Summer Schools **Of Academy Will** Graduate 296

Commencement August 21 and 22

Culver Summer Schools will graduate its largest class in 61 years Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 21-22, during commencement ceremonies bringing to an end the 1963 session.

Graduates of the three schools will total 296, which eclipses last year's record class of 281. The Naval School will give diplomas to 152 graduates, the Depart-ment of Horsemanship will honor 30 graduates, and the Wood-craft Camp will graduate 114.

Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (Ret.), director of the Summer Schools, will award diplomas to the Naval and Horsemanship schools at 8 a.m. ceremonies Thursday, while Woodcrafters will receive their diplomas a day earlier at 9:45 a.m. Wednesday As part of the Summer Schools' commencement, a s ix-day pro-gram beginning Saturday, Aug. 17, has been arranged for the many parents and guests who will be on campus at Culver Military Academy.

Highlights of the six-day program are: water ski exhibition at 12:45 p.m. and a garrison parade at 7 p.m. Sunday; final Wood-craft Camp Council Fire at 8 p.m. and theater production of "Toad of Toad Hall" at \$:30 p.m. in Eppley Auditorium on Monday; a meeting of all Culver fathers and mothers at 2:30 p.m., the final garrison parade at 4:15 p.m., and the final band concert at 8:30 p.m., Tuesday; athletic and military exhibitions beginning at 2 p.m., the commence-ment ball with Russ Carlyle and his orchestra from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., Wednesday, and final com-mencement ceromonies Thursday

completed their first major community project - the building of a new beach area on the shore line of the Culver Town Park. The new area begins at the west edge of the present beach and extends several feet to the west. Cooperating with the Jaycees on the project was Ray Houghton.

The new section of beach covers an area of 3.200 square feet. Approximately 125 yards of grav-el and sand were used to build the new section. In preparing the area, it was graded from the sidewalk to the lake shore into a gentle slope, removing all large rocks. The sand and gravel was then spread, making a fine beach. An eight inch cement curb was poured along the sidewalk edge to protect the soil under the walk and to keep it from washing. The curb extends two feet into the ground. The entire swimming area was then roped off. Culver Public Schools Set For Opening Day Students Report Tuesday, Sept. 3

The Culver Public Schools (grades one through 12) will open the day after Labor Day, Sept. 3, 1963. The teachers will organizational meetings have from S:30 a.m. until noon on the first day and school buses will pick up students in time to have them deposited at the Culver School by 1:00 p.m. Country and town students alike will be kept on the school premises for about one hour and fifteen minutes the first day.

However, the following day, Wednesday, Sept. 4, all students in grades one through 12 will have a full school duy. Kinderarten is the exception to the above for those students in kin-dergarten will not meet until Thursday, Sept. 5.

The length of the school day and the hours will be the same as for the past school year. Students in grades 7 through 12 will be tardy after 8:10 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3:54 p.m.

Lunch period for the top six grades will be from 11:59 a.m. until 12:35 p.m.

Many school buses will run on nearly the same schedule as they did last year: however, since some routes will be changed, par-ents should have youngsters ready carlier than thought necessary on the first day and have some counsel with the hus driver about the morning and even-
