Dog Owners Must Secure Dog Tags By End Of Month

Union Township residents are reminded by Trustee Glenn Overmyer that dog tax is now due. Many residents have not paid the tax on their canine pets and this tax must be paid by the end of this month.

Tax for a male or spayed dog is \$1; for a female dog is \$3; and for two dogs is \$6. For more than two dogs it is cheaper for the owner to buy a kennel license.

Dog tags can be obtained from Union Township Trustee Glenn Overmyer, Burr Oak, Ind., 46509, or Deputy Assessor Edgar Shaw, 426 College Avenue, Culver, Ind. 46111. If money is mailed to cover dog tax fees, a return, self-addressed, stamped envelope must be enclosed.

Memorial Rites Monday At Culver Library

The annual Memorial Day observance will be held at 10 a.m. Monday, May 30, at the Memorial Stone on the Library lawn. The Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion are cooperating in making plans. Other organizations participating will include the V.F.W. Ladies Auxiliary, American Legion Ladies Auxiliary, Mothers of World War II, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Brownies. Music will be provided by the Culver High School Band under the direction of Harry Fouts.

Wreaths will be placed at the Memorial Stone by representatives of the various organizations and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag will be led by the Boy Scouts. Rev. Carl Baker, pastor of the Culver Methodist Church, will give the invocation and will also be the main speaker.

After the ceremony at the Memorial Stone, the parade to the cemetery will be led by the High School Band and services will be held at the grave of Ivan Walker. Rev. Baker will be the speaker and music will be by the Band. Transportation from the Cemetery will be provided by the Culver Military Academy.

Prior to Memorial Day, members of the V.F.W. and American Legion will cooperate in placing flags on all graves of veterans in cemeteries in Union Township.

Enroll For Reading Club At Culver Library

Enroll in the Summer Reading Club at the Culver Public Library during the first two weeks of June. This Summer Reading Club will run from June 1 to July 30 and will provide many pleasurable and beneficial hours for area children during the Summer months.

At the time of enrollment, each child will be given a booklet in which to write the books read. Each book entered in the booklet must be initialed by one of the parents or guardian as proof the child has read that particular book. This must be presented to the librarian at the time books are returned.

The librarian will then stamp the booklet signifying the child as having reported the books read.

For each book read, there will be one point given for the grade the child will be entering in the fall.

In the fall, after the opening of school, Tri Kappa will present a prize to the two rooms having the highest number of points. One prize for grades 2, 3 or 4 and a prize for grades 5, 6 or 7.

Any one book read may count as one point providing it is on the child's reading level and signed by the parent.

Parents may also help their children with the reading club by reading too. They may ask for and receive a booklet to enter all books read. They need not register as their child or children will be the registrars.

All books must be returned to the library the last week in July and absolutely no later, as this is the only way points will be counted.

One booklet will be given to each joiner and there will be no seconds. The highest number of points each person may contribute to their class is 12, not including the extra points from books read by their parents.

No count will be made of books put in the book-return unless they are reported in person.

There will be a Story Hour for children who will enter first grade this Fall. Meetings will be held in the Library Auditorium on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. during June and July.

Emma Overmyer, Age 87, Dies After Illness

Mrs. Emma Margaret Overmyer, 87, who lived nearly all her life in the Burr Oak community, died at 5 p.m. Friday, May 20, at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Willard Stokes, 801 W. Jefferson St., Mishawaka. She had been more seriously ill since April 11.

Mrs. Overmyer was born April 21, 1879, in Wyandotte County, Ohio, and lived in the Burr Oak and Culver vicinity all her life except the past eight years when she lived with her children. She was married to Charles Overmyer April 11, 1903. He died on Feb. 6, 1958. Her parents were Joseph and Bertha Kane VonEhr.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Lester (Margaret) Kimmel of Route 1, Culver, and Mrs. Willard (Mary) Stokes of Mishawaka; one son, Russell C. Overmyer of Culver; three grandchildren; one great-grandchild; and several nieces and nephews.

