CMA Summer School Enrollment Sets Record

Enrollment in the Culver Summer Schools soared to a record figure of 1,660 today with classes officially underway in the 61st annual session.

Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (Ret.), director of the schools, said enrollment tops last year's high of 1,606. A record has also been set with 249 faculty and staff members on hand to instruct and supervise students in the four schools.

The enrollment figure continues Culver's position as the largest summer program of its type in the nation. Admiral Bays said there are waiting lists for all four schools.

Highest totals in history have been set in three of the four schools. Midshipmen total 830 in the Naval School, there are 150 troopers enrolled in the Summer School of Horsemanship, and 32 boys and girls are participating in the Summer Theater, which is starting its third year.

Admiral Bays said a capacity total of 648 youngsters between the ages of 9½ through 13 have the distinction of being the first to use Culver's new \$850,000 Woodcraft Camp, completed this spring. Begun last fall, the camp is located on 250 acres at the eastern tip of the 1,500-acre campus of Culver Military Academy.

Classes in credit and non-credit work began Tuesday, July 2, and indications are that more students than ever before will complete academic work this summer for credit or review.

The official opening of the 1963 session of the Culver Summer Schools will take place Thursday, July 4, with 4:45 p.m. ceremonies on the terrace of the Riding Hall. Major General Delmar T. Spivey USAF (Ret.), superintendent of Culver Military Academy, will address students, parents, faculty and guests, as will Admiral Bays. Dean of Admissions Frank M. Bryant will call the traditional roll of states.

Swedish Exchange Boy Scout Guest Here In Culver

Under an exchange program arranged by Tri-Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, a Swedish Boy Scout is visiting Culver for most of the month of July. He is Christer Oberg from Nasby Park, a suburb of Stockholm, and he is living with the Marshall Brown family, 450 Liberty Street.

Christer, who is a 17-year-old Sea Scout, arrived in Culver Saturday, June 29. He will remain here for two weeks, then go to Camp Tamarack, the Council Scout Camp, and finally return to Culver for his last week in this country. During his visit he hopes to become acquainted with the American way of life and the American Boy Scout program. In addition to learning about various facets of life in Culver, he will participate in several tours to be organized by the Council.

A total of five Swedish boys came to America under the exchange program. Three are staying in South Bend, and one is in Plymouth. On July 16 three American Scouts will go to Sweden to complete the exchange.

