## Annual Strawberry Festival Set For Thursday, June 11

### Miss Indiana To Be Present

Seven Aubbeenaubee High School girls are vying for the title of queen of the 1963 Aubbeenaubee Township Strawberry Festival, which will be conducted on the school athletic field in Leiters Ford Thursday, June 11.

The winner will be joined in the limelight by "Miss Indiana," blonde Marcie Pinkstaff of Crawfordsville, who was named Indiana's best combination of beauty and talent last July.

It will be the second straight year that "Miss Indiana" has appeared at the Strawberry Festival. Last year, Julia Jane Flannigan of Lebanon was an instant hit with her loveliness and charm at the Festival.

Hoping to succeed Nancy Crill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Crill, as Strawberry Festival queen are Janet Calhoun and Peggy Van Meter, seniors; Rita Hunneshagen, junior; Judy Roe and Teresa Hunneshagen, sophomores, and Cheryl Eastman and Peggy Nichols freshmen.

They were nominated by vote of their respective school classes. Each was given five containers to decorate and place about the township for receiving penny votes. The girl with the most money will be crowned queen during special ceremonies on the stage at the Festival.

While the annual extravaganza provides lots of fun, entertainment and food — especially all sizes and shapes of strawberries — the main results of the Festival are the community spirit it fosters in Aubbeenaubee Township and money to be used by the volunteer fire department.

The original purpose of the event was to raise money to buy equipment for the fire department and subsequent Festivals never have lost sight of this purpose.

This year, it is hoped to raise funds for purchase of a portable water pump, portable generator, smoke ejectors and stretchers.

This will be the 11th annual Strawberry Festival, but few persons care to estimate now just how many persons to expect, how many cars and trucks will be in town or how many pounds of food and gallons of beverages will be consumed before the big night is through.

In past years, a turnout of 1,000 to 1,500 was considered big. But last year, a crowd estimated at nearly 6,000 men, women and children came out in 50-degree temperatures to the Festival.

## Father Joseph A. Lenk Marks 25th Anniversary Of Ordination

Father Joseph A. Lenk, pastor of St. Mary's of the Lake Church, will celebrate the 25th Anniversary of his ordination as a Catholic priest with a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving, on Sunday, June 7th.

In all, 500 guests are expected. They will include Catholic and non-Catholic friends living in Culver, and in the Lake and Academy communities, together with Culver Alumni, clergy, and friends from Father Lenk's army days.

There will be a social hour at the Villa Maria, 920 South Shore Drive, Saturday evening with dinner for Father Lenk's out-of-town guests in the New York Room at the Three Sisters restaurant between 7 and 10 p.m.

The Solemn High Mass will be offered in St. Mary's Church at 11 a.m. Sunday morning.

Celebrant of the Mass will be Father Lenk himself; with the Rev. Charles Leland, C.S.B. of the University of Toronto, deacon; the Rev. James Wilmoth of Indianapolis, sub-deacon; the Rev. Casimir Moswinski, of St. Michael's in Plymouth, Arch Priest; and the Rev. Peter Meade, S.C.J., of the Divine Heart Seminary at Donaldson, master of ceremonies. The Acolytes for the Mass will be Mark Kosterman, Michael Stevens, Paul Liette, Edward Ricciardi, Jerry Lemar, A. Pare, A. Mars, and C. Kiefer. Sermon by Reverend Siegrist.

The sermon will be preached by the Rev. Urban Siegrist, C.P.P. S. of St. Joseph's College, at Collegeville.

The choir, under the direction of Harry R. Fouts with Mrs. Sam Strang at the organ, will sing the "Kyrie", "Gloria", "Credo", "Sanctus", "Benedictus", and "Agnus Dei" from the Mass of the Angels by Achille P. Bragers.

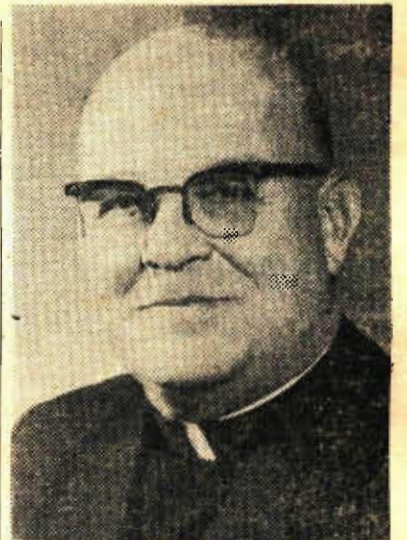
Came To St. Mary's In 1948

Father Lenk came to Culver as pastor of St. Mary's in 1948, following his World War II service as an army chaplain. He left active service in the grade of major, having served as a Catholic chaplain in the North African and Italian campaigns and with the Army of Occupation in Italy.

