Adult Classes At Culver School To Start In January

Preliminary surveys indicate sufficient interest to tentatively program five courses in planning for the Adult Evening Classes. Rex Good, director of the 1967 Adult Education for the three-township Culver Community School district, announced this week.

Spanish, Modern Math, Art, Typing and Sewing will be offered. Registration with payment of the tuition fee of \$12 for the 12-hour course is to be made before Dec. 30. Forms for registration with an announcement detailing the courses were distributed this week and copies are available at the school offices for those who wish copies.

Typing and Math classes are set to begin Monday evening, Jan. 9 continuing once a week through April 3. Art and Spanish classes are scheduled for Tuesday evenings beginning Jan. 10. There has been set for each of these classes from 7 to 8 p.m. CST.

The Sewing Class will be scheduled for one and one-half hour sessions beginning at 7 p.m., February 7 and continuing through April 1.

Mrs. Diana Barnabas, graduate of the University of Havana will teach Spanish; Mrs. Barbara Winters, beginning and intermediate Sewing Class instructor is a graduate of Purdue University and Valparaiso University.

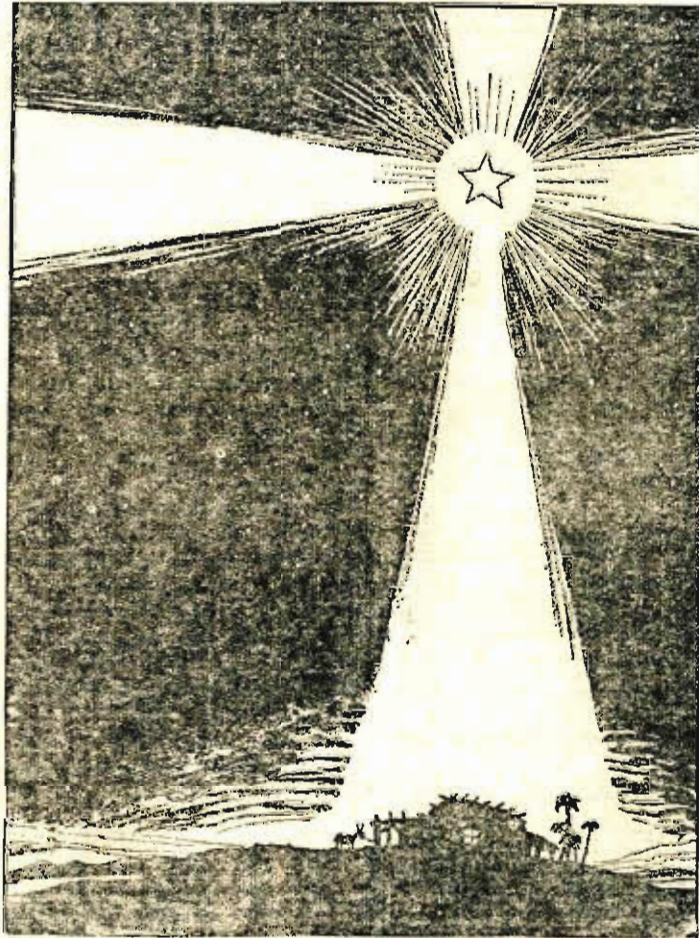

Hear Bids For New Culver Community School Building

The directors of the Holding Corporation of the Culver Community Schools heard the following bids for the new school building at a well-attended meeting Tuesday evening, Dec. 20, in the Community Building:

Easterday Construction Company of Culver gave a base bid of \$1,998,960, the total bid for the three phases of construction mechanical, general, and electrical.

The Van Kepple Construction of Demotte, Ind., submitted a bid of \$1,100,000 for the general contract.

D. E. Willsey Construction of Indianapolis gave a general contract bid of \$1,163,177.

Burton Plumbing and Heating of Rochester submitted a base mechanical bid of \$470.00.

Hatfield Electric of Indianapolis gave a bid of \$247,277 for the electrical phase.

Price Electric of Logansport bid \$260,300 for the electrical portion of the building.

A bid of \$228,950 for the electrical work was submitted by Hyre Electric of Highland, Ind.

Two Indianapolis firms bid on the total energy phase: Mac Allister Machinery bid \$82,459 and

Cummins Diesel, \$69,154.