The Grossman Funeral Home in Argos was in charge of services there at 2 p.m. Monday, May 23, with Rev. Dwight McClure, pastor of the Burr Oak Evangelical United Brethren Church, officiating. Burial followed in the Burr Oak Cemetery.

Robert H. Blair Wins Silver Star

Capt. Robert H. Blair, son of Dr. and Mrs. Russell Blair, received the Silver Star for bravery in impressive military ceremonies recently at Tampa, Fla.

A third-generation Army officer, young Blair directed artillery fire and rescue operations after being seriously wounded in Viet Nam last year. He maintained radio contact with the main command post until collapsing from loss of blood.

Blair, 33, who wears the special services "green beret" also received the Vietnamese Cross for Gallantry with palm for valor for action which saved lives of many trapped Vietnamese. It was his second wound of the campaign.

He also holds the Purple Heart with oak leaf-cluster, the Bronze Star and the Air Medal.

His father is retired Army Maj. Russell Blair, holder of the Eppley Chair of Languages at Culver Military Academy.

The presentation took place at Al Lopez Field in Tampa prior to a night baseball game. General Paul D. Adams, Commander in Chief, U.S. Strike Command, decorated the young hero.

The citation, in part, read: "For gallantry in action while engaged in military operations against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. On 3 September 1965, Captain Blair served as the Senior Advisor to the 1st Battalion, 14th Regiment, 9th Infantry Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam which was on a search and destroy mission in the vicinity of Tra On, Republic of Vietnam. Upon arriving at the objective site, Captain Blair moved to a position well to the front of the friendly attacking force to be in an advantageous position to direct and control tactical air strikes in support of his unit's assault upon insurgent positions. Due to his exposed position, an intense hail of hostile small arms and automatic weapons fire was immediately directed at him. Despite a severe head wound sustained from this fire, Captain Blair, realizing that the success of his unit's mission was heavily dependent upon friendly air support, remained at his advanced position and continued to direct effective fire upon the Viet Cong. Although the severity of his wound, loss of blood, and effects of shock caused him to lapse periodically into unconsciousness, he refused all offers of evacuation and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, continued his mission with devastating accuracy upon the insurgents. When the seriousness of his physical condition became known to much of the friendly force, he was finally carried to an evacuation helicopter in a state of unconsciousness and returned to Vinh Long for medical treatment. Captain Blair's conspicuous gallantry in action was in keeping with the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

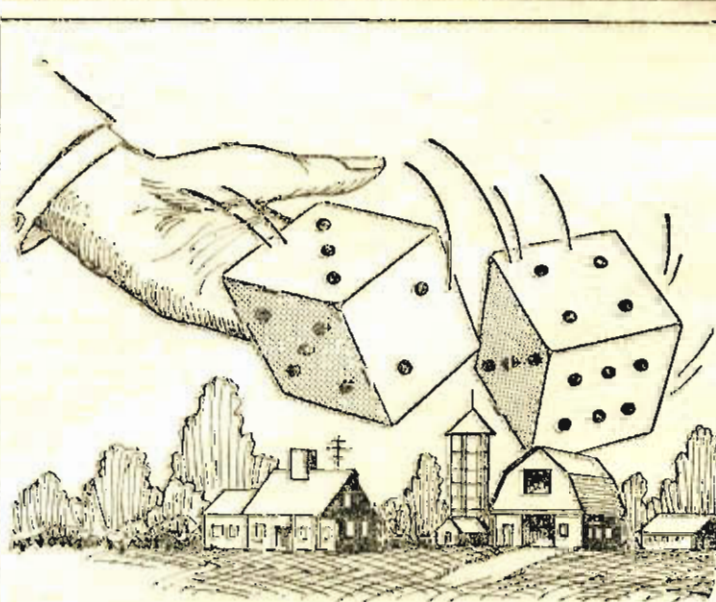

"This is civic service in its highest form," said Indiana's Lt. Gov. Robert L. Rock Saturday night as he commended Culver Jaycees for their instrumental role in bringing the first industry to Culver. Lt. Gov. Rock was keynote speaker at the Culver Jaycee welcoming dinner for the McGill Corporation at the Culver Inn.

