Culver Community School Plan Is Approved By State

On March 19th, the State School Reorganization Commission approved the Marshall County Plan as submitted by the Reorganization Committee of the county. The action by the State Commission thus provides for an election on each proposed unit at the time of the primary elections in May.

The Marshall County Plan includes proposals for the following consolidations: Bremen Public Schools; Argos Community Schools; Culver Community Schools; and the Plymouth Community Schools, to include the present Plymouth and West school systems. The areas included in Polk, North, Tippecanoe, and Bourbon townships were reorganized under previously approved plans and are not affected by the present plan.

The plan as approved for Culver Community Schools includes the territory of Aubbeenaubee, North Bend, and Union townships as they were consolidated previously under a consolidation law passed in 1947. The new plan, therefore, proposes no change in the area now included in the Culver Community School Corporation.

The significant changes included in the plan to be voted on in May have to do with the method of selection of the five members of the Board of School Trustees. For determining membership on the School Board, the entire school corporation shall be divided into four school-board-member districts. These shall consist of the civil townships of Aubbeenaubee Township, North Bend Township, and Union Township, and the Town of Culver.

The Advisory Boards of the three townships shall in joint session appoint one member from Aubbeenaubee Township for a term to start on July 1, 1964, and extend to June 30, 1968. The three Advisory Boards acting jointly also shall appoint one member who shall be a resident of the area of Union Township outside the Town of Culver. The term of this first Union Township appointee shall extend from July 1, 1964, to June 30, 1968.

The Advisory Boards acting jointly also shall appoint a member from North Bend Township to serve from July 1, 1964, to June 30, 1966. The Advisory Boards shall appoint another member from North Bend Township for a term extending for one year, — July 1, 1964, to June 30, 1965. After this one-year term expires, this member shall be chosen for a four-year term from the residents and freeholders of Aubbeenaubee Township. This member thereafter shall alternate between the two townships of North Bend and Aubbeenaubee.

A fifth member of the School Board shall be a resident of the Town of Culver and shall be appointed by the Town Board for a term to extend from July 1, 1964, to June 30, 1967.

Though the terms of the first members so appointed vary in length, all terms thereafter shall be of four-years' duration. A School Board member may be re-appointed for successive terms.

For the purpose of maintaining as nearly even balance of members politically as is possible, the appointees who will take office on July first shall have the following political affiliations: Aubbeenaubee Township, Democrat; North Bend Township, Republican; Union Township, Democrat; Town of Culver, Republican; and the alternating member from North Bend Township for the one-year term, Democrat. Thereafter the only restriction on political affiliation shall be that no more than three members shall be of the same party. No elective official shall be eligible for appointment to the School Board.

The outcome of the election on the Culver Community Schools unit in May will be determined by

R. Alexis Clarke To Be Candidate For Congress

R. Alexis (Lex) Clarke, 37-year-old Marshall County attorney and former State Representative, has announced his candidacy for the 3rd District GOP nomination for Congress. Clarke is a Precinct Committeeman in the Marshall County GOP organization, and he said that he made his final decision only after conferring with his County Chairman and many Republican leaders throughout the District.

In making his announcement, Clarke stated that: "A Republican nominee for Congress with Legislative experience would be the strongest candidate to oppose the Democrat incumbent in the fall. And I believe it vital that the Republican nominee confront his opponent vigorously with the truth on every forum, platform, pathway, highway, and byway in the District". In 1953 Clarke was nominated by State Senator Freeman Yeager of South Bend for Assistant Secretary of the Indiana State Senate, a Legislative post to which he was elected and in which he served throughout that Session. Following this, he gained legislative experience as Assistant Counsel for the U. S. Senate Banking Committee in Washington, D.C., being appointed (Continued on Page 5)

Funeral Services Held Monday For Bruce Robinson

Graveside services were held at the Culver Masonic Cemetery Monday morning for Dr. Bruce B. Robinson, age 72, with Dr. Ronald C. Williams, pastor of the Culver Methodist Church, officiating. Dr. Robinson died March 24 at McAllen, Texas, after a nine-month illness.

He was born in Compton, Ill., the son of Dr. and Mrs. C. R. Robinson. He was graduated from Baker University, received his master's degree from Clarke University, and doctor of medicine from Harvard University. He did graduate study at Heidelberg University, Germany.