Kitchen phase received the following bids: G. B. Alkman, Indianapolis, \$58,200; Hillman's Equipment, Fort Wayne, \$51,998; National China, Marion, \$58,635; Rhoads Equipment, Fort Wayne, \$57,300; and Mastercraft Company, Bellevue, Ky., \$51,123.

No decisions were reached, but after careful examination and full understanding of the bids, it is hoped to make acceptances late next week.

F. A. Twomey, Father Of Mrs. Helber, Dies

F. A. Twomey, age 80, father of Mrs. Wallace Helber of Culver, died suddenly on Wednesday, Dec. 14, at Ironton, Mo., where he had lived for the past three years.

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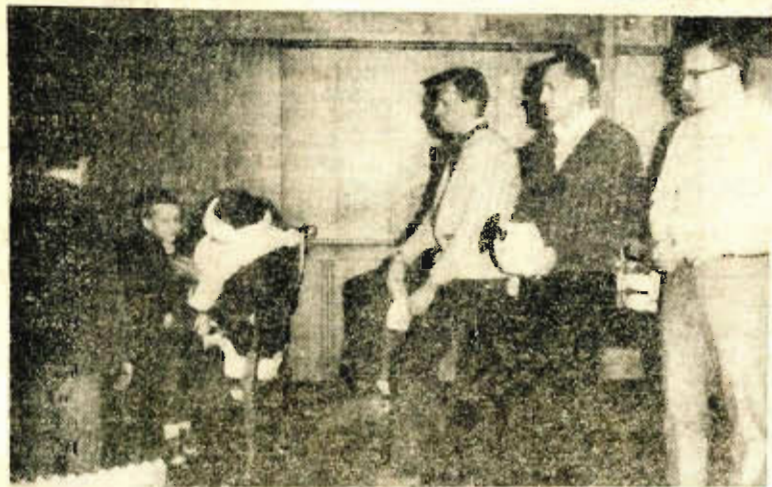
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Santa Claus Returns To Culver

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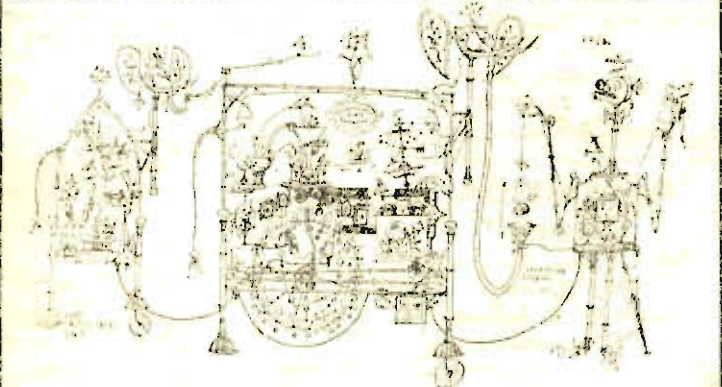

The Nickel Plate R.R.

Recently while visiting Culver, and vicinity, I was in Argos one day and saw a freight train of one hundred and thirty-six cars traveling west toward Chicago, and I was somewhat thrilled as I counted those cars just as I was thrilled when I counted those cars as a lad when I lived one mile west of Burr Oak, beside the railroad track. Since 1881 there has been a Nickel Plate railroad with track from Buffalo, to Chicago, and it was disturbing to me when I heard there was not to be a Nickel Plate railroad, but was going to be turned into Norfolk and Western, and I saw evidence of the change when I saw that freight train pass through Argos, for while there were three diesel engines pulling that freight a good old Nickel Plate engine was in the lead, with two Norfolk and Western engines trailing. There is some question as to how the name Nickel Plate came about, but some how it was deducted from the capital letters of the real railroad name, New York, Chicago and St. Louis railroad. Not long after the road was built the Vanderbilts purchased it and it is said Wm. Vanderbilt said, "Judging from the price we paid for this line, it ought to be Nickel plated."

To me it was bad enough when passenger service was discontinued on Mothers Day 1965, let alone changing the name. It is tough to be so sentimental. One other thing I want to say about the Nickel Plate railroad. When it was being built in 1881 my grandfather, the late William Overmyer, had a 160-acre farm one half mile west of Burr Oak. Most everyone was giving their right-of-way to the com-

pany, but my grandfather was not about to give those millionaires anything and they built track on both sides of his land, but grandfather was adamant, and they never joined the track until they paid grandfather for the right-of-way.

