## Remedial Reading Equipment Given To Culver Schools

### Gift Donated By Local Tri Kappas

The local chapter of the Tri-Kappa Sorority has recently decided to purchase some very useful reading equipment for the remedial reading program in the Culver Public School. This material was carefully considered for practicality and need before the sorority made a final decision.

Estimated cost of this equipment will be between \$1,000 and \$1,500. The proceeds of Tri Kappa's "Christmas In August" sale has made this gift possible.

One of the contributions that the Tri-Kappa Sorority is making to the Culver Public School remedial reading program is a film library for use with the Controlled Reader which has already been purchased by the Union Township Schools. The Controlled Reader makes possible the improvement of vital interpretive and functional skills for readers on all levels, with picture games for non-readers, picture and word stories for beginning readers, and an intriguing variety of interesting stories for older students.

During training, the moving slot makes possible improvements in visual mobility and coordination. The reading rate is set to challenge the reader so that the slot always uncovers fresh material. Directional attack improves as the reader develops an economy of fixations, make fewer regressions, thus broadening his span of recognition.

Controlled reading brings about marked improvement in interpretive skills. Comprehension improves as the reader becomes more proficient visually and reads easily and comfortably. Because there is no possibility of rereading, he learns to concentrate, read aggressively and accurately, organize his thoughts rapidly, and remember well.

Two other items being donated to the school reading program by Tri-Kappa are the Tachist-O-Flasher and Tackist-O-Filmstrips. They permit the fundamental perceptual skills of reading to be taught effectively to students of widely varying ages and abilities. These materials are designed to help increase attention span, perceptual span, speed of perception, speed of recognition, and accuracy of recognition.

Finally, they are presenting to the school the SRA Reading Laboratories for each grade level. These labs provide multilevel reading instruction to accommodate the vast range of individual differences in reading ability. The multilevel reading materials meet the needs of each pupil by providing him the opportunity to progress as fast and as far as his own learning rate and capacity permit. All materials are integrated; each Reading Lab is carefully designed as part of a sequential pattern to provide an organized basic reading program.

This is all quality equipment which has been time-tested. It should help improve the quality and type of help now being given to some 75 pupils in grades one through twelve. This fine donation by the Tri-Kappas should enable an unlimited number of grade students to participate in a self-help program, etc.

Diabetes can be detected by means of a simple, painless test that is available to all our citizens, and early detection and medical care almost always assures that people with diabetes can continue to lead normal, active lives.

The Marshall County Medical Society is conducting the 1962 Diabetes Detection Drive to enable our citizens to "take the test — and be sure."

Diabetes Week is sponsored nationally by the American Diabetes Association to discover as many as possible of the 1,400,000 undiagnosed cases of diabetes, and to alert all Americans to the symptoms of the ailment.

During Diabetes Week, Nov. 11-17, urine specimens left at the Culver City Drug Store or the McKinnis Pharmacy in Culver will be checked free of charge. Every individual is urged to bring a specimen in a clean bottle that has been labeled with his name and address or phone number. Both drug stores will have further information on Diabetes in the form of pamphlets.

# CMA Football Team Continues Winning Streak

Culver Military Academy's football team is one victory away from an excellent 7-1 season. For the third straight week the Cadets worked a kickoff play for a touchdown. Where Tom Lloyd scored on handoffs from Swennumson the first two times the play worked against St. John's and Hobart, Swennumson kept the ball on the second half kickoff at Bloomington and moved 85 yards for the score. John Young put Bloomington into the scoring column in the third period, though by this time Culver led 25-7. The visitors were to score two more before the game ended, one a Culbertson-to-Butch Pretorius pass that began at the Bloomington 32. Rosie Rosenberg kicked one extra point for Culver.

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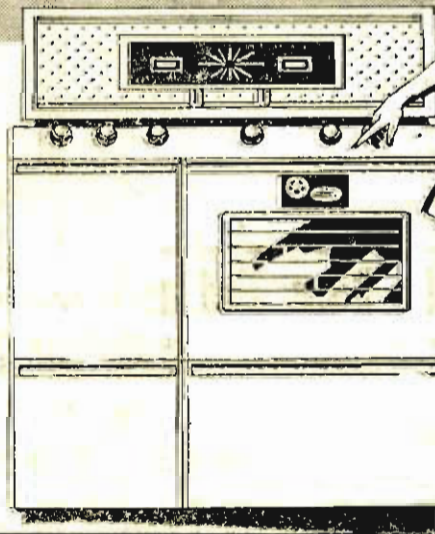

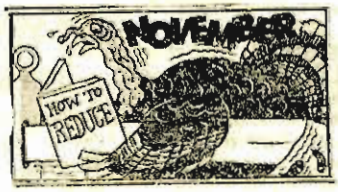

## A Reminder Of Fall Hunting Seasons

This is just a reminder that the fall hunting season is not far away.

**DEER:** Archery, Nov. 1 through Dec. 1. Through the 21st the bag is one of any deer, but after that it is a buck only with at least one forked antler. Gun, Nov. 22 through Dec. 1, with a bag of one buck with at least a forked antler.

There is a special area around Crane in which archers and gunners may take any deer during the three day period of Nov. 22, 23 and 24. The outside boundaries of this area are State Roads 45, 54, 450, and U.S. 50. If a deer is bagged that is not a legal buck, it must be brought to one of the checking stations located at Doans, Bramble or Williams. Here the deer will be aged, measured, weighed in some cases, and tagged for transportation outside the area.

**WATERFOWL:** The goose season is already in full swing and will continue through Dec. 18. The daily bag and possession limits may not include more than 2 Canada geese or subspecies, 2 white fronted geese, or 1 Canada goose or subspecies and 1 white fronted goose. The shooting hours are sunrise to sunset, except on the opening day of the duck season, which was Nov. 2, when the shooting began at noon, C.S.T.

