## Discards Stacked On 'Terrace' Get Board's Attention

The use of the "terrace area" between the sidewalk and curb for stacking discarded equipment by business places drew the attention of the Town Board at its regularly scheduled meeting on Monday night.

The Board noted that it is empowered by ordinance to order the removal of this equipment and will so notify the offending parties. Also discussed was the parking of vehicles in terrace areas that obstruct use of the sidewalk, or hinder the view of motorists at intersections. The Board said this, too, would be taken up with the parties involved.

The Board discussed the availability of the Nelson Equipment Co. building on Lake Shore Drive for possible purchase to house the combined Fire Station, Police and Water Dept., and Council Chambers. An investigation is being made to determine the various means available of financing this type of purchase. The building will become available with the cessation of business by Nelson Equipment Co. on March 1.

Town Board President Ted Erwin said he was preparing specifications for the purchase of a new police car by the town, and these would be ready soon.

## Chamber of Commerce Elects New Officers

The Culver Chamber of Commerce, meeting at The Culver Inn on Monday, Jan. 17, elected officers for 1966. The new president of the organization is Dr. Joseph D. Howard. Vice-president for the coming year will be Dr. Frank Setzler, retired Smithsonian Institution archeologist. Peter Trone, Chamber secretary-treasurer for the last 10 years, was re-elected to that position.

Wilber Taylor, retiring president, conducted the election and reviewed his year in office. Among the highlights of 1965 were the annual new teacher dinner, which drew a record attendance, and new street decorations for the summer and Christmas seasons.

Doctor Howard, in outlining his goal for the new year, presented several points for the consideration of the membership. Among the most important were the need for greater cooperation among the various governmental and civic groups in the town, township, Academy, and lake areas; the desirability for continued promotion of Culver and Lake Maxinkuckee; and the necessity of having local business and professional people look beyond the community limits when thinking of their goals.

Consideration was given to changing the number of meetings and to adding a meeting during the summer months. Doctor Howard asked that the proposal be tabled until more thought could be given to the matter.

Dr. Setzler was appointed to be the Chamber's liaison with the Town Board, and Joe Anderlohr to the same position with the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The next meeting will be on Feb. 14.

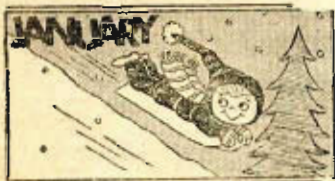

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# Musical Prodigy from Milwaukee Is National March of Dimes Child

Music hath charm for five-year-old Milwaukee miss, Lori Ann Wagner, National March of Dimes girl for 1966.

In fact, music charmed little Lori onto her feet when nothing else could. Her first steps were taken not toward her doting parents or a favorite cuddly toy. This youngster headed straight for the family piano. She was 2½ then and she's been tickling the ivory ever since.

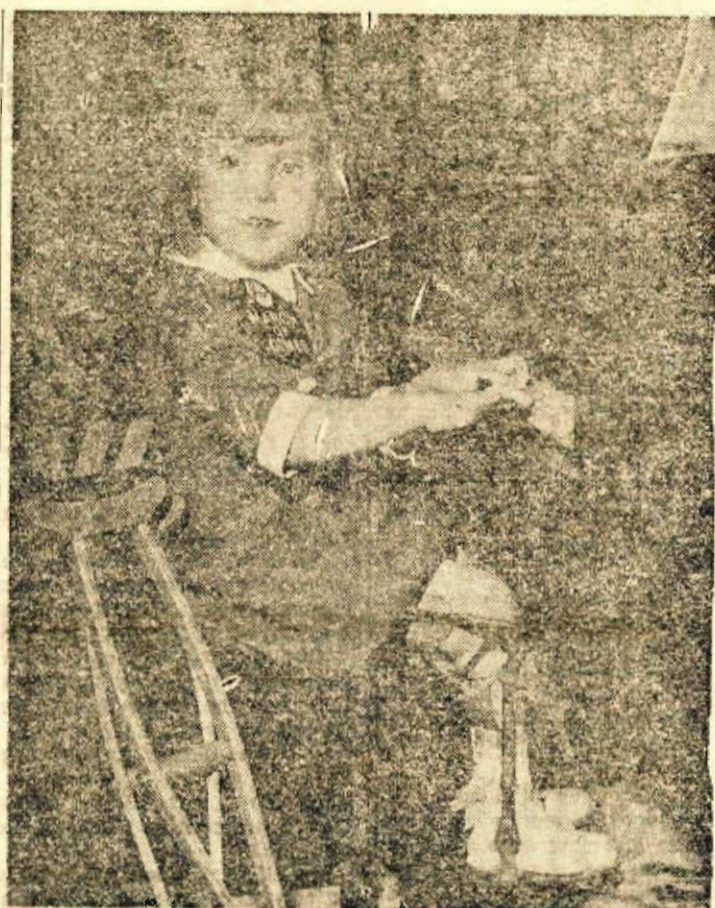
Granted, Lori's first steps were taken later than most children's—and at greater cost, because she was born with a crippling spinal defect that paralyzed her legs.

