Have You Seen This Dog?



Pictured above is the white, black and brown spayed female dog, which has bitten two people in less than a week. The dog, a half breed of Spaniel and Spitz, has been hunted by Chief of Police Don Mikesell, to hold for observation, in case the dog is rabid. So far all efforts to locate the mongrel have been in vain. In the meantime the two persons, who were bitten, have started their rabies shots.

If the dog is being held by someone as a pet, they should make every effort to get in touch with Chief Mikesell. If the dog is rabid and has died of the disease, it could mean the start of a rabies epidemic and could be very serious.

8th Grade Music Class Visits C.M.A. Carillon

The Culver eighth grade general music class with Richard Hambrook, Director of Music, visited the Carillon in the Culver Memorial Chapel May 15. Their visit included a look at the 51 bells which comprise the Carillon and a lecture on some of the facts about the Carillon here in America. This lecture was presented by Milford Myhre, the Academy Carillonneur, who joined the faculty of the Academy in 1957. Last fall Myhre gave a lecture and demonstration of the large pipe organ to this class.

The Carillon was cast and tuned by Gillett and Johnston of Croydon, England, and was presented to the Academy by the Amon G. Carter Foundation of Fort Worth, Texas. The Bourdon, or largest bell, weighs 6200 pounds and is 65 inches in diameter and sounds the note E. The smallest bell, weighing only 17 pounds, has a diameter of seven inches, and sounds D four octaves above. Westminster Quarters are chimed automatically throughout the day and the Bourdon may be swung to signal services.

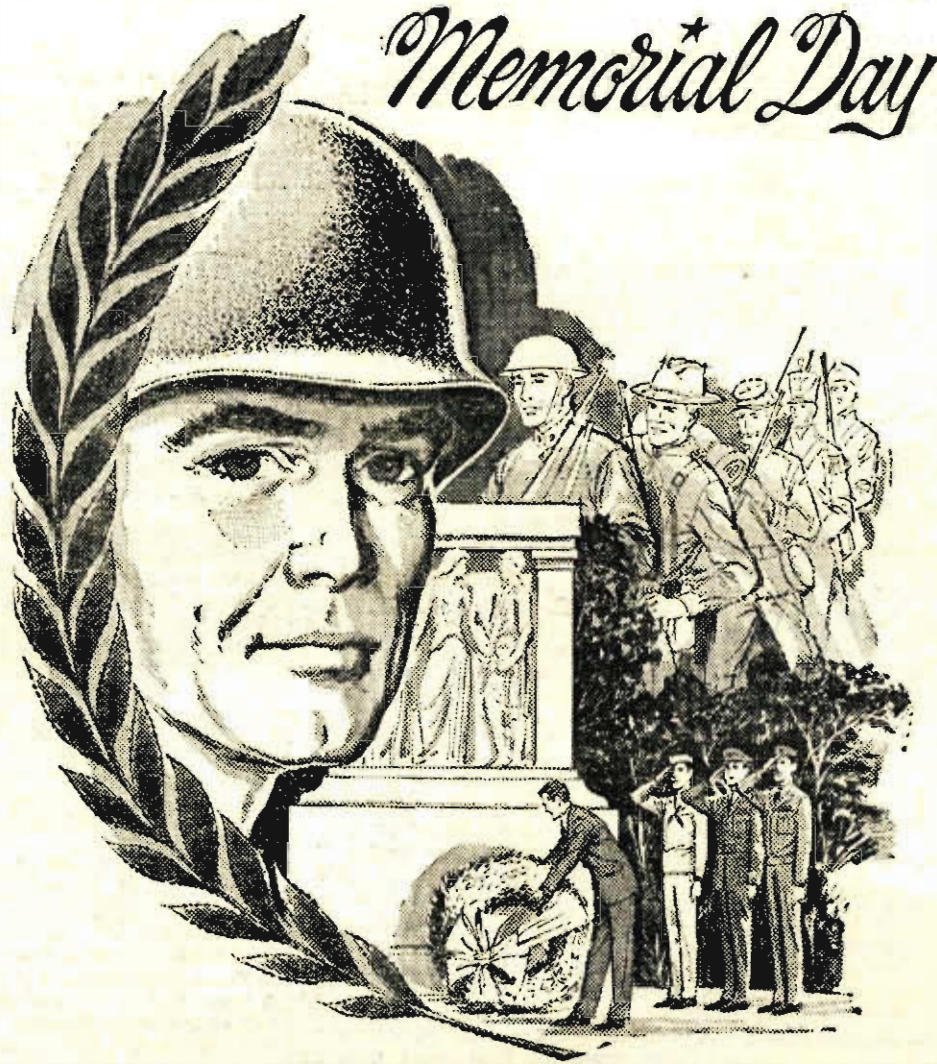

Arthur G. Hughes Appointed To NCTE Committee

Arthur G. Hughes of the faculty of the Culver Military Academy has been appointed to an important position with the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE), a professional organization of about 80,000 members and subscribers at all levels.

Mr. Hughes will serve as a member of the NCTE Committee on All-School English. The purpose of this committee is to help all administrators and teachers to understand that an adequate command of English is fundamental to the teaching and learning of all subjects. The committee will prepare a hand book of suggestions for the indirect teaching of English in all classes which will be distributed through the headquarters of NCTE.

