### Indians Beat Walkerton By Score Of 72-62

Friday night, Dec. 17, the Culver Indians beat the Walkerton Indians by a score of 72-62. This is the third win with four losses for Coach Crosley's squad and it is the fifth loss with three wins for the Walkerton team.

The shooting from the field was not especially good for either team. The Culver team hit 35 per cent, got 40 points and the Walkerton team hit 20 per cent and got 42 points. Neither percentage was high and there was only a two point difference in the field totals.

Free throws won the game for Culver. The homesquad took 43 free throw shots and made 22 of them, the highest total this season. Walkerton took 35 free throw shots and made only 20 of them. This 12 point advantage held by the Culver team gave them the victory.

Bruce Lindvall paced the Culver team by putting in 27 points. Bruce hit a fine 87 per cent of his free throw shots and thus added 13 points to the Culver total. Andy Lowry got 17 points and again did a fine job on the boards. Andy got a total of 13 rebounds, more than anyone else on either team.

Forward Dave Huff led the Walkerton team by scoring 22 points. He was followed by center Wally Johnson who put in 12 points.

The Culver B-team defeated the Walkerton B-team by a score of 46-37. Terry Gentry led the scoring with 13 points. Stu Lowry followed Terry in the scoring column with 9 points.

The next game will be with LaVale, there, on Jan. 7. The B-team game will start at 6:45 p.m. and the Varsity game will start at 8 p.m. Why don't you go see this fine game?

### Coin Collection Raided At CMA

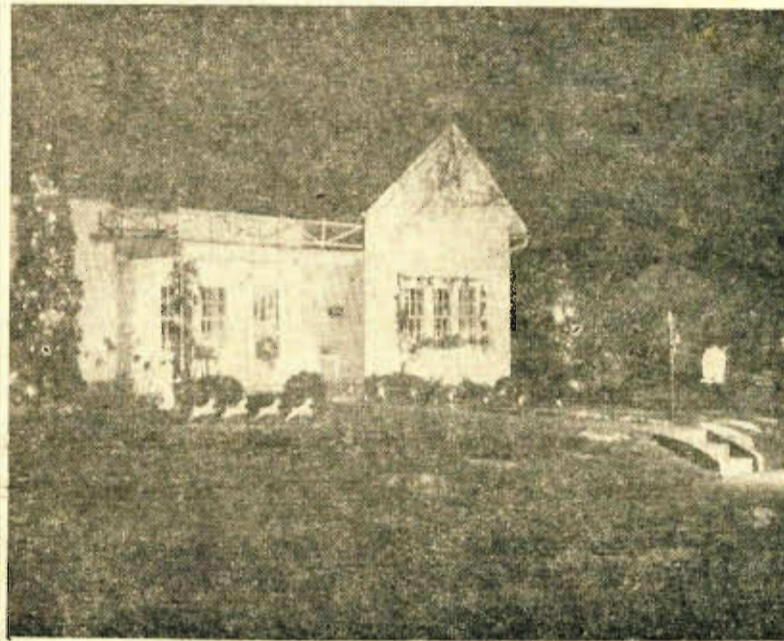
County and state police are investigating a break-in at Culver Military Academy where several coins were taken from an elaborate collection.

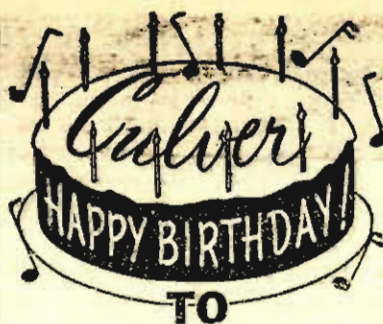

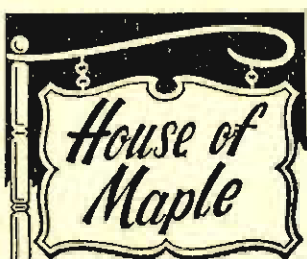

From here they sailed south to La Guaira, the port of Caracas, where a branch of the Andes rises directly out of the sea. A Cook's tour in Caracas gave them a quick look at this large metropolis, a city of contrasts.

