## Culver Public Schools Begin 1963-64 Session

### Book Store Open August 26-30

Grades one through 12 of the Culver Public Schools will open the day after Labor Day on Tuesday, Sept. 3, for the beginning of the 1963-64 school year. School buses will pick up students in time to have them deposited at the school by 1 p.m. Country and town students alike will be kept on the school premises for about one hour and 15 minutes the first day.

However, the following day, Wednesday, Sept. 4, all students in grades one through 12 will have a full school day. Kindergarten is the exception to the above for those students in kindergarten will not meet until Thursday, Sept. 5.

The length of the school day and the hours will be the same as for the past school year. Students in grades 7 through 12 will be tardy after 8:10 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3:54 p.m.

Lunch period for the top six grades will be from 11:59 a.m. until 12:35 p.m.

Parents having students in grades one through 12 who have not previously attended Culver Public Schools should bring their child to school and register same on or before Wednesday, Aug. 28. All new enrollees should first report to the high school office on the second floor of the south end of the older building.

Children entering first grade must be six years of age by the last day of September, 1963, and this must be proven by the child's birth certificate. If your child attended the Culver Kindergarten last year, you need not furnish proof of age for entering him into the first grade.

All parents who have not enrolled their kindergarten-age child should do so any time now and certainly not later than Wednesday, Aug. 28. Those students who will be entering kindergarten in the Culver Public Schools must be five years of age by Aug. 31, 1963, and this age must be proven by presentation of a birth certificate.

Book rentals will be payable in the high school office from 8 a.m. through 4 p.m. Monday, Aug. 26, through Friday, Aug. 30. This will include book rentals for grades one through 12.

The hot lunch program will be exactly the same as the previous school years: 25 cents for the first four grades and 30 cents for grades 5 through 12. The class "A" milk program will be continued for another year — grade school students can buy grade "A" whole milk for 3 cents per half-pint carton, morning and afternoon.

## Culver Firemen Answer Three Fire Alarms

The Culver Fire Department was called to the home of Harold McMillan, 1054 East Shore Drive, last Wednesday, August 14, as the result of a furnace explosion. Damage to the furnace and smoke damage to the home was estimated at \$300. The fire department was called about 8:35 p.m.

The explosion resulted when Mr. McMillan turned on the oil furnace. Cause of the explosion is not known. Damage was covered by insurance.

A shed on the Dick Newman farm, south west of Culver, was destroyed by fire Monday afternoon. The Culver Fire Department received the call at about 2:00 p.m. but was unable to save the building due to the head start of the flames. The roof and most of the walls were burned. Firemen were able to save the connecting milk pens.

The building caught fire as a farm hand was attempting to burn out a hornets nest inside the building.

Culver Firemen were called to Commerce Corner on State Road 17 Tuesday evening as the result of a burning auto. Mrs. Berta Minix was driving to the laundry in Culver when her car caught fire. About \$350 in damage was done to the car. Cause of the fire is unknown.

## Swimmer Injured By Speed Boat Propeller

Ronald Woodson, 14, of 245 West 91st St., Chicago, escaped serious injury last Sunday afternoon about 1:25 p.m. when he was run over by the propeller of his uncle's speed boat. He was treated at the Culver Clinic for minor cuts which had been inflicted just below the shoulder blades.

The accident happened when Ronald attempted to leave the Beach Lodge swimming area to climb aboard the speed boat, which was just outside the roped off area. The boat was being operated by Charles Woodson, of 35 South Central Park, an uncle of the lad. The lad's sister, Carroll, who was in the speed boat, attempted to help Ronald in the boat by grabbing his hand. The youths lost their grip and Ronald sank under the water and under the boat, coming in contact with the propeller.

Two little youngsters, aged 10, and members of the Woodson party, were standing on the pier watching. Seeing the accident happen, they grew excited and jumped in to save Ronald, although neither one could swim. Rick Ervin, Beach Lodge life guard, rescued the two boys, one of which required artificial respiration to revive him.

Shore Patrolman James Cox and Chief of Police Don Mikesell investigated the accident.