The duck season continues through Nov. 26 with a daily bag limit of 2 — 6 coots. The daily bag limit may not include more of the following species than: (a) 1 mallard or 1 black duck, (b) 2 wood ducks, (c) 1 hooded merganser. Shooting stops at sunset.

**UPLAND GAME:** The season for pheasant, quail, Hungarian partridge, and rabbit begins Nov. 10, at 9 a.m. C.S.T. Pheasant hunting continues through the 30th with a daily bag of 2 cocks. The quail season closes Dec. 20 and 10 is the daily limit. Hunky

shooting also closes on Dec. 20, but the daily bag is 5. Rabbit hunting continues through Jan. 10 and 5 is the daily limit.

**TRAPPING:** Trappers may put out their traps at 12 noon Nov. 15. The season closes Jan. 31.

# Indians Lose To Aubbeenaubbee In Opening Game

## Will Meet Tyner Here November 16

The Aubbeenaubbee Braves spoiled Culver's season opener for the second straight year last Friday night, beating the Indians on the loser's home floor, 55-42.

A fine opening night crowd, hoping to see an improved Indian squad over last year's 3-18 club, were disappointed as the Culver offense was muffled by Aubbee's zone defense.

Nearly three minutes of action had gone by before Glen Patton of Aubbee hit a free throw for the new season's first point. The sea-saw first quarter ended with Culver leading, 10-9.

With junior guard Paul White the only consistent scoring threat, Culver was sorely hampered by poor ballhandling but White's two free throws with time elapsed at halftime gave Culver at 25-24 bulge. Paul had 14 points in the first half.

Sparked by 6'2" junior forward Joe Holcomb, Aubbee pulled into the lead in the third stanza. Culver stayed within reach until late in the final quarter, but could never even threaten a comeback.

The Indians' defense seemed much improved over last year's but the offensive attack never jelled except for White's fine shooting. Holcomb, starting his third season of varsity ball as only a junior, racked up scoring honors with 20 points despite playing only three-fourths of the game.

White duplicated his amazing opening night of last year with 19 points. Senior forward Thad Overmyer, 6'3", was held to five points but was Culver's best rebounder, grabbing off 18 missed shots.

Coach Jim Cox's B-Team shook off early game jitters to defeat Aubbee, 37-32, in an overtime game. Freshman center Andy Lowry made his high school debut with 13 points and an amazing amount of rebounds. Gene Kelly swished 12 points for Aubbee.

After a two-week lay-off, the Indians play host to a very weak Tyner team Nov. 16. Culver should gain its first home victory since February of 1961.

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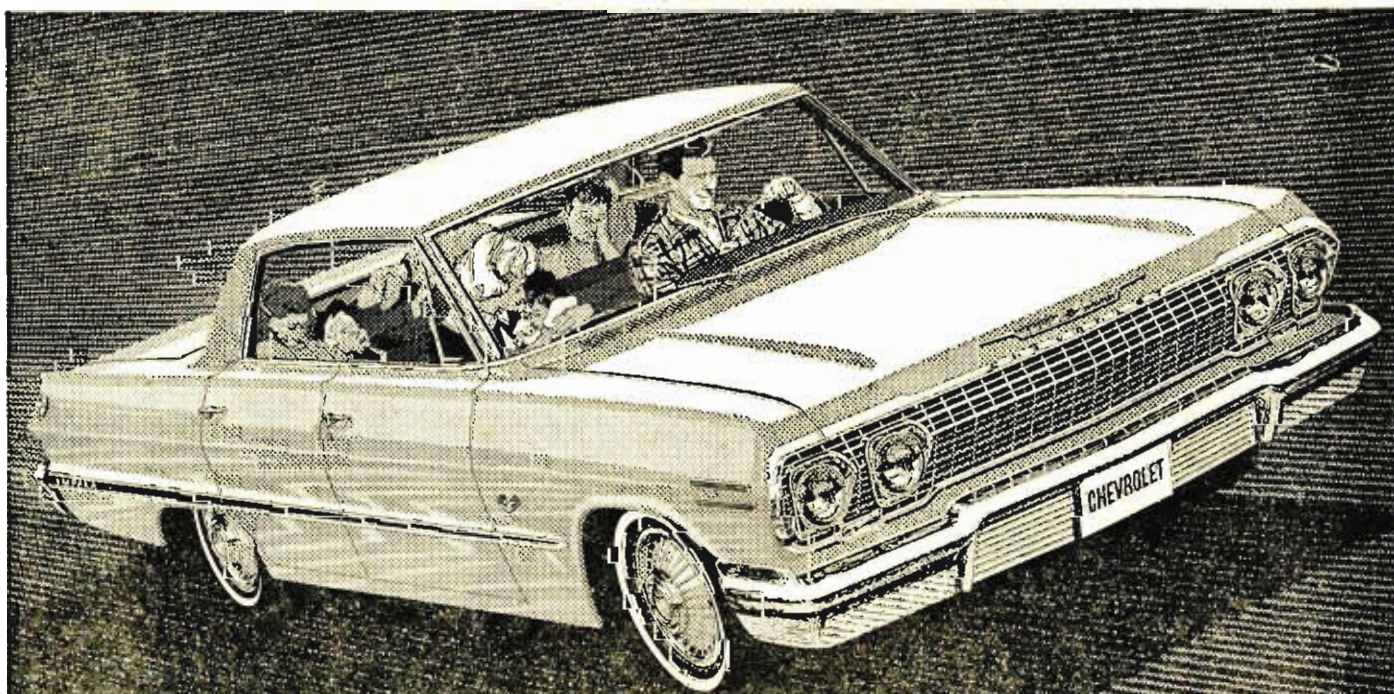
