## Babson Discusses Investments For A Young Couple

### Advises Careful Selection Of Home

In a recent column, I outlined four divisions of study for youngsters at home on vacation from college and considering the "electives" for their next term. These were ENGLISH, SCIENCE, PHYSICAL HEALTH, and RELIGION (or FAITH). That column should be carefully retained for future reference.

This week, I wish to mention ten "investments" which a young couple who have finished high school, and perhaps college, should acquire:

(1) A FAMILY. Whether or not you get married is none of my business. If, however, you are married, your first investment should be a family. The cheapest and best time to begin this is when you are young.

(2) YOUR HOME. At the same time, it is important to locate your home in the right state. True, every one of our fifty states has its advantages and disadvantages; but it is most important that a young couple settle in a state suitable in climate, business opportunities, and probable growth. I cannot help individuals through correspondence; but this matter should be your main study, covering several months, before you definitely settle anywhere. Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce where you now live will help you with this. Personally, I like a comparatively small city showing considerable growth now.

(3) LIFE INSURANCE. After starting a family and getting located, you should take out life insurance. Take it out when you are young, for several reasons. — you can get a low premium, and you need it most then. I think a twenty-year straight life policy is probably the best for you. Premiums would naturally be payable for twenty years, but with no more payments necessary after that. On the other hand, if you should die soon after the policy is taken out, your beneficiaries would receive payment in full. Later, you may want to change from straight twenty-year life to an endowment or some other fau-zy policy; but not for your first one.

(4) FURTHER TRAINING. By this time, you and your wife should have decided what you are best fitted for — whether it is a clerk, an engineer, or a salesman. Or, you may be best fitted for agriculture. Once you have decided, get all the training you can in that field.

(5) EDUCATION OF CHILDREN. I believe in savings bank accounts; every family should deposit at least 5% of their income in the savings bank for the education of their children. If you start when the children are young, it is surprising how savings accounts will grow with only a small but regular deposit. Once when I asked Thomas A. Edison who was the greatest inventor, he replied: "The man who invented Compound Interest was no slouch."

(6) CHURCH AFFILIATION. The young couple who is trying to get along without active participation in some church is making a great mistake. I am not appealing for any special denomination; but the denomination in which you were brought up probably has a church near you. Be not content merely to attend it, but take an active part in its wel-

## EDITORIAL

The application for a three-way liquor license by two Culver businesses, namely the Lake View Restaurant and the El Ray Tavern, will come up for hearing before the Marshall County Alcoholic Beverage Board Thursday, Jan. 16.

Whatever decision is made, as the result of this hearing, should be arrived at impartially and in accordance with the regulations governing such decisions.

The decision of granting, or not granting, a three-way liquor permit must be based on the fitness of the applicant, and the propriety of issuing such a permit. The Board's decision should not be influenced because of pressures generated by fanatical minority groups.

The Town Board, which recently left office in the change of administrations, took it upon themselves to do away with the discrimination that existed in regard to different types of alcoholic beverage licenses in Culver, and rightfully so.

Disregarding the moral aspect, for it is impossible to legislate people's morals, the public has the right, as a part of their own personal freedom, to buy or acquire a commodity that is legal in whatever form they desire. Any departure from this procedure, which guarantees the rights to personal freedom, is discriminatory.

fare, and have your children attend its Sunday School.

(7) CHILD DEVELOPMENT. Carefully watch your children develop. Do not try to make them follow some line that you and your wife want them to follow. Probably each child has inherited some trait from some ancestor. Although they may be brothers, children can be entirely different in the traits they have inherited.

(8) EARLY COMPANIONS. You can "select" your children's playmates and friends as they grow up. This is something which is very important and should be carefully studied and watched.

(9) HOME INFLUENCE. Instead of letting your children go out to too many parties in other homes, encourage them to have parties in their own home where you can largely determine who should be invited. But do not be too rigid about it.

(10) GUIDANCE. Experience teaches me that money spent guiding your children will be well invested; but this must be done very carefully without trying to force them into any definite social group or any line of endeavor. In short, your most important investment will be the TIME and THOUGHT given to your children... and NOT MONEY! Your children's love or interest or friendships cannot be bought.

