Elita Joy Cowen, Age 8, Dies Very Suddenly Sunday

Miss Elita Joy Cowen, eight-year-old daughter of Eldon Cowen, Route 3, Argos, and the late Mrs. Melita Johnson Cowen, died at 11:45 a.m. Sunday at Marshall County Parkview Hospital, Plymouth. Death was attributed to encephalitis following an illness of one and a half days.

She was born June 19, 1954, at Rochester. Her mother, Melita Johnson Cowen, and her step-mother Ardith Stevens Cowen, preceded her in death.

A lifetime resident of Route 3, Argos, she was enrolled in the third grade of the Argos Community Schools. She was a member of the Blue Birds of Argos. Miss Cowen was also a member of the Poplar Grove Methodist Church.

Surviving with her father, Eldon Cowen, Route 3, Argos, are two sisters, Linda and Charla Cowen, both at home; one step-sister, Linda Stevens of Hales Corners, Wis.; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cowen of Route 3, Argos, maternal grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Glen Johnson, Route 3, Argos; and step-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Stevens of Culver.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday from the Poplar Grove Methodist Church. The Rev. W. Ray Kuhn, church pastor, officiated. Interment was in Poplar Grove Cemetery.

Roy E. Wickizer, Retired Farmer, Dies At Age 86

Roy E. Wickizer, 86, prominent retired Culver farmer, died Thursday afternoon at his home, 412 Lake Shore Drive, Culver, following an illness of six weeks.

He was born in Union Township, Marshall County on Oct. 25, 1875, and spent his life in this community.

Mr. Wickizer attended Normal College at Valparaiso and taught school in Union Township three years after which he was engaged in farming in this community until his retirement four years ago.

Since that time he and Mrs. Wickizer have resided in Culver.

Surviving with his widow, Mae, are a son, R. Park Wickizer, of South Bend; a daughter, Mrs. Ellen Keerle of Gary; four grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Mr. Wickizer was a member of the Culver Methodist Church, Maxinkuckee I.O.O.F. Lodge, Union Township Farm Bureau, and was a past member of the Marshall County Council.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the Culver Methodist Church by the Rev. Albert Vermillion of Darlington. Interment was in the Poplar Grove Cemetery, east of Culver.

