

Miss Nancy Crill Named Strawberry Queen of 1963

Several thousand people, undaunted by the 40-degree temperatures, crowded into the town of Leifers Ford last Thursday evening for the Annual Strawberry Festival.

Long lines, four of them, formed to pass through the serving tents where hot dogs, sloppy Joes, cake, pie, ice cream, coffee, soft drinks and strawberries, prepared in every form and shape, could be had. Serving started at 5 p.m. and continued until all the food ran out.

The evening's program started with a huge parade which was highlighted by beauty queens galore and those young ladies, who aspired to be the Strawberry Queen of 1963 before the evening was over.

Julia Jane Flanigan of Lebanon, Miss Indiana of 1963, who would have the honor of crowning Miss Strawberry Queen later in the evening, was in attendance; Colleen Kelly, Miss Purdue of 1963; Donna Boling, Miss Hobart of 1963; Susan Jean Pudlo, Miss Michigan City of 1963; Miss Charlene Lucas, Culver Jaycee Queen of 1963, and Miss Melinda Jones, Strawberry Queen of 1962, were all in attendance. Eight young ladies from Leifers Ford who were contestants for Miss Strawberry Queen of 1963 were also in the parade. Each young lady was riding in a sleek convertible.

The parade, which consisted of floats, riding clubs, bands and comedy entries, traveled through the car lined streets to the school's athletic field where the judging of the floats was completed. The religious float entered by the Mount Hope Church of near Leifers Ford won first prize in the float contest. Following the parade the huge crowd

was entertained by a two-hour variety show.

The high spot of the evening followed, the crowning of the 1963 Strawberry Queen, Miss Nancy Crill, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Crill was crowned Strawberry Queen of 1963 by Miss Indiana.

Following the selection of the queen, an old fashioned square dance was held in the high school gym for the huge crowd.

The event — the largest in Fulton County, is planned to aid the Aubbeenaubbee Volunteer Fire Department. Last year over 4,500 people attended and the year before about 3,000. This year the estimated crowd was close to 5,000. In the words of Paul Davidson, co-chairman of the event, "I don't know where we will put them all, if this thing gets any bigger. I don't know what we will do." The traffic problem was a huge one, which required local police, Civil Defense officers and state police to handle.

The proceeds this year will go to purchase a much needed ambulance and emergency equipment, and an additional pump for small grass fires.

School Enrollment Will Increase

School Board Plans For Long Range Program — A Saving To Taxpayers

The Culver Community Schools Corporation, which came into being in January of this year, includes the three townships of Aubbeenaubbee in Fulton County, North Bend in Starke County, and Union Township in Marshall County. The corporation includes a geographic area of 114 square miles. Transportation for rural pupils is provided by a fleet of 18 school busses. This spring a total of 982 pupils were being provided transportation.

During the past term, there were 234 pupils attending school at Aubbeenaubbee School and 889 at Culver in grades 1 to 12. In addition there were over 70 kindergarten pupils enrolled at Culver. In addition, lists secured in April indicated a total of 12 pupils of North Bend in attendance at Monterey and 95 at Knox. Thus the total of enrolled pupils living in the three-township area was 1,230. A check of North Bend pupils attending Culver School showed a total of 148. This would indicate a total of 255 pupils living in North Bend Township and 234 in Aubbeenaubbee Township.

Though there is some doubt as to the probable enrollments at Culver and Aubbeenaubbee Schools in the fall of 1963, there seems to be a potential total of pupils in grades 1-12 in the entire school corporation of about 1,250 to 1,270. The anticipated enrollment at the Aubbeenaubbee School is from 235 to 240. Culver seems likely to have somewhat over 1,000 pupils in grades 1-12 plus somewhat over 90 in the kindergarten.

In the fall of 1959, there were 746 pupils enrolled in grades 1-12 in the Culver School. At the close of the past term, the number had reached almost 900. Next fall the enrollment in 1-12 should exceed 1,000 pupils. It is interesting to note that in the fall of 1952 Culver began its occupancy of a new elementary building. At that time the total Culver enrollment in the entire school was 653. With more than 1,000 expected in the fall of 1963, the eleven-year increase for grades 1-12 will have been almost 350, an increase of 53% in eleven years. With this changing enrollment, the Culver School must be enlarged to provide proper facilities for the larger group of pupils.

The present junior-senior high school building is 42 years old, and it will not provide acceptable high school facilities for the future. Hence a long-range plan for a new high school must be developed. In the fall of 1952, Culver had an enrollment of 350 pupils when the grade pupils moved into new facilities. In 1963-1964, this total is likely to reach at least 580, and in the next five years the number should reach 650. As a result, definite plans must be carried out to provide an addition to the elementary building. It is the plan of the Board of School Trustees to have available within the next year a new wing of six classrooms and an adequate cafeteria. With a potential enrollment of 1,000 pupils this next fall, the Culver cafeteria has a seating capacity of 90 pupils. A Science room is being used to seat part of the pupils at lunchtime.

To provide part of the money necessary for the additional facilities, the School Board has proposed the establishment of a Cumulative Building Fund levy. If this proposal is approved, the revenue from this source in 1964 would help pay for the cost of the needed addition to the elementary building. Issuance of school corporation bonds would provide for the remaining funds needed. It is the hope of the School Board that new facilities to handle adequately the pupils of the new corporation may be provided over a period of five or six years. This would enable the corporation to utilize bonding power and the accumulated Building Fund money to construct the facilities without resorting to the use of a holding corporation. With the 1963 legislature having provided for the distribution of state funds to help local school corporations meet cost of debt service on new buildings, the bond redemption program should be possible with moderate costs at the local level after the building needs have been furnished.

With an evaluation for tax purpose of almost fifteen million dollars and a total outstanding indebtedness on school bonds of about \$10,000, the new corporation is in a really favorable position to take care of its need for facilities without prohibitive problems. The taxable valuation per enrolled pupil is over \$12,000, one of the most favorable factors of this type among all new reorganized school corporations in the several counties of this area. Such a situation should enable the Culver Community Schools to handle the admitted needs without undue hardship.

The above program, which may present some inconvenience to the increased enrollment, will not present a crucial crowding problem, but will be a substantial saving in interest rates and increased tax levies should a different construction program be followed. The board could immediately lay plans to build a new high school, planned for future increased enrollments, which would cost up in the thousands of dollars. This would mean an abnormal tax increase to meet increased interest rates on this large a sum plus substantial funds to decrease the principal. This would very definitely obligate the taxpayer to unsurmountable debt, which could only be relieved by a heavy increased tax burden.