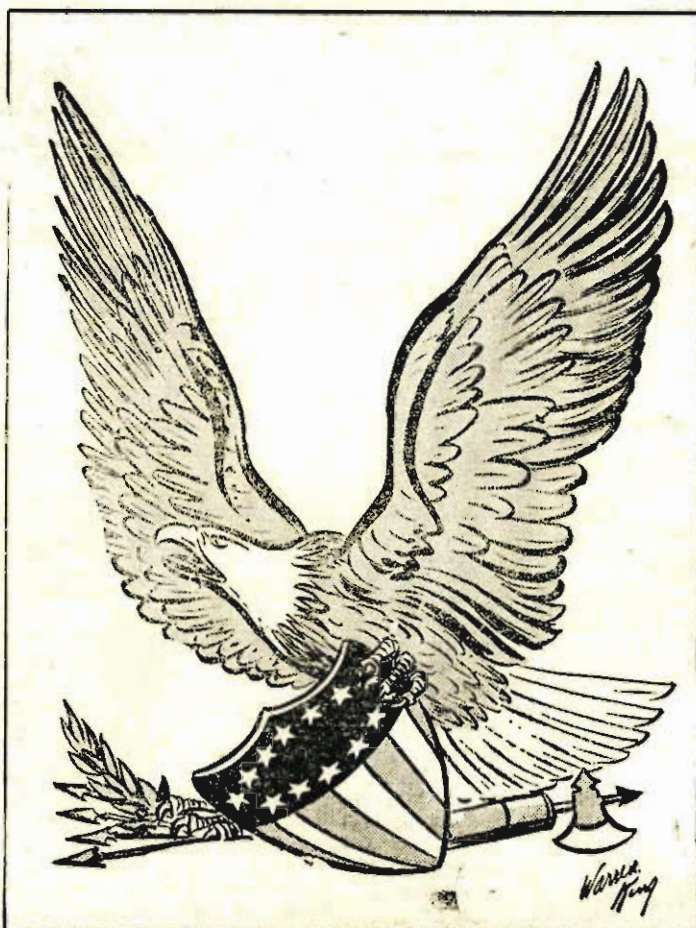

CMA Fireworks Display 9:15 P.M. On Thursday

State Exchange Banks Continue Amazing Growth

Remodeling Nearly Finished At Argos

Mr. W. O. Osborn, President of The State Exchange Bank, of Culver, and Argos, and Farmers State Bank, of LaPaz, Ind., reports that the statement of both banks as of June 29, 1963, shows an increase over the corresponding period a year ago to be \$626,416.36.

Boy Scouts Return Seven Hurt In After Two-Week Explosion At Canadian Trip Highways 14 & 17

At seven o'clock on Saturday morning, June 15, eight eager Boy Scouts of Culver's Troop 290, and three adult leaders, departed for Quetico Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada. They returned Friday, June 28.

During those two weeks an exciting and memorable experience was shared by all. (Quetico Provincial Park contains 4,000 square miles of wilderness canoe country in which no airplane, except Canadian government planes, may fly lower than 4,000 feet).

The automobile portion of the expedition involved a 1,500-mile round-trip with coming and going overnight stops at state parks in Wisconsin. The group embarked by canoes for their Canadian point of destination from Moose Lake, Minn., which is 22 miles northeast of Ely, Minn.

They paddled approximately 100 miles, round trip, from the Moose Lake landing to their campsite on Lake Kawnpipi, Ontario Province, Canada. One group traveled farther north for a day's fishing in McKenzie Lake.

Four canoes and 12 packs were taken on the trip. The canoes weighed from 65 to 85 pounds and the packs weighed from 40 to 80 pounds. Only the barest essentials were allowed.

To reach the campsite, nine lakes, one of which was over 14 miles in length, and two "pot holes" were navigated. The campers trudged over eight rocky, hilly, and muddy portages of over two miles in total length. This was the real endurance test of the entire trip.

The group enjoyed good fishing with many Walleye and Northern Pike being hooked. The largest Walleye landed weighed about six pounds and the largest Northern caught was 37 inches long and weighed approximately 15 pounds. One Scout actually caught two fish on one plug. He hooked onto a Walleye and then a large Northern grabbed the smaller fish and both were landed. The weather was accommodating, with only one rainy day in which the group learned the art of cooking in a downpour. The temperature was very comfortable.

The group encountered many deer and had various escapades with two bears. Many different species of birds were also seen and observed, including the symbolic bald eagle.

Many lessons were learned, from the best way to fish to the right kind of wood to burn for cooking. It truly will be a trip long remembered by the entire group.

Those attending were Scouts Steve and Tom Bocock, Greg Dawson, Dave and Steve Kelly, Fletcher Mattox, Terry Powers, and Dean Smith. Adults making the trip were Harold Fitterling, who led the group, Frank Sperry,

Carl F. Foust, Scoutmaster of local Troop.

Seven persons were injured, three seriously, Monday, when gasoline fumes exploded in the combination service station, grocery and home, of Mr. and Mrs. Murle May, located at the junction of State Highways 14 and 17, about 8 miles south of Culver. The explosion wrecked the establishment.

Murle May, 31, said he was hurled 39 feet through the wall of the frame building. The family was eating dinner at the time. It is thought fumes leaked from an underground gasoline storage tank into the basement of the building and were ignited by a butane water heater.

Murle and his two-year old daughter, Vicki, were burned over 50% of their bodies and were hospitalized in Indianapolis. Thomas Messer, 37, of Delong, was also burned seriously. He was hospitalized at Woodlawn Hospital. Both Mr. May and daughter Vicki are considered critical.

Other members of the family, who suffered burns are Miss Murlin May, 14; Kathy May, 13; Curtis May, 14 months; and May's wife, Mrs. Alice May. All were treated at Woodlawn Hospital and then released.

Culver Military Academy will again cooperate with the Indiana State University Division of Extended Services this fall when a graduate course will be offered on the Culver campus.

