Remedial Reading Local Boy Scout Equipment Given To Receive

Gift Donated By Local Tri Kappas

The local chapter of the Tri-Kappa Sorority has recently decided to purchase some very useful equipment for the remedial reading program in the Culver Public School, This material was carefully considered for practica-bility and need before the sorority made a final decision.

Estimated cost of this equipment will be between \$1,000 and \$1,500. The proceeds of Tri Kappa's "Christmas In August" sale

has made this gift possible.
One of the contributions that
the Tri-Kappa Sorority is making
to the Culver Public School remedial reading program is a film library for use with the Controlled Reader which has already been purchased by the Union Township Schools. The Controlled Reader makes possible the improvement of vital interpretive and func-tional skills for readers on all levels, with picture games for non-readers, picture and word stories for beginning readers, and

an intriguing variety of interest-ing stories for older students. During training, the moving slot makes possible improvements in visual mobility and coordinaad much experience in vocal tion. The reading rate is set to ausic for he participated both in challenge the reader so that the ollege groups, church groups, nd has done much as a vocal cloist. Controlled reading brings about marked improvement in interpretive skills. Comprehension improves as the reader becomes more proficient visually and reads easily and comfortable. easily and comfortably. Because there is no possibility of rereading, he learns to concentrate, read aggressively and accurately, organize his thoughts rapidly, and remember well.

Two other items being donated to the school reading program by Tri-Kappa are the Tachist-O-Flasher and Tackist-O-Filmstrips. They permit the fundamental perceptual skills of reading to be taught effectively to students of widely varying ages and abilities. These materials are designed to help increase attention span, perceptual span, speed of perception, speed of recognition, and accuracy of recognition.

Finally, they are presenting to the school the SRA Rending Laboratories for each grade level. These labs provide multilevel reading instruction to accommodate the vast range of individual differences in reading ability. The multilevel reading materials meet the needs of each pupil by providing him the opportunity progress as fast and as far as his own learning rate and capacity permit. All materials are integrated; each Reading Lab is carefully designed as part of a sequential pattern to provide an organized basic reading program.

This is all quality equipment which has been time-tested. It should help improve the quality and type of help now being given to some 75 pupils in grades one through tweive. This fine dona-tion by the Tri-Kappas should enable an unlimited number of grade students to participate in a self-help program, etc.

A Reminder Of Fall Hunting Seasons

This is just a reminder that the fall hunting season is not far away.

through Dec. 1. Through the 21st the bag is one of any deer, but after that it is a buck only with at least one forked antier. Gun. Nov. 22 through Dec. 1, with a bag of one buck with at least a forked antler.

There is a special area around Crane in which archers and gunners may take any deer during the three day period of Nov. and 24. The outside boundaries of this area are State Roads 45, 54. 450, and U.S. 50, If a deer is bagged that is not a legal buck, it must be brought to one of the checking stations lo Doans, Bramble or located at or Williams. Here the deer will be aged, measured, weighed in some cases, and tagged for transportatiion outside the area.

WATERFOWL: The goose season is already in full swing and will continue through Dec. 18. The daily bag and possession limits may not include more than 2 Canada geese or subspecies, 2 white fronted geese, or 1 Canada goose or subspecies and 1 white fronted goose.
