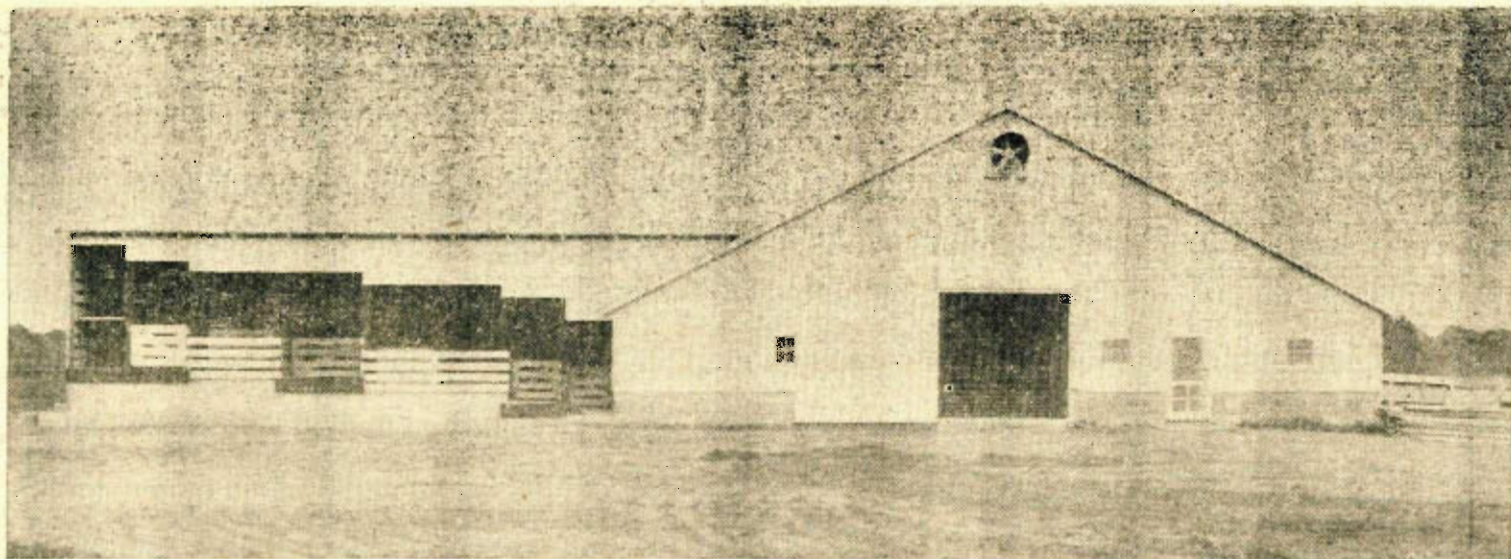

C.M.A. To Open With Enrollment Of 888 Students

Culver Military Academy will open its 72nd academic year Sept. 15 with 88 students, Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (Ret.), announced today.

The enrollment continues Culver's position as the largest independent secondary boarding school in the nation and is 14 more than last year's record enrollment.

There are 522 students returning from last year and 319 new boarding students, according to figures released by Dean of Admissions Frank M. Bryant. Day students total 47, 15 of which are faculty daughters.

New students arrived on campus Wednesday, Sept. 8, and returning students are scheduled to arrive here Tuesday, Sept. 14. Academic classes will begin on Sept. 15.

The 888 students attend strictly college preparatory classes in grades eight through 12. The Academy is operated by the non-profit Culver Educational Foundation.

Second Polio Feeding Set For September 26

Culver will participate in the second county-wide oral polio vaccine feeding to be given Sunday, Sept. 26.

The local station will be serving at the school cafeteria from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Citizens of all ages are urged to turn out for this second effort to help stamp out polio in our county. Oral vaccine is considered necessary regardless of what shots may have been used as immunization for it attacks polio viruses internally.

All those who received their first feeding in May will complete their immunization by receiving this second feeding.