If anyone wants to refute the above statements, speak up.

Social Security

The first of the year is the time many people choose to fill out their applications for retirement according to Mr. Charles E. Burke, District Manager of the South Bend Social Security Office. Persons planning to retire in January or February of 1967 can save time and avoid crowded conditions by visiting their social security office yet this year. Contacting your social security office no more than three months before the month of retirement is a sure way to assure that your first check will arrive promptly, said Mr. Burke.

The possibility of repeated visits can be eliminated when the

necessary documents are brought along at the time of the first visit. All persons applying for payments should bring along their social security cards and those of the wife and children under age 18, or children under age 22 who are still attending school full time. Proof of age for the retiring worker and members of his family are usually required. A copy of last year's tax return for the social security office to keep is needed from those in business for themselves. Employees should have available the amount of their last year's earnings, as well as an estimate of earnings to date this year. All dates regarding birth, marriage, death, adoption, divorce or disability should be available if needed by the social security representative. It is far better to bring a document that is not needed than to need a document that was not brought to the office, advises Mr. Burke.

Mr. Burke cautions that benefits can be lost when persons delay contacting their social security office because they do not have the required material. Any doubts or questions can be resolved by calling the social se-

curity office, 234-4001, or stopping in at 125 S. Lafayette Blvd. The office is open Thursday evenings until 9 p.m. for those who are still working.

1275 residents over 72 years of age living in St. Joseph, Marshall and Fulton Counties have already signed up for the special social security benefits of \$35 a month.

According to Mr. Charles E. Burke, District Manager of the South Bend Social Security District Office, these are individuals over 72 who are not eligible for regular social security benefits and are not eligible for any other government pension.

Many of those who filed their application for these benefits and were eligible for payment in October have already received their checks. There are still some residents that have not filled their applications, said Mr. Burke, and these people cannot be paid until they do file. Mr. Burke further stated, that these special benefits for 72 year olds are not retroactive, and those who do not file by their 72nd birthday month will lose money. They can file as early as 3 months before their 72nd

birthday month.

Mr. Burke added that almost every citizen or permanent resident, over 72 who does not receive public assistance or a pension from the Federal, State or local government should apply.

The always powerful Midwest, led by Notre Dame and Michigan State, placed 10 players on the 1966 All-American football team selected by the American Football Coaches Association. Twenty-five players, including 13 on offense and 12 on defense, were chosen for places on the classic team in recognition of their outstanding play during the 1966 collegiate football season. Four Notre Dame standouts were picked along with three from Michigan State.

Teams from the Southeast placed seven players on the 77th annual team, which is the successor to the first All-America squad chosen by Coach Walter Camp of Yale in 1889.

Sponsored by the Eastman Kodak Company, the team includes four players from Far West teams, three from the Southwest and one from the East.