This appointment is one of many being made by NCTE in connection with vigorous expansion of the organization in new directions, according to Dr. James R. Squire, Council Executive Secretary.

The goal of the Council is to increase the effectiveness of the teaching of English language and

its literature in the nation's schools and colleges. In addition to furnishing such teaching aids as books, recordings, and literary maps, NCTE publishes six professional journals — Elementary English, English Journal, College English, College Composition and Communication, Abstracts of English Studies, and Studies In The Mass Media.

The Summer Reading Club is in full swing with children registering who have completed any of the grades one through six. Dozens of youngsters have signed up, and it should be noted that the last day to register is Saturday, June 1.

Culver Summer Schools Expect Peak Enrollment

A record enrollment for the 1963 session of the Culver Summer Schools is anticipated today by Dean of Admissions Frank M. Bryant. However, applications for all three schools will be accepted through June 29.

The Summer Schools will also have 242 faculty and staff members, a record number for the Culver summer program started 61 years ago.

Largest of the four schools is the Naval School, with an enrollment of 823. The Woodcraft Camp, moving into new permanent quarters for the first time this summer, has a capacity of 648 boys, and the Summer School of Horsemanship is limited to 136. The Naval and Horsemanship schools are for boys 14 through 18, while the Woodcraft Camp is for boys 9½ through 13. Newest of the schools is the Summer Theater Workshop, which will enroll about 20 this year.

The total anticipated enrollment of 1,637 will continue Culver's position as the largest summer program of its type in the nation.

Authorities said Miller drove from a side road on to Road 10 into the path of a car driven by Sally Ann Knepper, 21, Route 4, Plymouth. The Knepper vehicle hit the Miller car broadside.

She was treated and released at Starke Memorial Hospital in Knox for shock and lacerations and abrasions of her head, knees and legs.

Starke County Coroner Raymond Braman stated Miller died of a fractured neck and crushed chest.

A passenger in the Miller car, Mrs. Catherine Fort, 47, North Judson, was taken to Starke Memorial and later transferred to Holy Family Hospital in LaPorte where she is reported in fairly good condition. Her left arm and left leg were crushed in the accident.

Both cars were demolished in the accident which was investigated by state police and the Starke County sheriff's department.

Mr. Miller was born Sept. 27, 1894 in Fulton County and had been a resident of Delong most of his life. He was a retired employee of the Erie Railroad.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Daisy Brown of Loganport; two sons, William of Elkhart and Walter of Delong; three sisters, Mrs. Nellie Kline, Miss Lena Miller and Mrs. Rose Guise, all of Culver; 10 grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren.

Preceding him in death were four brothers and two sisters.



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Awarded Fulbright Fellowship



THOMAS E. WALKER

A Culver Military Academy instructor has been awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to teach at an American-sponsored college in Greece during the 1963-64 academic year.

Thomas E. Walker, senior instructor in English and a member of the Academy faculty since 1955, has been assigned to teach at Anatolia College in Thessaloniki, second largest city in Greece. He is the second Academy instructor to receive a Fulbright Fellowship within the last 11 years.

Walker, his wife Charlotte, a Missouri native, and two children will leave for Washington, D.C. and four days of indoctrination from July 15-19 before sailing for Greece. He will spend a month on the Grecian island of Spetsai beginning Aug. 1, during which time his orientation will include 60 hours of the Greek language, 20 hours of Greek history and culture, and 20 hours of teaching English as a foreign language. He will return to teaching duties at Culver sometime during the summer of 1964.

One of 26 recipients of Fulbright Fellowships to Greece, Walker was selected by a committee of 12 U.S. citizens prominent in public and private educational and cultural activities. He applied for the fellowship last September under the Fulbright-Hays Act and underwent an intensive oral examination with members of the Office of Education of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Born in Joplin, Mo., Walker attended the University of Missouri on a Gregory Scholarship and received his bachelor's degree in education in 1948. He received a Master of Arts degree in English from Missouri a year later and then did advanced study at

the University of North Carolina, where he was on a teaching fellowship from 1950 to 1954. Walker was an assistant professor at Hanover College before joining the Academy staff in 1955.

Walker has been the author of several articles published in widely-circulated periodicals within the last year. His article "Can Words Cut Cost," was published in "Dun's Review," a Dun and Bradstreet publication, last year, and articles on the experiment of team teaching at Culver were published by the Independent Schools Bulletin and Croft Publications. An article on more effective language within industrial and commercial publications was carried by "Indiana Business and Industry," recently.

A member of the Modern Language Association, Walker also belongs to the Indiana Council for Teachers of English and the Council for Basic Education. He was selected last year to serve on a committee to rewrite and improve the English Language Curriculum in Literature for the State of Indiana.

Walker served in the U.S.

Army from 1943 to 1946 in the European and Asian theaters.

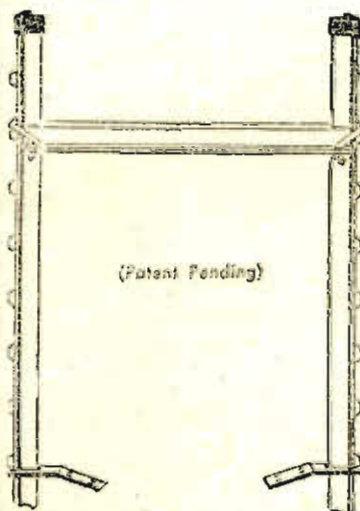