Dr. Robinson served on the staffs of Toronto, Canada, General Hospital, Massachusetts State Hospital, and St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Washington, D.C. He was a psychiatrist for the U.S. Veterans Bureau in New York City, after which he established, under the auspices of the National Committee on Mental Hygiene, child guidance clinics in Cleveland, Ohio; Macon, Ga.; Memphis, Tenn.; and other major cities. He founded one of the first child guidance clinics in a public school at Newark, N.J., and served as its director for 30 years. He was a member of the faculty of Newark State Teachers College and lectured in several colleges.

Eight years ago Dr. Robinson retired and made his home on Lake Maxinkuckee where he had been a summer resident since 1924. He spent his winters in McAllen, Texas.

Dr. Robinson is the donor of the chimes at the Culver Methodist Church as well as the public address and hearing aid systems.

He was a member of the Culver Methodist Church, American Medical Association, New Jersey Medical Association, New Jersey State Teachers Association, various psychiatric groups, New York Urban League, and Delta Tau Delta Fraternity. He was a World War I veteran.

Dr. Robinson is survived by his brother, M. R. Robinson of Culver, and his sister, Mrs. Blanche M. Conner of Tulsa, Okla.

NIPSCO To Lay Gas Lines Around Lake

Residents living around Lake Maxinkuckee, outside the corporate limits of Culver, will soon have the privilege of installing natural gas in their residences. The Northern Indiana Public Service Company started Monday to lay gas lines on Maxinkuckee Road east from Maxinkuckee landing, past the Academy airport road.

As soon as state highway officials grant a right of way permit, allowing the utility to lay lines along the highway, work will start on the lines around the lake which will connect with the NipSCO main line where it crosses the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks near the Academy power house. The line will be laid east on Highway 10 to Highway 117, following Highway 117 as far as the Dr. Ernest Norris property.

On the west side of the Lake, the lines will connect with the city line in the south end of Culver and follow the West and South Shore Drives into the Venetian Village. Thus, every resident on the lake will have access to this gas utility for their personal use. NipSCO hopes to complete the work by Fall.

Korean Orphans Joyfully Wear Clothing Donations From Culver

BOXES AND BOXES OF CLOTHING were received from the local Boy Scouts by Korean orphans who were so enthusiastic about receiving this sorely needed commodity that they could not wait until the boxes were taken inside, but had to try them on immediately — and in near-freezing temperatures!

The local Boy Scouts have received word that the clothing which they have been periodically shipping during the past months to needy Korean orphans has been enthusiastically received and arrived at very opportune times.

The children, residents of My Home Orphanage, located south of Tongduchon, Korea, received 17 boxes of shoes, boots, socks, coats, scarfs, mittens, shirts, sweaters, pants, snow suits, and various other articles of clothing. Still other shipments of clothing are to be sent at later dates.

The clothing drive, which began last November under the sponsorship of the Culver Boy Scout Troop 290, stemmed from the sincere interest and concern of a former Culver resident, M/Sgt. Harold Bocock, who is presently stationed in Korea with the United States Army. Mrs. Bocock and children reside here on Route 1.

While here in Culver, Sergeant

Bocock was on the Culver Military Academy staff and devoted much time and effort to the Culver Boy Scouts and served as a member of that organization's executive committee.

The following is from a letter of Sergeant Bocock describing the day the children received the clothing: "We went out about 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon and what a madhouse! Kids came from everywhere. It was just above freezing, but they started opening boxes right out in the yard, as you can see. The two older women took charge and as they took out a piece of clothing, they would look around for a kid it would fit, hold it up to them, and try it on right there.

"According to Mrs. Pack (head of the orphanage), it was the first clothing they had received all winter and it couldn't have come at a better time, because they were just about out. I was really surprised at the good clothing — some of it looked

brand new and the kids were tickled to get a pair of shoes. Just wish I could have had a movie camera to really do justice to everything that went on.

"Anyway, it was a howling success and all the hard work you put in on it was worth every bit of it. Just wish you all could have seen what went on."

The following article appeared in the "Stars and Stripes" and the "Division" — both military publications: "The children of My Home Orphanage have received 25 boxes of clothing as a result of the efforts of two Camp Hovey sergeants. The orphanage, located south of Tongduchon, Korea, is supported by the soldiers of the 7th Infantry Division's 2nd Brigade.

"Last fall M/Sgt. Harold L. Bocock, B Company, 3rd Battalion, 32nd Infantry, sent one of the chapel bulletins to his home in Culver, Ind. The bulletin explained that the children of the orphanage were in need of clothing for the cold winter. Under the supervision of the Scout Mothers of Boy Scout Troop 290 of Culver, 17 boxes of clothing were collected and prepared for shipment to Sergeant Bocock.

