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



J. Bochicchio, Indianapolis Regional Office Manager of the VA, has announced. At the same time, 209 veterans

wha are receiving additional service-connected disability compensation because of a dependent parent or parents will also re-ceive the dependency question-

At the time parents were placed on the compensation rolls, they were definitely determined to be dependent. The purpose of the questionnaire is to establish the fact that they have continued be dependent and are still eligible for payment.

Recipients of the questionnaire are expected to return them befor October 21, 1963. The VA advises recipents that all questionnaires must be returned by the deadline date.