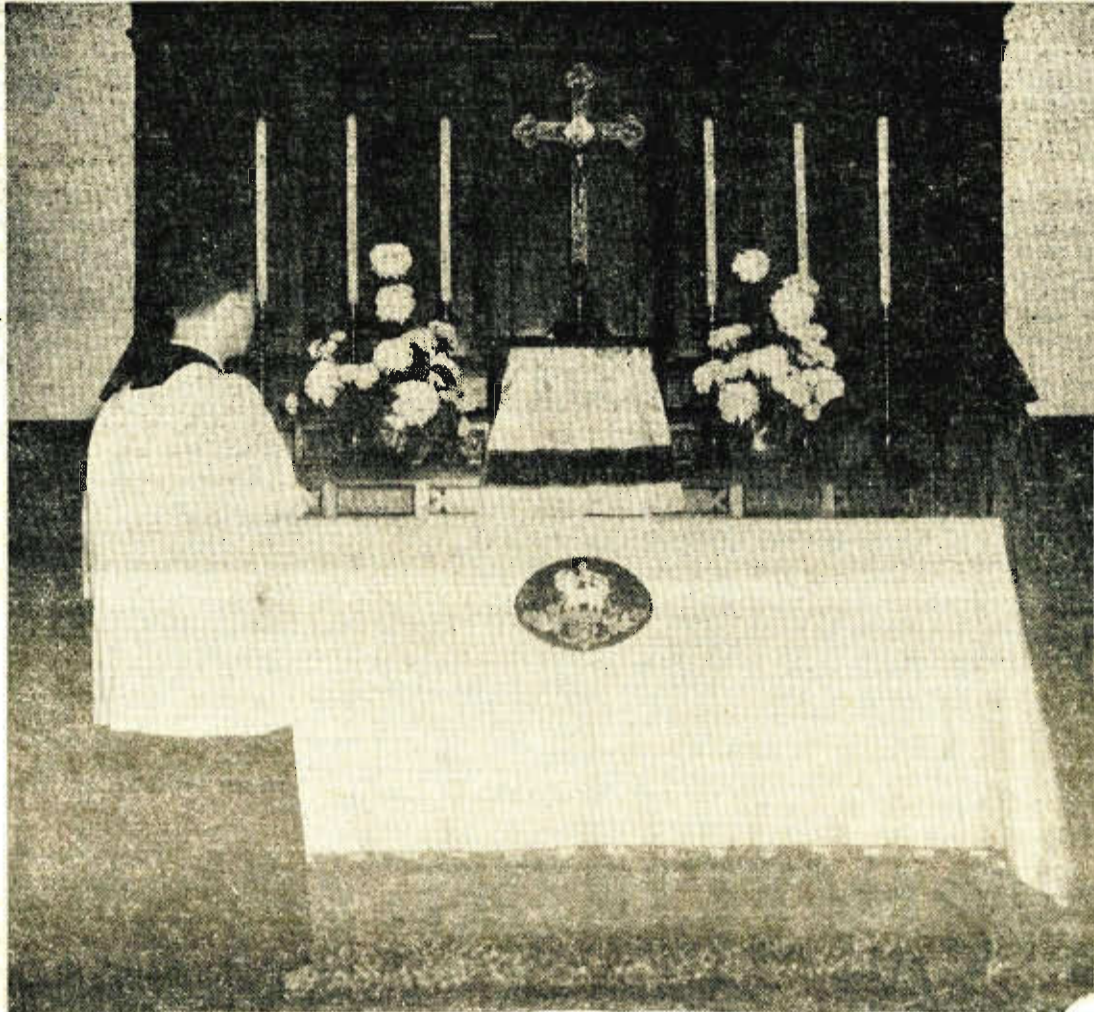

Father Sheridan To Celebrate 15th Year At St. Thomas' Church In Plymouth

Plans are being made at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, Plymouth, to celebrate the 15th anniversary of its pastor, the Rev. William C. R. Sheridan. Father Sheridan was instituted as the parish priest in December, 1947, by his Bishop, the Right Reverend Reginald Mallett, S.T.D., of South Bend.

Scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 4, at 7:30 p.m. is a Service of Thanksgiving. Among those participating at Solemn Evensong (Vespers) is Chaplain Allen F. Bray of the Culver Military Academy. The Dean of the Cathedral Church at St. James, South Bend, the Very Rev. Robert F. Royster, will preach.

County Wide Parish
St. Thomas' Parish was founded in 1860 in Plymouth. It now serves as the Episcopal (Anglican) parish for Marshall County. More than 25% of its people live in the county, with 20 of its families residing in Culver and environs.

A Community Pastor
The Pastor of St. Thomas' has been closely identified with the Plymouth community and many parts of Marshall County. Father Sheridan has worked with the Alcoholics Anonymous (they have met in St. Thomas' Parish House for 14 years). He has been a director of the United Fund since its inception and believes that its works of mercy "constitute the conscience of a community". Father Sheridan has an especially deep concern for Christian charity between the various Churches. In 1948 he persuaded a group of local pastors to eat breakfast together before their monthly business meeting. This has been continued for 14 years by those who believe that this is important.

In 1958 Father Sheridan was given the first "Distinguished Citizen's Award" by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Due to the recent retirement or death of many older pastors in the Episcopal Diocese of Northern Indiana, Father Sheridan has become—after 18 years—the second from "senior priest". He has a number of diocesan responsibilities. They include: being an Examining Chaplain to the Bishop; a Member of the Bishop and Council; a trustee of the "Diocesan Expansion Fund". For the past two years he has been President of the Standing Committee, the highest position to which a parish priest can be elected.

Father Sheridan is originally from Baltimore, Maryland. He attended St. Paul's School there, the University of Virginia and Carroll College, Waukesha, Wis. He was educated for the priesthood at Nashotah House, Nashotah, Wis.

The Pastor of St. Thomas' has been married for 19 years to the former Miss Rudith Treder of Milwaukee. With their five children, Elizabeth, Margaret, Mary, Stephen and Peter they live in St. Thomas' Rectory at 412 N. Center St., Plymouth.

Father Sheridan's pastorate — with one exception — is the longest of any priest or pastor now serving in Marshall County.

Special Services At CMA Memorial Chapel On Sunday

Second in a series of five services of choral evensong with organ recital will be held at the Memorial Chapel of Culver Military Academy at 5 p.m. Sunday afternoon, Dec. 2. The service will be conducted by the Rev. Allen F. Bray, III, Academy Chaplain, and Donald R. M. Paterson, choirmaster.