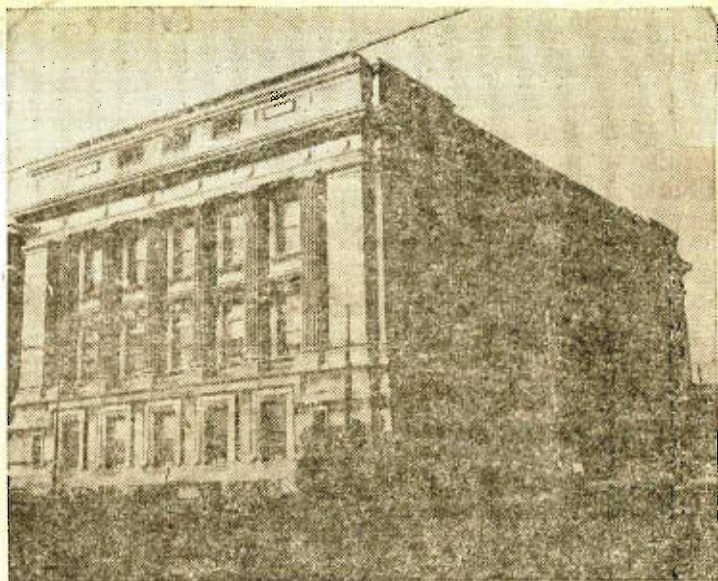

THREE IMPROVEMENTS  
ANNOUNCED FOR  
1964 CORN POLICY

Three major improvements in the 1964 corn policy offered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation were announced today by Earl Wilson, State Director. The bushel guarantee has been increased, the premium rate has been reduced, and loss adjustment methods have been simplified. Wilson stated that these changes will result in more protection for each premium dollar, and provide faster claim service to policyholders.

In Marshall County, the bushel guarantee on corn has been increased by an average of 37%, while the premium rate has been decreased by 25%. This increase in guarantee results in the highest protection ever offered under an All-Risk Crop Insurance Policy. Soybeans and wheat are also insured crops in Marshall County.

Federal Crop Insurance is an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. Protection is provided against all causes of loss, such as drought, excessive rain, flood, frost, insect infestation, plant disease, hail, wind, wildlife, fire, lightning, snow, and all other unavoidable causes. In its 1962 Annual Report to Congress, the Corporation shows indemnities resulting from over 100 different causes of loss.

The policy operates on the basis of a bushel guarantee determined by the past yield records for the county for each crop. The farmer can choose from three

price-per-bushel figures the amount of indemnity he will be paid for each bushel when a loss occurs. FCIC is required to operate on a sound, financial basis. Farmers, therefore, pay for the protection according to the risks and productivity of their farm.

In a nutshell, here is how it works. It guarantees a specific number of good-quality bushels of grain on the acres protected. In addition, the policy has a provision of adjustment when poor-quality or high moisture grain is involved. Indemnities are determined by multiplying the number of bushels the farmer is short of his guarantee by the price-per-bushel he selected. The policy is available to both land owners and renters, and each can insure his interest in the crops independently of the other.

WHEREAS, Liquor is now being sold in the town of Culver in the Clubhouse of the V.F.W. and in two drugstores in accordance with the law and without the necessity of having the consent of the Board of Trustees of said Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town Boards of the Towns of Argos, LaPaz and Bremen in Marshall County, Indiana, have heretofore enacted Ordinances consenting to the issuance of Liquor Retailer's Permits in said Towns and Liquor Retailer's Permits have been issued by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission of the State of Indiana to applicants within said town; and

WHEREAS, the Culver Inn has heretofore within the last three years applied for a Liquor Retailer's Permit; and

WHEREAS, the Board finds that under the circumstances it is discriminatory against the privately owned taverns in the Town of Culver not to be able to apply for a Liquor Retailer's Permit, now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver:

Section 1. That pursuant to the authority granted to said Board by the Indiana General Assembly in Chapter 226 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 1935, consent is hereby granted to the Alcoholic Beverage Commission of the State of Indiana to issue Liquor Retailer's Permits to applicants otherwise duly qualified under the law in respect to premises located within said Town of Culver, Indiana.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and signed by the presiding officer of said Board.