A native of Fort Wayne, he attended St. Mary's School there; St. Joseph's College, at Collegeville; St. Mary's College in Kentucky; and four years of Theology at Mt. St. Mary's Seminary, Norwood, Ohio. He also has done graduate work at the University of Notre Dame.

Prior to his military service, Father Lenk served at St. Lawrence Church, Muncie, and was a member of the city's Juvenile Delinquency Board.

He was senior Catholic chaplain at the huge Hines Veterans' Administration Hospital, Maywood, Ill., and since then has served as diocesan director of the Legion of Decency and, during 1948, as Indiana state chaplain of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He served as President of St. Joseph's College Alumni Association and last year was made a fellow of St. Joseph's College by the Lay Board of Trustees.

### Present St. Mary's Church Is 10 Years Old

The present St. Mary's Church and rectory were built by Father Lenk in Culver. The Quonset hut church built in 1948 was totally destroyed in a flash fire which struck early in the morning of Jan. 28, 1954.

Through most of 1954 Culver Catholics attended Sunday Mass in Culver's El Rancho Theatre — but, meanwhile, funds were being raised rapidly and the present modern fireproof church building was under construction.

At the same time, the parish had been growing rapidly. Starting as a mission in 1897, the Culver Catholic community had moved feebly during the early years with its members attending Catholic churches in Rochester, Monterey, and Plymouth.

Later a visiting priest came to Culver and conducted services in private homes, the scout cabin, the basement of the public library and the Culver school auditorium.

### \$350,000 Investment

The present church plant involved an investment of \$350,000 and has a seating capacity of 350 with three Sunday Masses during the winter months and five Sunday Masses during the summer.

It is a personal foible of Father Lenk to keep the present front doors of St. Mary's painted red — as a reminder to his people that the church is in the red. But he has promised a coat of green paint when the last of the debt is paid off; and those close to the hard-driving pastor suspect that a hue of less flamboyant color will turn up on the front doors a season or so after that.

The financial affairs of the parish reflect the parish's growth in more significant matters. During Father Lenk's Culver tenure, Holy Communions have increased from 1,000 a year to 12,000 — and other vital statistics of the parish have expanded in proportion.

### Three Parishes Within One

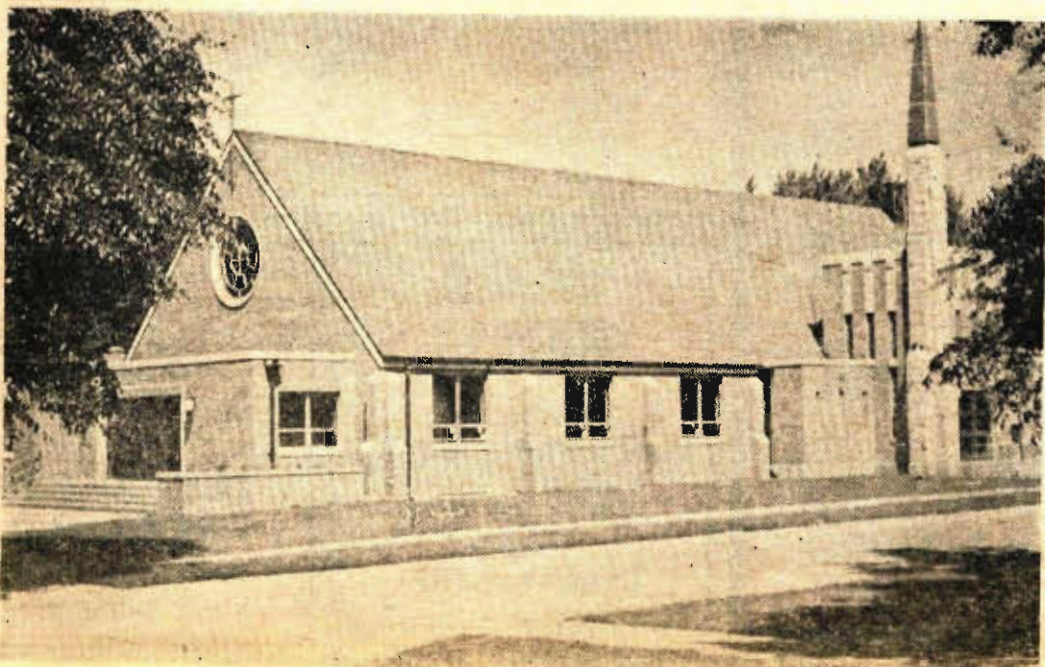
Father Lenk often has remarked that he has three parishes within one: the permanent residents of Culver upon whom he relies first and foremost for allegiance to the Church; the summer cottagers who are his "Sunshine" parishioners during the warm and bright months of the year; and the Culver cadets, who make up an entirely separate Catholic community of their own in both summer and winter months.