The 12-man Culver Jaycee industrial committee, spearheaded by co-chairmen Ronald McKee and Donald Muchlhausen, along with president Roy Nicodemus, were responsible for attracting and signing the McGill Corporation of Valparaiso to Culver. The firm is a leading manufacturer of precision roller bearings and is presently building a \$2 million factory at Culver, planning for an eventual employment of 200 persons.

Lt. Gov. Rock told his audience of approximately 300 Marshall County residents that it takes a great deal of effort to bring a

new industry into the state or into an area.

"This bearing plant will have an important impact on Culver," said Lt. Gov. Rock. "McGill is a prestige firm known for its quality products. The factory will bring new money into the community and will provide for future employment."

The speaker pointed out that "Indiana is on the move and you people of Culver have recognized it. The State and the Department of Commerce will help this community in every way possible at any time. We're going to keep moving in Indiana."

The Lieutenant Governor also described briefly the activities of his Department of Commerce. He said, "Industry is probably on its highest pedestal today. We are in a real competitive 'war between the states' that we previously were not equipped to fight. We now have great opportunities in Indiana to move straight to the top."

The Department of Commerce, he said, now has the funds and tools to be of major assistance to communities of Indiana. He mentioned a \$2 million revolving fund available for improvement loans to municipalities. He said Indiana's first trade mission is now in Northern Europe. Lt. Gov. Rock said Indiana tourism is now being promoted, with the enthusiastic cooperation of Indiana businesses.

DRIED FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS
Flowers don't have to disappear with the fall frosts.
Purdue University extension horticulturists suggest picking your flowers now and preserving them for winter beauty. They have a publication which explains how to do this. It is "Dried Flower Arrangements," HO-73-2.
Several methods have been used for years. A new way is preserving through the use of silica-gel crystals, available at garden centers. This method is good for preserving delicate flowers such as roses and fall chrysanthemums. They will be dry in about a week.
The publication also suggests several uses for dried flowers, such as in combination with fresh flowers or with colored leaves.
Indiana residents can receive a free copy of "Dried Flower Arrangements," HO-73-2, by writing a postcard to the Agricultural Publications Office, AES Building, Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind., 47907, or contacting their county Extension office. Be sure to request the publication by name and number.

