One hundred and ninety years ago, the Liberty bell rang out to proclaim the Declaration of Independence to the American colonists, marking an entirely new concept in the development of human prog-

The immortal words of Thomas Jefferson asserted that "all men are created equal" and "that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights . . . life, liberty and the pursuit of happi-

Just what does Independence Day mean to us today? Is it just another day off . . . a long weekend . . . a parade or fireworks dis-

The celebrating of Independence Day can be more deadly than the war it commemorates. For example, from 1900 to 1930 more Americans were killed (4,290) and more maimed (96,000) by fireworks than were killed in the eight-year Revolutionary War in which we lost 4,044 killed and 6,188 seriously wounded.

Public display accidents now account for one-third of all major injuries from fireworks. Accidents on the highways continue to take their everincreasing deathly toll, but the fatality rote in relation to the highway mileage is decreasing.

Let us take a prinute to pause and reflect on the basic precepts which are as true today as they were that memorable day in Philadelphia. Make this a safe and sane holiday, so we may live to enjoy the guarantees of freedom, and retain them in our minds, hearts and deeds.

Community Pays **Tribute To** Frank McLane

One hundred and fifty-seven people attended "Frank McLane Night," in the Lions Den Monday evening to honor Mr. McLane, retiring Superintendent of the Culver Community Schools, for his 42 years as a teacher and school administrator.

In the crowd of well-wishers were some of Mr. McLane's former classmates, many of his former students and people who had worked with him during his 10 years as County Superintendent of Schools.

Robert Osborn, master of ceremonies for the event, noted that McLane grew up in Culver and had spent his whole life in or concerned with Culver. 'It makes us doubly proud," he observed.

McLane was born in Culver in 1901, graduated from Culver High School in 1919, spent 27 years here as a faculty member and has served since Feb. 1, 1965, as superintendent of the Culver Community Schools.

Also honored at the banquet were McLane's wife of 41 years, Alice, and his son, Frank O. Mc-Lane along with his wife, Mari-

McLane noted that he had met his wife when they were high school students and she was the reason why he returned to Culver on weekends while in college at DePauw University. It was during one of these weekends "while working in a grocery store on Saturday so I could go back to school the rest of the week," that Union Township Trustee Glen Spapp asked him to begin teaching at Culver after graduation, he recalled.

Nine former tawnship trustees who had served on the County Board of Education while McLane was County Superintendent were recognized, from the audience.

"Culver Community Schools are off to a good start," McLane told the audience, "and I say thank you' from the bottom of my heart to the three townships involved."

"I hate to say it's time for that third strike, but a time comes to say you've had it. I will regret not being able to work with the people of Culver and Marshall

Men who had served on the Culver Community School Board while McLane was superintendent were also introduced from the audience. Speaking for the current board, president Woodce McGlothin, of Leiters Ford, said "in the very short time I have known this man, he has proven one of the finest I have known."

Rolla Pruett, director of pupil personnel and guidance services for the State Board of Education also spoke. He said that "Frank McLane has carved his niche in the greatest of all buildings, the building of Life. His niche is carved, and its quality is assured."

Edward Amond, past president of the Culver Alumni Association. presented McLane with a certificate of recognition from the Association for his 'outstanding contribution to the field of educa-

McLane was also presented a wrist watch by Mrs. E. D. Overmyer representing the group of citizens who organized "Frank McLane Night."

Among those introduced from their seats in the audience was Miss Edna Stahl, McLane's first grade teacher.

Fireworks Display At The Academy Fourth Of July

Annual Fourth of July fireworks will again attract an overflow crowd of more than 5,000 to the campus of Culver Military Academy at 9 p.m. Monday. The display is sponsored annually by the Academy and is open to the public. Culver's 100-piece Summer Naval School Band will begin a brief concert at 8:45 p.m. on the Riding Hall Terrace where the display may be seen.

Academy officials made a speciaf plea arging that no fireworks be brought on campus during the Fourth of July display.

"There has been a tendency in recent years for visitors to the campus to bring their own fireworks and set them off on Academy property during the Fourth of July display," an Academy spokesman said. "Last year, several large fireworks were set off in the vicinity of the crowd.

"The public is welcome to attend the display but the Academy must insist that no fireworks be brought on campus because of the danger to our students and the many guests-including small children--who will be here Monday night."

Culver Summer Schools Open June 29

Expect Record Enrollment

Culver Military Academy will hegin academic classes Wednesday. June 29, in its sixty-fifth and largest session of the Culver Summer Schools.

Expected to enroll are 1,794 hoys and girls from virtually every state in the country and many foreign countries who will take part in the largest academic-recreational program of its type in the nation.

Major Ceneral Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (ret.), superintendent of Culver, said carollment increases in each of the four divisions of the Summer Schools and in special day students, most of whom are taking academic work. Last year's record enrollment at Culver was 1,724 on opening day.

Largest of the four divisions is the Naval School, which will enroll 763 boys aged 14 through 18. Estimated enrollment for the Woodcraft Camp is 714 boys aged 9½ through 13. The Summer School of Horsemanship will have 154 boys in the 14-18 age hracket, and the Girls School, which is beginning its second year, has an enrollment of 109 in the 14-18 age bracket. There are 45 special day students and nine boys involved in an intensified canoeing program.

Of the total group of students, 102 are day students.

Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (ret.), who directs the Summer Schools, said there has been a waiting list in all four schools for several months. Admiral Bays beads a staff of 263 instructors and administrators, also the larg-

est in the history of the schools. Reflecting the increased tendency of U.S. students to utilize the summer months for continued academic work, Culver will offer credit and review work to more boys and girls this summer than ever before. John F. Edgell, who is director of studies in the three upper schools, said better than \$5 percent of the 1,081 in the Naval, Cavalry, and Girls schools will take some form of academic

work for credit and review. The Academy will offer credit and review work in English, languages, mathematics, and social studies, and introductory courses in science during the current eight-week session. Among the newly-expanded courses this summer will be additional opportunities in the theater arts under the direction of Patrick Henry, drama instructor from Chicago's Goodman Theater.