There's nothing, though, that handicaps Lori in the music department. This little lady has a great ear and can often pick out a tune after hearing it just once. She also knows all the words to numerous songs including "Hello, Dolly" and "Supercalifragilistic-expialidocious." Despite her leg braces, she can take to the dance floor for an uninhibited frug, monkey or swim.

Music and show business are in Lori's blood. Her father, Henry (Skip) Wagner, is a bandleader. He plays the trumpet and 10 other instruments. The basement of the Wagner home resembles a musical instrument shop. Anytime she wants to, Lori can tootle a trumpet, trombone, tuba or tenor saxophone; she can strum a guitar, mandolin, bass fiddle or banjo; she can beat out a rhythm on the drums, squeeze notes out of an accordion or warm up that grand piano which was her first love.

To complete Lori's theatrical genealogy, Skip's father was a vaudeville performer with a roller skating act. And two of Lori's aunts had a sister act as dancers. They still work together—operating a theatrical costume house, and both are active in March of Dimes special events.

Apart from the family tradition, Lori is something of a pro in her own right. As the Milwaukee County Poster Child for the March of Dimes last year, she was the star of the local campaign and made 12 television appearances. As the National March of Dimes Child for 1966, she might well call on the President at the White House, meet United States Senators and Congressmen, stage and screen personalities, and make public appearances all over the nation. None of it is likely to faze "super Lori."

Her parents, who will accompany her on a March of Dimes tour during January, are bracing themselves for all eventualities. Last year, when their strawberry-blond bombshell was introduced to the mayor of a large city, she was asked if she knew who he was. "Sure. He's the big shot," responded Lori as her parents smiled weakly at the mayor.

Another time after meeting a British woman, Lori noted that "She had an English accent."

When she was nine days old, Lori had corrective surgery for her birth defect. This could not prevent paralysis but it did protect her against infection. She was fitted with leg braces when she was 18 months old, but it was another

year before she could walk. It was then she headed for the piano. Doctors are hopeful that, in time, Lori may walk without the crutches and braces she now uses.

She has physical therapy exercises every day. Her mother, Mary Ellen, is trained by professionals to help out at home in every step of this important part of Lori's rehabilitation.

For the past two years, the Milwaukee County Chapter of the March of Dimes has helped finance Lori's medical care. One of their most zealous volunteers is Lori's mother, who heads the Mothers' March in her section of the city.

The Wagners have two younger children, both boys, who are healthy and very active.

## Academy Sports

For the first time in several seasons, Culver Military Academy's winter sports teams boasted winning records as Eagle basketball players, wrestlers, and swimmers finished a successful series of contests last week.

The basketball squad brought its record to 5-4, the wrestling squad won No. 7 against a lone defeat by South Bend Clay High School, and the swimmers also have lost only one engagement while winning four.

In competition this week, the basketball squad is host to Avilla for at 8 p.m. varsity game Friday night and then journeys to LaSalle for a Saturday night contest. The wrestling team is at home with Decatur at 2 p.m. Saturday while the swimming team is meeting South Bend Adams here at the same time. The Academy athletes will have the following week off for examinations.

Most active last week was the wrestling squad, which won three matches. Closest of the three was a 26-22 victory over tough Mishawaka. Coach Colin Stetson's grapplers followed up the next afternoon with a victory over South Bend Washington, and then on Saturday they walloped Merrillville, 42-5. The team is pointing for its own invitational wrestling meet here beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 29.

