### School Board Asks For Appointment Method Change

The Board of School Trustees in its meeting of Monday evening reviewed the proposed plan for the appointment and qualifications of School Board members as these provisions are set forth in the comprehensive plan of the Marshall County School Reorganization Committee. The public hearing on this plan is scheduled to be held at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 18, at the Plymouth High School cafeteria.

During the School Board's discussion of the proposals included in the new plan developed by the Marshall County Committee, Vernie Bowen, Robert Reichard, and Paul Davidson of Aubbeenaubee Township reviewed certain desirable changes which might be discussed with the Marshall County Committee. Since the proposed plan would result in the appointment of an almost completely new School Board to take office on July 1, 1964, it was the recommendation of the Aubbeenaubee group that the plan be written in such a way as to make it possible for the two present members who are not elected township officials to be re-appointed if the appointing boards would so desire. As the plan is written, the only member who could possibly be re-appointed would be Judd Stinecomb, representing the Town of Culver. The details regarding qualifications now provided in the County Committee's plan would make Cedric White ineligible for membership after June 30, 1964.

The Aubbeenaubee Township patrons called attention to the fact that Mr. White now holds the Board membership which will alternate between North Bend Township and Aubbeenaubee Township. The plan under which the Culver Community School Corporation came into being provided that North Bend have this alternate member until June 30, 1965, and Mr. White was appointed on this basis. However, under the new Marshall County plan, this alternating member would shift to Aubbeenaubee Township on July 1, 1964, for a one-year term. The three-member group from Aubbeenaubee Township suggested that this one-year appointment be made from North Bend Township. This would be in conformity with the present plan and would make it possible for Mr. White to remain on the School Board until June 30, 1965, as his present term provides. At the completion of his term, the alternating member then would be appointed from Aubbeenaubee Township.

In the course of the discussion, it was agreed also that the three township trustees now serving on the School Board should be permitted to complete their terms on the School Board. This would lead to a gradual change of membership on the board. The Marshall County plan, in accord with state regulations, makes elected public officials ineligible for School Board membership. At present Trustee Eldon Davis of Aubbeenaubee Township, Trustee Donald Taylor of North Bend, and Trustee Glenn Overmyer of Union are serving as members of the School Board. Mr. Overmyer's term would end on June 30, 1965; Mr. Taylor's term would terminate on June 30, 1966; and Mr. Davis' on June 30, 1964.

Following the discussion by the group, it was agreed that either

Superintendent Frank McLane reported that Dr. A. T. Lindley of Purdue University had spent last Wednesday in the school corporation in connection with the school survey and would return on Tuesday afternoon to talk with members of the School Board. It is the desire of school officials and of Dr. Lindley that the survey may progress rapidly enough to enable the School Board to decide in the near future on the plan of operating the Aubbeenaubee and Culver Schools after unification of the two high schools for the 1964-1965 school term.

### \$100,000 Fire Destroys Barn On Witham Farm

#### 75 Head Of Cattle Killed In Blaze

A \$100,000 fire destroyed a large barn on the Lewis Witham farm southeast of Culver Friday and killed 75 head of cattle trapped in the burning structure.

Culver Fire Chief David Burns said the fire started about 8:55 p.m. and the flames consumed 200 tons of hay and 75 head of dairy cattle. Five cows escaped the burning structure.

Chief Burns said the barn was 60 feet by 100 feet in size and that a considerable amount of farm machinery was lost in the blaze.

The farm is occupied by the Robert Palmer family and located three miles south of Culver on South Sycamore Road.

Mrs. Palmer reported that the family was sitting in the living room when she saw a flash through the window and the barn burst into flames.

Palmer stated that he had been in a workshop near the barn only minutes before and there was no sign of any blaze at that time.

During the height of the blaze a doctor was called when Palmer collapsed from the excitement.

The blaze that could be seen for several miles around attracted the attention of motorists returning home from area basketball games, hampering firemen as they attempted to get their fire fighting equipment to the burning structure. In some places firemen had to push parked cars into the ditch along the driveway leading to the farm in order to get through.

Firemen from Culver, Monterey, and Aubbeenaubee Township fought the blaze for several hours and sprayed nearby buildings to keep the blaze from spreading.

They were hampered in fighting the blaze in near zero temperatures when the ground around the building became ice covered by the wind-whipped water spray and hoses froze shut.