When Culver Military Academy was made part of the parish in 1948, Father Lenk set up the St. Thomas More Foundation. It has served the spiritual, cultural, and social needs of over 6,000 Catholic cadets in the summer and winter schools.

In looking back over his 25 years in the priesthood, 16 years of it spent at Culver, Father Lenk remarked this week that in St. Mary's may be seen the fulfillment of the words in Hebrews, II:1, "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of

## Tulsa Editor Is Speaker At CMA Commencement

Jenkin Lloyd Jones, editor of the Tulsa (Okla.) Tribune, told the graduating class at Culver Military Academy Monday that it is living in an age when "phonetic theories of education have been more concerned with entertaining the student than with teaching him."

In a commencement address entitled "The Art of Thinking," Jones told 1,000 students, parents, faculty, and alumni attending the honors convocation:

"You live in a country and at a time when a great many of your contemporaries have been denied the privilege of having their brains exercised."

"In many of our schools today it is still considered more important to adjust the student to his environment, as they say, than to give him understanding. His failures," said Jones, "are glossed over lest he suffer the traumas of inferiority. His talents are not pressed lest he pull an undemocratic distance ahead of his fellows. His report cards say nothing, for fear the bright student will grow boastful and the stupid one lose hope."

The prominent newspaper editor, whose speech "The Stomach-Turning Point" received nationwide attention several years ago, charged that today's student is "stuffed with tranquilizers that leave him with the comfortable impression that lazy work and sloppy work are just about as acceptable as the fruits of devotion and diligence. It is a dream world where everyone passes."

Jones, Culver alumnus, said a great many educators have now realized that these theories have produced a generation of Americans which is neither "particularly happy, particularly adjusted, nor particularly knowledgeable. He predicted that the "swing back" is underway and commended the Academy for not being "the indulgent master."

In calling for what he termed the art of thinking, Jones said

"by and large man is not evil. But we would rather do almost anything than think. We would rather talk than think, and cheer than think, and march than think, and even fight than think. Because it is not in the nature of most of us yet to find a reasonable premise and proceed therefrom to a logical conclusion."

At a time when the world lives in fear of the atom bomb, Jones said man also looks forward with hope to the limitless resources of power unlocked by simple, straight-forward, and uncomplicated thinking.

"In every field of art and science, morality and politics, the world hungers for uncomplicated men. . . Common sense is nothing more than the ability to recognize the obvious. "You will not see it often practiced," Jones added. "Man still loves magic more than logic. . . He is a slave of soft words, which he invariably applies to himself, and of harsh words with which he describes his opponents. He considers himself a liberal or a conservative, but his enemies are invariably radical or reactionary."

"Your success," he said, "in a specific occupation may depend upon the learning process, but your success as a human being will be governed by your wisdom. Wisdom is the soul of decency. The wise man cannot be cruel. Neither can he be cowardly. He is always capable of dying cheerfully, but never for the wrong things. He will fight like a tiger, but not in unworthy causes."

"The art of reasonableness, the art of honest inquiry, the art of thinking straight, thinking simply, and thinking quite a lot of the time," Jones concluded, "represent the true legacy that Culver has hoped to leave you. This legacy, if you can grasp it, will long outlast the military tactics, the Latin verbs, the chemical formulae, the mathematical equations. It is your hunting license for noble and effective lives."