If you did not receive your first feeding, you should come now for your first and receive your second from your family doctor.

Exam Announced For Marine and Naval Academies

Congressman John Brademas announced recently that he will use the Competitive System of nomination in filling one appointment available to the Third Congressional District in 1966 to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

Brademas said that the Third District does not at this time have vacancies available in 1966 for either the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y., or the U.S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colo.

"In order to give every candidate a fair chance and to nominate the best qualified young men, I am continuing the policy of making these nominations on a competitive basis," Brademas said. "The academies prefer this method and every young man has an equal opportunity for appointment."

A written examination prepared by the U.S. Civil Service Commission especially for service academy aspirants, will be held at locations throughout the nation, including South Bend, on Saturday, Nov. 6.

Brademas said that all prospective candidates from St. Joseph, Elkhart, LaPorte and Marshall counties will be required to take this examination and must notify him by Oct. 6 of their desire to compete for the appointment. Candidates must be between 17 and 22 years of age on July 1, 1966.

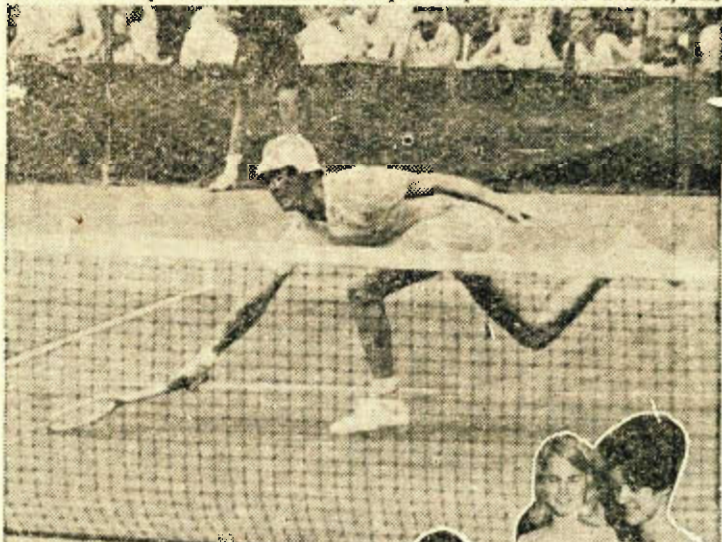
Brademas emphasized that the CSC examination is a preliminary test given to determine candidates for the academies. The candidates must then qualify for admission by passing written and physical examinations given directly by the academies.

The Hoosier Congressman also announced that he is allowed to nominate 10 candidates to compete on a State-wide basis with other Congressional nominees for Indiana's allotment of seven 1966 vacancies at the Merchant Marine Academy at Great Neck, Long Island.

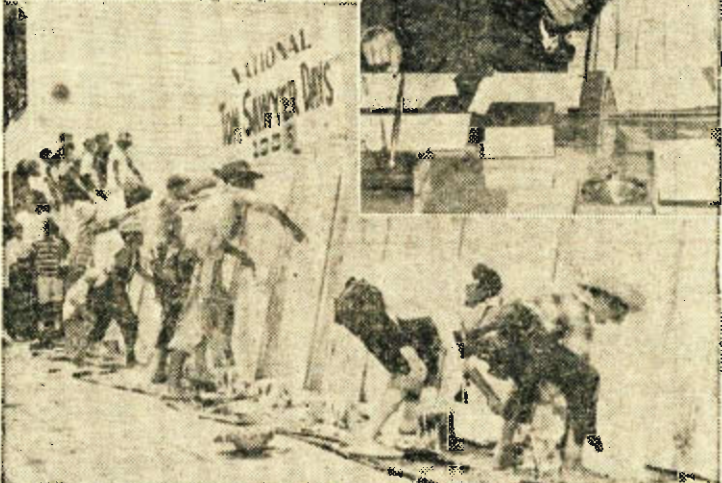

Air Force Seeks Veterans From All Service Branches

Major Joseph E. Shupe, Commander of Air Force Recruiting activities for the state of Indiana, southern Michigan and eastern Illinois, announced today that the Air Force is seeking veterans from all branches of service.

