Work Progressing On New Woodcraft Camp



Work on the new Woodcraft Camp of the Culver Summer Schools is progressing on schedule. The camp is being constructed on a 250-acre tract of land bordered by Routes 10 and 117, and located east of the present Woodcraft Camp. The 64 permanent buildings are designed to house 648 boys and to provide classroom, administration, library, dining, and lavatory facilities. The buildings are of wood construction and replace tents used by the Woodcraft Camp since it was founded as part of the Summer Schools 50 years ago.

A typical cabin will house 12 boys sleeping in two rows of double-decked beds, six on a side. Counselors will have their own rooms at the rear of the cabin. Individual lockers and cabinets will be provided for athletic gear and personal belongings of the Woodcrafters. The cabins measure 32 feet in length, 20 feet in width, and 18 feet high. They are ventilated by red cedar louvers and fibre-glass screen. The camp will be completed in time for use of the 1963 Woodcraft School.

Johnson Tire Service Sells To Partnership

The Johnson Tire Service, one of Culver's oldest businesses, was purchased Monday, Jan. 7, by the partnership of Harold Miller, Robert Miller and Wesley Schilling. It was announced by Walter Johnson, former owner. The new owners will retain the present firm name of Johnson Tire Service.

Mr. Johnson, who has no immediate plans, (only to take a long rest according to him) started his business on Jan. 10, 1920. Coming from South Bend at the age of 19, he started a retreading and vulcanizing business in what is now the location of the Fingerhut Bakery and Strang's Barber Shop. In 1920 tire retreading and vulcanizing was a new type of business, just getting started.

In the year of 1925 Mr. Johnson expanded to the location the firm now occupies. The building housing the business was constructed by Mr. Johnson. Added to the business at that time were all the services that are found today in a service station, such as gasoline, oil, lubrications, etc. The retreading and vulcanizing business was also retained. In reminiscing about the early days of the business, Mr. Johnson says there were more horses and buggies in those days than automobiles and there were still hitch racks along the streets in Culver.

Harold Miller and Wesley Schilling, two of the new owners, formed a partnership during the time spent in the armed services in the year of 1947. In 1951 after being discharged from the service, the partners took over the management of the Watland Farms, located south of Culver. Robert Miller joined the partnership a few years later. The partnership has operated the Watland Farms up to the present time.

The new owners, in a statement to The Citizen, plan to carry on the same policies and services which Mr. Johnson maintained in his 43 years of business operation.

Park 'N Shop To Build New Super Market Building

Construction on a new building, which will be the new home of the local Park 'N Shop Super Market, will begin soon, according to an announcement made this week by Charles Rhodes, owner of the Park 'N Shop Super Market organization. The new building will be located on the property recently purchased from Roth and Nolan Cline, and lies just east of the present Park 'N Shop market.

The new building will be a Stran Steel Building and will be erected by the David Poor Company of Warsaw. The dimensions of the new structure will be 60 x 102 feet, and one story in height. The building will contain four times the amount of square feet of floor space the present market now has.

The structure will face East Jefferson Street and be located on a tract of ground 165 x 198 feet. It will be situated to allow for free parking in front and on the west side of the building for approximately 80 cars.

The front of the building will have a six foot canopy, which will allow for outside produce displays in any type of weather. The inside will be completely modern in every way. New automatic checkout counters will be installed to allow for faster checkout service. The building will be completely air-conditioned.

The cement block building, which has been occupied by the M. R. Cline Builder's Store will be remodeled and used as a rental location.

The announcement of the Park 'N Shop expansion program, highlights several business changes which have been made in Culver over the past several weeks. The new structure will add much to the growing business section of Culver. To add to the progress of Culver, the Culver Town Board has expressed their intention to cooperate as fully as they possibly can.

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR NEW ARGOS AND BOURBON POST OFFICE BUILDINGS

Congressman John Brademas (D-Ind.) has announced that construction of the new post office buildings at Argos and Bourbon was further advanced with the announcement by Postmaster General J. Edward Day that a contract has been awarded to Terrace Arms, Inc., 20 1/2 W. Boardman Street, Youngstown, Ohio, to build and lease the buildings to the Post Office Department.

Under the Department's Lease

Construction program the Terrace Arms Company will construct the new buildings and lease them to the Department for 10 years, with renewal options up to 20 years.

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, while the buildings remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

The new post office at Argos will be constructed on a site containing 10,378 square feet at the northeast corner of Walnut and First Streets, and is expected to

be completed in approximately seven months. It will have an interior space of 2,879 square feet, with an area of 5,987 square feet for parking and movement of postal vehicles.

The new post office at Bourbon will be constructed on a site containing 10,578 square feet at 221 North Main Street, and is expected to be completed in approximately eight months. It will have an interior space of 2,914 square feet, with an area of 5,914 square feet for parking and movement of postal vehicles.

