State Exchange and Farmers State Bank Resources Exceed \$50 Million

For the first time in history total resources of The State Exchange Bank and Farmers State Bank, LaPaz, now exceed \$50,000,000.00, it was reported today by W. O. Osborn, President of both institutions.

Total resources of The State Exchange Bank as of December 31, 1966, were \$38,358,504.42, and of the Farmers State Bank, LaPaz, were \$11,806,353.55.

Deposits of The State Exchange Bank increased from \$32,988,092.00, to \$35,213,247.00, during 1966, with loans increasing from \$18,647,942.00, to \$22,295,148.00. Farmers State Bank deposits increased during the same period from \$10,618,566.00, to \$11,119,698.00, and loans from \$4,454,895.00, to \$5,015,333.00.

Mr. Osborn reported that the State Exchange Finance Company, an affiliate of The State Exchange Bank, now shows total resources of \$12,138,969.00, as compared with totals of one year ago of \$11,011,490.00.

Town Trustees To Consider Water System Updating

On Monday, Jan. 16, at a regular meeting, the Culver Board of Trustees will give final consideration to a proposed \$300,000 water system improvement program.

The program would include a larger water storage tank, larger mains in certain areas, an iron removal system, and a new well.

D. H. Lessig Engineers, Inc., of Warsaw, Ind., have completed preliminary studies of the program based on the recommendations of the Indiana Rating Bureau in 1964. These recommendations were part of a report setting out the necessary improvements for the Town to maintain its insurance rating.

The recent announcement that home owners' insurance will cost 20 percent more this year points up the importance of maintaining a favorable insurance rating.

Water usage in 1966 nearly doubled that of 1965. The proposed improvements would be designed to allow further Town expansion and new industry without further expansion of the basic water facilities, to correct low water pressure in problem areas, to improve the quality of the water by providing for iron removal, and to help qualify the Town for a more favorable insurance rating.

Training Course Offered For Civil Defense Volunteers

Civil defense volunteers from Marshall County are invited to attend a special training course in fallout shelter management, to be conducted in Warsaw beginning Jan. 18 and continuing for six weeks.

The class will meet at 7 p.m. in Warsaw's Lake City Bank, East Center Street, and will be held each Wednesday evening through Feb. 22. It is being financed by a grant from the Office of Civil Defense.

Open to all interested people, the course is being sponsored by the Indiana Department of Civil Defense and the Indiana University Extension Division. Denny Kruck, special lecturer for the I.U. Extension Division, will be instructor.

The shelter management course is being offered to train individuals in the techniques and skills required to manage a shelter under stress situations. Special consideration will be given to the psychological, and physiological problems of shelter living.

Individuals who successfully complete the course will be qualified to manage public fallout shelters.

The Warsaw short course is designed for volunteers from Kosciusko, Marshall, Fulton, Wabash, Whitley, Elkhart, and Noble counties.

M-S Development Center Fund Drive Goal Is Exceeded

With the help of eight Culver contributors, the Century Club drive of the Marshall-Starke Development Center exceeded its goal and raised \$13,416.50.

The drive for one hundred donors also sparked interest in smaller contributions amounting to \$2167.97.

The grand total of the three-month drive, \$15,584.47, assures the continuing operation of the school for retarded children in Marshall and Starke Counties.

Culver names on the final list of Century Club donors include the Jaycees and Eagles which both contributed \$100.

Ten Culver men — Paul Patterson, Jerry Widner, Ronald Kisser, Richard Basham, William Heck, Larry Norman, John Iam, Gary Flora, Earl Clark and H. R. LaPlace — gave \$100 of their "coffee fund" to the Development Center.

One of the largest donations to the drive came from Culver chapter of Tri Kappa which presented a check for \$500.

Other Culver names on the \$100 donor list are the Maxinkuckee Junior Women's Federation, the W.S.C.S. of the Methodist Church and the Lions Club.

Culver residents who belong to the Marshall County Home Demonstration Clubs, the Marshall County Medical Society, the Marshall County REMC, the Marshall County Farm Bureau or the Marshall County Horse Association and Sheriff's Posse contributed through these groups.

The State Exchange Banks of Culver, Argos and Plymouth also made a \$100 donation.

Culver Military Academy not only made a \$100 donation to become a Century Club member, but also offered to host the dinner at which Century Club members will be presented their recognition certificates.

A nationally-known speaker is being sought for the dinner and the date will be set as soon as his reply is received.