The prior service program is open to all veterans honorably discharged from any branch of service. In most cases a veteran can enter the Air Force in the same grade held from his previous

branch of service. A veteran that can qualify will be given his choice of assignment in the states or overseas area while at the local recruiting office. He will know his assignment before he is enlisted in the Air Force.

All prior service enlistees may take a 30-day reenlistment leave before reporting to his base for assignment.

Anyone reenlisting in pay grade E-4 or higher with over 4 years of service, may collect travel pay for himself and his dependents to his base of assignment.

Major Shupe stated that under the new pay raise effective Sept. 1, 1965, most men reenlisting will receive a nice increase in pay.

FEEDING A CROWD

Planning a family reunion of a community dinner? Knowing what to cook, how to buy, prepare and serve it may be baffling for beginners.

If you want information about feeding a crowd, see a new publication, "Feeding a Crowd," published by the Indiana Cooperative Extension Service.

Written by Miriam Eads, Purdue University foods and nutrition specialist, the publication tells how to distribute jobs, plan menus, count the cost, estimate quantities of food needed, and follow good sanitation practices.

Miss Eads offers recipes for 50 servings of reunion salad, square hamburgers, baked beans, crispy cornbread, fruit cup and oatmeal cookies.

TERMITES NOT INJURIOUS TO HEALTHY TREES

Beware of persons who may pressure you into letting them control termites in trees, say Purdue University entomologists.

Such persons often tell the homeowner that termites in trees mean that the insects already are or soon will get into the house. This is not necessarily true, the entomologists say. Dead heartwood in old and dying trees is a natural habitat for termites.

The insects also live in old stumps, logs and any other wood in direct contact with the soil. If trees are sickly, the termites are probably a result rather than a cause of the condition.

It is true that termites sometimes attack healthy plants. They may feed upon the roots of nursery stock and live in the soft tissue of plants such as corn and rhubarb. Even so, such damage is an exception rather than the rule. There is no evidence that they have any effect upon normally healthy trees.

STORED FOOD INSECTS STILL A PROBLEM

Insects that infest flour, cake mixes and other stored foods are still a problem for modern homemakers, says Glen Lehker, Purdue University extension entomologist.

These little insects may appear wherever there are cereals, flour, dry dog food or bird seed.

Several kinds or species of insects are involved. Some are small brown beetles, whereas others develop into tiny moths or "millers" that fly about the home.

Lehker lists six steps that can eliminate these pests from the

kitchen. They are:

Determine sources of infestation by carefully examining all susceptible foods. Throw away any that are insect infested.

If infested materials have further value or if there is little evidence of contamination, heat the material in shallow pans in the oven for at least 1/2 hour at 130 to 160 degrees F.

Clean and wash cabinets and storage spaces with soap and water. Let dry, and spray surfaces with 5 per cent DDT. Do not allow insecticide to come in contact at any time with food or cooking utensils. After the spray dries, put in new shelf papers, and replace items.

As a further precaution, keep susceptible foods in the refrigerator or store them in glass or metal containers with tight fitting lids. Keep storage places clean.

Purchase susceptible foods in quantities small enough to use within a reasonable length of time.

Look for a good root system when selecting shrubs, recommend Purdue University horticulturists. It's best to buy only from a reputable nurseryman.

Brighten canned cherries with a bit of red food coloring for more attractive desserts, suggest Purdue University food specialists.

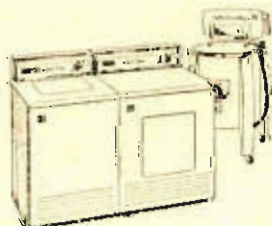

ELM LEAF BEETLES ARRIVE

Elm leaf beetles are by far and wide the worst pests of Chinese elm, says Glen Lehker, Purdue University entomologist.

These insects, which are relatively new to Indiana, have shown up in greater than usual numbers.

