Sesquicentennial Day At Academy Set For August 6

Special ceremonies in observance of the Indiana Sesquicentennial are among a series of musical, religious, and military events which will be open to the public during the summer session of Culver Military Academy.

Indiana Sesquicentennial Day at Culver is Saturday, Aug. 6, when the Culver Summer Schools will stage a pageant depicting various aspects of the state's history. An art exhibition from the Hooster Salon will also be on display during that time.

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, USAF (ret.), superintendent, said that Culver will open the sesquicentennial pageant to the general public as well as summer band concerts, church services, and Sunday evening parades. General Spivey said that as the program is formulated, additional music programs and theater events will be announced.

Col. Edward Payson, director of the Culver band, will lead 100 student musicians in 4 p.m. Sunday concerts in the air-conditioned Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium on July 30, 17, and 24, and Aug. 7 and 15. The Culver band has scheduled its annual Moonlight Cruise, begun more than 20 years ago, for the weekend of July 30-31. The band will sail aboard the three-masted schooner Fowler and play for the Lake Maxinkuckee west side July 31 and the east side the next evening.

The music department also plans a full recital on Aug. 14.

Sunday evening parades involve more than 1,600 boys and are held at 8:30 p.m. on the Riding Hall Terrace. They begin July 10 through Aug. 14, with a commencement parade Aug. 19, the day before the summer session ends.

Religious services are held in Memorial Chapel at 11 a.m. each Sunday, and there are dramatic programs to be staged by members of the theater school on July 15 and 29, and Aug. 17.

Woodcraft Camp Indian ceremonies begin in the Council Ring on July 16 and will be held at 8 p.m. on July 23 and 30, and Aug. 15.

These events will involve the 1,794 boys and girls who are enrolled in the sixty-fifth session of the Culver Summer Schools.

SAVINGS BONDS REPORT

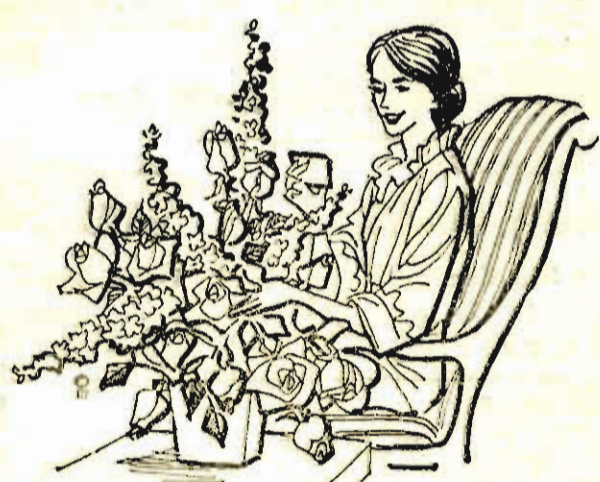

Naval School Seniors To Have Sea Duty

Seniors enrolled in Culver's Summer Naval School will get their first taste of "sea duty" July 18-19 when they join the crew of the U.S. Navy's USS Havre for cruises on Lake Michigan.

Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (Ret.), who directs the Summer Schools, said the cruises aboard the USS Havre are a new phase of the Naval School program, which teaches Culver midshipmen such naval skills as navigation, communications, sailing, seamanship and others. As an honor Naval School for many years, Culver has a regular U.S. Navy detachment assigned here each summer for instructional purposes. The school is headed by Capt. Robert Bolton, USN (ret.), a veteran of 33 years in the Navy during which he held many important command posts.

Approximately 180 seniors will go aboard the USS Havre at Michigan City during the two days. The group will be divided into 90 boys each day, and the USS Havre will leave Michigan City at 9 a.m. with a scheduled return at 5 p.m. The patrol craft escort will steam along the Chicago shoreline during the morning and then head out into Lake Michigan for the return trip.

Admiral Bays said that through the cooperation of Lt. Donald G. Jefferson, captain of the USS Havre, Culver midshipmen will take part in many phases of the ship's operation as supplemental instruction to their courses at Culver. They will be assigned to regular ship's company for instruction in such phases as gun positions, engine room, the bridge, combat information center, and deck detail.

The USS Havre is one of several Navy ships that operate during much of the year in the Great Lakes. Like the others, the Havre is used as a training vessel for Naval Reservists. The 850-ton vessel has modern surface, underwater, and air detection gear and cruises at about 13 knots. Commissioned in 1944, the Havre acted as pilot vessel at the entrance to Tokyo Bay after the surrender of the Japanese. She has been based at Michigan City since 1962.

