School Board Asks For Appointment Method Change


The Board of School Trustees in its meeting of Monday evening reviewed the proposed plan for the appointment and qualifications of School Board members as these provisions are set forth in the comprehensive plan of the Marshall County School Reorganization Committee. The public hearing on this plan is scheduled to be held at \$:00 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 18, at the Plymouth High School cafeteria.

During the School Board's discussion of the proposals included in the new plan developed by the Marshall County Committee. Vernie Bowen, Robert Reichard, and Paul Davidson of Aubbeenaubbee Township reviewed certain desirable changes which might be discussed with the Marshall County Committee. Since the proposed plan would result in the appointment of an almost completely new School Board to take office on July 1, 1964, it was the recommendation of the Aubbeenaubbee group that the plan be written in such a way as to make it possible for the two present members who are not elected township officials to be re-appointed if the appointing boards would so desire. As the plan is written, the only member who could possibly be re-appointed would be Judd Stinehomb, representing the Town of Culver. The details regarding qualifications now provided in the County Committee's plan would make Cedric White ineligible for membership after June 30, 1964.

The Aubbeenaubbee Township patrons called attention to the fact that Mr. White now holds the Board membership which will alternate between North Be n d Township and Aubbeenaubbee Township. The plan under which the Culver Community School Corporation came into being provided that North Bend have this alternate member until June 30, 1965, and Mr. White was appointed on this basis. However, under the new Marshall County plan, this alternating member would shift to Aubbeenaubbee Township on July 1, 1964, for a one-year term. The three-member group from Aubbeenaubbee Township suggested that this one-year appointment be made from North Bend Township. This would be in conformity with the present plan and would make it possible for Mr. White to remain on the School Board until June 30, 1965, as his present term provides. At the completton of his term, the alternating member then would be appointed from Aubbeenaubbee Township.

In the course of the discussion. it was agreed also that the three township trustees now serving on the School Board should be permitted to complete their terms on the School Board. This would lead to a gradual change of membership on the board. The Marshall County plan, in accord with state regulations, makes elected public officials ineligible for School Board membership. At present Trustee Eldon Davis Aubbeenaubbee Trustee Donald Taylor of North Bend, and Trustee Glenn Over-myer of Union are serving as members of the School Board. Mr. Overmyer's term would end on June 30, 1965; Mr. Taylor's term would terminate on June 30, 1966; and Mr. Davis' on June 30, 1964.

\$100,000 Fire Destroys Barn On Witham Farm

75 Head Of Cattle Killed In Blaze

A \$100,000 fire destroyed a large barn on the Lewis Witham farm southeast of Culver Friday and killed 75 head of cattle trapped in the burning structure.

Culver Fire Chief David Burns said the fire started about 8:55 p.m. and the flames consumed 200 tons of hay and 75 head of dairy cattle. Five cows escaped the burning structure.

Chief Burns said the barn was

Chief Burns said the barn was 60 feet by 100 feet in size and that a considerable amount of farm machinery was lost in the blaze.

The farm is occupied by the Robert Palmer family and located three miles south of Culver on South Sycamore Road

on South Sycamore Road.

Mrs. Palmer reported that the family was sitting in the living room when she saw a flash through the window and the harn burst into flames.

Palmer stated that he had been in a workshop near the harn

Palmer stated that he had been in a workshop near the barn only minutes before and there was no sign of any blaze at that

During the height of the blaze a doctor was called when Palmer collapsed from the excitement.

The blaze that could be seen for several miles around attracted the attention of motorists returning home from area basketball games, hampering firemen as they attempted to get their fire fighting equipment to the burning structure. In some places firemen had to push parked ears into the ditch along the driveway leading to the farm in order to get through.

Firemen from Culver, Monter-

Firemen from Culver, Monterey, and Aubbeenaubbee Township fought the blaze for several hours and sprayed nearby buildings to keep the blaze from

spreading.

They were hampered in fighting the blaze in near zero temperatures when the ground around the building became ice covered by the wind-whipped water spray and hoses froze shut.

Noted Woodcraft

Major Edwin C. Myers, the man whose love of Indian lore made the Woodcraft Council Fires a favorite past-time for Culver Summer Schools' visitors for more than a quarter century, is

Chief Myers, as he was known to thousands of young boys dur-ing his 30 years as a member of Woodcraft Camp faculty, died of a heart attack last Thursday, Dec. 12, in Webster Groves, Mo. Funeral services were held in Webster Groves and burial

was at New Boston, III.

For years Major Myers used as a basis for the Saturday evening council fires the knowledge he had gained by visiting Indian reservations in the West. The nickname "chief" came from the Black Foot tribe during one of his visits.

Probably Major Myers' greatest triumph came two years ago when he directed the pageant marking the 50th anniversary of the Woodcraft Camp. The pageant was staged at night on the Academy's football field and traced the early beginnings of the Indian tribes in this area as well as the founding of the school. Several thousand people attended. Major Myers' interest in Indi-

an lore developed through his association with the Scout circus. He also played percussion instruments with several circus bands, including Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey. A graduate of Kirksville (Mo.) Teachers College, he had a master's degree in fine arts from the University of Missouri. He had taught at Webster Groves High School since 1932.

SOCIAL SECURITY AFFECTS NINE OUT OF TEN PERSONS

"After more than a quarter century of social security, many people still think of it as something strictly for the older person and it is this incorrect picture of social security that we try to dispel through every means that we can," Mr. Cornelius R. Schafer social security district manager, said today.

Mr. Schafer brought out that the social security program protects persons of all ages — not only the 62 or 65 year-olds. In addition to the regular retirement benefits for elderly people, disability payments may also be made to a totally and permanently disabled worker who is under

Henefits to widows, surviving children under 18 years of age,

years of age are also an impor-tant part of "social security". people who can get benefits if they were dependent on a deceased worker are dependent husbands, and in certain situations, divorced wives.

"Social security is no longer protection for the older person alone," Mr. Schafer said. "It is a lifetime protection for nine out of ten working Americans."
But benefits cannot be paid

unless an application is made; a person who is nearing retirement should inquire at the social se-curity office about benefits, as should survivors of a deceased worker, or a worker who has become disabled.

"These three times for action," Mr. Schafer said, "are a must if a person is to be fully informed