## Charles Rhodes And Wife To Tour Europe, Russia

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rhodes, owner-operators of Culver's spacious Park 'N Shop supermarket will depart next week on Thursday, June 11, with 20 Indiana supermarket operators, food wholesalers, and brokers from the Indianapolis airport on the first leg of a 21-day People-to-People Goodwill journey which will take them to England, Belgium, Sweden, Russia, Hungary, Poland, and Germany.

Meetings, interviews, visitations, and receptions are scheduled throughout the 21 days as the Indiana citizens take part in meetings with United States and foreign government authorities and meet representatives of their occupational counterparts in European supermarkets and wholesale warehouses.

The purpose of their visit will be to learn, in person, methods and working conditions and, in general, attempt to improve understanding and relations between America and the people abroad. The entire mission is arranged and designed to implement the aims and purposes of the United States cultural visitation exchange program and the National People-to-People Organization. Heading the Indiana delegation is Dr. Eric C. Oesterle, Purdue University.

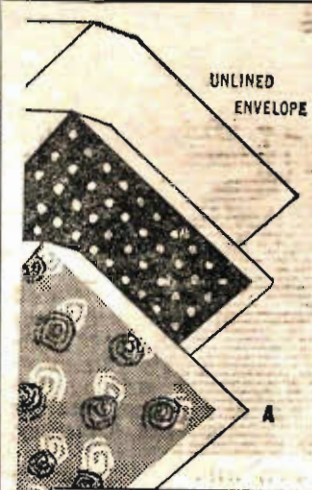
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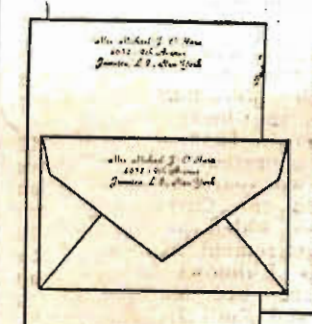

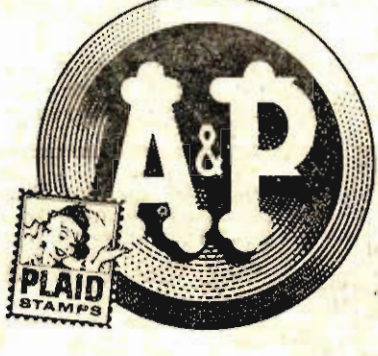

# Town Board Topics

The Culver Town Board at their regular Monday night meeting, June 1, discussed a letter received from Don Trone, secretary of the Lake Maxinkuckee Association, which asked the Town of Culver to again become a member of the Association. Mr. Trone pointed out that the Association furnished a man and car and a man and boat to patrol the roads around Lake Maxinkuckee and the waters of the lake, which was a great help to the Town of Culver and the city's police force. After discussion, the Board voted to become a member of the Association.

Bids for the new lawn mower were opened. Culver Hardware and Snyder Motor Sales presented bids that ranged from \$63.50 up to \$119.95 which would include the old mower as a trade-in. The low bid of \$63.50 presented by Culver Hardware was accepted by the Board.

Dave Burns presented specifications for a new fire truck, which had been discussed at a previous Board meeting. The approximate price of the new fire truck was \$22,000.00 with a trade-in of the old truck for \$650.00. Mr. Burns urged that a meeting be held between the Culver Town Board and the Township Advisory Board. He stated the township would bear half of the expense of the new truck. When questioned as to the need of a new truck, Mr. Burns stated the present one is 19 years old and is in such poor condition that it does not pass all of the State Rating Board requirements. He also explained what the new truck would provide and that specifications would be submitted to several companies for bids. President Ted Erwin asked Mr. Burns to set up a meeting with the Township Advisory Board and the Town Board in the near future.

Street Commissioner Don Mikesell reported that the streets had been swept by a commercial sweeper, broken curbing had been cleaned up, and that the sweeper took 2 1/2 days to do the job. The Board suggested that since the sweeping job was finished, that Culver residents take it upon themselves to help keep it that way, doing their share in keeping trash and litter from collecting on the streets. With everyone cooperating, the streets of Culver could remain clean and well kept. In the downtown area are trash containers, which are put there to use. So let's use them.

Mr. Mikesell also stated the work done in the Culver Town Park consisted of placing trash cans and park benches. Setting up slides and playground equipment and the hauling away of the trash collected there. Permission was granted to Mr. Mikesell to buy paint to paint the park tables.