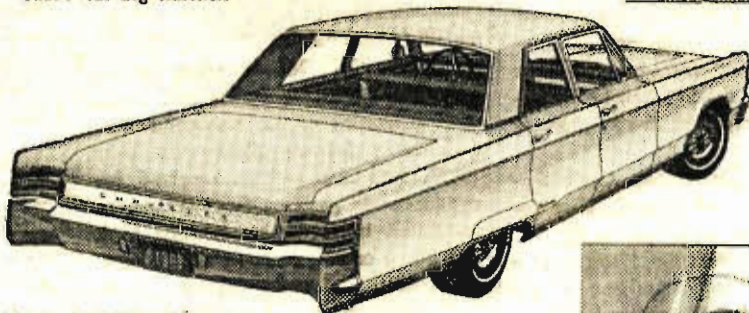

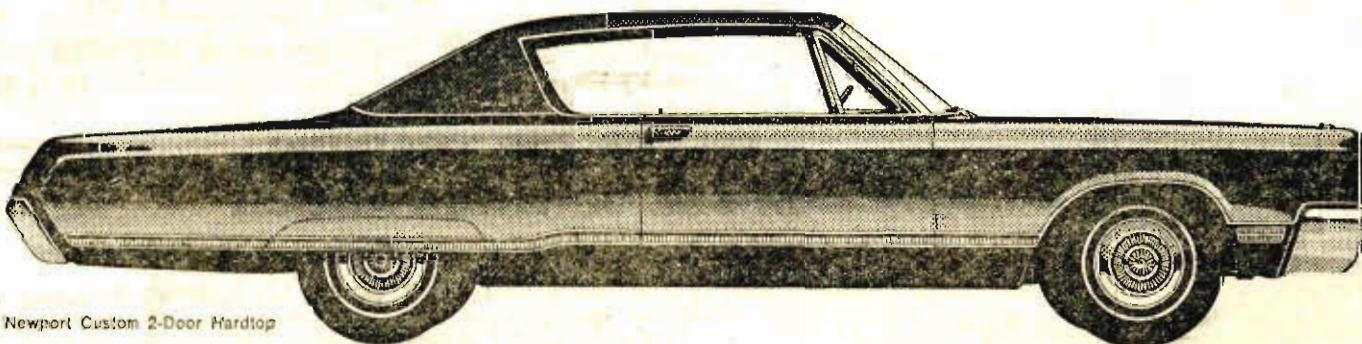

Social Security

During their working years, men and women who work in jobs covered by social security are building credit towards possible benefits when they reach retirement age according to Charles E. Burke, District Manager of the South Bend Social Security Office.

In order to qualify for a retirement benefit, a worker must have credit for a certain number of quarters of coverage. The number of quarters required is determined by when the worker reached retirement age.

A worker's benefit amount is based upon an average of earnings credited to his account. The amount also depends upon whether a worker claims his benefits at a reduced rate as early as age 62, or whether he waits until he is 65 to start receiving payments.

Mr. Burke said that the social security office has a leaflet which explains the amount of work required for a worker to become eligible for retirement benefits. This leaflet gives step by step instructions for estimating the amount of the retirement benefit.

Mr. Burke pointed out that this leaflet also explains family bene-

fits which are payable as well as the maximum amount which can be paid on a worker's account.

Hungry Mice Helped 'Create' 'Silent Night'

Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from a recent issue of "The Indianapolis Star," and is very timely for this Yuletide Season.

Vienna — Every Christmas, millions of Christians in all parts of the world gather together, around the Christmas tree, in churches, or simply in groups to sing a simple Austrian song with a haunting melody — "Silent Night, Holy Night. . ."

Not many of those who sing this Christmas song each year know that if it hadn't been for hungry mice, the music and words would never have been written.

Franz Gruber, who composed the melody, was born in Salzburg where his father was a member of the archbishop's bodyguard and his mother a seamstress.

At an early age, Franz decided that he would become a schoolmaster, and began to take music lessons. For in those days, as indeed it still is today in Austria for teachers in country districts, a schoolmaster was required to play at least one instrument and know the rudiments of composition.

At the age of 22, Gruber was appointed as the schoolmaster at Oberndorf, a small hamlet on the Austro-Bavarian border.

It was here that he met and became friends with Joseph Mohr, the parish priest who was to write the immortal verses.

It was customary to hold a special Christmas service in the church on Christmas Eve, including an organ recital.

The day before, on Dec. 23, 1818, Gruber who, because of his musical attainments, was also the church organist, entered the church to practice his organ recital.

To his horror, the bellows did not work. When he examined them, he discovered that hungry mice had gnawed several large holes in the leather bellows. It was out of the question to repair them in time for the annual Christmas Eve recital. Gruber immediately rushed off to consult his friend, the village priest.

The priest had an idea. It so happened that he had just finished writing a few verses on a Christmas theme and perhaps Gruber could set them to music for a vocal performance.

Gruber dashed off to his lodgings and began to compose. Finally, toward dawn, Gruber finished scoring the melody. He went around and awakened the priest who was delighted with the result. The two sat down after

breakfast and sang the verses to the melody composed by Gruber. That evening, with the schoolmaster accompanying the congregation on his guitar, the villagers of Oberndorf sang "Silent Night, Holy Night. . ." for the first time.

It might well have been the last time, too, because the organ bellows were repaired and the customary organ recitals were resumed.

The score and verses were placed inside the organ cover and were soon forgotten.