Sunday's service will be devoted to the Advent season of the church year. Paterson will perform Advent organ compositions of Johann Sebastian Bach, and the special choir will sing an arrangement of the famous Advent chorale "Come, Saviour of the Gentiles". Also included in the service will be antiphonal singing of the Versicles and Responses from the service of Evening Prayer, the traditional canticles, from St. Luke—"Magnificat" and "Nunc Dimittis"—and a setting of the 84th Psalm.

Street Decorations For The Holidays Being Put Up

The city of Culver will take on the holiday festive spirit this week as workers install the Christmas street decorations. The decorations being hung are those which were purchased last year by the Chamber of Commerce, from funds raised by the local business firms, and those purchased this year to add to the decorations so that a better coverage of the business district could be made.

The additional decorations purchased this year are four lantern post ornamental stars to be hung from the utility poles. Four stars, two feet in diameter, will be hung at the intersection of Main and Jefferson streets. Two hundred feet of aluminum and red streamers and 135 feet of aluminum streamers will be used as garnish for utility poles. The new purchases added to last year's decorations will make an outstanding holiday display for a city the size of Culver.

In addition to the aluminum decorations, strands of colored lights will be strung from pole to pole. As usual, the large Christmas tree, with its bright colored lights, will be placed in the triangle lot in front of the Pennsylvania Railroad station.

Postmaster Says: 'Mail Early And Often!'

"Mail early and often!" is Postmaster E. Wayne Mattox's special slogan for his "Mail early for Christmas" campaign this year. He suggests that you get your Christmas card and gift lists up-to-date. Make sure each address includes full name, street and number; city, zone and state. Secure sturdy packing materials for your gift packages. The postmaster adds, "Preparation is half the battle. Let's all work together to make this the merriest Christmas ever!"

Be sure to send your Christmas cards by first class mail, using the attractive new 4¢ Christmas stamps. This insures priority of dispatch and delivery, plus forwarding if necessary. Also, your cards can carry written messages and will be returned to you without cost, provided you put your return name and address on the envelopes. Separate your Christmas cards into "Local" and "Out of Town" bundles, using the handy labels you can secure from the post office or your letter carrier.

If you'll "Mail early and often!", you can be sure all of your Christmas cards and gifts will be delivered by Christmas Day. Christmas mail for most distant points should be sent well before Dec. 10. Gifts and cards for nearby destinations should be mailed by Dec. 15, or at least a week before Christmas.

Civil Air Patrol To Celebrate 21st Anniversary

Twenty-one is the magic number in an ancient game of cards; it is the magic age when a young man legally becomes adult. With Civil Air Patrol, using these other things as comparatives, the volunteer civilian auxiliary of the Air Force literally "comes of age" at 21 when it celebrates its 21st anniversary on Dec. 1, 1962.

And during its past year, much has been done to make "coming of age" an accomplishment. Established is a goal of 100,000 teenage cadets and at least 60,000 senior members by 1966. Already the drive is paying off and many of the 52 wings of CAP are meeting their quotas. The membership today is approximately 72,000, both cadets and seniors — already a big step forward. Confidence, however, is the nation's need for a strong search and rescue service by the trained Emergency Services officer of CAP, and its need for wider-spread, more advanced aerospace education for youth is the stimulus that will achieve the aim of the Long-Range Plan.

As CAP approached its 21st birthday, many mature things were happening. Most of the wings obtained man-sized written agreements with their state Civil Defense Agencies, Optomist International and The American Legion joined forces with CAP to spread interest in aerospace education and to form new squadrons. As a result, during the first year the Long-Range Plan was put on paper, membership began to grow in the proportions Civil Air Patrol, as a corporation, desired. The Air Force liaison offices at national, region and wing levels aided the drive. Youth programs were stepped up to meet modern-day demands. Aircraft control and space age courses were added to the already established jet and aerospace age courses. The picture brightened.

Civil Air Patrol's activities have spread. Hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, and other natural and man-made disasters find Civil Air Patrol volunteers lending a hand. Surplus military radio equipment has been salvaged and rebuilt into one of the most extensive radio nets this country has today. Some 14,000 CAP radio stations tie the 50 state wings, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia into an invisible network of almost instant communication.