Larry Linhart has been hired as Life Guard for the beach in front of the Beach Lodge. Mr. Linhart had received a scholarship to the Red Cross Life-Saving School at La Grange. It was also announced that Greg Dawson would serve as part-time Life Guard, and be on duty while Mr. Linhart attended school. Mr. Dawson will also work on Mr. Linhart's day off and be on duty on Saturdays and Sundays also.

The Board discussed Ordinance No. 180, which will re-establish the new ward boundaries for the Town of Culver to coincide with those of the Township Precincts as set out in the Ordinance. In this way, wards and precincts inside the Town limits would be the same. This action has been needed for sometime, which will do away with much confusion. It is pointed out, however, this change would not affect the voting in National, State or County elections, but would only be concerned with Town elections. The Board passed this ordinance.

The Board moved to advertise for bids on gasoline and lubricating oil and fuel oil. The notices appear in this issue of The Citizen.

Odds and Ends: Dave Burns reported that the Academy would donate the cinders and take care of the leveling off of the town dump whenever the street department was ready to work on it.

Mr. Stubbs informed the Board that he had a road grader for sale and asked \$2,000 for it — the Board took this under advisement. . . . Mr. McFeely reported that all the 4-inch water mains had been laid on Slate Street and work was progressing in attaching water taps for the property owners along the line. . . . Don Mikesell reported the surface drainage near Dr. Howard's office had been completed and gravel had been placed over the manhole near Mr. Ricciardi's place of business.

# Seek Design For Sesquicentennial Official Symbol

Indiana will celebrate its 150th birthday in 1966. The Indiana General Assembly has charged the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission with the responsibility of planning and administering our state's birthday party.

The Commission is seeking a suitable design that can be adopted as the official symbol of the Sesquicentennial. Such a design would have many applications. First, and perhaps most important, it should be suitable for use on the commemorative stamp that we expect the U. S. Post Office Department to issue. The design might also be used on one side of a commemorative medal, on stationery, on Commission publications, etc. The Commission reserves the right to adapt the approved design as might be necessary in various applications and the right to use or not use the prize winning design as the official symbol of the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission.

The Commission invites the submission of designs by students and faculty members in art departments of the universities and colleges of Indiana, and individual artists in our state. The selection of the winning design will be made by the Executive Committee of the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission subject to the approval of the Commission and the U. S. Post Office Department. Designs must be delivered to the office of the Commission, 101 State Office Building, Indianapolis 4, by 12 noon, Aug. 3, 1964. A prize of \$1,000 will be awarded to the winning artist.

Artists submitting designs should observe the following rules:

1. The design should have a state-wide significance or symbolism.
2. The design shall be in the ratio of 0.84 x 1.44 inches, arranged either horizontally or vertically. (Entries should be on paper measuring five inches by seven inches.) These 5" x 7" drawings may be horizontal or

vertical according to the artist's design.

3. One, two or three color designs will be considered.

4. Those submitting designs should bear in mind that the Citizen's Advisory Committee to the Postmaster General have set up the following criteria for commemorative stamp design:

a. No living person shall be honored by portrayal on a postage stamp.

b. No American citizen shall be so honored until at least 15 years after death.

c. Commemorative stamps shall not be issued to honor a fraternal or religious organization, a commercial enterprise, or a specific product.

5. Artists may submit as many entries as they desire.

6. All entries become the property of the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission; none can be returned.

7. In order to be eligible, entries must be delivered to the office of the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission, 101 State Office Building, Indianapolis, Ind., 46204, by 12 noon, Aug. 3, 1964.

Artists might consider the symbolic value of the State Motto, tree, flower, bird, and such structures as the first State Capitol at Corydon, the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument at Indianapolis, etc., in planning their designs.

Local club women and residents are encouraged to participate in the creation of a suitable

design to be used as the official symbol of the Indiana Sesquicentennial.

Mrs. George Phillips, District President; and Mrs. A. L. Jonas, Knox, District Chairman of Fine Arts; and Mrs. Loyd Swoverland, District Chairman of Cultural Heritage, are hopeful that a member of the Indiana Federation of Clubs will submit the winning entry. Members of the Federation who do submit entries are to bring them to the Mid-Summer Council Meeting, July 31, at the Columbia Club, in Indianapolis, where they will be displayed at the request of Mrs. David W. Martin, Fort Wayne, President-elect, for 1964-1966, of the I.F.C. The artists will be recognized during the noon luncheon for the Council.
