



A Culver Military Academy instructor has been awarded a Ful-bright Fellowship to teach at an American-sponsored college Greece during the 1963-64 academic year.

Thomas E. Walker, senior instructor in English and a member of the Academy faculty since 1955, has been assigned to teach Anatolia College in Thesseloniki, second largest city in Greece. He is the second Academy instructor to receive a Fulbright Fellowship within the last 11 years.

Walker, his wife Charlotte, a Missouri native, and two children will leave for Washington, D.C. and four days of indoctrination from July 15-13 before sailing for Greece. He will spend a month on the Grecian island of Spetsai beginning Aug. 1, during which time his orientation will include 60 hours of the Greek language, 20 hours of Greek history and culture, and 20 hours of teaching English as a foreign language. He will return to teaching duties at Culver sometime during the summer of 1964.

One of 26 recipients of Fulbright Fellowships to Greece. Walker was selected by a committee of 12 U.S. citizens prominent in public and private educational and cultural activities. He applied for the fellowship last September under the Fulbright-Hays Act and underwent an intensive oral examination with members of the Office of Educa-tion of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Dr. Longenecker To Speak At CMA Graduation

Dr. Herbert E. Longenecker, president of Tulane University, New Orleans, La., will deliver the commencement address to 171 graduating seniors of Culver Military Academy at 11 a.m. Tuesday, June 4.

The Tulane president's speech will be given at the annual Commencement Honors Convocation when special awards are presented and members of the 1963 class are cited for academic achievement.

Dr. Longenecker was appointed president of Tulane in 1960 and prior to that time was vice-president in charge of professional colleges for the University of Illinois for five years. A member of the faculty at the University of Pittsburgh between 1938 and 1955. Dr. Longenecker was professor of biochemistry, dean of research in the natural sciences, and finally dean of the graduate school for nine years.

Following his graduation from Pennsylvania State University, University Park, Pa., in 1936, he was National Research Council Fellow for two years at the University of Liverpool, University of Cologne, and Queens University. He received a doctor of science degree from Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, in 1951, and was given Penn State's distinguished alumnus award in 1960. He was also honored by the Illinois Interprofessional Council with a distinguished service award in 1958.

Dr. Longenecker currently is involved in many committees and boards which serve education, civic, and government activities. He is a member of the commission on foreign relations for the American Council on Education, a director of the Ford Motor Company Scholarship program, a director of the Council of Southern Universities, a member of the advisory committee on ROTC activities for the Office of Defense, and he is on the advisory council for the U.S. Army Chemical Corps. He is also a director or trustee of three research Institutes.