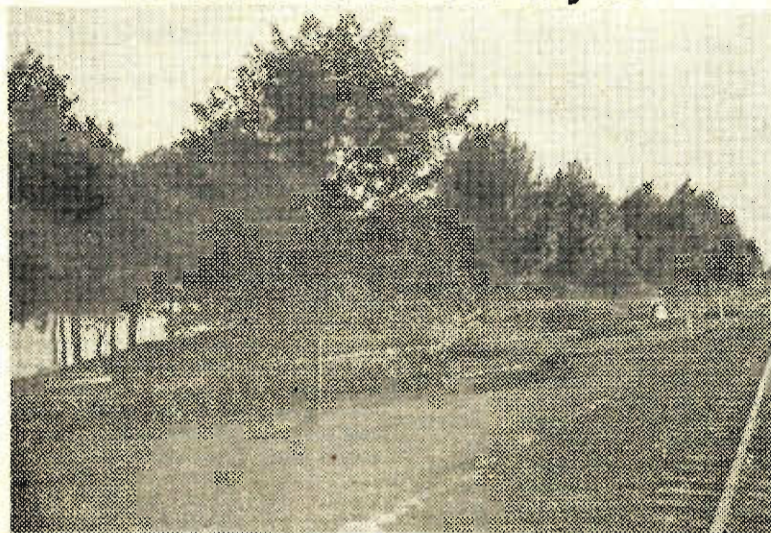
## RECEIVE HONORABLE MENTION AT SUMMER THEATER WORKSHOP

Pictured above is a view of beautiful Vandalia Park, now our Town Park, of more than half a century ago. The grassy slopes were broken by colorful flower beds and gravel walks bordered by white-washed stones.

The children are expected to arrive home on Saturday, Aug. 24.

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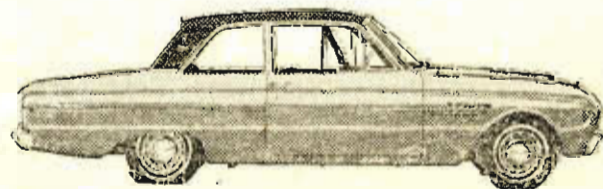

