Assessment Tax Forms Mailed To Union Residents

To Be Returned By May 15

Marshall County Assessor Thomas V. Langdon has stated that personal property assessment forms are being sent to owners of motor vehicles in the County (including Union Township) and it is hoped that all forms will be mailed out by the end of the month.

Because household goods are no longer being assessed, most taxpayers will not be visited by deputy assessors, but will receive forms through the mail. Deputy assessors would still visit income-producing properties, such as farms, and homes where building improvements have been made.

The forms being mailed contain a question concerning improvements. Langdon said that deputies would also use building permits issued the past year by Plymouth and the towns in the County as a crosscheck.

Langdon added that, with the loss of the household goods, there would probably be a drop in the assessed valuation, which in turn would mean a higher tax rate and a greater tax burden on owners of real estate.

The forms to be filled out contain information concerning motor vehicles received from registration slips from the County auto license branch. The owners must complete information as to the model and equipment of the car.

Information as to boats and equipment, airplanes, and dogs owned must also be given. There are also questions concerning improvements on real estate, ownership of property in other counties, ownership of intangible property, and payment of gross income taxes. Langdon pointed out that valuation of cars and boats will be set by Township assessing officials when the forms are returned.

The forms can be mailed to either Union Township Trustee Glenn Overmyer, Burr Oak, Ind. 46509, or Deputy Assessor Edgar Shaw, 426 College Ave., Culver, Ind. 46511. Persons wishing to know the valuations should include a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

The forms are due back by May 15. Failure to return them by then can mean a penalty of \$5 on property with a value less than \$1,000, and a penalty of \$10 on property valued at more than \$1,000.

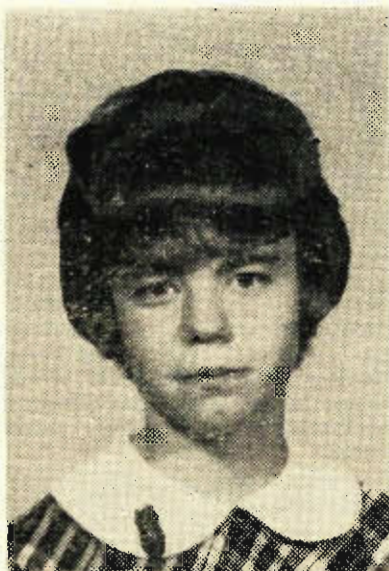
Funds for this annual event go to buy student awards for non-profit school organizations. They are also used to buy Senior Honor Sweaters.

School Safety Gets Attention At Board Meeting

The safety of school children crossing the streets in the Culver School area continued to get attention at Monday night's meeting of the Town Board.

The board read a letter from Robert Kyle of 440 School Street, which was critical of safety measures which have been in effect at the school, and urged prompt action to improve safety facilities before an accident or serious injury results.

Verlin Shaffer, who first pointed out the urgency of the safety problem at the March 10 Town Board meeting, reported that the School Board had designated a school employee to supervise the crossing at School Street, but at the first instance of inclement weather, the employee did not appear.

Town Board members restated their interest in cooperating with school officials to the extent necessary to assure the safety of the area, but said the matter is primarily within School Board jurisdiction.

In other business, the board voted to officially adopt the name "Academy Road" for the east-west street now known by that name, and extend the name to include all sections of the street between the Pennsylvania Railroad and State Street. The name will be properly recorded in the County Recorder's Office.

Firemen asked if space allocations had yet been made for the new Town Hall Building on Lake Shore Drive, and were told that this would be taken up soon with the various town departments and personnel involved.

Frank Setzler, who represents the Chamber of Commerce and Lake Maxinkuckee Assn., asked about the possibility of establishing a public boat pier adjacent to the swimming area at the Town Park. He was told that this would have to be properly budgeted, and funds allocated through Park funds for which no additional money was available this year.

The board announced that the Street Department Building at the corner of Plymouth and Jefferson Streets will be offered for sale soon and a legal advertisement offering the property is being prepared. The building will be vacated when the Street Department moves to the present Town Hall, and other town departments move to the new Lake Shore Drive property.

The board approved a new two-year contract with Bill Washburn to handle the concessions at the Culver Beach Lodge during the summer seasons.

New Projects, Civic Improvements On Chamber of Commerce '66 Agenda

Several new projects and a program of recommended civic improvements were discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Culver-Union Township Chamber of Commerce held last week at the Culver Inn.

Dr. Joseph D. Howard, newly elected president for 1966, stated the recommendations were the result of considerable study and surveys made by the various committees he had appointed. These suggested projects were outlined by Dr. Howard, and laid before the membership for consideration and action. Dr. Howard also stressed the importance of increased interest and membership in the Chamber on the part of all retail merchants, businesses and professional men. He pointed out the great value of the lake as an attraction to aid local business, and the urgent need for more aggressive civic interest in all activities for the betterment of the community.

New directional signs advertising Culver and Culver Military Academy, to be located at advantageous points on roads leading into Culver, were approved, provided suitable locations might be obtained. It was general feeling that existing State and County

Highway signs were inadequate and not efficient as to size or location.

Street improvements and resurfacing of some roadways came in for discussion and some strong recommendations. High on the priority list was the grading and hard-surfacing of the extension of Academy Road west from old Road 17. Also recommended was a more thorough study of drainage problems in that area, with these improvements to be put before the Town Board for consideration and action.

Also there was a strong feeling that the local school authorities should establish a well-organized school patrol system, for the protection of school-age children arriving at and departing from the school area. This recommendation will be brought to the attention of the proper school offi-

cials, with prompt action suggested.

Dr. Howard stated that several committees had been appointed to make further surveys and studies of possible civic improvements, and for the promotion of publicity for Culver and the lake community.

Mr. Harold Fritz, who is to be the local manager for the new McGill Manufacturing Company plant in Culver, was a guest and spoke briefly on that company's appraisal of Culver for the location of the new plant, and outlined their plans for the development of this new industry in Culver.

The next regular meeting of the Chamber will be a luncheon at the Culver Inn on Monday, April 11. Following a short business session, Colonel George Linnemeir, assistant to the Commandant at the Academy, will speak on his experiences in Viet Nam. Colonel Linnemeir spent over two years as a Marine Corps pilot in that battle area, as well as serving in the Intelligence Department as a liaison officer with the Vietnamese government.