The beetle larvae feed on the underside of the leaves and give the foliage a lace-like appearance. The larvae are yellow to black in color and "slug-like" in appearance. Later they change into beetles, which also feed on the leaves and lay eggs for another generation.

As the larvae mature, they crawl about over the tree trunks and often collect in masses near the ground level. The adult beetles are about 1/4 inch long, dull green colored and have black stripes along the outer edges of their wing covers. The beetles often make a nuisance of themselves by getting inside houses to overwinter.

Trees can be protected by spraying them with lead arsenate, DDT or dieldrin. Dieldrin is the preferred material and should be used at the rate of one pint of an 18.6% concentrate in each 50 gallons of water. A second application will be needed later in the summer when a new brood of the worms appear.

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CATTLE MANAGEMENT PUBLICATIONS

Managing a beef cow herd properly might require a knowledge of herbicides, the purchasing power index or steamed bonemeal.

Feeder cattle management could point to an understanding of when to apply potash to pasture land, what degree to slope a concrete feed lot or how to control grubs.

These are questions answered in two Purdue University Extension publications, "Beef Cow Herd Management," Extension Circular 497, and "Feeder Cattle Management," Extension Circular 501.

The circulars cover various aspects of feeding, housing, health and marketing fattening cattle and cow herds. There are tips on future trends in the cattle business, forecasts of what direction cattle feeding is taking geographically

and detailed looks at the economics of management.

Indiana residents can obtain free copies of the publications by sending a postcard to the Agricultural Publications Office, AES Building, Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind., 47907, or contacting their county Extension agent. Be sure to ask for the circulars by name and number.

COTTONY MAPLE SCALE

Cottony maple scale, a common and serious pest of soft maple trees, this month looks like strings of freshly popped corn attached to lower twigs and branches.

Glen Lehker, Purdue University entomologist, says the white cottony-like masses are egg sacks which can contain up to 3,000 eggs each. The eggs hatch in June and early July and young scales

migrate to foliage and suck saps from the leaves. They remain there until fall when males die and female scales move back to the twigs and branches to overwinter.

Branches heavily infested with the cottony maple scale often die, and the entire tree may take on a yellowish appearance. This often happens in late summer when it is too late for sprays to be most effective.

Lehker suggests that infested trees be watched now and sprayed as soon as eggs hatch and young scales start to move about. They are light colored, resemble mites and can be seen with the naked eye.

The preferred spray is DDT, used at the rate of three parts of a 25 per cent emulsifiable concentrate in 25 gallons of water.

SMELL AND CHOOSE

Women, who for years could tell at a glance the color of nail polish in a bottle, now with a quick sniff, they can tell its fragrance, reports Modern Packaging, McGraw-Hill publication. A manufacturer has equipped nail polish bottles with a plastic collar which gives off the exact fragrance of the polish.

The driver who uses his head is far less apt to get it injured. According to the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company, the head is the most vulnerable part of the body in most traffic accidents. Studies indicate that up to 70 per cent of all auto injuries occur to the head and neck. Seat belts offer the best preventive measure. They restrain head and body from being thrown against parts of the car, especially windshield and instrument panel.

Poach leftover egg yolks or whites in boiling water, drain, cool and push through a sieve to garnish salads, suggest Purdue University food specialists.