"Education 542: Programmed Instruction: Principles and Practices" will be offered during the first semester starting Tuesday, Sept. 10, 1963 at 6 p.m. and continuing each Tuesday thereafter. 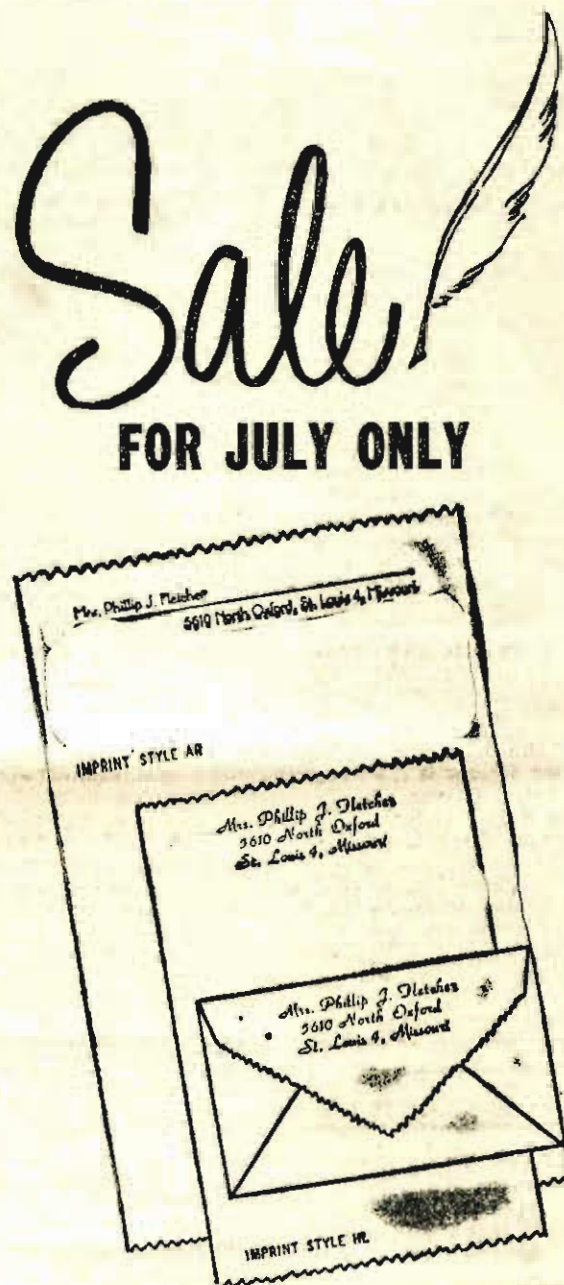
Two Accidents Investigated By Chief Mikesell

Dr. Otis Bowen Named Chairman Of Committee

Pursuant to a resolution passed in 1963 General Assembly, the Legislative Advisory Commission headed by Lt. Governor Ristine and Speaker of the House, Richard Guthrie, has appointed a special committee to make a study and evaluation of the Aid to Dependent Children program of the state and to report the results and recommendations to the next General Assembly.

The Legislative Advisory Commission appointed the following members: State Senator, Allen Bloom, Fort Wayne; State Senator, Lee Clingan, Covington; State Rep. Anna Maloney, Gary; and Dr. Otis R. Bowen, Bremen.

The committee held its organizational meeting at the State House on Wednesday, June 26, and Dr. Bowen was elected chairman of this important study committee.

Dr. Bowen stated that the com-

mittee planned a thorough study of the state's program of Aid to Dependent Children; the committee, among other things, will study the adequacy or inadequacy of support payments, the problem of the "run-away parent" or deserter from support of his or her children, and the problem of child support or lack of child support by the parent even though he or she remains in the same locality. Investigation will try to determine if new laws are needed to help alleviate this problem or whether the present laws are adequate or just need better enforcement.

This is a matter of great importance to the tax payer who is charged for the cost of support in cases of neglect but of greater importance to the neglected children themselves.

Dr. Bowen has expressed a desire to hear from any citizen or organization who has knowledge of the problem and who has ideas as to how they should be solved.

If Duun W. Weaver had lived
until June 29th he would have
been 85 years old.

I never met him but four
times, but he was a good friend
in absence.