The emphasis on American youth has mushroomed into a Civil Air Patrol cadet program which offers hundreds of special scholarships and honors programs at Air Force bases, and an International Air Cadet Exchange which has been an outstanding "people to people" program for 15 years.

Here in Culver, we have had reason to be proud of our own Civil Air Patrol unit. These volunteers are our own neighbors and friends. Let us remember that our CAP unit is but one of more than 2,000 such units located in every state of our country. Your son and daughter may be one of the CAP cadets who now number more than 40,000 nationwide.

Civil Air Patrol is celebrating its 21st anniversary next week, Dec. 1-7, 21 years of service to nation and community. We salute Civil Air Patrol on its past achievements, and pay tribute to our own squadron who are a part of this 72,000-member volunteer force standing ready to lend a helping hand to each of us.

Apply Now For Special License Plate Numbers

Want the same license plate on your car next year that you have on this year?

You may reserve the same number, according to the license bureau, if you follow these directions:

You must apply at the Marshall County License Bureau in Plymouth between Nov. 26 and Dec. 15.

You must bring the pre-typed registration which you received from the state. If you have not received one, bring the container card you carry in your car for your 1962 plate.

You must bring your "B" copy of your paid 1962 Tax receipt.

A reminder, you must apply and pay for the number between Nov. 26 and Dec. 15 or they will not be reserved. On Dec. 15 any number not paid for will be open to anyone.

Machine Guns Stolen From CMA Saturday

Culver Military Academy was visited by thieves over the Thanksgiving weekend. Missing from the Academy are three machine guns, used for classroom demonstration and are not workable. The theft was discovered late Saturday by a custodian. It is believed the robbery took place in the early hours of Saturday morning.

It is believed the thieves gained entrance to the building where the guns were stored, by using a truck with a chain fastened to the truck and the window frame, using the truck as power to remove the window pane.

The guns which are very heavy and require two men to carry them, were a .25 caliber Japanese machine gun; a .25 caliber German machine gun; and a .30 caliber Lewis gun.

Although several other guns, of lighter weight, were stored in the same building, none of these were taken. There was no ammunition stored with the guns, and the firing pins had been removed, so as to make the machine guns absolutely safe for classroom demonstration.

Don Mikesell, Culver Police Chief, and the county sheriff's department are investigating.

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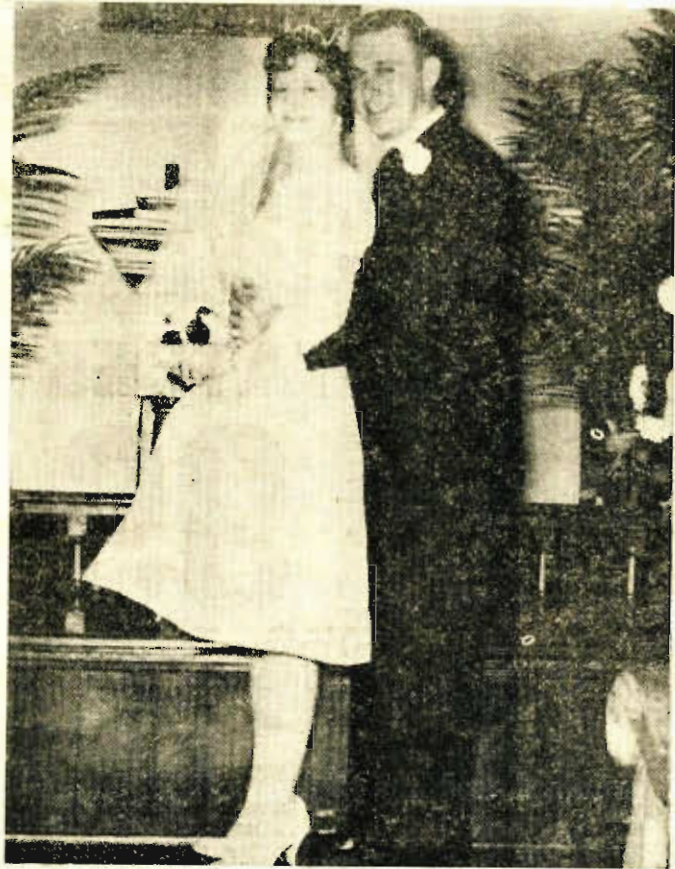

