



## "Spoon River Anthology" At Eppley Saturday

Students of the Theater Workshop of the Culver Summer Schools will present selections from Edgar Lee Masters' "Spoon River Anthology" in a 2 p.m. concert reading Saturday, Aug. 17, in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium.

The production is the third to be given by the Theater Workshop group and is open to the general public with no admission charge.

"Spoon River Anthology" is a collection of 250 epitaphs and is given in concert reading as if the dead were speaking. For Saturday's production, Director of Theater William J. Martin has selected 54 of the epitaphs that are tied together by a narration written by Harvey Firari and given by Arthur Hughes. Firari and Hughes are both faculty members at Culver Military Academy.

Forty-two students of the Theater Workshop will participate in the production. The concert reading will be augmented by special lighting and two new Linnebach projectors constructed recently by advanced technical students under the direction of David Pauker.

ten child will have either morning or afternoon kindergarten but for one semester. There will be four different groups of kindergarten children — first semester morning and afternoon and second semester morning and afternoon. The older kindergarteners will attend the first semester sessions while the younger kindergarteners will attend the second semester sessions.

KINDERGARTEN WILL NOT START ON THE FIRST DAY FOR ALL OTHER SCHOOL CHILDREN, BUT WILL START INSTEAD ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 1963.

Book rentals will be payable in the high school office from 8 a.m. through 4 p.m. Monday, Aug. 26, through Friday, Aug. 30. This will include book rentals for grades one through 12. ALL

BOOK RENTALS SHOULD BE PAID AT THIS TIME.

The hot lunch program will be exactly the same as the previous school years: 25¢ for the first four grades and 30¢ for grades 5 through 12. The class "A" milk program will be continued for another year — grade school students can buy a grade A whole milk for 3¢ per ½ pint carton morning and afternoon.

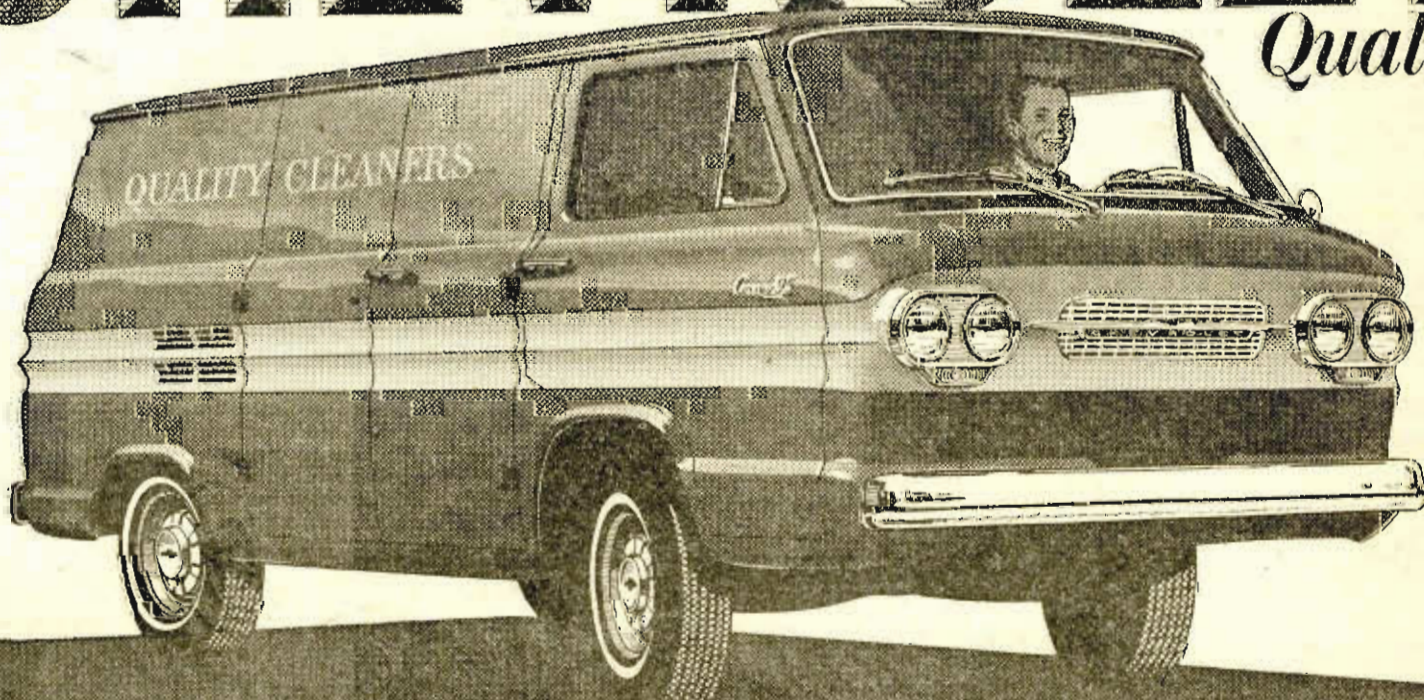

Next Monday all Scouts will meet at the Church at 6:45 p.m. to go swimming at the Woodcraft beach. Come and join the fun!

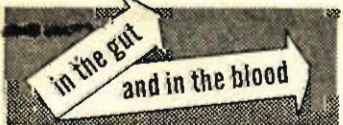
