Bells To Ring Four Minutes On Sunday, July 4

A Reminder Of Our Heritage

Culver's bells will ring out on Independence Day, Sunday, July 4, in unison with those of the rest of the nation as a reminder of America's precious heritage, according to a statement by Martin Uebel, Commander of the W. A. Fleet Post of the American Legion.

With the cooperation of the churches of Culver and surrounding communities, The American Legion has arranged for the ringing of bells for four minutes, beginning at 1 p.m.

The ringing of the bells here will coincide with similar ceremonies throughout the nation. The originating ceremony will be conducted at historic Independence Hall, Philadelphia, Pa.

The local American Legion Post asks all residents — every man, woman, and child — to pause as the bells begin to ring and reflect upon the significance of Independence Day. Let us observe this momentous day in the same true spirit which inspired our forefathers to establish the independence which we have inherited.

Commander Uebel also urges all citizens to display the flag on this most important day.

Academy Summer Schools Boast Huge Enrollment

1,735 Students Set Record

Culver Military Academy expects to complete enrollment Thursday (July 1) with a record of 1,735 students attending its summer sessions.

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (ret.), superintendent of the Academy, said the enrollment is expected to surpass by approximately 100 students last year's total of 1,635.

Bolstering the record enrollment are 105 girls who are attending the Summer School for Girls, an innovation in the Culver Summer Schools' operation. Previously, Culver has for five years operated a summer theater school that enrolled approximately 30 girls. But this year the Academy has expanded its summer program and is permitting girls to participate in virtually every phase of the academic and recreational programs.

The breakdown in enrollment includes 750 in the Naval School, 705 in the Woodcraft Camp, 150 in the School of Horsemanship, and 105 in the Summer School for Girls. There are also 25 special students enrolled in academic courses. Of the total enrollment, 80 are day students.

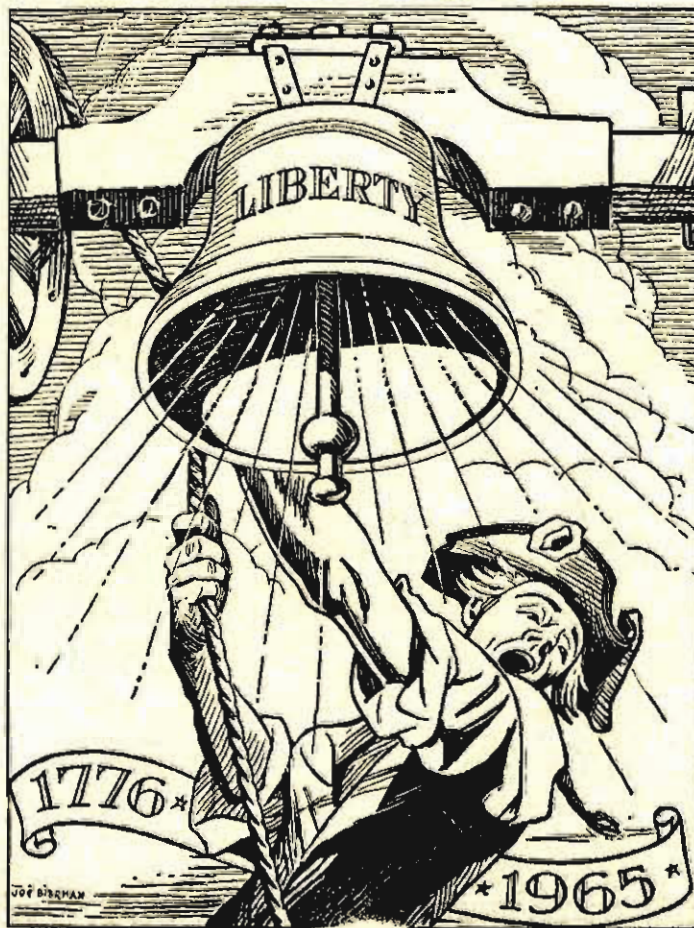
Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (ret.), director of the Summer Schools, heads a large faculty of 236 who teach or supervise an expanding academic and recreational program. Among the new academic offerings this year is a broadened course in developmental reading for boys in the Woodcraft Camp.

Classes begin today, Thursday, July 1, and the Summer Schools end Saturday, Aug. 21. There will be 4 p.m. Sunday band concerts beginning July 11, and the band will play its annual Moonlight Serenade for residents of the Lake Maxinkuckee area on the weekend of Aug. 7-8. The band will sail aboard the O. W. Fowler on the west side of the Lake Aug. 7, and then serenade East Shore residents the following night. There will be no 4 p.m. band concert on that weekend.

