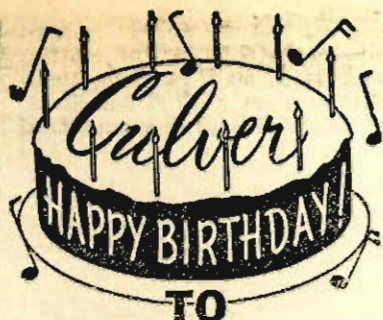
Do not forget Sunday School services each Sunday at 10 a.m. Attendance last Sunday was 53.

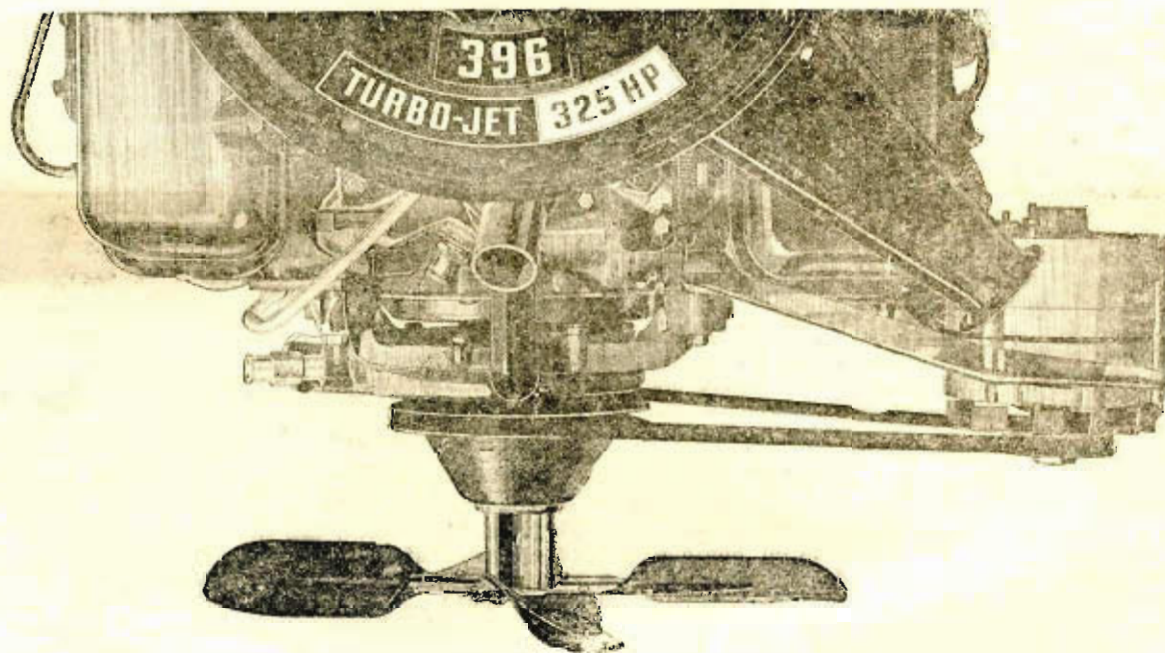

Art Contests To Be Sponsored By Indiana Federation Of Clubs

Rules for the 1966 Art contests sponsored by the Indiana Federation of Clubs for High School students and IFC Universal Club members have been set up by Mrs. A. W. Kirkman, Michigan City, 13th District president, and by Mrs. Earl R. Cloyd, Michigan City, district art chairman. Mrs. Jonathan Marshall, Bourbon, is county chairman of Art and Dimes for Art.

Adult workshop contest entrants will compete for cash awards in the following categories: oil, water color, charcoal, pastels, ink; ceramics and weaving. A contestant may submit two entries which must be original work completed within the last 12 months, and the contestant must be a member of an IFC Universal club.

The General Federation of Women's clubs presents its second outdoor advertising contest for IFC members only with a 1966 theme of "GROWTH of AMERICA." Oils, water colors and mixed media may be used. Minimum size, unframed, is 12" x 15"; maximum size, unframed, to be 24" x 32".

High School Rules

High school workshop contest rules are: student must be a junior or senior and shall have a recommendation from the art teacher and school principal to accompany contest entry. A portfolio of work with 3-5 examples (portfolio size not to exceed 16" x 20") will be submitted to the district contest. Work may be done in oil, water color, pastel, charcoal or pencil and must be original. Minimum size, unframed, 11" x 14"; maximum size, unframed, 14" x 20".

Oils should be simply framed; other media must be matted, with pastels sprayed with fixative. No glass permitted. Sculpture or ceramics may be entered. If size pro-

hibits easy handling of entry, photographs may be submitted. Awards are one week at Ball State Art Department workshop and participating in campus social activities for two students.

Hallmark's Art Talent Contest for students are the same as the IFC Student Workshop contest except that entrants must be graduating seniors in 1966. The theme is "HELP FREEDOM GROW"; entries must be in the hands of Mrs. Wilbur Taylor, 900 Lake Shore Drive, IFC chairman, by March 10, 1966, and prepaid. Only one entry per student.

Work entered in this contest may also be submitted for the IFC Student Workshop contest to be held in connection with the Adult contest on Sunday, April 17, Tinker's Dam, Karwick Rd., Michigan City. Entries must be taken to Tinker's Dam between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., when judging will be started. Entries must be picked up before 8 p.m. the same day. Judges will be nationally known artists.

Student contests sponsored by the Indiana Federation of Clubs are approved by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.