Scoutmaster Carl F. Foust recently received this note of appreciation from 2/Lt. Ronald D. Wallace, Infantry, Assistant Adjutant: "I would like to thank you and the Boy Scouts of Troop 290 for the clothing you have so generously donated to My Home Orphanage.

"Although the children have few material comforts, they appreciate what they have and use it with great care. Your gifts were particularly welcomed since they arrived at a time when most needed.

"I might add that several of the boys at the orphanage are active in the Korean Boy Scouts and were gratified to learn that their counterparts in America are true Scouts in the highest sense of the word."

Many others have given toward this very worthwhile project. Among these are Mrs. James Green and the Maxinkuckee Methodist W.S.C.S.

Local residents who have items of clothing to contribute to this drive are reminded that these donations may be deposited at

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any time at the Culver Methodist Church or you may contact Mrs. Bocock, the Sergeant's wife, who also devotes her wholehearted efforts to this project. Plans are underway for another shipment to be sent in two weeks, so housecleaning Culverites are reminded to remember these needy Korean orphans when you have useable articles which you no longer need.

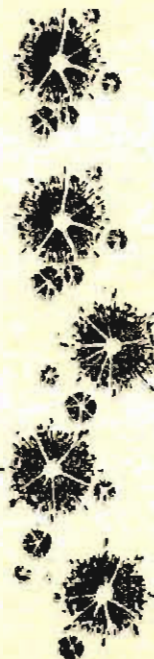
Women's Guild To

ed by U. S. Senator Homer E. Capehart. In November 1954, he was elected to the Indiana House of Representatives from Marshall County and served in the 1955 Session of the Legislature. While a member of the Indiana House of Representatives, he served as Ranking Member of Judiciary B Committee, as well as member of several other Legislative committees. During the 1955 Session of Legislature, Clarke was sponsor of the Flood Control Study Law for the Kankakee and Yellow River basins for Marshall, St. Joseph, LaPorte and other counties. He also co-sponsored the 19-year-old Amendment and fought for the Optional City Charter Amendment. He did not seek re-election to the Assembly. During the 1950's, Clarke was appointed 3rd District Young Republican Chairman by GOP District Chairman, Kenneth Osborn, of LaPorte. He was re-appointed to that post by Charles Ainlay of Goshen, when he became 3rd District GOP Chairman. He also served on the Young Republican State Executive Committee and was a delegate to the Young Republican National Convention in 1955.

For the past several years, Clarke has practiced law at Bremen, Ind. In 1962 he was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the Jaycees for outstanding contribution to civic and community development. Mr. Clarke received his L.L.B. degree from the University of Mississippi Law School, and did his pre-law work at Indiana University and Indiana University Extension in South Bend.

Mr. Clarke, a Marshall County resident since early childhood, resides with his wife, Sally and their three children, at 545 S. St. Joseph St., Bremen, Ind. He is a World War II Navy veteran, having enlisted in 1944 at the age of 17. He is a member of the American Legion, member of Phi Delta Phi International Legal Fraternity, member and President of the Bremen Kiwanis Club, and a member of the First United Church of Christ.