In the 1920's he and my father
were cutting the winter's fuel
supply and my father must have
said to him, "This is Willie's
birthday." Many of you Culver
people are aware of the fact that
Mr. Weaver never forgot a birth-
day, possibly some of you remem-
ber the time your phone rang
early in the morning reminding
you it was your birthday. Well
my phone never rang, but after
he learned the date of my birth,
it was never forgotten.

Mr. Weaver had a collection of
ancient coins, dating back to Bib-
lical times, well described with
value of each given. He knew I
taught a Bible class and he sent
the coins to me to use in a class.
I had a special gathering in my
home where these coins were
used to the profit and learning of
many.

I returned the coins to Mr.
Weaver, and I understand they

are on display in a museum in
Plymouth for the public to enjoy.

Another unusual thing he did
was to send me a minute account
of my father's funeral.

This took place in February,
1940. He named the songs that
were sung, the names of the pall-
bearers, the text Rev. F. L. Snyder
used as a basis for the ser-
mon and a description of the com-
munital service.

Who else but Mr. Weaver would
be so thoughtful and helpful in
time of sorrow?

On the one hundredth anniver-
sary of my father's birth, Nov.
28, 1954, he took a bouquet of
flowers and placed it on his grave
in the Voreis cemetery at Burr
Oak.

A picture was taken on his
22nd birthday, also one on his
82nd birthday.

Yes, I miss you, Mr. Weaver.

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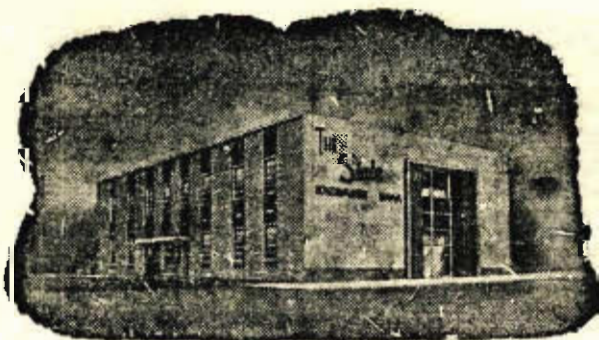

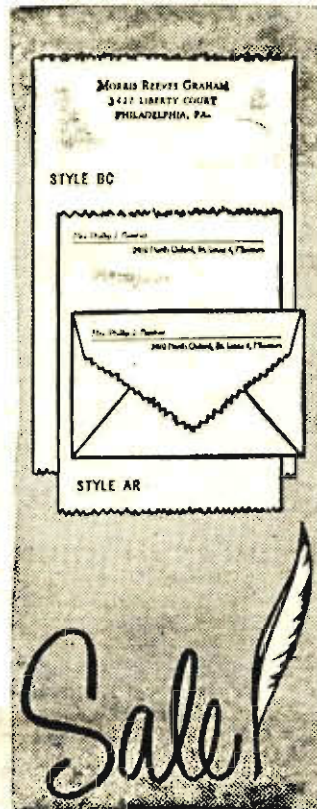

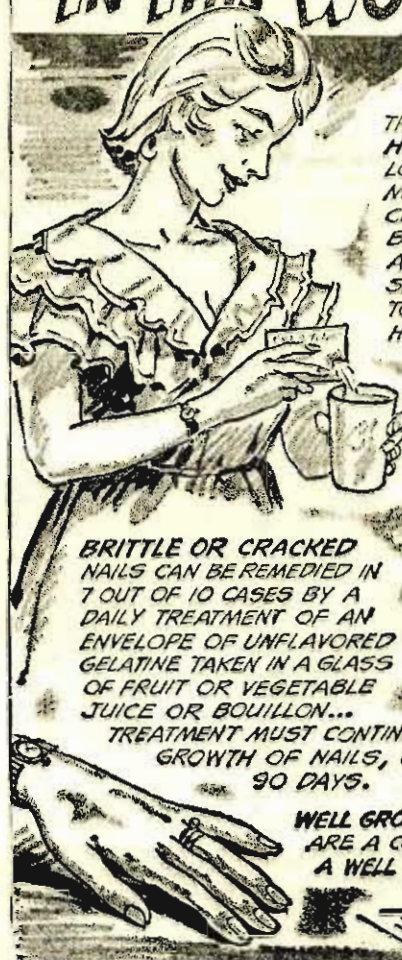
