Flashers To Be Installed At New SR 17 and SR 10

Mrs. Elgie Good, Route 2, Culver, who has been corresponding with the State Highway Commission since last October in an effort to have flashing beacons installed at the intersection of New State Road 17 and State Road 10 has received the following letter from Clinton A. Venable, Chief, Division of Traffic of the Highway Commission:

"This will acknowledge your letter of June 24, 1965, in which you transmitted newspaper clippings regarding accidents occuring at the intersection of SR 17 and SR 10 west of Culver.

"In our letter of January 20, 1965, it was indicated that we would consider the installation of standard illushing beacons on a future program. Perhaps you overlooked or did not understand this statement. Nevertheless we are pleased to advise you that the State Highway Commission in their meeting of June 23 approved our 1965-66 Program which included the installation of flashing beacons at this location.

"We do not plan to make the intersection a "4-Way Stop" but the supplemental flashing beacons will call the motorists' attention to the intersection more emphatically and alert him to the need for using caution as he approaches this location. It is anticipated that such an installation will be made by the end of the

"Thank you for your letter and we trust this additional information will apprise you of our plans for improving traffic control at this intersection."

When Mrs. Good first wrote the Highway Commission she was advised that a study would be conducted to determine whether additional traffic controls were needed at this location, and later that the installation would be considered on a future program.

Culver, Argos, LaPaz Banks End **Greatest Growth Year In History**

They also wish to invite attention to Section 34 of the Indiana Boating Laws which reads as fol-lows: "No person shall moor or attach any boat to any buoy, beacon, light marker, stake, flag or other aid to safe operation placed upon the public waters of this state by, or by others under the authority of, the State of Indiana. or shall move, remove, displace, tamper with, damage or destroy the same under penalty of law."



ATTENDING NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL INSTITUTE IN BUSINESS







June is the month of roses. But if you treat your rose plants properly, says Purdue University extension horticulturist Don Scheer, you can have roses until it frosts this fall.

bloom, apply fertilizer. Use 12-12-12 or a similar analysis, using about one-half cup per bush, or for a large bed, two pounds per 100 square feet. Broadcast the fertilizer around bushes, work it in lightly with a rake or hoe and water thoroughly.

The water is a necessary step right after fertilizing to put the fertilizer in solution, Scheer says, so it becomes available to the plant.

You don't need to apply fertilizer for the rest of the summer. Fertilizer applied too late in the season encourages new growth which might still be soft when winter's killing frosts begin.

All rose bushes require the rest of the summer is proper watering, spraying, dusting and weed control, the horticulturist says.

Fined \$25 For **Failure To Return** Library Book

The following article from a recent issue of the Starke County Republican has been brought to the attention of Mrs. Jane Scruggs, Culver Librarian, and should be of interest locally.

"Robert Feig, 25, Route 1, Knox, paid a fine and costs totaling \$25 in Knox City Court last week for failure to return a book he had borrowed from the Henry Schricker Library in February.

"The act states that "whoever borrows from any library, gallery, museum, collection, or exhibition, any book, newspaper, magazine, manuscript, pamphlet, publication, recording, film or other article belonging to or in care of such library, gallery (etc.) under and agreement to return the same, within a specified time, and thereafter fails to return such book. National Science Foundation. newspaper etc. shall be given written notice which shall bear upon its face a copy of this section of this act, mailed or delivered in person to his last known address. to return such book, newspaper etc., within 15 days, and in the event that such person shall thereafter wilfully and knowingly fail to return such article within 30 one field trip each week. They will days, or shall fail to reimburse such library, gallery etc. for the value of such borrowed article, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be liable to a fine of not more than fifty dollars or imprisonment for more than 10 days.

'Another section of the same stature provides a penalty for any person who receives or buys such : an article taken from a library and yet another section provides a penalty for the person who "writes upon, cuts, defaces, disfigures, soils, obliterates, breaks or destroys" an article in a library.

"The library reports that there are at least 50 more such late books on the lists and that legal action will be taken if they are not returned immediately."
