## PEP CLUB SPONSORS SATURDAY BAKE SALES

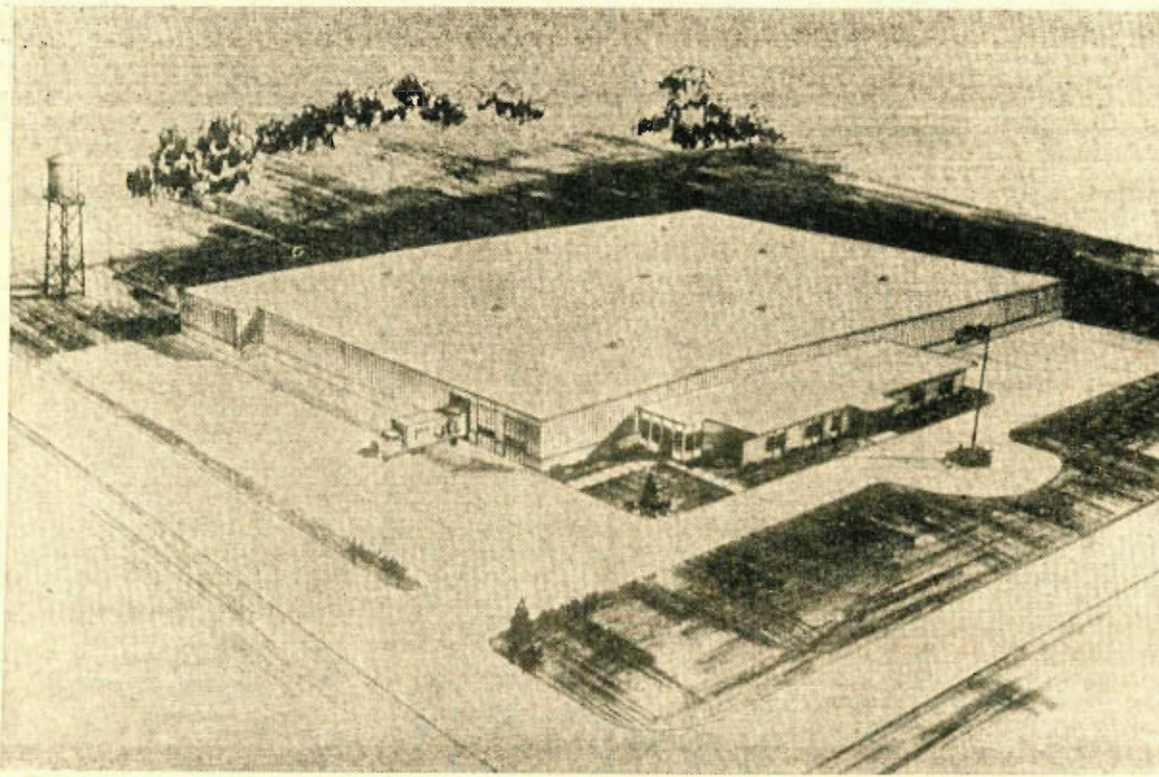

## Construction Work Begins At New McGill Bearing Plant

Work is underway on construction of the new \$800,000 Bearing Division plant of McGill Manufacturing Co. at the west edge of Culver. Official ground breaking ceremonies took place last Friday at the factory site, attended by McGill's President Charles McGill, other company officers, and representatives of local government and service organizations.

Plans call for the completion of the 300 x 220-foot building facing on new State Road 17 with entry from Mill Street, by next June 1. The new building will be of steel construction above a five-foot base of cement blocks. Fronting the main building will be a 40 x 150-foot office.

Twenty acres of the 55-acre site will be devoted initially to the new plant of 72,000 square feet, including 6,000 square feet of office space.

At the ground breaking ceremony, Charles McGill turned the first shovel of dirt which signalled the start of the plant's construction. Other McGill officials who took part were James C. McGill, son of the president who is company secretary; A. B. Williamson,

vice president and Bearing Division general manager; H. R. Warner, treasurer; D. C. Whitesell, director of advertising, and Harold Fritz, production superintendent.

Representing the community were Roy Nicodemus, president of Culver Jaycees; Wilber Taylor, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Al Poppe, president of the Lions Club, and Edgar Shaw, of the Culver Town Board.

Tonn and Blank, Inc., of Michigan City, is the general contractor with electrical work to be done by Koontz-Wagner Inc., South Bend.

Plans call for construction to be completed by June 1, with the installation of the latest in new machinery to be installed and operating by fall of 1966. New equipment cost in addition to the machinery to be moved from Valparaiso will exceed \$1,250,000, according to Williamson.

McGill will begin manufacturing CAMROL Cam Follower bearings at the Culver plant with 25 to 30 people and plan to increase this to as many as 60 production workers the first year as rapidly as people can be trained. Eventual

work force will approximate 200, said Mr. Williamson. Expansion of the production area can be handled easily with the addition of bays at the back of the original building.

The McGill Company was founded in 1905 to produce electrical specialties and the Bearing Division was added in 1925. Innovations in heavy duty needle roller bearings and the creation of the cam follower bearing has elevated McGill to leadership in the industry. Another new McGill bearing concept known as the SPHERE-ROL spherical roller bearing offers protective seals for the first time in this type bearing.

The new plant is the first for McGill outside of Valparaiso, where the company employs over 850 in two divisions.