Coach Tom Baker's basketball squad, clawing its way to a winning record, got over the 500 mark Saturday night with a 78-57 victory over Tyner. The triumph was convincing but ragged, although the Eagle five had played only one other game—an outing against the alumni—in almost a month. ## Medicare

"Any person eligible for Medicare should not drop or cancel any private health insurance he now has simply because of the new Medicare law," Mr. Charles E. Burke, social security district manager in South Bend, cautioned recently.

"Health insurance for people 65 and over does not go into effect until July 1, 1966. Neither the hospital nor the medical insurance plan in this program will start before that date," Mr. Burke stressed.

He pointed out that premature cancellation of private insurance could leave a person without any health protection at all until the July 1, 1966, date. Only hospital and medical expenses incurred after that date will be covered under Medicare.

Mr. Burke added that those covered under the medical insurance plan will begin their \$3 monthly payments in July 1966, the same time their protection begins. Hospital insurance will cost nothing after a person retires.

The South Bend office will be open to the public each Thursday evening until 9:00 p.m. and each Saturday morning from 8:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. These extra hours have been arranged primarily for the convenience of the many people 65 years of age and older who would like to file for "Medicare" or get specific information

about other social security benefit programs, but cannot visit an office during the regular week-day hours because they are still working.

"For more information on Medicare, ask your social security office for leaflet number 2. If you have any questions, the district office personnel will be glad to answer them," Mr. Burke concluded.

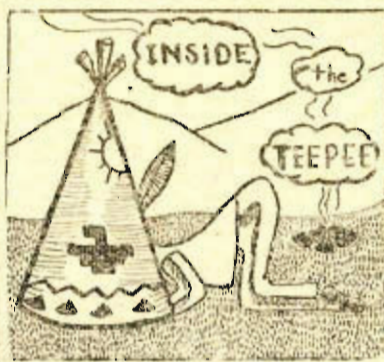

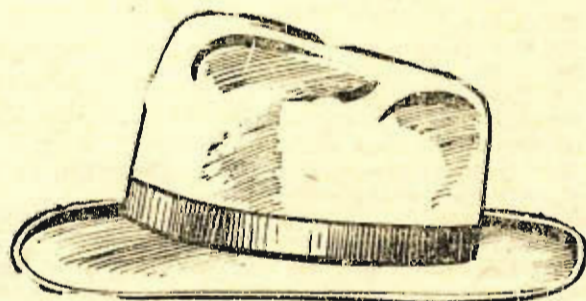
The Student Council has most of the Homecoming plans completed for this year's homecoming which will be held Jan. 29, at the Culver-Plymouth game.

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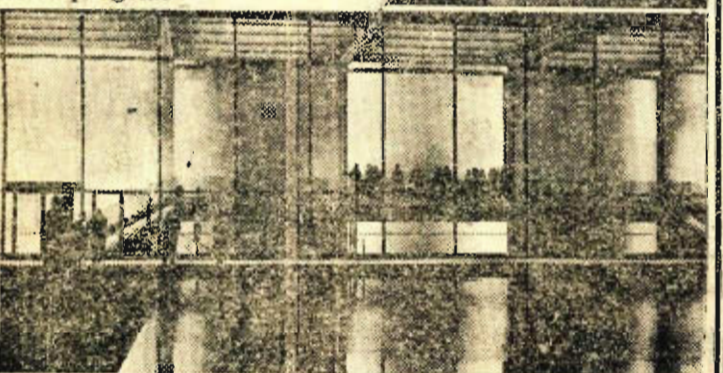

# Indians Open Session In Bi-County Meet

## Rolled Up 2 Wins Last Weekend

 Last weekend the Culver Indians beat the LaSalle Lions by 22 points and the Cass Kings by 17 points. This double-victory weekend puts the Indians above the 50 per cent mark with a record of six wins and five losses.

The Indians will play Wednesday night, Jan. 19, in the opening session of the Bi-County Tourney at the LaVille High School gym. **Indians Beat LaSalle**

The Culver team was able to win by out-rebounding the Lions and taking more shots than they took.

There was only a 2½ per cent difference in floor shot percentages, but a 20-point difference in total number of points received. Reason: the Indians took 22 more shots from the floor than the Lions took.

