## Biggest Problems For Postal Staff At Christmas Time

"One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," Postmaster E. W. Mattox, said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers DOES help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered.

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. Postmaster Mattox urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside. Practically all parcels must be shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller lighter parcels, which makes sturdy boxes very important for fragile articles. All parcels should be addressed only on one side. It is a good idea to have the address and a list of the contents enclosed somewhere inside the parcel.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

During this peak season the Post Office will remain open all day for the next two Saturdays, Dec. 11 and 12, to accommodate patrons.

## Two Teenagers Hurt In Accident

A car containing five teenagers failed to make the jog in the road at South Main Street and Davis Street early Sunday morning, causing heavy damage to the car and injury to two of the passengers.

Police Chief Don Mikesell said a car driven by Robert Albert, 18, R. R. 2, Culver, went out of control and hit a tree stump in front of 404 South Main, causing extensive damage to the car.

Danny Humes, 17, Culver, was treated at the Culver Clinic for a laceration of the scalp, concussion, and possible back injury. Sue Ellen Sedlack, 16, Rochester, was treated by Dr. Joseph Howard for a possible fractured collar bone, and Paulette Nunn, 16, Leiters Ford, also examined by Dr. Howard, was apparently not injured.

Albert, and another passenger, Larry Washburn, 17, Culver, escaped injury in the accident, which occurred about 1 a.m. Sunday.

Chief Police Mikesell said the investigation of the accident is continuing.

## Funeral Services Held Saturday For Fern G. Fenimore

Mrs. Fern G. Fenimore, 77, Route 1, Culver, died at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 1, at the Parkview Hospital, Plymouth, where she had been a patient since Saturday, Nov. 27, after suffering severe burns in her home.

Mrs. Fenimore was born Sept. 2, 1888, near Burr Oak, and lived in Rochester and Kewanna until 1917, when she moved to Findley, Ohio. In 1936, she moved to Culver, where she has since resided. She was the daughter of the late Elijah and Rebecca (Voreis) Robinson. She was a charter member of the Culver Bible Church.

On Sept. 30, 1906, in Rochester, she was married to Edgar H. Fenimore, who preceded her in death on Aug. 21, 1957. Surviving are two sons, Donovan Fenimore, Mishawaka, and Gerald E. Fenimore, Huntsville, Ala.; a sister, Mrs. Zetta A. Shaw, Culver; four grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 4, at the Culver Bible Church, with the pastor, Rev. Eric Ryser, assisted by Rev. Maynard Tittle, of Plymouth, former pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was made in the Culver Masonic Cemetery.

The Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home of Culver was in charge of the arrangements.

## Board Annexes Dillon Property; Other Business

The Town Board, meeting in regular session on Monday night, waived second and third reading, and passed Ordinance No. 191 which annexes Maxinkuckee Highlands 2nd Addition, a residential subdivision.

The annexation is in response to a petition by Judson and Dollis Dillon, owners of the property which consists of about 3.1 acres and nine lots. No other property owners were affected.

The annexation will become effective upon two publications of the annexation ordinance.

In other business, the board learned that the new fire truck is scheduled for delivery in Culver on Friday, December 17, and will then be subjected to fire underwriter acceptance tests before being put into service.

The board discussed expiring terms of office which will occur soon on several governing boards. Among the seats which will need to be filled are five members of the town plan commission, one library board, and one board of zoning appeals.

The board discussed revisions to the contract with the Culver Military Academy which will incorporate the 15 percent increase in sewer user rates. The board said that while the revised contract may not be concluded and accepted before the January 1 effective date, the new rate will be retroactive to that date.

### LOCAL STUDENT IN HONORS WORK FOR UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA FRESHMEN

A Culver student at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N.C., is one of the 109 freshmen and sophomores participating in the honors program for academically-talented underclassmen.

Charles Myron Benner, of Culver, is among those in the freshman program.

Selection for the freshman honors program is made by the Faculty Council on Honors on the basis of college entrance examination scores, placement tests, secondary school records and evaluations by principals and

teachers.

Members of the program register for advanced sections of subjects in which their records indicate exceptional ability. Now in its ninth year, the freshman honors program, which was founded with the aid of a grant from the Carnegie Corporation, has attracted wide interest in university circles.

### Widows Eligible At Age 60 For Social Security

About 180,000 widows are eligible to get social security benefits sooner than before because of a recent change in the law. Mr. Charles E. Burke, social security district manager in South Bend, said today.

A widow whose husband was insured under social security can choose to start her monthly payments when she is 60. In the past, widows had to be at least 62 to get the payments, Mr. Burke continued.

A widow's monthly payment will be reduced if she decides to start benefits before she is 62. Under the new law, her benefit is reduced slightly for each month she is under 62 when she starts getting the payments.

On the average, a widow who accepts benefits before age 62 will collect about the same value in total benefits over the years, but in smaller installments to take account of the longer period during which she will be paid.

The decision to accept reduced payments can only be made by the widow. Mr. Burke said all widows who are 60 or 61 should get in touch with the social security office to get more information about reduced widow's benefits and other changes under the new law.

Widows who wish to receive benefits before age 62 should apply for them. If you can't come to the office now, call or write for a copy of Leaflet No. 5.

The social security district office is located at 335 N. Lafayette Blvd.