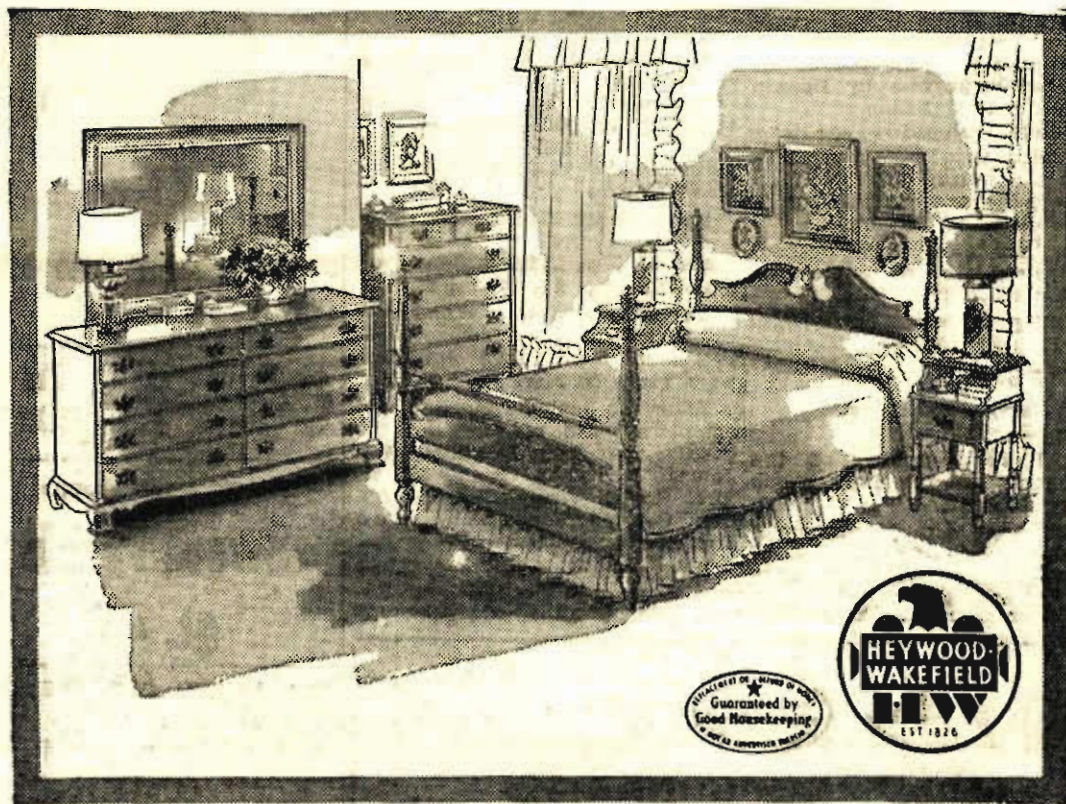

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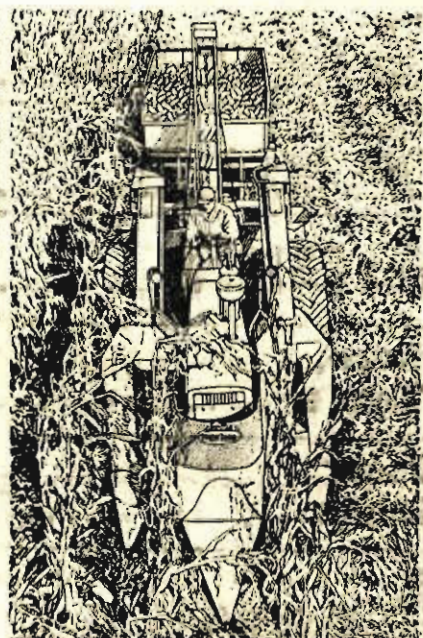

Farmers in Marshall County were reminded that community elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committeemen will soon be taking place.

Carl W. The chairman, vice chairman, and regular member of the elected ASC committee will also serve respectively as delegate, alternate delegate, and second alternate delegate to the county convention to be held soon thereafter, where the ASC county committee will be chosen.

### QUESTIONNAIRE TO BE SENT TO VETERAN'S PARENTS

Dependent parents of 4,819 deceased Indiana veterans receiving service-connected death compensation payments from the Veterans Administration will receive a special dependency questionnaire with their monthly checks on or about August 31, 1963. A. J. Boehicchio, Indianapolis Regional Office Manager of the VA, has announced.

At the same time, 209 veterans who are receiving additional service-connected disability compensation because of a dependent parent or parents will also receive the dependency questionnaire.

At the time parents were placed on the compensation rolls, they were definitely determined to be dependent. The purpose of the questionnaire is to establish the fact that they have continued to be dependent and are still eligible for payment.

Recipients of the questionnaire are expected to return them before October 31, 1963. The VA advises recipients that all questionnaires must be returned by the deadline date.

Since the questionnaire cards will be handled by machinery, recipients are requested not to fold, cut, mutilate or trim them in any manner, Mr. Boehicchio added.

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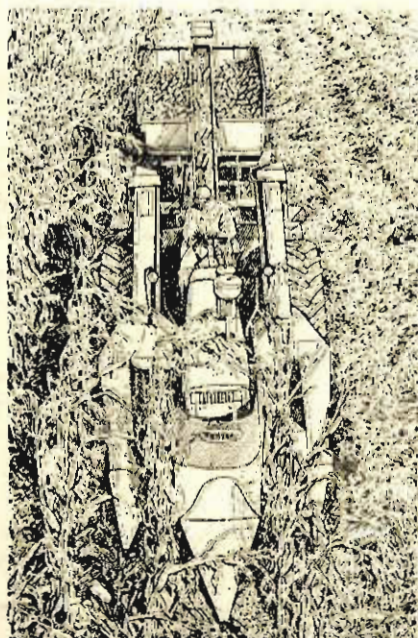

## Do You Remember 'Way Back When?'

Highlights of Culver News of 10, 20, 30, 40, and 50 Years Ago This Week

AUGUST 19, 1953 —

Robert Rust has been appointed to head the Public Relations staff of the Culver Military Academy it was announced this week.

Following the death of Brigadier General L. R. Gignilliat last Oct. 20, alumni of the Culver Military Academy from all over the United States and abroad have been sending in contribu-

tions for the establishment of a "fitting memorial" to the beloved and colorful former superintendent of the famed educational institution.

An explosion of undetermined origin early Tuesday morning, preceded by a volley of rocks that crashed through four windows of the telephone exchange at 230 Lakeview St., marked the first local violence attributed to the telephone strike.