From this corner of South America they headed westward to Curacao, a perfect transplant of a Dutch village. Curacao recalled pleasant memories for Frank, who stopped here in 1948 while heading an International Expedition to Australia.

Then on to St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands, and finally to San Juan, Puerto Rico before returning to New York.

The several prizes they won in the various contests held on board will serve as happy reminders. The snow, which greeted them the morning after their arrival home, was a complete change from the wonderful weather with eighty-degree temperatures they enjoyed on the trip, but they are gradually becoming acclimated to the local winter temperature.

### SOCIAL SECURITY

Q. My husband recently passed away. He worked under social security for many years. I am not yet age 60 but I heard I could draw a widow's benefit at that time. How much less benefit would I receive at age 60 than at 62?

A. You would receive a reduction of about 6 2/3 for each year

you took your benefits before reaching age 62. On the average a widow who accepts benefits before age 62 will collect about the same value in total benefits over the years but in smaller installments to take account of the longer period during which she will be paid.

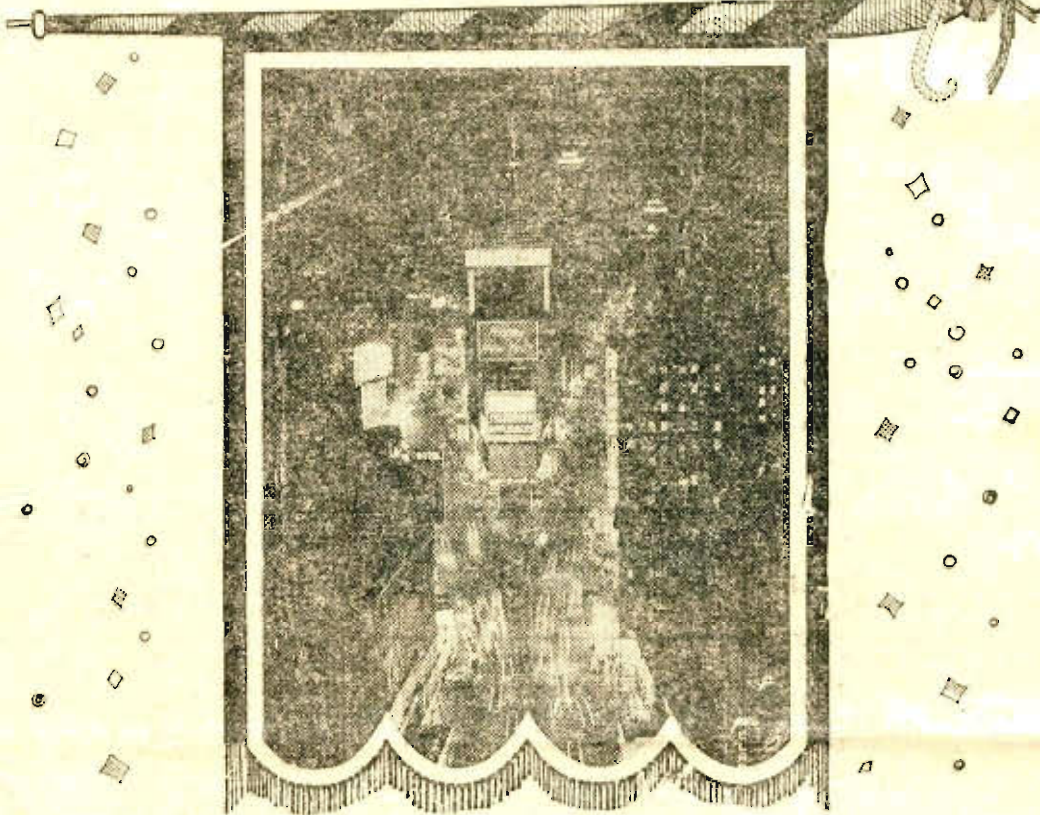