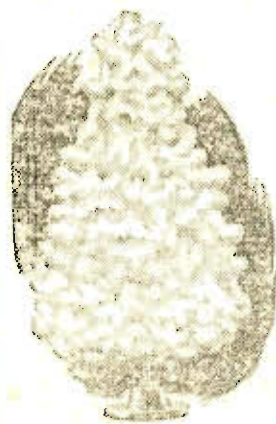


point margin in the third period.

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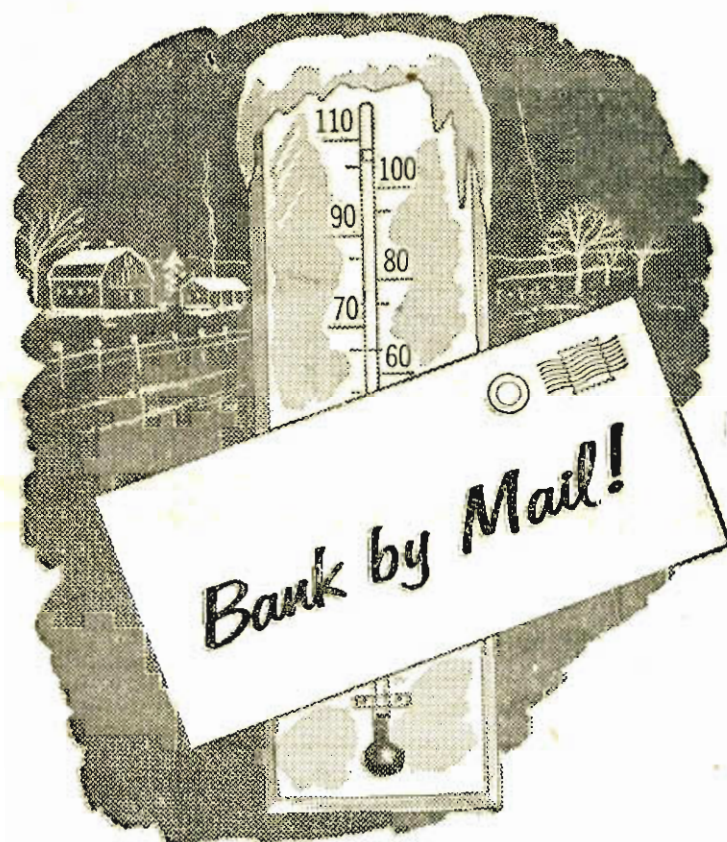
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## Contributions To Development Center

She also listed farm animals, non-metal airplanes, balls, play stoves, refrigerators and sinks. "We would like very much for someone to build us an airport about 26" by 48" and a farm about the same size," she added.

Other items that might be found at Christmas cleaning time are bulletin boards, children's records and books with children's poems.

People who are making out Christmas magazine gift subscriptions may want to include the Center, too. Mrs. Amond is hoping someone or some club will enroll the Center in the Dr. Seuss Reading Club which costs \$1.75 per month with postage.

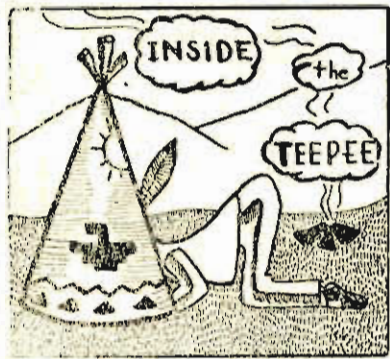

# GRADE SCHOOL NEWS

To Miss Page's second grade Steve Kresk brought a large hornets nest to put on display for science class.

Last month we had many birthdays in Mrs. Carter's third grade. Each birthday girl or boy treated the class with refreshments. We are now learning about four figure numbers in Arithmetic. In Science we are studying how the different food groups help us.

In Miss Henning's third grade class during health we are studying about the four food groups. We have divided the class into four committees and each committee is making a chart for their food group.

This week in Mrs. Keller's fourth grade class we are working on fractional numbers in our new math. We have made some fractional charts to help us understand them better. In Social Studies we are studying about the Navajo Indians of Arizona and New Mexico. We are making a desert scene in a box. We are learning to write letters in English. We wrote to Laura Morley and Margaret Massa, both former Culver students, after receiving letters from them. Twelve students stayed up during our spelling match over the first 12 weeks list.

The students in Mrs. Hartman's fourth grade have just finished studying about two desert regions in our world. They compared and contrasted the American Southwest desert area with the Sahara Desert in Africa. This work entailed studying the Navajo Indians who live in the American desert area. We have collected examples of farming equipment and have written reports on wheat farming.

During the Social Studies baseball game in Mr. Frettinger's fifth grade, the Yankees beat the Cubs 4 to 1. Sylvia Williams brought the skull of a cow to school last week. She is working on a report about skulls and cows. Some of the class have been looking at different specimens through our microscope during Science. We are planning to do more Science experiments this grading period. Diane Breitborth and Nancy Nicodemus have already conducted one about soybeans and corn.

All three sections of the sixth grade have had a spelling contest for the month of November. Mr. Harris's room won the contest. We studied sounds and recorded our voices on a tape recorder. Each student had to either read a poem, sing, or play an instrument. It was interesting to hear how different our voices and instruments sounded on tape.