Along with the academic work being taken in the three upper schools, there is an increase in the number of younger boys who wiff take formal courses such as verbal skills, developmental reading and aquatic biology, in the Wooderaft Camp.

Registration for all four schools will continue through Wednesday, when credit classes begin. Opening day ceremonies will be held Monday, July 4, when General Spivey and Admiral Bays will address the student body. The 1966 summer session ends with Woodcraft graduation on Wednesday, Aug. 17, and with graduation in the upper schools on Saturday, Aug. 20.

The Culver band has scheduled its annual Moonlight Cruise, begun more than 20 years ago, for the weekend of July 20-21. The band will sail abourd the three-masted schooner Fowler and play for the Lake Maxiakuckee west side July 31 and the east side the next eve-

The music department also plans a full recital on Aug. 14. Sunday evening parades involve more than 1,600 boys and are held at 6:30 p.m. on the Riding Hall Terrace. They begin July 10 through Aug. 14, with a

commencement parade Aug. 19, the day before the summer session ends.

Religious services are held in Memorial Chapel at 11 a.m. each Sunday, and there are dramatic programs to be staged by members of the theater school on July 15 and 29, and Aug. 17,

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Naval School Seniors To **Have Sea Duty**

Seniors enrolled in Culver's Summer Naval School will get their first taste of "sea duty" July 18-19 when they join the crew of the U.S. Navy's USS Havre for cruises on Lake Michi-

Rear Admiral John W. Bays. USN (Ret.), who directs the Summer Schools, said the cruises aboard the USS Havre are a new phase of the Naval School program, which teaches Culver midshipmen such naval skills as navigation, communications, sailing, seamanship and others. As an honor Naval School for many years, Culver has a regular U.S. Navy detachment assigned here each summer for instructional purposes. The school is headed py Capt. Robert Bolton, USN (ret.), a veteran of 33 years in the Navy during which he held many important command posts.

Approximately 180 seniors will go aboard the USS Havre at Michigan City during the two days. The group will be divided into 90 boys each day, and the USS Havre will leave Michigan City at 9 a.m. with a scheduled return at 5 p.m. The patrol cruft escort will steam along the Chicago shoreline during the morning and then head out into Lake Michigan for the return trip.

Admiral Bays said that through the cooperation of Lt. Donald G. Jefferson, captain of the USS Havre, Culver midehipmen will take part in many phases of the ship's operation as supplemental instruction to their courses at Culver. They will be assigned to regular ship's company for instruction in such phases as gun positions, engine room, the bridge, combat information center, and deck detail.

The USS Havre is one of several Navy ships that operate during much of the year in the Great Lakes, Like the others, the Havre is used as a training vessel for Navai Reservists. The 850-ton vessel has modern surface, underwater, and air detection gear and cruises at about 13 knots. Commissioned in 1944, the Havre acted as pilot vessel at the entrance to Tokyo Bay after the surrender of the Japanese. She has been based at Michigan City since 1962.

The Naval School is the largest of four divisions of the Culver Summer Schools, operated by Culver Military Academy during July and August. This summer, 1,775 hoys and girls - a record enrollment - are engaged in a full program of academic and recreational activity. The schools are the largest of their type in the nation.

Famous Sportsmen To Lecture At CMA Summer Session

Professional football player Mike Daka, All American swimmer Ted Stickles, and former track world record-holder Fred Wilt are among a series of famous sports personalities who will be visiting lecturers at the summer session of Culver Military Academy during July and August.

Each of the sports personalities will give lectures in their particular field of athletics along with providing demonstrations and movies. The athletes will appear before various segments of the 1,775 students attending the current sixty-fifth session of the Culver Summer Schools.

Stickles, the Indiana University world record-holder, is one of two well known sports figures who will serve full-time on the Culver staff this summer. Stickles will teach Scuba-diving but is also expected to assist in the swimming program. The other nationally known member of the Culver athletic staff is Kalman Blaho, coach of the American canoe

Ditka, the All-National Football League tight end from the Chicago Bears, will lecture here Friday, July 8th. He will bring a Bears' film and also demonstrate various football tactics.

On Saturday, July 9, track stars Fred Wilt and Gil Dodds will stage a track clinic. Wilt is now an FBI agent in Lafayette. Ind., but he remains active in track as an official and an editor of a track publication. As a special feature of the track clinic, a manufacturer will provide 200 boys with thermaglass poles for training in pole-vaulting.

George King, the Purdue University basketball coach, will lecture here Aug. 13 and also show films of the Big 10.

Among others expected to appear at Culver this summer is Pete Rademacher, former Olym-pic boxing champi vho was beaten in an attempt at the world's heavyweight championship. An archery clinic will be given in July and the Academy staff is also planning a lecture on professional hockey.

Authorized and supported by the U.S. Office of Education under the Higher Education Act of 1965, the fellowship program will begin Sept. 12 and continue through Aug. 12, 1967. Prof. J. N. Hook, U. of I. department of English, is director and Roger K. Applebee is associate director.

In general, course work will be of a substantive nature and will include current offerings of the department of English and College of Education. However, all fellows will enroll in special sections where practicable for certain common courses having direct applicability to the position of high school department chairman.

Upon successful completion of the program, an approved eightunit sequence, fellows will be awarded an advanced certificate attesting to their academic qualifications to assume positions as secondary department chairmen.

At least six units of graduate course work will be selected from among the following areas: the English language, English and





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