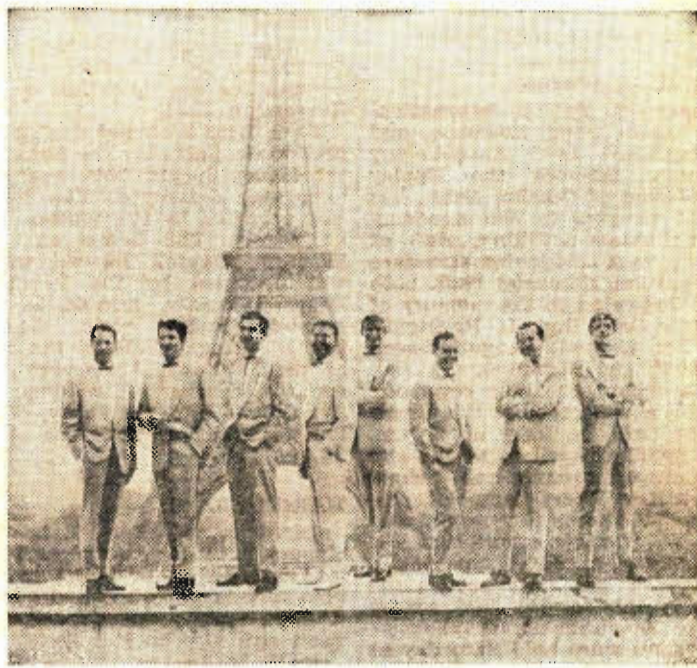

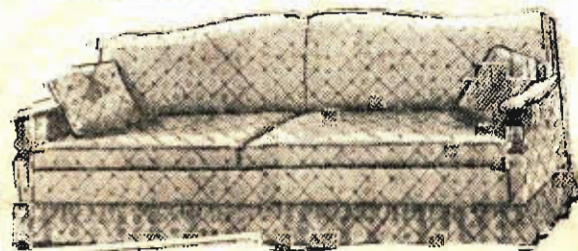

APRIL 2, 1914—

The first steps have been taken for the organization of a free public library for Culver and Union Township. It is hoped that every person in the town and township will give at least one book to this proposed \$10,000 or \$12,000 Carnegie library. Donations should be delivered to the Exchange Bank where they will be transferred to shelves in the library rooms over Dr. Tallman's office.

A new town pier will be constructed at a length of between 100 and 120 feet and a width of 8 feet. It will be built in 10-foot sections and floored with 2-inch plank.

On and after next Sunday all Sunday trains on the Vandalia will be withdrawn indefinitely, and two week-day trains will be annulled — the 7:35 a.m. going north and the 10:51 going south.

car over, or rather, through roads hub deep with mud where heavier cars mired down. They came through the quicksand near DeLong after dark without lights by walking ahead with a lantern and picking their way.

Congressman Ford To Speak At CMA Friday, April 3

Michigan Congressman Gerald R. Ford, a member of the Warren Commission investigating the assassination of President Kennedy, will speak to students and faculty at Culver Military Academy at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 3.

Congressman Ford's talk will be given in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium and the public is invited to attend. The representative of Michigan's fifth district is expected to gear his talk for Culver's American heritage program, however his Washington office indicated he will discuss defense appropriations and foreign aid and will mention the objectives and methods being employed by the Warren Commission.

Ford is one of seven members appointed to the Warren Commission by President Johnson. He is also the senior Republican member of the defense appropriations subcommittee and a member of the subcommittee on foreign operations. A leading Republican within the Congress, Ford is a member of his party's policy committee, he acts as chairman of the Republican objectors for the consent calendar, and, as chairman of the Republican Conference, he is a member of the Joint Senate-House Republican leadership. He is in his eighth term.

Ford has been designated as a member of the American Group for the Interparliamentary Union and attended the 1959 session in Warsaw, the 1961 session at Brussels, and the 1963 meeting in Belgrade. He has also represented this country at meetings of the United States-Canadian Interparliamentary Group in Ottawa, New York, and Washington. In September 1961, Rep. Ford was selected by the American Political Science Association as the Republican House member to receive its "Distinguished Congressional Service Award" for outstanding work in the Congress.

An outstanding high school athlete, Ford won all-city and all-state honors in football. At the University of Michigan, he earned three varsity football letters. A member of Michigan's undefeated national championship teams in 1932 and 1933, he was selected Michigan's most valuable player in 1934. One of his teammates during this period was Russell D. Oliver, Culver football coach and alumni secretary. He was graduated from the University of Michigan with a B.A. degree in 1935, having been selected a member of Michigan's top senior honor society.

Ford participated in the 1935 East-West Crippled Children's benefit football game at San Francisco. In August of that same year he played in the All-Star game in Chicago against the Chicago Bears. In 1959 Ford was selected by the judges for "Sports Illustrated" to receive its "Silver Anniversary All-American Award" as one of the 25 football players of 25 years ago who had contributed the most to their fellow citizens in the quarter century.

Ford entered Yale University Law School in 1935 where, in addition to his scholastic activities, he acted as assistant varsity football coach and served as freshman

boxing coach. In 1941 Ford received his law degree from Yale where he was a member of Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity. Following his admission to the Michigan State Bar in June of that year, he became a partner in the law firm of Ford and Buchen in Grand Rapids.

In 1942 Ford entered the U.S. Navy where he served 47 months of active duty in World War II. Aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Monterey (CVL-26) for two years, he participated in the third and fifth fleet carrier operations. Following shore duty with the Naval Aviation Training Program, he was released to inactive duty in January of 1946 with the rank of lieutenant commander.

Returning to Grand Rapids, Ford resumed the practice of law, and in 1948 received the Grand Rapids Junior Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service Award for his active participation in various community projects. In 1949 he was selected by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of "America's Ten Outstanding Young Men" and received its Distinguished Service Award.