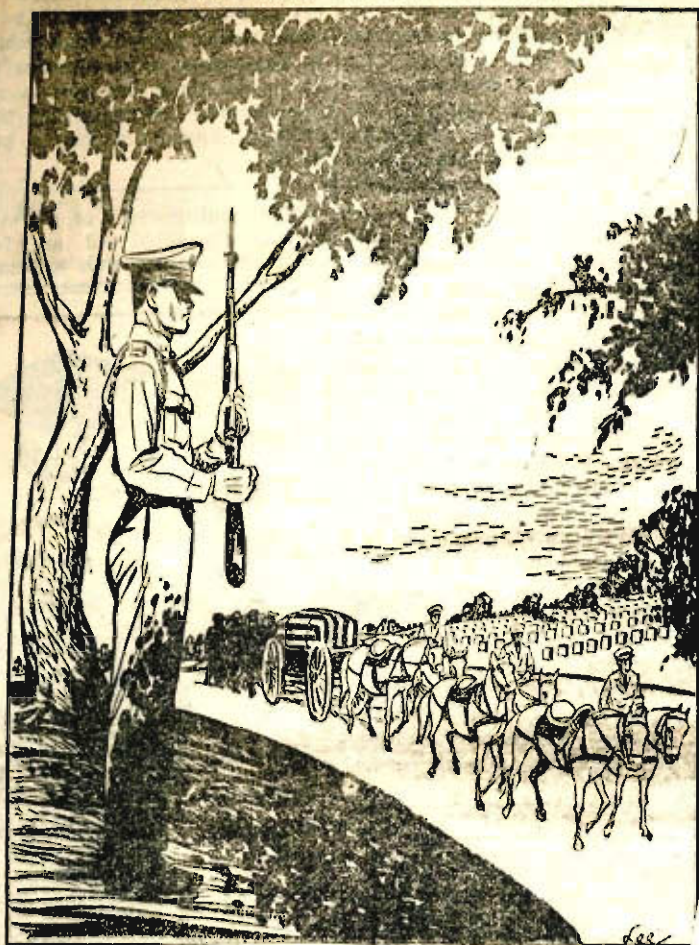

A DAY TO REMEMBER

The muffled dirge of a military band . . . the rhythmic cadence of marching men . . . the creaking, squeaking of the caisson . . . the nervous clatter of horses hooves all break the tense silence as the cortege slowly wends its way toward its final destination in the National Cemetery in Arlington.

The trees are beginning to weave their natural canopy of green over the Virginia landscape, the floral plants are in bloom, and in the distance one may see President Kennedy's resting place, the Lee Mansion, and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Slowly paced through the winding streets amid the thousands of small headstones nestled close to the turf and bordered by the trees about to flower into protective shade, the impressive procession passes. Suddenly it halts. The precision-like steps of the pallbearers are heard against a murmuring silence. And as they lead the mourners to the gravesight "Lead Kindly Light" is heard softly in the background. At the grave a man of God says a prayer. On a far hill—the sharp clicking of rifle bolts is heard—three sharp reports from the firing squad—and the poignant rendition of Taps is sounded. The pallbearers in meticulous precision remove the flag—and snap each fold into place. The commanding officer presents the flag to the next of kin.

This is but one day—in one place—but all over America on May 30th the nation pays tribute to the military dead.

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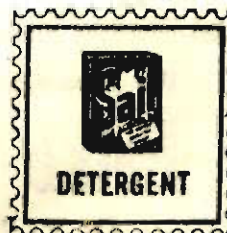

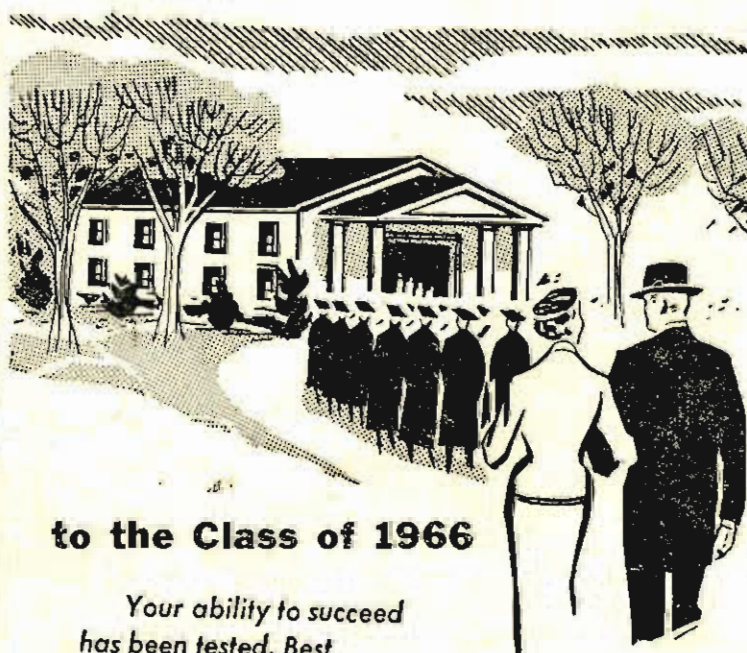
Grade School
