## Folk Singers To Perform At Eppley Theatre Friday

The Robert De Cormier Folk Singers, which had their beginnings as the nationally known Belafonte Folk Singers several years ago, will appear in the Culver Military Academy Concert-Theater Series on Friday, Feb. 4.

Two performances are scheduled for the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium at 1 p.m. and at 8:15 p.m. The matinee is for 1,600 Marshall County Public school students who are participating in Culver's Program for Education in the Performing Arts. The De Cormier Singers is the second of four performances in the current series to be seen by Marshall County children, who attend the theater at Culver free of charge except for transportation in school busses.

Other PEPA matinees for Marshall County children are the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Feb. 16, and the American Jazz Septet, March 8.

The evening performance of the De Cormier Folk Singers will be seen by the Academy's student body, faculty, and the general public.

The Robert De Cormier Folk Singers made its bow in 1962 in New York City in a downtown showcase. The New York engagement was followed by a 50-city tour in the United States and Canada.

As a result of the resounding success of this initial tour, the group made a coast-to-coast tour in the United States and Canada last season. That tour was such an overwhelming success that the group was again booked for a sold-out tour this season.

The De Cormier Singers bears the stamp of the theatrical know-how and the musical good taste of its founder, Robert De Cormier. De Cormier gained nationwide fame through his work as conductor and arranger for Harry Belafonte, both for his personal appearances and his recordings. When the Belafonte Folk Singers was formed, De Cormier became its arranger and conductor and was largely responsible for the immense popularity enjoyed by this group.

For two seasons the Belafonte Folk Singers filled sold-out tours of 90 engagements across the continent. The formation of his own group is the natural outgrowth of his experience with the Belafonte Folk Singers.

As an arranger, De Cormier has been active in the theater and the concert hall, on radio and television and on recordings. Theatergoers will recall his choral arrangements for the Broadway productions of "The Happiest Girl in the World," starring Cyril Ritchard, and the long-run hit "Milk and Honey." Last season he was represented on Broadway by David Merrick's musical production "110 in the Shade." In the summer of 1962, De Cormier presented a series of ten half-hour television programs over the BBS in England.

In addition to his work with Harry Belafonte and the Belafonte Folk Singers, in the concert hall and on records, De Cormier provided memorable background music and choral arrangements for the recording of Charlton Heston's "Readings from the Five Books of Moses."

### CADETS SELECTED TO ATTEND CONFERENCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

David A. Bennington, Ukiah, Calif., and Maxwell K. Hearn, Tampa, Fla., will represent Culver Military Academy at the Government Leadership Conference for Indiana high school students. The conference will be held Feb. 5 at Indianapolis.

Bennington and Hearn were selected by the Academy's history department on the basis of academic excellence, leadership, and demonstrated interest in government. They will be accompanied by Alexander D. Nagy, an Academy instructor in American history.

Each Indiana high school has been invited to send two students and one teacher to the day-long session sponsored by Senator Birch Bayh (D-Ind.), and sanctioned by the Indiana Secondary School Principals Association. Bayh said the conference "is designed to encourage young Hoosiers to pursue careers in government."

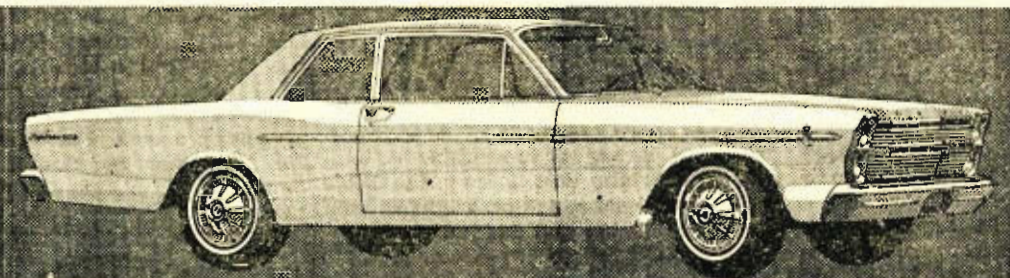

**NEW WINTER ELECTRIC PEAK SET BY NIPSCO**

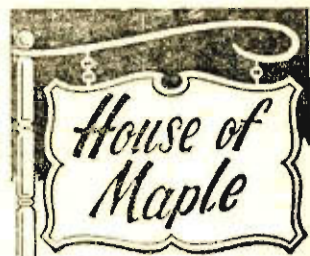

Morris pointed out the new peak was set when temperatures dipped to near zero across the utility's service area during a weekday when regular activities are scheduled.

"This, coupled with the normal industrial load, did it," he concluded.

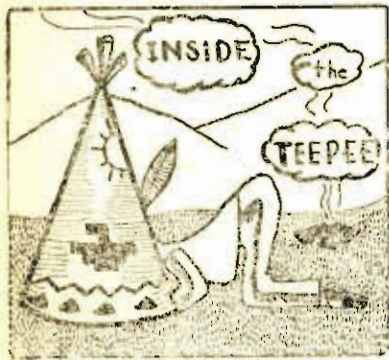

### Gas Distribution At Record Peak During Cold Spell

The greatest firm natural gas send-out in Northern Indiana Public Service Company history was recorded in the 24-hour period ending at 12 noon, Friday, Jan. 28, as temperatures dipped below the zero mark across NIPSCO's 12,000 square mile service area.

Gas distribution rose to approximately 762 million cubic feet for the three NIPSCO systems — Northwest, Fort Wayne and LaGrange.

Jerome M. Pickford, NIPSCO manager of gas operations, said the peak was met with flow gas from five regular pipeline suppliers and from gas stored in underground storage areas at Royal Center, Ind., and Herscher, Ill.

He pointed out the last such record — 678 million cubic feet — was set just 10 days earlier from a noon Monday to Tuesday period when temperatures averaged between 4 and 15 degrees above zero.

New system peaks recorded during the present cold snap were 645 million cubic feet for the Northwest system, 114 million for Fort Payne and 3 million for LaGrange.

Firms Raise Spending For Plants, Machinery To Fight Skill Shortage Automated Tools Help Stretch Manpower; New Factories Put Where the Men Are Added Stimulus for Economy By Charles B. Camp Staff Reporter of The Wall Street Journal

CLEVELAND — A good man nowadays is hard to find — especially if you're an employer. But lavish spending for new machinery can help get the most work possible out of the skilled men you have — and spending for new factories that are judiciously placed and attractive may even help you find new manpower.

New Plants, Too

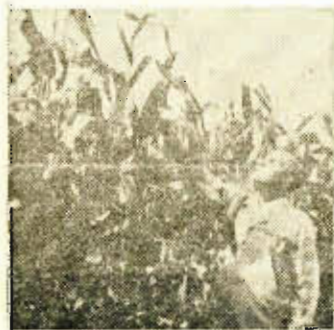
Labor shortages are even impelling some companies to build whole new plants. McGill Manufacturing Co., a Valparaiso, Ind., maker of anti-friction roller bearings, feels that it can't expand its work force any more in Valparaiso, says one official. "In the past three years two new steel mills have opened here, making the labor market highly competitive and cutting deeply into the supply."

Consequently, McGill is spending \$2 million to build a new plant in rural Culver, Ind., (population: 1,500) 50 miles away, and fill it with new machine tools. Culver is home for a number of skilled workers who now drive up to 160 miles a day, round trip, to jobs in such industrial centers as South Bend and Gary.