Witham, owner of the farm, is the principal of a Hammond High School.

The loss was covered by insurance, according to Palmer.

Fire Chief Burns said the cause of the blaze is undetermined.

Mrs. Lydia A. Myers, 85, of Walkerton, formerly of Culver and Letters Ford, died Thursday evening at the Community Hospital in LaPorte following an illness of two years.

Mrs. Myers was born Oct. 22, 1878, at Bruce Lake Station and lived in the Culver and Letters Ford community until three years ago when she entered the Walkerton Nursing Home where she has since resided.

Mrs. Myers was a member of the Culver Evangelical United Brethren Church and a member of the Culver Rebekah Lodge.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Mary Low Niles, Mich., and Mrs. Florence Markle, North Liberty; two sons, Boyd Myers, Northfield, Minn., and Lloyd Myers, Niles, Mich.; three brothers, John and Russell McKee, Osyka, Miss., and Lester McKee, Brook, Ind.; and several grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 15, at the Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home with Rev. Walter Chisholm, pastor of the Culver E.U.B. Church, officiating. Burial was made in the I.O.O.F. Cemetery at Letters Ford.

### Edwin C. Myers, Noted Woodcraft Instructor, Dies

Major Edwin C. Myers, the man whose love of Indian lore made the Woodcraft Council Fires a favorite past-time for Culver Summer Schools' visitors for more than a quarter century, is dead.

Chief Myers, as he was known to thousands of young boys during his 30 years as a member of the Woodcraft Camp faculty, died of a heart attack last Thursday, Dec. 12, in Webster Groves, Mo. Funeral services were held in Webster Groves and burial was at New Boston, Ill.

For years Major Myers used as a basis for the Saturday evening council fires the knowledge he had gained by visiting Indian reservations in the West. The nickname "chief" came from the Black Foot tribe during one of his visits.

Probably Major Myers' greatest triumph came two years ago when he directed the pageant marking the 50th anniversary of the Woodcraft Camp. The pageant was staged at night on the Academy's football field and traced the early beginnings of the Indian tribes in this area as well as the founding of the school. Several thousand people attended.

Major Myers' interest in Indian lore developed through his association with the Scout circus. He also played percussion instruments with several circus bands, including Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey. A graduate of Kirksville (Mo.) Teachers College, he had a master's degree in fine arts from the University of Missouri. He had taught at Webster Groves High School since 1932.

Major Myers is survived by his widow and a son Edward, who is an airline pilot in the Air Force. A nephew, Richard Swenson, was graduated from the Academy last June.

Richards, CAP, Commander of the Indiana Wing, during an address before the general assembly of the Indiana Wing Civil Air Patrol conference, announced that the Seymour Aviation Commission has approved the use of Freeman Municipal Airport, Seymour, for "OPERATION SARTRAIN '64," Civil Air Patrol's first search and rescue training encampment.

Freeman Municipal Airport, managed by Glenn Manion, is located south-west of Seymour, Ind. It was once an Army-Air Corps instrument training field and was the site of Indiana Wing Civil Air Patrol's first summer bivouacs during World War II.

The Indiana National Guard and the Department of Public Instruction are two of the many organizations supporting "OPERATION SARTRAIN '64."

The three-hundred senior and cadet Civil Air Patrol members who will be participating in the encampment belong to units of the Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, and Florida Air Patrol Wings.

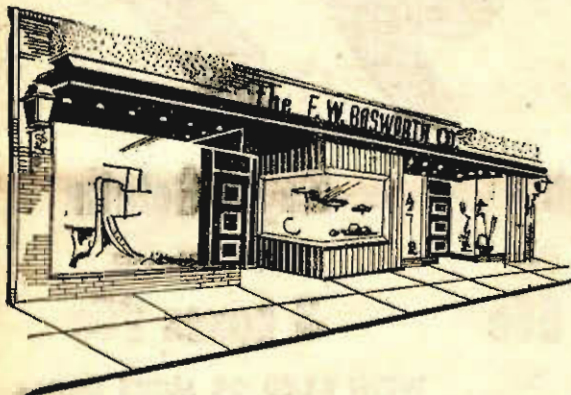

Sports events last week left the basketball team with a 2-4 record, the swimming team at 3-1 and the wrestling squad unbeaten in four matches.