Ford defeated the Republican incumbent in the 1948 primary and beat his Democrat opponent in the November election to become the Representative in the 81st Congress from the Fifth District of Michigan which is composed of Kent and Ottawa Counties. Ford has maintained an attendance record of 93.2 per cent during 15 years in office (1949-1963), missing only 296 roll calls out of 3,034 in the House of Representatives.

MRS. DONALD PARSON ENROLLS AT I. U.'S FORT WAYNE CENTER

Mrs. Donald Parson, 524 N. Liberty, Culver, is among the students enrolled in credit classes this semester at the Indiana University Fort Wayne Campus.

A total of 1001 students are enrolled from 63 Indiana cities, 73 from 62 Ohio communities, and two from Michigan cities.

The Fort Wayne Campus' overall enrollment of both full and part-time students for the spring semester shows an increase of 12 per cent over the enrollment for the same semester last year, according to Dr. Ralph E. Broyles, director. Full time students increased 25 per cent.

The summer session of the Fort Wayne Campus of Indiana University will open June 22 and run through Aug. 14. Interested people should contact the office of the regional campus for a copy of the schedule of classes.

AVOID 6 COMMON MISTAKES MADE ON TAX RETURNS

The surest way to get special attention from the Internal Revenue Service is to file an "imperfect" return. However, this special attention has no benefits; just more delay and additional cost for everyone. This tax advice from Vernon C. Dawson, Acting District Director of Internal Revenue, is based on over 100 years of tax collecting experience by the agency.

He pointed out 6 common items that delay the processing of returns. They are: (1) failure to attach W-2 forms, (2) no signatures, (3) tax information not readable, (4) failure to list dependents and exemptions, (5) failure to total deductions, and (6) failure to list Social Security number.

What happens when the taxpayer forgets one of the above? Mr. Dawson said the return must be specially processed and any refund will be delayed. If the taxpayer calls or writes about his refund, this inquiry takes clerical help away from the processing of correctly prepared returns. Thus, all returns are slowed up.

Review your return very carefully when it is completed, Mr. Dawson advised. Put it aside overnight, then review it again the next day. After you are sure it is clear, complete, and correct, mail it to the District Director of Internal Revenue, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204.

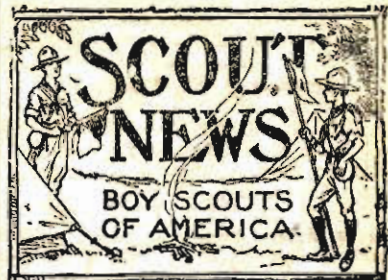

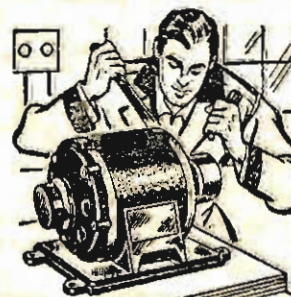

Approximately 50 of the university's top singers will appear in the concert in Epley Auditorium at Culver Military Academy on Friday, April 10, at 8:00 p.m., which will be directed by Robert E. Stoll.

Also on the program will be the Hoosier Queens, Male Quartet and other specialty numbers which always appear jointly with the "Singing Hoosiers."

Each year the "Singing Hoosiers" give concerts throughout Indiana and surrounding states. Requests for concerts by this group are received almost daily.

The male singers will wear the traditional full dress suits while the "Queens" will be attired in formal of pastel colors. The groups are composed of some 150 of the top voices on the I.U. campus. However, this number is reduced for concerts given off the campus.

In the summer of 1958 the "Singing Hoosiers" and "Hoosier Queens" gave concerts for American servicemen in Germany under sponsorship of the Defense Department. During the six-weeks' tour, the I.U. singers sang

35 concerts before 8,000 servicemen.

In the 1960 summer the groups took a nine-weeks' tour, sponsored by the Defense Department, to military installations in Germany and Italy, giving 43 performances attended by 11,000 servicemen.

APRIL 15 DEADLINE FOR ANNUAL SOCIAL SECURITY REPORT

April 15, 1964, is not only your Federal Income tax deadline, but it is also the deadline for the Social Security annual report. All those who are receiving social security monthly benefits and have earned over \$1200 in the year 1963 must file a report of their earnings with the Social Security office.

Mr. Charles E. Burke, Manager of the South Bend Social Security office stated that this report is necessary if a beneficiary exceeded \$1200 in 1963 regardless of the fact that he earned the money before he applied and received his social security benefit. Failure to file a timely report before April 15, 1964, may result in a penalty according to Mr. Burke.