Commenting on the fund-raising drive, Century Club Chairman Paul Nye of Plymouth, said, "The success of the drive speaks well for the community and its interest in retarded children, particularly those at the Marshall-Starke Development Center.

"Certainly the efforts of all the organizations which contributed are to be noted — especially to be congratulated are the people who spearheaded the drive for funds within these organizations."

He went on to point out that the board of directors at the center now feels even more keenly its responsibility to use the money from private contributions to the best advantage of the children in the school.

Much of the \$10,000 goal was earmarked for current expenses at the Center, but since the drive exceeded the goal, hopes are high for some expansion of the present program.

Million Mothers Fight Birth Defects In Traditional March of Dimes Drive

Famed actresses Jane Wyatt, Angela Lansbury and Gigi Perreau share a secret — they have learned there can be a great deal more to life than the glamour and glitter of stage and screen stardom.

Behind the scenes these stars are among the more than one million American women who have become March of Dimes volunteers so that countless millions of infants, yet unborn, may have the chance to lead normal and useful lives.

For the fourth consecutive year, Miss Wyatt is national chairman of the March of Dimes Mothers' March on birth defects. Miss Lansbury is chairman in New York City, and Miss Perreau is chairman in Los Angeles, Calif.

As the world of stars helps the 1967 March of Dimes, so does the world of space. The Mothers' March chairman in Houston, Tex., is Mrs. L. Gordon Cooper Jr., wife of the famous astronaut, while the mother of astronaut Wally Schirra, Mrs. Walter Schirra Sr., heads the Mothers' March in San Diego, Calif.

These well-known women and the many other equally dedicated Mothers' March volunteers across the nation seek their neighbors' support and contributions for the 1967 March of Dimes because the need is so vital and immediate.

Each year more than 250,000 American babies are born with birth defects, many of which can disfigure, disable or kill. That's about 700 infants born each day with a physical or mental defect. Birth defects each year destroy an estimated 500,000 infants before they are born.

"On their Mothers' March from door to door, volunteers will have two main goals," Miss Wyatt explains.

"These women want to educate parents and parents-to-be about birth defects and what is known about how to prevent them. They will also try to raise funds to support the fight on birth defects."

The educational leaflet, "Happy Birth Day," will be distributed during the Mothers' March. It explains what to do if you are about to be married, if you are expecting a baby, if a birth defect occurs in your family or if you have friends with a defective child who needs assistance.

Contributions to the 1967 March of Dimes will help the fight on birth defects by supporting:

- The growing nationwide network of 77 Birth Defects Centers for diagnosis and treatment.
- A scientific research program aimed at finding the causes and methods of preventing birth defects.
- A Professional Education Program for scientists and medical personnel.
- A nationwide Public Education Program to distribute authoritative information about prenatal care and birth defects treatment and research.

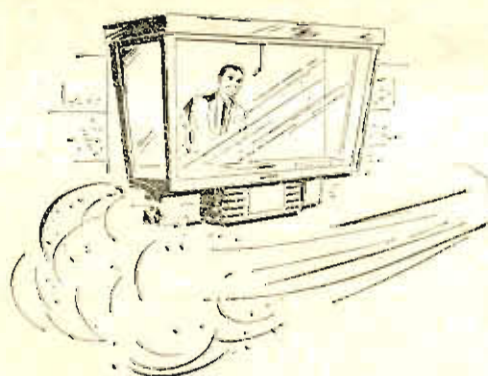



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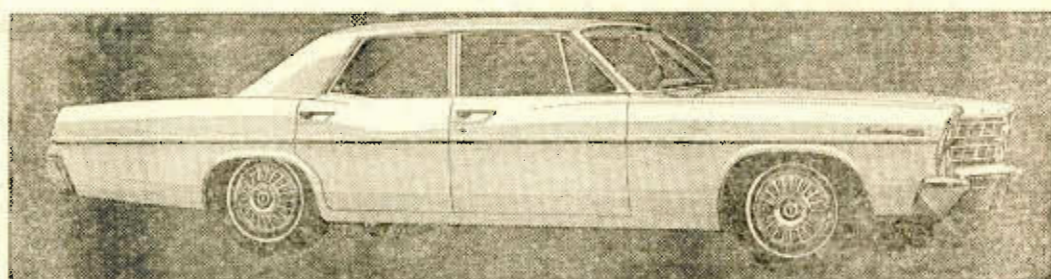

National Players To Present Comedy At Academy

The National Players will present Aristophanes' classical comedy "The Birds" at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 11, at Culver Military Academy.