A few years later a Tyrolean organ mender came to Oberndorf to make some necessary repairs.

In those days, the Ziller Valley where the Tyrolean organ mender had his home was famous for its glovemakers. Every summer, the glovemakers used to travel all over Europe selling their wares. In order to attract customers at their booths set up at local fairs, they used to sing Austrian songs.

While repairing the Oberndorf organ, the organ mender came across the music and verses of "Silent Night." He liked them so he took them with him back to Tyrol.

That summer, the glovemakers of the Ziller Valley included the Christmas song in their repertoire. At the Leipzig Fair the

duke of Leipzig heard and liked the song so much that he invited the glovemakers to come and sing it at his court.

The song was immediately a success, and soon the song was being sung at all the courts of central Europe.

Since then, the charming little melody and verses written by the village schoolmaster and the parish priest have been sung each Christmas all over the world.

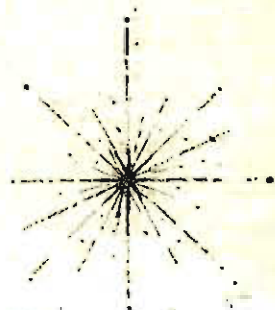

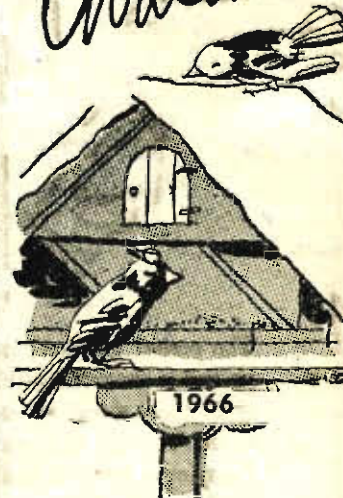

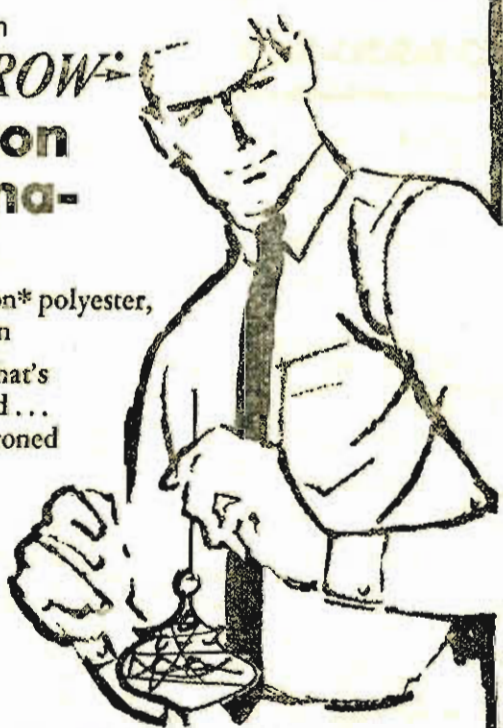

Man's Best Friend Can Make Enemies

A dog's bark can be worse than his bite. No dog owner outside of the comic strips allows his pet to fray the mailman's trousers—but your neighbors' nerves can be torn to shreds by constant howling, yapping, whining or moaning for long hours when you are away. Even the best of dogs, the most loyal as well as the most lovable, can breed ill will between his owner and others if the dog is not trained to avoid this bad dog-habit.

Curing a dog of howling and disturbing the peace, suggests the Purina Pet Care Center, is simple. But it does take a little patience.

After taking your dog for its morning exercise, lead him into a room and shut the door. Leave him alone. If he begins to bark, enter immediately and make him stop immediately. Your presence usually will be enough to silence the dog. After all, he is making noise because he wants to remain at your side. If you must enter the room more than once, however, it may be necessary to assert your mastery. A few little slaps under the chin will suffice. Remember, your purpose is not to punish your pet but to train him.

When your dog has remained alone and quiet for about an hour, open the door and let him come to you. Praise him. Play with him for a few minutes. Re-assure him of your love—and then put him back in the room.

When he's come through another session of good behavior, let him join you again for a while. Repeat this procedure throughout the day. By evening, your dog will have learned that, to be a member of your family, he must be quiet when he is left alone. He'll love you as much as ever. And so will your neighbors.