Further expansion with smaller plants is planned for the future. Charles McGill said today that new plant locations will favor areas where employment potential for people trainable for our required skills is greatest.

A plant manager to be announced later will be moved from Valparaiso along with a few key supervisory people. Those interested in future employment should contact the Personnel Department at the parent plant in Valparaiso for details.

## Insurance Needs Are Discussed By School Board

The Board of School Trustees on Monday evening discussed in detail with Robert Cultice of State Exchange Insurance Company a proposed revision of the entire insurance program for the school corporation. The plan explained to the School Board would increase to a more adequate amount the insurance coverage for school facilities while reducing the number of policies now in effect. Certain types of losses or damage not now covered would be added to the protection provided by present policies. The Board took the matter of such a program under consideration for a later decision.

Superintendent Frank McLane also explained the provisions of the 1965 Elementary and Secondary Education Act, giving attention to possible improvements in the educational program by use of funds available under Title I of the new legislation. It seemed likely that the local school officials would give immediate attention to the expansion of remedial reading and arithmetic programs in order to aid pupils having trouble in these areas.

Because of a temporary vacancy, a bus driver is needed for one afternoon route. Mr. Robert Flora at present drives the route in the morning, but is not available for the evening trip. Supt. McLane is seeking at present for a man who could drive the route in the afternoon, with the duties extending from about 3:10 p.m. until 4:15 p.m. The afternoon trip remuneration is \$4.50 dally.

### The Miracle of Survival

The military survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor of December 7, 1941, are trying to perform a miracle by locating as many survivors as is possible in order to band together and form chapters in cities and state across the country as the "Pearl Harbor Survivors Association". We have located over 10,000 servicemen and women of all the uniformed military services who were there, and believe that some 40,000 more survivors may still be alive today and

that we have formed our national association of survivors of Pearl Harbor 1941, and seeking to perform the "Miracle of Survival" which is, "returning enmasse" to Honolulu, Hawaii, for our 25th anniversary and memorial service at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1966.

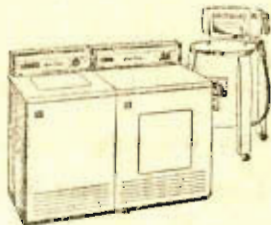

Frances Coates Grace, well known soprano and disease, will present a unique program of Claude Debussy's "Pellens and Melisande" at 8 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 14, at Culver Military Academy.

Mrs. Grace, of Hinsdale, Ill., is sponsored by the Seven Arts Committee of the Faculty Wives Association at Culver. The full-length program will be held in the Music and Art Building and is open to the public. There is no admission charge.

The Debussy program is the sixth in a series of solo-operas and climaxes a long and distinguished career of Frances Coates Grace, who has become known in the music world for her ability to condense a four-hour grand opera into an hour's program. ## Federal Aid To Education?

Editor's Note: The following theme, written by Andy Lowry, was a requirement for Mr. Lawson's Civics Class.

Since World War II the controversy over the idea of federal aid to education has grown to enormous proportions. Congress, acting under interpretations of the general welfare clause has begun programs for aid to our nation's schools. Many people believe that federal aid to public schools will eventually bring about federal control of public schools, thus weakening state and local school standards. The constitutionality of federal aid has been seriously questioned concerning parochial schools and segregated schools in the South which would lend support to practices outlawed in the United States. Our federal government has continued with its attempts of federal aid to schools despite the many objections. In 1961, President Kennedy sent to congress a plan which would eventually use more than five and a half billion dollars over a five year period for education. This sum was to include grants for dormitories, classrooms, and scholarships. Also included were grants that would cover teachers' salaries. Many people felt that this was getting too close to government regulation of the schools. Thus they contested the series of bills on educational grants.

If we glance back at the history of the United States, we will find that the question is not whether the federal government should support our schools, but to what degree, and in what form as well as by what method. It has been the policy of the United States for almost half a century to give regular grants for vocational training in our schools. In 1917, the Smith-Hughes Act provided money for agriculture, business, home economic, and industrial courses in our high schools. Recently there has been the National Defense Education Act, the Economic Opportunity Act, and the revised National Defense Education Act. The National Defense Education Act granted aid to upgrade our methods of teaching in the fields of science, mathematics, and foreign languages, and to enlarge guidance and counseling in our secondary schools. The revised National Defense Education Act included aid for improvements in English, reading, and social studies. The Economic Opportunity Act was improvements in education to help raise the standard of living in poverty-stricken areas.

Mrs. Edith Green, a representative from Oregon, says that the question of whether there should or should not be federal aid to education is a false one. Right

now the federal government is spending approximately two and one-quarter billion dollars on education and research, and one-half of that sum is going directly to the colleges and schools. Before the government can successfully construct a broader program for aid to education, it must re-evaluate the money being spent on education at the present in a manner favorable to the taxpayer. This is where our government must start its program if it is to enlarge the support for our schools. After this it will be able to expand the educational program to meet current and future needs.

In the future there must be a larger percentage of federal support for our schools. In this decade a rapidly increasing population will bring a great increase in the number of people enrolled in our secondary schools and colleges. The local support of these schools has not shown a remarkable increase in the past few years, and the state governments cannot possibly maintain our schools. The government will be forced to play a major role in supporting education. Only the future will reveal to us whether the government will become dictatorial or remain democratic in its aid to education.
