross National Small Craft School will open at Culver Military Academy on Wednesday, June 13, for approximately 100 students.

Culver is among the oldest schools supporting the Red Cross program of first aid, water safety, and craftsmanship. The Academy has been host to the leadership training school since 1930.

Students taking the 10-day course at Culver will receive basic and instructor training in boating, canoeing, and sailing. George Reading, Granville, Ohio, a veteran instructor with some 25 years experience, is director of the school. He adds that particular emphasis will be placed on a new course involving safe operation of outboard motorboats.

During the time the students are on campus they will use facilities and small crafts of the Culver Summer Naval School. They will also be housed and fed at the Academy. 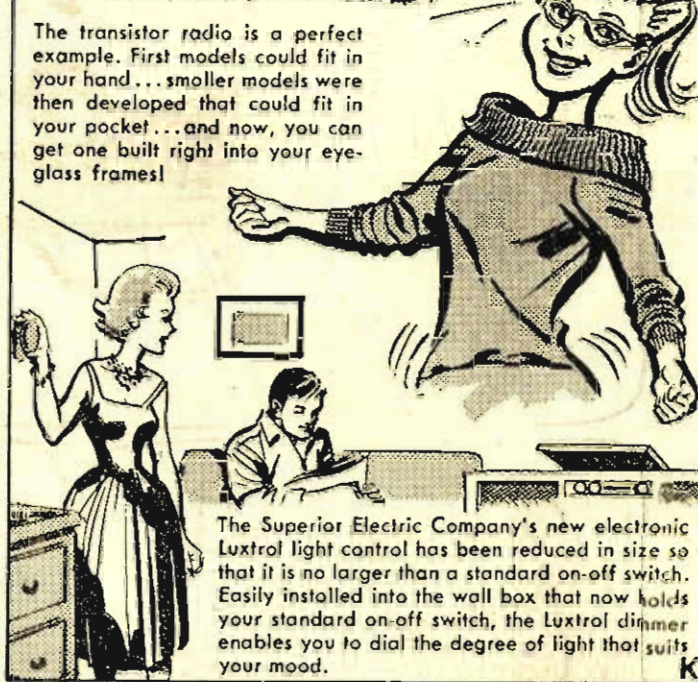