Rebounds were also crucial in this game. Culver brought down 52 rebounds compared to 18 for LaSalle. Center Andy Lowry got 18 rebounds and Bruce Lindvall got 19 rebounds to lead the Culver team.

Andy Lowry and Bruce Lindvall also headed the scoring column for Culver. Andy got 20 points and Bruce got 14 points. The Indians hit 40 per cent of their floor shots and 41 per cent of their foul shots.

Warnsley led the LaSalle team by getting 17 points.

**Indians Beat Cass**  
 Last Saturday night the Culver Indians beat the Cass Kings at the Bunker Hill Air Force Base by a score of 65-48. This is the tenth loss for the Kings with only three victories.

Again, the Indians were able to win by out-rebounding the opposition and getting more shots.

In this game the Indians were able to roll up a large margin by getting more foul shots than the Kings got. The Kings hit 75 per cent of their foul shots compared to 68 per cent for Culver, but the Indians got 34 shots while the Kings were taking only 16. The Indians were thus able to get an 11-point advantage.

The rebounds were again crucial. The Indians got 52 compared to 28 for the Kings. Andy Lowry

led the team by bringing down 23 rebounds.

The scoring for Culver was led by Bruce Lindvall and Andy Lowry who put in 19 points and 14 points, respectively. The Indians hit 33 per cent of their floor shots and 68 per cent of their foul shots.

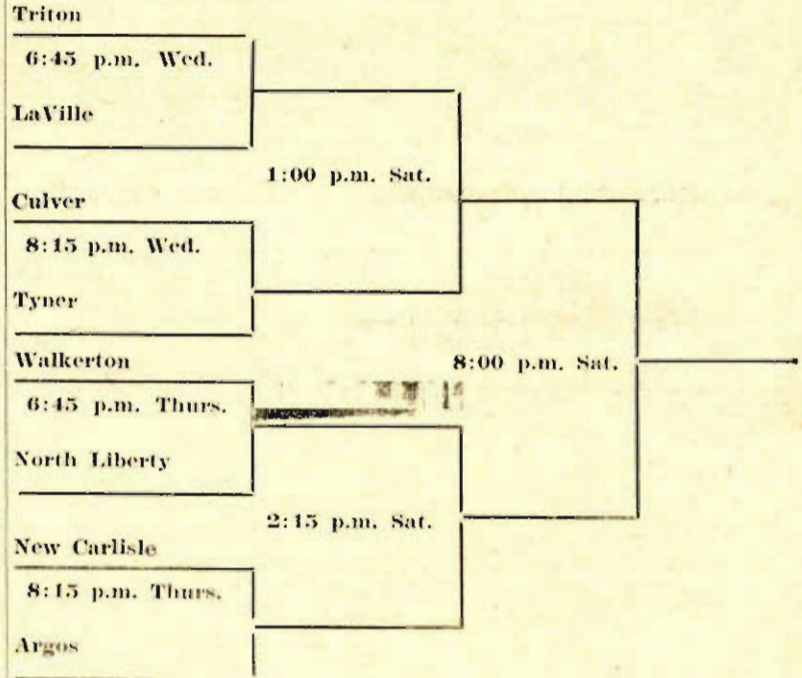

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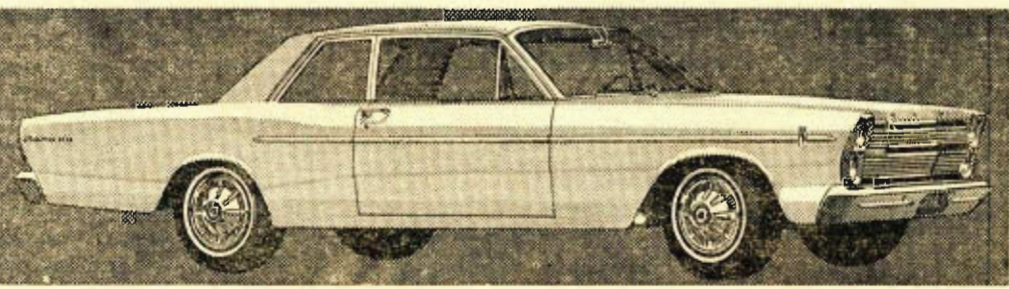


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