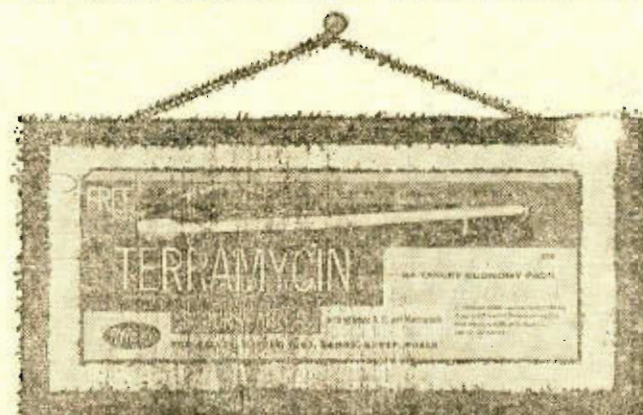

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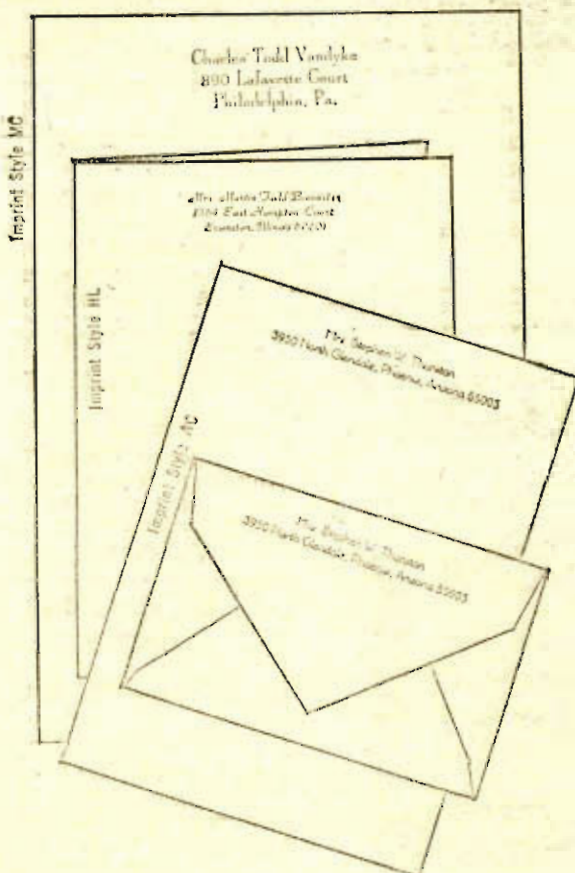

HOME SITE SOILS

Value of a home site can depend on such features as the soil's natural drainage, its ability to absorb wastes or its resistance against swelling and shrinking.

Harry M. Galloway, Purdue University extension agronomist, offers these tips for potential lot buyers as well as those who have lots to sell:

Natural drainage is important for several reasons. Basements are not feasible or are very costly to build and maintain on some of Indiana's wetter soils. Extensive grading to raise the house elevation, prevent water ponding

and provide firm footing the year around are needed on many of these wet soils.

If the site is in the country, you will want to consider how well the soil absorbs septic wastes. If wastes aren't absorbed by the soil they will seep out somewhere into drainageways or ditches.

Galloway also says that many soils swell and shrink with alternate wetting and drying. They may support foundations well when dry but lose their strength when wet. Cracked walls or uneven floors due to settling may result. These lower the value of the home and decrease future salability of nearby land.

These tips, Galloway says, won't seem so important when soils are dry and firm and grass is green in early summer. But remember, he cautions, that excess water, sewage problems and foundation strength can become important any time the soils are wet for long periods.

He suggests that reputable real estate agents, builders, local soil conservation district technicians

or county Extension agents can supply additional information.

SEW WHAT'S NEW

Sew what's new is the suggestion of Mrs. Bonita Farmer, Purdue University clothing specialist.

In a new Extension publication, she discusses many new fabrics — double knit, deep pile, laminated, lace, stretch, simulated leather and suede, crepe, diagonal and metallic fabrics.

She examines each fabric according to composition, signs of quality, cutting and sewing techniques.

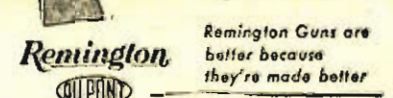

STARTING MOWERS EASILY

Your power lawn mower will start easier if you follow a few basic maintenance practices in caring for it.

Ray M. Lien, Purdue University agricultural engineer, says common causes of starting problems with small engines usually involve the fuel system and ignition system.