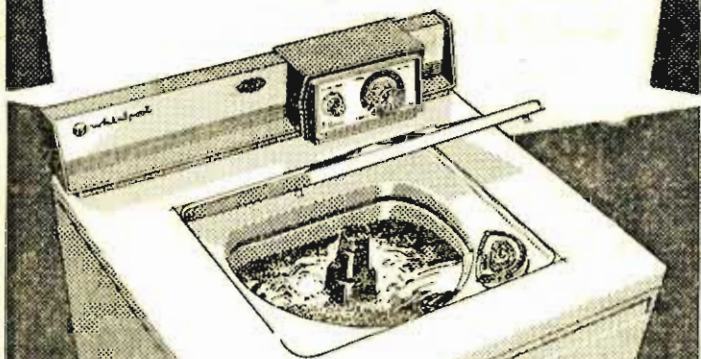

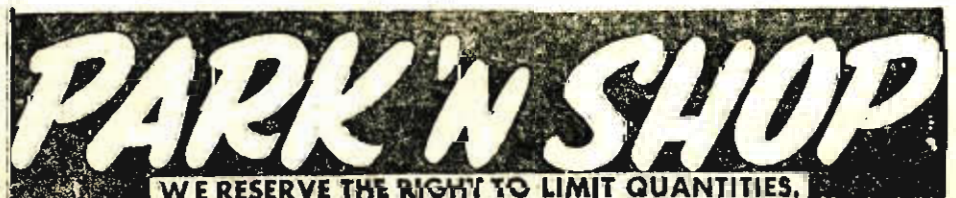

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A Great Hoax Helps To Spread Socialism

Union leaders have pushed for government intervention with the hue and cry that the workers create the wealth but do not get a fair share of it.

The facts are that out of every dollar available for workers or owners of American corporations, the workers average 89.7 cents and the owners average 10.3 cents.

Machines furnish about 95 per cent of the energy used in American industry yet the owners of these machines, the people who have saved money to buy them, get only about one-ninth of the dollars that are available, after expenses are paid, with which to reward labor and owners.

On the other hand workers supply about 5 per cent of the energy used in industrial production in our country and are rewarded with about eight-ninths of the wealth flowing from these industries that is divisible between owners and labor.

Socialism has spread, not only in our own country, but around the world on the basis of the great hoax promulgated in literature, published in all leading languages, proclaiming the gigantic error that of the dollars available for owners and workers, owners get four-fifths and labor one-fifth. If this were true every fair-minded person would be a Socialist. It is because multitudes believe this error that socialism is winning.

When advised that just the opposite is true — that owners receive one-ninth and labor eight-ninths, fair-minded people can no longer be Socialists.

Internal Revenue reports show that during the last 45 years, 45 per cent of American companies "on the average have shown losses." Only the better managed and fortunately situated companies have shown profits.

Profit is the very lifeblood of a prosperous, self-governing society. Tyranny and slavery will be the lot of those who reject the profit system or force profits down so low as to discourage saving and risk-taking in enterprise. The margin of safety is already very slender.

REMYAN SCHOLARSHIPS

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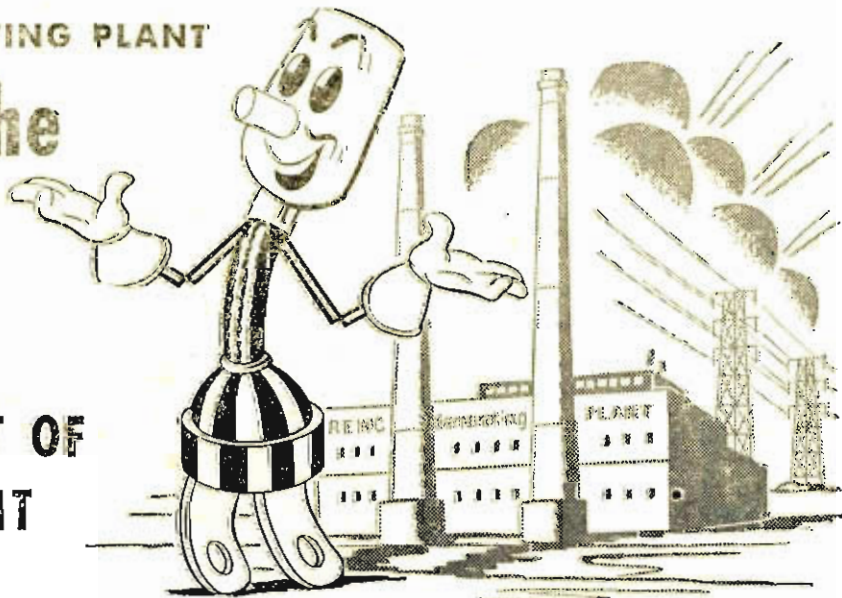

