Biggest Problems | Funeral Services For Postal Staff At Christmas Time Fern G. Fenimore

"One of the biggest problems handwriting. At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket. this can become a major problem." Postmaster E. W. Mattox, said to-

day.
"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers DOES help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office. being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered.

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. Postmaster Mattox urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside. Practically all parcels must be shipped in bags and often heavier tems rest on top of smaller lighter parcels, which makes sturdy boxes very important for fragile articles. All parcels should be addressed only on one side. It is a good idea to have the address and list of the contents enclosed somewhere inside the parcel.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addessing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

Board Annexes Dillon Property; Other Business

The Town Board, meeting in regular session on Monday night, waived second and third reading, and passed Ordinance No. 191 which annexes Maxinkuckee Highlands 2nd Addition, a residential subdivision.

The annexation is in response to a petition by Judson and Dollis Dillon, owners of the property which consists of about 3.1 acres and nine lots. No other property owners were affected.

The annexation will become effective upon two publications of the annexation ordinance.

In other business, the board learned that the new fire truck is scheduled for delivery in Culver on Friday, December 17, and will then be subjected to fire underwriter acceptance tests before being put into service.

The board discussed expiring terms of office which will occur soon on several governing hoards. Among the seats which will need to be filled are five members of the town plan commission, one library board, and one board of zoning appeals.

The board discussed revisions to the contract with the Culver Military Academy which will incorporate the 15 percent increase in sewer user rates. The hoard said that while the revised contract may not be concluded and accepted before the January 1 effective date, the new rate will be retroactive to that date.



Widows Eligible At Age 60 For Social Security

About 180,000 widows are eligible to get social security benefits sooner than before because of a recent change in the law. Mr. Charles E. Burke, social security district manager in South Rend said today.

A widow whose husband was insured under social security can choose to start her monthly payments when she is 60. In the past, widows had to be at least 62 to get the payments, Mr. Burke con-

widow's monthly payment will be reduced if she decides to start benefits before she in 62. Under the new law, her benefit is reduced slightly for each month she is under 62 when she starts getting the payments.

On the average, a widow who accepts benefits before age 62 will collect about the same value in total benefits over the years, but in smaller installments to take account of the longer period during which she will be paid.

The decision to accept reduced payments can only be made by the widow. Mr. Burke said all widows who are 60 or 61 should get in touch with the social security of-46511 fice to get more information about reduced widow's benefits and other changes under the new law.

Widows who wish to receive benefits before age 62 should apply for them. If you can't come to the office now, call or write for a copy of Leaflet No. 5.

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


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Contributions To Development Center







Last month we had many birthdays in Mrs. Carter's third grade. Each birthday girl or boy treated the class with refreshments. We are now learning about four figure numbers in Arithmetic. In Science we are studying how the different food groups help us.