Struggling hardest to get its season rolling on a winning basis is the Academy basketball team, which literally blew two games last weekend. In games against South Caston and Cranbrook School of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., the Eagles led at the half only to have last-quarter surges upend them. South Caston pulled out a 61-53 verdict when the Cadets made only four of 18 shots in the last period. The Academy team also made only seven of 19 foul attempts.

Against Cranbrook, a team with a 6-0 record, the Eagles led by 16 at the half and gradually fell apart to lose 67-64. Three injuries haven't helped Chet Marshall's coaching problems either. The team is to be joined next month by Butch Pretorius, a leading scorer last year, who is still recovering from football injuries. A Culver resident is one of two Culver Military Academy students nominated for four-year Morehead Scholarships to the University of North Carolina.

The Culver student is William M. Gleason, son of Lt. Col. and Mrs. Ronald Gleason, North Terrace, who was named along with Thomas E. Carpenter, Waynesville, Ohio, during special academic ceremonies at the Academy last Thursday.

Morehead Scholarships are worth \$6,800 to non-North Carolina residents for the four years of study during which the John Motley Morehead Foundation

pays all expenses plus spending money. The scholarships are given on the basis of outstanding merit reflected in academic ability and attainment, character, leadership, ambition, and unselfish service and physical vigor. No consideration is given of need.

Gleason and Carpenter bring to four the number of Culver students nominated under the Morehead program. Last year Culver's Michael J. Crosswell and Charles Crawford were among 53 boys to receive Morehead Scholarships. Although 418 Morehead Scholars have attended the University of North Carolina since 1951, Culver did not participate until last year when it became one of only a few Midwest schools invited to nominate outstanding candidates for the scholarships.

Gleason has attended the Academy for five years and has been honored in the past for academic achievement through the awarding of six Gold or Silver A's. He is a cadet captain and commanding officer of Battery B, one of the highest positions in the cadet military organization. He is a member of the Four Gun Drill, honor organization of the artillery, and a member of the Honor Council.

Col. Gleason is a counselor and a member of the English department at the Academy.

**SOCIAL SECURITY AFFECTS NINE OUT OF TEN PERSONS**

"After more than a quarter century of social security, many people still think of it as something strictly for the older person and it is this incorrect picture of social security that we try to dispel through every means that we can," Mr. Cornelius R. Schafer, social security district manager, said today.

Mr. Schafer brought out that the social security program protects persons of all ages — not only the 62 or 65 year-olds. In addition to the regular retirement benefits for elderly people, disability payments may also be made to a totally and permanently disabled worker who is under 65.

Benefits to widows, surviving children under 18 years of age,

and disabled children past 18 years of age are also an important part of "social security". Other people who can get benefits if they were dependent on a deceased worker are dependent husbands, and in certain situations, divorced wives.

"Social security is no longer protection for the older person alone," Mr. Schafer said. "It is a lifetime protection for nine out of ten working Americans."

But benefits cannot be paid unless an application is made; a person who is nearing retirement should inquire at the social security office about benefits, as should survivors of a deceased worker, or a worker who has become disabled.

"These three times for action," Mr. Schafer said, "are a must if a person is to be fully informed

on his social security rights and obligations. It costs nothing to ask, but it may cost a good deal — in loss of benefits — if you stay in the dark about social security."