From Conservation Department

There is no official opening day to signal the beginning of ice fishing in Indiana. Somehow, the followers of this frigid sport appear uncalled with the first forming of solid ice on lakes and ponds.

Some Hoosiers have known for years that fish do not stop biting because the water surface is frozen and the water temperature is low. All sportsmen, and women, in Indiana are invited to put on their warmest clothes and join in the fun.

Ice fishing gear is simple and inexpensive. A short cane pole or light rod, a monofilament line of 2 to 5 lbs. test, a size 6 or 8 hook, and a tiny split shot sinker will do a fine job on panfish. A small float can be added, if desired.

Bluegill, crappie, and yellow perch are the favorites of ice fishermen. These offer some of the finest eating imaginable.

Favorite baits are immature insects with the interesting names of bee moths, mousies, and wigglers. Small minnows are best for crappie. Large minnows may take bass and northern pike. A special rig for pike would be a strong 5 ft. pole, 20 lb. test line, a number 10 hook, and a lively minnow 5 or 6 inches long. Trout are also taken in some northern Indiana lakes which have been stocked.

Special artificial ice fishing lures are available in sporting goods stores. These often produce good catches of bass when jigged, or repeatedly raised and lowered in the water.

Ice fishing is not limited to northern Indiana. Lakes and farm ponds in central Indiana are consistently producing some better catches now through the ice than in midsummer. Even southern Indiana fishermen have opportunities when a long cold spell brings firm ice.

Ice fishing regulations require a fisherman to use no more than two holes, no more than one line per hole, and only one hook per line. The maximum diameter of the hole is 12 inches. Generally, a six inch hole is plenty. If a ice house or shanty is used, the owner's name and address must be on the outside of the door. The door latch must be made to open from both the inside and the outside. The ice house should be removed before the breakup in the spring.

Most of the concert managers were on campus Friday in time to witness two of Culver's theater presentations. Ira and Inman, folk-singers, and the Cy Touff jazz quintet gave a matinee performance at 1 p.m. Friday in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium for public school children in Marshall County. They also performed for Academy cadets, faculty, and the general public at 8:15.

Concert managers met Friday night for the first time and then convened at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in Eppley Auditorium to meet with representatives of the various agencies. The managers discussed mutual problems with agencies and performers at a Saturday morning session. In the afternoon the topic concerned a new project in Muncie in which civic and educational groups have pooled resources to construct a theater. Martin also talked to the group on his ideas to encourage more programs in the performing arts within state teacher colleges.

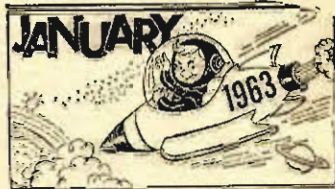
Conservation Department Warns Against Nutria

NOTICE: Be on the lookout for the following: A RAT! Weight up to 25 lbs.; length varies with age, but may reach 24 inches long in the body with a tail of 12 to 16 inches.

This rodent at first sight appears to be a stunted beaver with a long round tail and mildewed coat of fur. These rodents have been showing up in various localities throughout the state in the past few years. Most of the sightings have been single animals. The few reported by trappers have been well distributed over the state.

The animals have likely come from accidental escapes from nutria breeders throughout Indiana. There appears to be reason to believe that some breeders may have released some of their breeding stock, also.

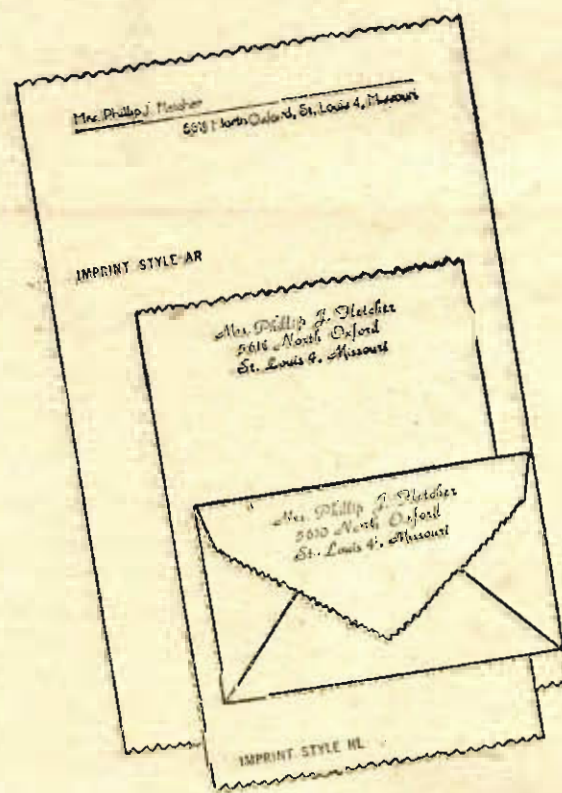
