C.M.A. Airport To Be Closed Permanently

Culver Military Academy will close its airport permanently, effective Jan. 4.

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, superintendent, said the close proximity of the new airport at Plymouth, 14 miles from Culver, and the need for additional campus area are factors leading to the decision to close down the Academy's grass air strip.

"The new airport at Plymouth has surfaced runways, lights, and ground to air communications, and offers those who normally use our airport a superior and convenient facility," General Spivey said. "The Plymouth Airport is better equipped to handle larger, faster airplanes and it also permits greater flexibility with a 24-hour operation."

General Spivey added the Academy will make use of the land formerly used for the airstrip in the expansion of its campus activities. He said definite plans are not yet formulated for the use of this area after Jan. 4.

The Academy's airport has been designated as a private field by the Federal Aviation Agency since last fall, and the FAA has been notified of the decision to shut down the field.

The Academy airstrip is located east of the main campus just off State Road 10 and near the Woodcraft Camp and golf course. Flight pattern for the east-west runway is over the Academy-owned golf course.

Sesquicentennial Office To Stay Open To June 30

The Indiana Sesquicentennial has announced that although its official events have been completed as of the 11th of this month, (December) its office located in Room 101 of the State Office Building, will remain open until June 30 of 1967 to wrap up some of the programs established for the Sesquicentennial.

The Sesquicentennial History-mobile, which has been touring the state this year, will continue through June of 1967, upon approval. One of the last projects to be handled mainly through the Historical Society and State Library, will be the final judging of historical material collected for the Manuscript Project - May 1, 1967 through June 1, 1967.

Mr. J. M. Gurthrie, presently Assistant Director of the Commission, will assume the position of Director and will have an office staff of two. The Commission, itself, will be in existence until June 30 and will hold one to two meetings during that period.

Indians Storm To Second Victory, Beat Argos 70-59

The Culver Indians stormed to their second victory, Wednesday, Dec. 21, defeating Argos 70-59.

The Indians started out slowly in the first quarter and had to spurt late in the quarter to get within five points of the hot shooting Dragons. The tribe hit only 5 for 16 from the floor causing the Indians most of their slack.

In the second period the tribe caught fire and quickly caught the slumping Dragons. It was nip and tuck for most of the rest of the quarter but the tribe pulled away to a three point lead in the waning minutes.

In the third stanza the tribe really got hot hitting 10 for 15 from the field. Ed Wieringa, who came off the bench late in the first period, led the tribe, hitting three straight from the hardwood.

The fourth quarter proved to be the Dragons' downfall. The tribe played keepaway the whole fourth stanza, causing the Dragons to make many unnecessary fouls. The tribe could have really stomped the Dragons if it wasn't for missed freethrows.

The tribe did one of the best jobs on defense this year against the Argos quintet. The Indians hit 27 for 61 (44.3%) from the floor while the Dragons hit only 20 for 67 (29.9%). Frederick E. Rakestraw, Indiana Supreme Court Justice and former Fulton Circuit Court judge, will become a partner effective Jan. 1 in the Chipman & Chipman law firm of Plymouth. It was announced recently.

A distinguished judge, Rakestraw was appointed to the Supreme Court by Gov. Roger Branigin in January, 1966, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Judge Frederick Landis. A Democrat, Rakestraw was defeated in the November election when Republicans swept the entire state ticket.

Ernest W. Carter Dies At Age 82 After Illness

Ernest W. Carter, 82, 442 Lake Street, Culver, died at 4:35 Sunday, Dec. 25, at the Knox Nursing Home, Knox, Ind., where he had been a patient for the past seven months. In failing health for several years, he was stricken with a stroke on May 12, 1966.

Mr. Carter was born on Aug. 7, 1884, at Bismarck, Ill., to John and Emma (Williams) Carter. During the first World War, he worked at the Henry Ford plant, in Detroit, Mich. He was a tool and die maker, by trade, and before retiring in 1933, he also worked for the Hostess Cake Co., in Kalamazoo, Mich. He came to Culver in 1935, where he has since resided. He was an active citizen, serving as president of the Culver Town Board from 1940 through 1943. In recent years, he was Building Commissioner for the Culver Planning Board. He served on many civic committees, and was an active politician. He was a member of the Church of Christ of Alvin, Ill., a member of the Henry H. Culver Lodge No. 617, F & A M, the Emily Jane Culver Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, the South Bend Scottish Rite, and the Scottish Rite Club of Marshall County.

On Dec. 25, 1942, he was married to Mrs. Margaret Bernhard Smith, at Hibbard, Ind. She survives with one brother, Homer Carter, Alvin, Ill. Also surviving are one step-daughter, Mrs. Eileen Gross, Culver, and six step-grandchildren. Several nieces and nephews also survive. Two brothers, Claud, of Kalamazoo, Mich., and Clarence, of Albuquerque, N.M., and one sister, Inez, of Alvin, Ill., preceded him in death.

Services were held at 2:00 p.m., (C.S.T.), on Wednesday, Dec. 28, at the Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home, where memorial services were conducted by the Emily Jane Culver Chapter, O.E.S., and the Henry H. Culver Lodge No. 617 F&AM, on Tuesday evening, Dec. 27.

Rev. A. E. Givens, pastor of the Culver Evangelical United Brethren Church, assisted by Rev. Joseph Hancy, pastor of the Hibbard Evangelical United Brethren Church, officiated at the services. Burial was made in the Culver Masonic Cemetery.

PRODUCTION REPORT

A new annual herd production average for milk and butterfat has been announced for the Registered Holstein herd owned by John A. Newman & Sons, Culver.

As reported by Holstein-Friesian Association of America, the herd has completed its latest testing year with an official per-cow average of 16,090 pounds of milk and 601 pounds of butterfat, based on 81 completed lactations.

Purdue University supervised the weighing and production testing procedures in cooperation with this breed improvement program of the Holstein organization.

The results of participation in official production testing are useful to herd owners in measuring breeding progress, analyzing herd management and the development of outstanding cow families.

This herd's performance level compares favorably to the average U. S. cow's annual output of 7,880 pounds of milk and 285 pounds of butterfat. Production averages are calculated on the commonly employed, two milkings per day, 305-day, mature equivalent basis to provide a comparison standard.