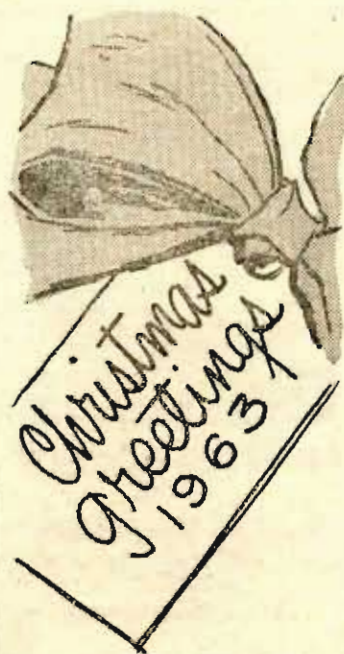

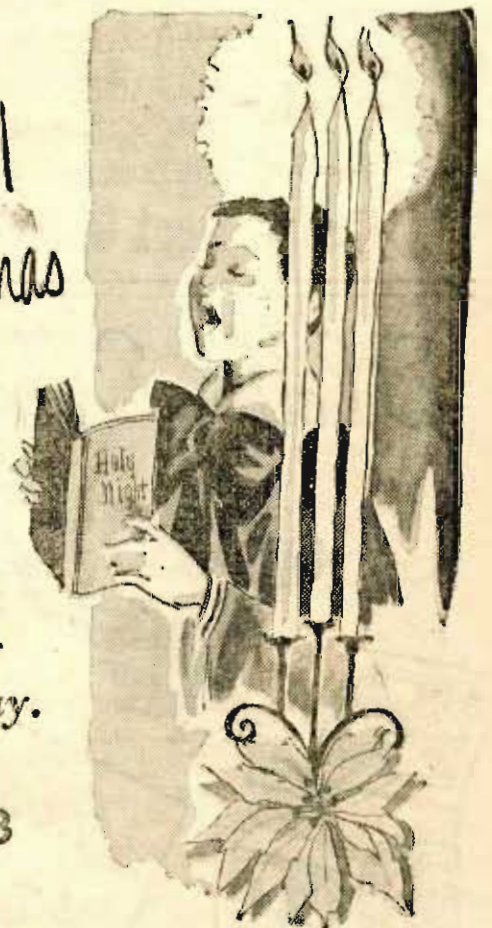

**1963 WOOL LAMB PROMOTION DEDUCTIONS SET**

Deductions from wool program incentive payments to finance the wool and lamb producers' self-help promotion program for 1963 will continue at the same level as in previous years. Carl Price, Chairman, Marshall County, Indiana, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced. The 1963 marketing year extends from April 1 through Dec. 31, 1963, in the transition to a calendar year basis decided upon last year.

Deduction rates will be 1 cent per pound from shorn wool payments, and 5 cents per hundred pounds of liveweight from unshorn lamb payments. The deductions will provide funds for advertising, promotional, and related market activities on wool

and lamb. The promotion program is implemented by agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, as authorized by the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended. The present agreement was approved in a referendum held in 1962.

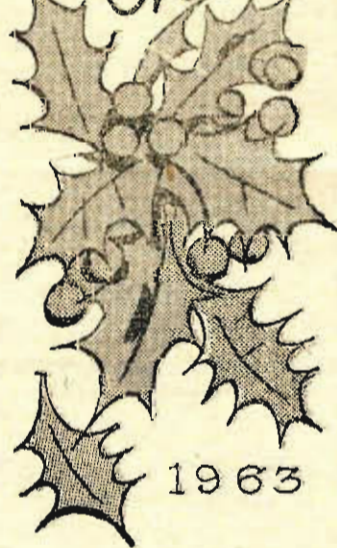

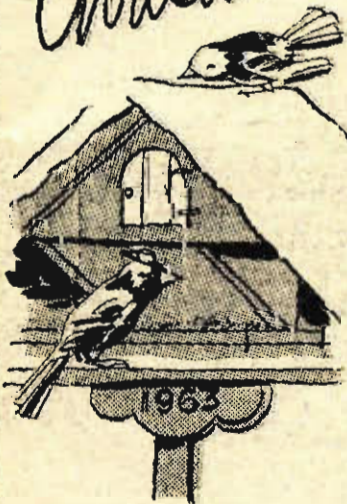

As an alumnus of the Studebaker Corporation, hourly rated employee? It is sad to see the closing of the South Bend operation. I was one of the 29,000 plus employees, during the golden era

employment years of the early 1950's.

I could never and cannot now, understand how some fellow employees could give such a poor "Studebaker image" to their neighbors.

In the first place, some men would brag how little work they actually did during the workday week and yet felt that he was being underpaid for his toil. The other points being: 1. the semi-joking, dangerous remarks of the inferior quality of the autos, which they were making for the company — then to add to the indifference; 2: they wouldn't even make an attempt to buy the car they were producing or try to encourage others to purchase their workmanship.

No matter what an individual works at, he should feel the loyalty and responsibility of buying his company product, otherwise he should look for other employment where he can have pride in his workmanship — giving a dollar's value for the honest dollar he is earning.