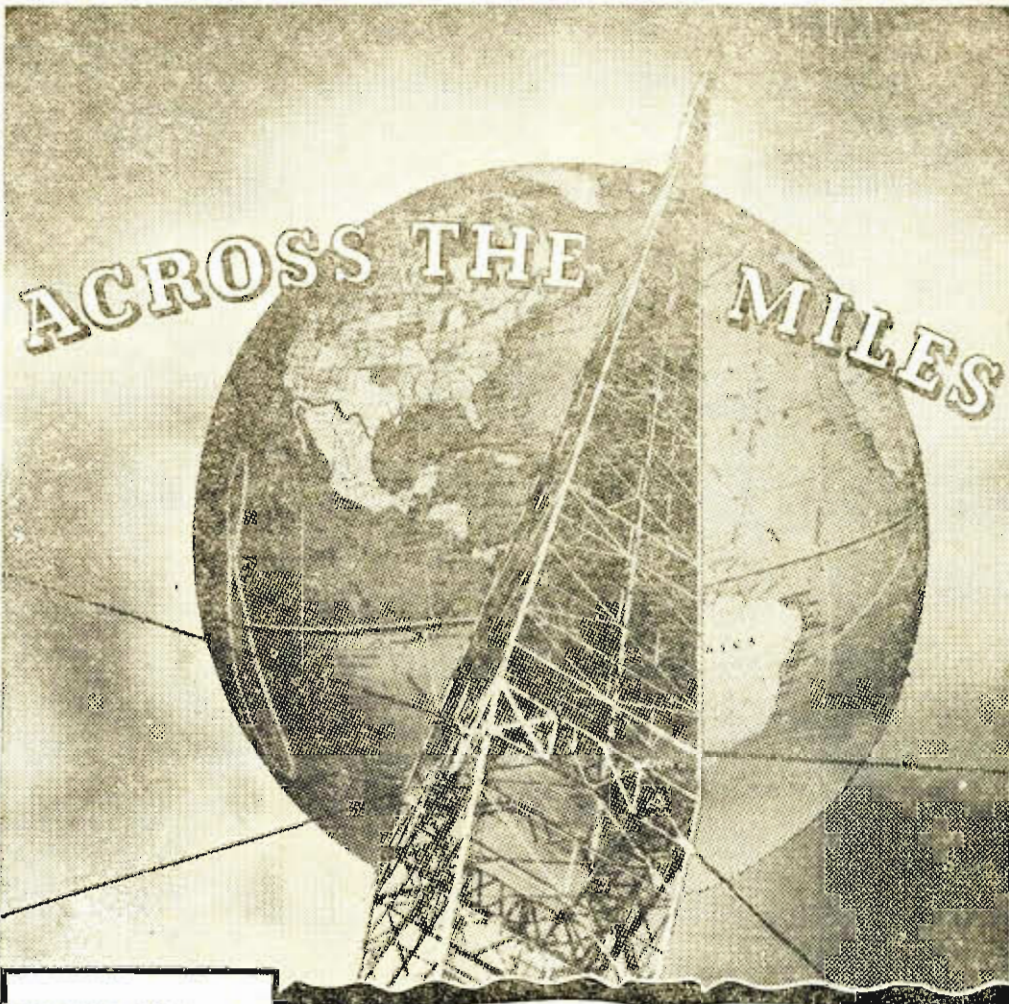

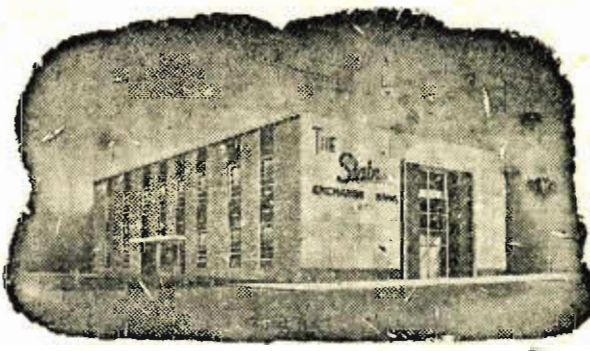