The Naval School is the largest of four divisions of the Culver Summer Schools, operated by Culver Military Academy during July and August. This summer, 1,775 boys and girls — a record enrollment — are engaged in a full program of academic and recreational activity. The schools are the largest of their type in the nation.

Famous Sportsmen To Lecture At CMA Summer Session

Professional football player Mike Ditka, All American swimmer Ted Stickles, and former track world record-holder Fred Wilt are among a series of famous sports personalities who will be visiting lecturers at the summer session of Culver Military Academy during July and August.

Each of the sports personalities will give lectures in their particular field of athletics along with providing demonstrations and movies. The athletes will appear before various segments of the 1,775 students attending the current sixty-fifth session of the Culver Summer Schools.

Stickles, the Indiana University world record-holder, is one of two well known sports figures who will serve full-time on the Culver staff this summer. Stickles will teach Scuba-diving but is also expected to assist in the swimming program. The other nationally known member of the Culver athletic staff is Kalman Blaho, coach of the American canoe teams.

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Charles E. Bayless Awarded Fellowship

Seventeen experienced high school English teachers from throughout the United States have been awarded fellowships for one year of graduate study on the University of Illinois campus at Urbana, Ill., to prepare them for positions as department chairmen.

Among them is Charles E. Bayless of Culver Military Academy.

Authorized and supported by the U.S. Office of Education under the Higher Education Act of 1965, the fellowship program will begin Sept. 12 and continue through Aug. 12, 1967. Prof. J. N. Hook, U. of I. department of English, is director and Roger K. Applebee is associate director.

In general, course work will be of a substantive nature and will include current offerings of the department of English and College of Education. However, all fellows will enroll in special sections where practicable for certain common courses having direct applicability to the position of high school department chairman.

Upon successful completion of the program, an approved eight-unit sequence, fellows will be awarded an advanced certificate attesting to their academic qualifications to assume positions as secondary department chairmen.

At least six units of graduate course work will be selected from among the following areas: the English language, English and

American literature, rhetoric and composition, measurement and evaluation, the teaching of reading, history and philosophy of education, and educational psychology.

Fellows will receive a tax-free stipend of \$4,000 for the academic year, with an additional allowance of \$500 for each dependent up to four. The summer stipend will be \$800 plus a dependency allowance of from \$100 to \$400. Tuition and fees also will be waived.

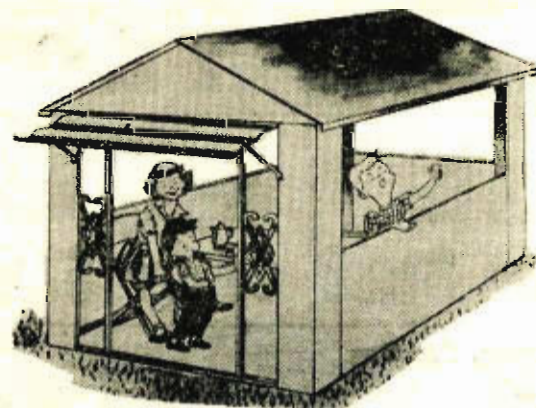
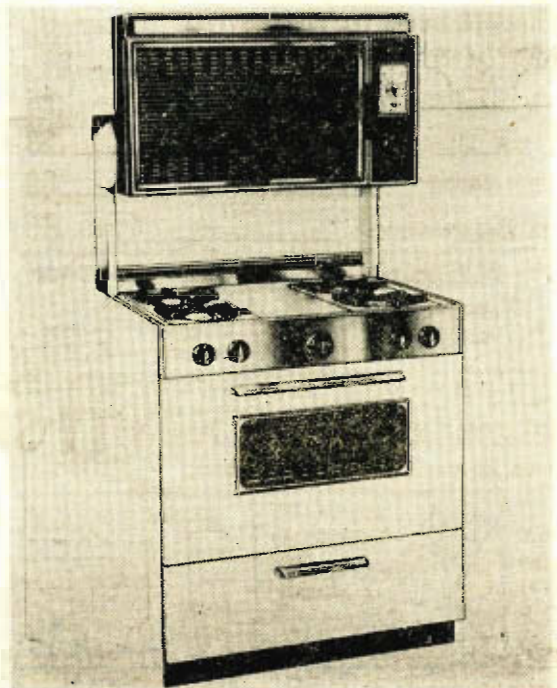
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Culver Indians Lose 3 Straight In Baseball

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
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