Woodcraft Camp Council Fires begin on Saturday, July 17, and are scheduled for July 24, and 31, Aug. 7 and 16.

What Price Patriotism?

They were men of means and well educated — yet they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well the price they'd pay. What happened to them?

Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died. Twenty had their homes ransacked and burned. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardship of the war.

Carter Braxton, a wealthy trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home to pay his debts and died bankrupt.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family constantly and to keep in hiding. His possessions were taken and he was reduced to poverty.

British soldiers or vandals looted the properties of William Ellery, George Clymer, Syman Hall, George Walton, Button Gwinnett, Thomas Heyward, Edward Rutledge and Arthur Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. Nelson urged General Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and property destroyed. The British jailed his wife and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and grist mill were destroyed. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion.

Robert Morris and Phillip Livingston suffered similar fates. Such are the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These men HAD security, but they valued liberty more.—Sunray News

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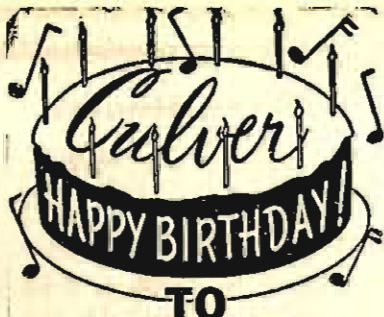

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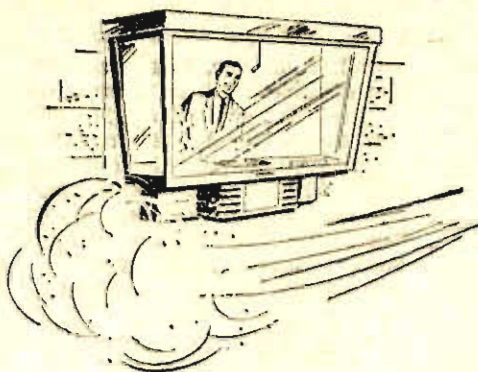

Bonus Received From The Highway Distribution Fund

Marshall County and Culver received their second and final "bonus" distribution from the Motor Vehicle Highway Distribution Fund.

State Auditor Mark L. France said a total of more than \$11,-421,000 was distributed to 543 cities and towns and the state's 92 counties from levies collected by the state during the month of May. Last month, \$13,395,000 was sent to local government units in the first "bonus" distribution.

The two windfall distributions were made possible by a new law governing distribution of state gasoline taxes and motor vehicle fees. In both payments local government units received much more money than usual because the State Highway Department will not start collecting its share until July 1, 1965.

Auditor France said the "bonus" distributions were made with counties receiving 45 per cent of the money and cities and towns sharing 55 per cent.

Starting next month and each month thereafter, the State Highway Department will get 53 per cent of the funds, counties will receive 32 per cent and cities and towns will get 15 per cent.

Auditor France praised the 1965 General Assembly and Governor Branigin for the foresight in the enactment of this law since it carries out the pledge of their party to place more state funds and responsibility in the hands of local units of government for the planning and carrying out of their highway and street programs.

Distributions were formerly made on a quarterly basis causing huge sums of money to be held in escrow by the state until a late date making it difficult for these local units of government to budget and plan their programs.

The amount disbursed to Marshall County was \$67,167 for May, and \$55,178 for June, making a total of \$122,338. Disbursed to Culver was \$3,778 for May and \$3,214 for June, making a total of \$6,992.

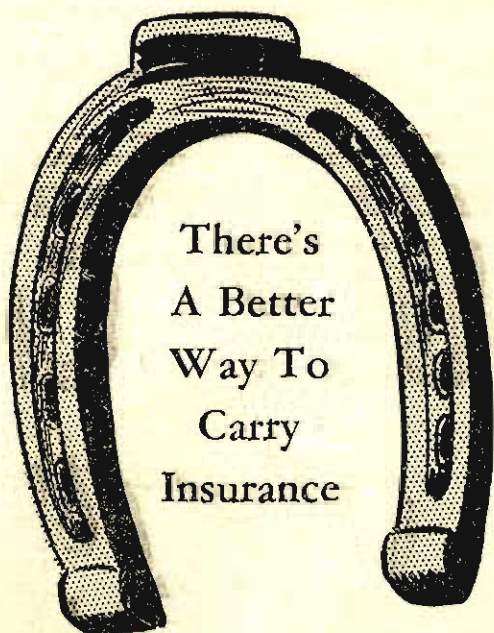
