

ed in 1860 in Plymouth. It now serves as the Episcopal (Angli-can) parish for Marshall County: More than 25% of its people live in the county, with 20 of its families residing in Culver and environs.

A Community Pastor

The Pastor of St. Thomas' has been closely identified with the Plymouth community and many parts of Marshall County. Father Sheridan has worked with the Alcoholics Anonymous (they have met in St. Thomas' Parish House for 14 years). He has been a director of the United Fund since its inception and believes that its works of mercy "constitute the conscience of a community". Father Sheridan has an especially deep concern for Christian charity between the various Churches. In 1948 he persuaded a group of local pastors to eat breakfast together before their monthly business meeting. This has been continued for 14 years by those who believe that this is important.

In 1958 Father Sheridan was given the first "Distinguished Citizen's Award" by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Civil Air Patrol To Celebrate 21st Anniversary

Twenty-one is the magic number in an ancient game of cards; it is the magic age when a young man legally becomes adult. With Civil Air Patrol, using these other things as comparatives, the volunteer civilian auxiliary of the Air Force literally "comes of age" at 21 when its celebrates its 21st anniversary on Dec. 1, 1962,

And during its past year, much has been done to make "coming of age" an accomplishment. Es-tablished is a goal of 100,000 teenage cadets and at least 60,000 senior members by 1966. Already the drive is paying off and many of the 52 wings of CAP are meeting their quotas. The membership today is approximately 72,000. both cadets and seniors — already a big step forward. Confidence, however, is the nation's need for a strong search and rescue service by the trained Emergency Services officer of CAP, and its need for wider-spread, more advanced aerospace education for youth is the stimulus that will achieve the aim of the Long-Range Plan.

As CAP approached its 21st birthday, many mature things were happening. Most of the wings obtained man-sized written agreements with their state Civil Defense Agencies. Optomist Inter-national and The American Le-gion joined forces with CAP to spread interest in aerospace education and to form new squadrons. As a result, during the first year the Long-Range Plan was put on paper, membership began to grow in the proportions Civil Air Patrol, as a corporation, desired. The Air Force liaison offices at national, region and wing levels aided the drive. Youth progams were stepped up to meet modern-day demands. Aircraft control and space age courses were added to the already established jet and aerospace age courses. The picture brightened. Civil Air Patrol's activities have

spread, Hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, and other natural and man-made disasters find Civil Air Patrol volunteers lending a hand. Surplus military radio equipment has been salvaged and rebuilt into one of the most extensive radio nets this country has today. Some 14,000 CAP radio stations tie the 50 state wings, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia into an invisible network of almost instant communication.

The emphasis on American youth has mushroomed into a Civil Air Patrol cadet program which offers hundreds of special scholarships and honors programs at Air Force bases, and an International Air Cadet Exchange which has been an outstanding "people to people" program for 15 years.

Here in Culver, we have had reason to be proud of our own Civil Air Patrol unit. These volunteers are our own neighbors and friends. Let us remember that our CAP unit is but one of more than 2,000 such units located in every state of our country. Your son and daughter may be one of the CAP cadets who now number more than 40,000 nationwide.

Machine Guns Stolen From **CMA** Saturday

Culver Military Academy was visited by thieves over the Thanksgiving weekend. Missing from the Academy are three machine guns, used for classroom demonstration and are not workable. The theft was discovered late Saturday by a custodian. It is believed the robbery took place in the early hours of Saturday

It is believed the thieves gained entrance to the building where the guns were stored, by using a truck with a chain fastened to the truck and the window frame, using the truck as power to remove the window forme. The guns which are very

heavy and require two men to carry them, were a .25 caliber Japanese machine gun; a .25 caliber German machine gun; and a 30 caliber Lewis gun.

Although several other guns, of lighter weight, were stored in the same building, none of these were taken. There was no ammunition stored with the guns, and the firing pins had been removed, so as to make the machine guns absolutely safe for classroom demonstration.



and the owners average 19.3 cents.

Machines furnish about 95 per cent of the energy used in American industry yet the owners of these machines, the people who have saved money to buy them, get only about one-ninth of the dollars. that are available, after expenses are paid, with which to reward

On the other hand workers supply about 5 per cent of the energy used in industrial production in our country and are rewarded with about eight-ainths of the wealth flowing from these industries that

is divisible between owners and labor. Socialism has spread, not only in our own country, but around the world on the basis of the great hoax promulgated in literature, published in all leading languages, proclaiming the gigantic error that of the dollars available for owners and workers, owners get four-fifths and labor one-fifth. If this were true every fair-minded person would be a Socialist. It is because multitudes believe this error that socialism is winning.

When advised that just the opposite is true that owners receive one-ninth and labor eight-ninths, fair-minded people can no longer be Socialists,

Profit is the very lifeblood of a prosperous, self-governing society.