How can we expect our neighbors and friends to buy something that we, as workers, think is only second-best and not worthy of personal ownership?

Many of the fuzzy-headed thinkers were soon out of a job in the middle 50's, partially due to their poor attitude and lack of workmanship pride. They talked their product down enough times to eventually eliminate their own job.

A South Bend minister recently told the story of the small boy who was learning to tell time; noting the various chimes of the Grandfather clock in the hall. One night, he heard the clock strike 12 and then 13, 14, 15 — rushing into his parents' room, he shouted, "Wake up, wake up. It's later than it's ever been before!"

So it is today with the Studebaker operation in South Bend. Let us now hope and pray that the unemployed laborers find work soon and when another company buys the present factory location, that each and every worker, young and old, salaried and hourly rated, has the courage and intelligence to talk it up and buy his own product.

# Sam Lowry Paces Indians To Two More Victories

## Defeat Caston And Rochester

Culver's star senior forward, Sam Lowry, exploded for 61 points last weekend to lead the Culver Indians to two victories over Fulton County's finest, North Caston, 74-73, and Rochester, 69-61. The wins boosted Coach Gene Crosley's squad's mark to 7-2.

Lowry, a 5' 10" converted guard, put on one of the greatest displays of shooting ever seen in the local gym, hitting on 26 of 38 field goal attempts for the two nights. His 36 points against Rochester fell one point shy of the modern CHS record shared by Ed Davis and Jim Kowatch.

Sam's performance overshadowed another fine individual effort turned in by Ned Davis, who tallied 17 points in the fourth quarter Friday to spark a 27-point period for the Tribe in the tight Caston game.

The sharpshooting Comets blazed to a 22-17 first quarter lead Friday night before the home town guns began to fire. Lowry's four second quarter buckets led the Tribe to a 30-all half-time score.

Sam got 12 points in the third period, but Caston managed to hold a 48-47 lead with eight minutes to go. Then Davis took over. Scoring on strong offensive board work and his line-drive jumper, the 6'0" senior tallied eight field goals and one free throw to give Culver a lead which the visitors could not overcome, despite a late flurry of baskets.

Lowry had 25 and Davis 20 to lead the winners, while Alan Wills and Mike Smith sparked Caston with 28 and 19 points, respectively. Wills nearly kept pace with Davis' fourth quarter burst, gunning in 12 markers in a brilliant attempt to pull it out for the Comets.

Saturday night most of the Indians were off their normal shooting pace — but not Sam Lowry. Sam swished 'em in from 22 feet out, banked 'em in from the sides, and scooped 'em in under the outstretched arms of the taller Zebras. He hit on 16 of 25 field goal attempts, to add on to his brilliant 10-of-13 performance of the night before.

Culver led the entire Rochester contest after grabbing a 16-10 first quarter lead. When the half ended 50-29 in the Indians' favor, Lowry had tallied 14 points. He sparked Culver to a 50-45 lead after the third period by getting six more baskets, and his ten points in the final stanza matched the ten by Rochester's Pete Terpstra and kept the contest out of the Zebras' reach.

Davis again played well under the boards, adding eleven points for the Indians. Terpstra had 22 and Ron Simons 12 for the losers. Lowry's wild weekend increas-

ed his already excellent field goal percentage to 50%, an unheard of average for outside shooters. His scoring average also soared to 21.1 ppg., giving Culver its finest individual scoring since Kowatch, who was on hand at the game to see his record nearly eclipsed, was gunning them in for Coach "Red" Sering.

Lest our readers should get the impression that the Indians are a "one man" team, they are quickly reminded that the Tribe's field goal percentage as a team is a sparkling 41.3% after nine games, with Davis leading at 52% and Doug Lindvall also hitting half of his shots.

Coach John Bottorff's scrappy B-Team split even over the weekend, running their record to 6-3. The Papooses eased to a 66-33 win over Caston's B-Squad, led by sophomore Bruce Lindvall's 23 points, tallied in only three quarters. Setting the pace for a week-end of outstanding individual scoring performances, sophs Danny Haenes and Mike Eustis each hit five field goals in one period. Rochester's tall Colts defeated Culver, 45-37 Saturday night. Jim Lewis led the losers with ten points.

Culver travels to Walkerton next Friday night to warm up for the Argos Holiday Tourney which will be held Dec. 27-28.