Check the gasoline supply when you have starting problems after the mower has been stored through the winter. Only fresh gasoline should be used — old gasoline may contain an accumulation of gum or other products of oxidation.

It's also important, Lien says, to be sure the air vent is open in the gasoline tank filler cap. If no air can enter the tank, gasoline will not flow from it.

The air filter is another vital part of the fuel system. It's there to keep abrasive dirt and dust out of the engine. If the air cleaner becomes clogged with dirt or grass, it may completely shut off the air supply or restrict it so much the engine will not run.


Oil bath air cleaners should be emptied, washed and refilled with recommended oil. Foam pad type cleaners should be replaced or cleaned in solvent and re-oiled as directed in the maintenance manual.

Starting problems are often caused by an improperly functioning choke. Be sure the choke cable or lever is adjusted to allow the choke to close fully for starting and open fully for running. Choking enriches the fuel-air mixture to make starting easier. The choke should be used with caution as over-choking can flood the engine and make starting impossible. Be sure the choke opens fully after the engine starts.

The spark plug is the part of the ignition system which most often causes starting problems. Fortunately for the homeowner it's also simple to replace.

Spark plugs often become dirty and cause trouble by failing to ignite the fuel and air mixture. Lien recommends keeping a spare plug of the proper type on hand for re-

placement. If trouble develops, it's a simple matter to take out the old one and screw in a new one. Should you decide to clean an old plug, it's best to have it done at a service station.

Service the engine with the recommended type oil. On a four-cycle engine, keep the crankcase oil at the proper level. On a two-cycle engine, mix the oil in the proper proportions with the fuel.

Do not starch clothes or linens before storing them, advise Purdue University clothing specialists. Molds and silverfish often feed on starch.

Treat your chopping block to an occasional rubdown with mineral oil, animal fat or boiled linseed oil, suggest Purdue University home furnishings specialists.



Polio Vaccines Are Safe and Effective Today

The search for the cause of polio proceeded slowly in the face of mounting epidemics which swept the United States annually in the early part of the twentieth century.

As the investigation continued, scientists noticed that the disease was moving up from young infants to strike at older age groups, claiming school-age children and even young adults for its victims. It is also found that the young adults were more likely to suffer severe paralysis.

Throughout this period of mounting problems, however, the greatest difficulty faced by researchers was the size of the polio virus itself. The germ is too small to be seen with an ordinary microscope.

Like all viruses, polio germs grow only in living cells, although they can lie dormant for indefinite periods in water, milk, or

sewage until they find the right kind of human cell to invade.

Infection of cotton rats, in 1939, provided an easier laboratory animal to work with than the expensive and cumbersome monkeys, but research possibilities were severely limited until 1949, when Dr. John Enders succeeded in growing polio virus in the test tube.

At last, the way was open for scientists to work with the polio virus. And then it soon became clear that more than one virus could cause the disease and that — should a vaccine be developed — it would have to contain at least three different strains.

Just such a vaccine — of the killed or inactivated virus — was developed by Dr. Jonas Salk in 1955.

The development of Salk vaccine was a milestone in the fight against polio and has greatly reduced the number of people vic-

timized by the disease. It was recognized, however, that the injection by needle and the need for repeated booster shots were handicaps.

As a result, Dr. Albert Sabin in 1961 announced a vaccine of the live virus which could be taken orally — each of the three strains to be taken by mouth at separate intervals. Further improvements by the pharmaceutical industry have combined three polio strains into one dose of vaccine so that now only two feedings are necessary for basic protection.

However, while the oral vaccine is more easily administered, the Salk type injected by needle can be combined with immunizing vaccine against diphtheria, tetanus whooping cough.

Since the needs and conditions of patients vary, it is the physician who decides which immunization is best.

Whichever the case, the viruses that cause polio are still around

to infect the unprotected. Immunization is the only sure way to be safe from polio.

WHEAT FOR DAIRY COWS

Wheat is equal to corn in a dairy ration if certain feeding precautions are taken, says Purdue University animal scientist Merle Cunningham.