Miss Edna Mae Von Ehr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Von Ehr., Culver, became the bride of Lyman D. Craft, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Craft, also of Culver, in a Saturday evening ceremony at Grace Church.

The 52nd session of the Culver Summer Schools will close Saturday, Aug. 22, with the graduation of 290 students from all schools.

AUGUST 25, 1943 —

John J. Burns, age 50, member of the quintet that held up the State Exchange Bank here Dec. 29, 1920, was released from the state prison at Michigan City, where he had been serving a life sentence for first degree murder in connection with the bank robbery.

The surprise blackout of 12 counties in the South Bend area, promised for some time, arrived on Monday night and was handled locally with the minimum of confusion.

Mrs. Mary Ann Altman, age 62, widow of Virgil Altman, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Bonita Eads, near Urbana, Ind., after an illness of several weeks.

The 1943-44 term of school will be inaugurated with organization day Sept. 3, while regular classes will start on Sept. 7, according to Principal Floyd M. Annis.

Marshall County farmers will figure out their own Third War Loan quotas at the rate of \$6.17 per acre of crops and will be asked to invest at least 70 per cent of this annual personal and family goal during the September drive.

The 4-H enrollment for the Culver school area is very small this year in the agricultural projects. However, this small enrollment does potentially constitute a sizeable contribution to the war effort. Eight members are feeding 10 beef steers, which should provide immediately about 7,500 pounds of choice dressed beef.

AUGUST 23, 1933 —

Peter Spangler, age 90, a Civil War veteran, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Laura Babcock, in Rochester.

A crowd of about 1,000 filled Vandalia Park to hear the program of the Pure Milk Association at the joint picnic of the Teegarden, Bremen, Plymouth, and Monterey locals.

Jesse "Doc" Robinson won the flyweight championship in the World's Fair tournament at Chicago.

Among the local boys who received prizes at the 4-H Club contests in Plymouth were Forrest Curtis, Eldon Curtis, Robert Osborn, Richard Behmer, Donald White, and Donald Davis.

In a beautiful and impressive ceremony Miss Helen Hanke of Chicago became the bride of Scott Hopper of Chicago, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Hopper of this city.

AUGUST 22, 1923 —

Announcement has been made that E. P. Courtney has sold his interest in the Culver City Bakery to H. E. Sanders. The formal change of ownership will be made Sept. 1.

I. A. Johnson's Oldsmobile was stolen from his cottage near the Palmer House.

Six business houses of the community were entered and the cash drawers pilfered. It is believed that the burglars were not grown men, but boys.

The sign post which was located in the middle of the main square of the city was removed because of orders of the directors of the State Highway Commission.

Colonel and Mrs. Greiner returned from Puerto Rico where Colonel Greiner was attending

the 25th reunion of the old Fourth Ohio Regiment which served in Puerto Rico during the Spanish-American War.

AUGUST 28, 1913 —

At a special meeting of the Culver City Club last week an order was given to A. M. Roberts for a drinking fountain to be presented to the town by the club. The fountain is listed at \$165 and is of cast iron of ornamental design, five feet high, 22 inches square with reservoirs for humans, horses, and dogs, and will be located at the direction of the Town Board and the Water Co. — possibly where the town pump now stands.

The fire boys did another good piece of work when they saved W. S. Easterday's house from destruction Monday forenoon.

Mrs. C. L. Allerding received word last week that William Lewis, formerly of Maxinkuckee, died Aug. 15 at Montreal, Canada, at the age of 73 years.

Since Spring coal prices have steadily advanced, hard chestnut coal is now selling for \$8.25 per ton, the highest it has ever been. It is believed the prices will soar even above \$9 before the winter is over.

Mr. and Mrs. John Henderson have returned from their Western visit and they say that the hot winds have destroyed all vegetation.

T. E. Slattery, who owns 156 feet of frontage opposite the depot, was recently offered \$65 per front foot — \$10,140 — in trade by a Chicago party who desired to put up a store building. He paid \$3,000 for the land 10 years ago.

The room formerly occupied by The Citizen is being prepared for the use of the primary department of the public school which has been crowded out of the large building.

B. A. Curtis is putting up a house on his farm near the Washington Church that will cost around \$4,000. It will be plumbed for a water service, lighted by acetylen gas and heated by a furnace.