Because of its pasty nature, wheat should be introduced into the ration gradually, as not more than one-third of the concentrate mixture. The farmer can probably feed slightly higher levels after his cows have become accustomed to wheat's addition in the ration.

Another consideration is the size of wheat particles after grinding. Finer grinding, Cunningham says, tends to reduce palatability. It would be best to crack or coarsely grind the grain.

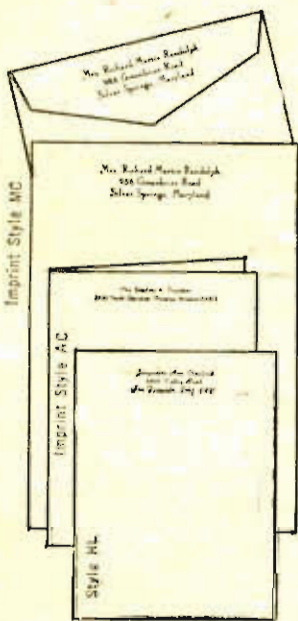

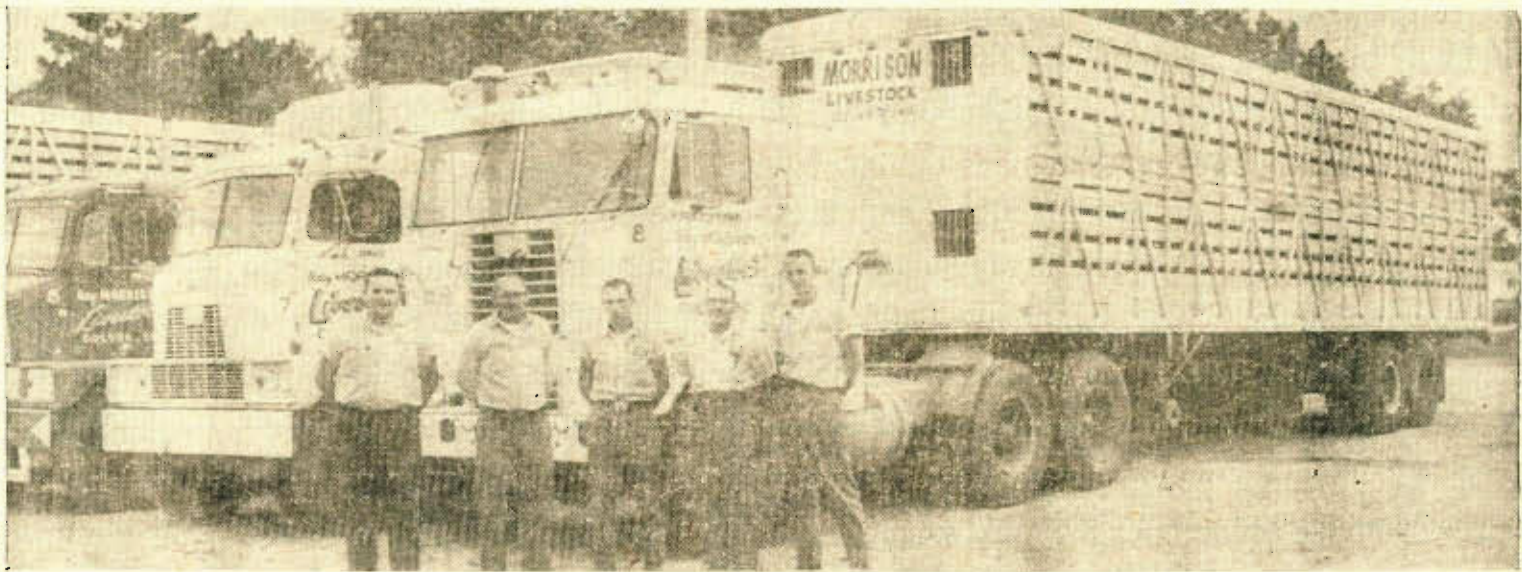