The production is part of the Academy's eighth annual Concert-Theater Series and will be given in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium.

The National Players, longest running national classical repertory company in the U.S., is in its eighteenth season. The Players have appeared at Culver each season since 1960 and are one of the favorites of Academy theater audiences.

Aristophanes, writing in Athens in the fifth century B.C., is acknowledged to be the father of all Western comedy and, perhaps along with Moliere, to be one of its two greatest masters. Yet his plays are seldom produced, mostly because it is assumed that the extreme license and bawdry permitted Athenian comic writers is offensive to modern audiences. This is not true, however, in the opinion of the National Players. Says the Rev. Gilbert V. Hartke, O.P., director of The Players:

"Vulgarity has always been a part of the comic vein, and even its Athenian extremes can usually be restated in a way not too offensive to our ears. The real difficulty encountered in staging Aristophanes lies in the abundance of explicit reference to his own contemporaries and their doings — references which we would need a history book to follow and without which we miss the joke. By the time this obscure material has been cut, often too little remains.

"This play is fortunate in this respect. Aside from being one of the least bawdy and most lyrical of the plays, it is also, in its original form one of the longest and most developed. When the play has been cut, a substantial body of comic incident remains."

Walter Kerr, in preparing an acting edition of "The Birds" has first collated all available translations and reduced lines to their essential meaning, then paraphrased them in a colloquial style which attempts to make them sound as they might have sounded to an average Greek citizen sitting in a popular comic theatre. Kerr cut away the obscure parts of the text and to compensate extended ideas to clarify them.

"The Birds" is divided into two parts. The first act concerns the founding of "Cloud CuckooLand" and its resistance to all earthly bores and quacks. The second concerns its resistance to the Olympian gods and contains Aristophanes' comment on the polytheistic absurdities to which Athenian religion had been reduced. Comments Father Hartke:

"But Aristophanes is neither lecturing nor allowing himself to become bitter; he is simply having fun."

Following the National Players on the Concert-Theater Series will be the Feb. 9 production by the Metropolitan Opera Studio group.

Indiana Bell Connects State Law Enforcement Teletypewriter System

Recently in Indianapolis, an escaped convict, who was suspected of robbing a branch bank, was arrested at a blockade shortly after the holdup. His description had been dispatched to police throughout the area.

After a robber disarmed a policeman and store owner in Indiana, a man answering the description of the gunman was picked up 15 minutes later only a few miles away.

Earlier in the year, two suspects were arrested in California and charged with murdering a man in Colorado 48 hours earlier.

In all these cases, police communications played a big part in apprehending the suspects.

Fast, integrated communications systems are making it harder than ever these days for criminals to keep that one step ahead of the law.

National, regional, state and local networks specially designed for law enforcement needs are helping to offset the mobility of today's criminal, who travels in jet planes and in high-powered cars over super-highways. Telephones, typewriters, closed circuit television, radio and computer communications are becoming as much a part of the modern police arsenal as firearms.

The most extensive police communications system is LETS -- the national Law Enforcement Teletypewriter System. This is a high-speed, fully automatic link between six regional police networks, in which messages are sent at 100 words a minute and quickly relayed from one end of the country to the other.

The Indiana State Police Department is part of the expansive system. Simply by contacting State Police posts in their area, local law enforcement officials throughout Indiana have access to communication services available through LETS.

The teletypewriter was first used as a law enforcement tool in 1927 by police in a few Connecticut communities. In 1930 an interstate police teletypewriter system connecting New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania went into service.

During the next three decades, many two-point circuits were installed until finally there were six major networks: three in the East and one each in the South, West and Midwest. LETS, put into operation last April, combined these six networks into one national system.

So that messages could be transferred from network to network, the Bell System -- working closely with local and state law enforcement agencies -- installed highly-sophisticated relaying equipment at State Highway Patrol Headquarters in Phoenix, Arizona.

The Long Lines Department of American Telephone and Telegraph, which coordinated the project, provides the interstate connections for LETS. The Bell operating companies -- like Indiana Bell -- furnish most of the intrastate circuits. The teletypewriters were produced by the Teletype Corporation, a subsidiary of the Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply organization of the Bell System.

Fifty stations, most of them in state capitals, are directly connected to the LETS network. Each has its own two-letter call directing code and can contact one, some or all other stations.

In addition, about 4,500 teletypewriter locations around the country have indirect access to the Phoenix relay center. Thus, state and local police departments, sheriff's offices, motor vehicle bureaus and special investigating

agencies all have a handy, national outlet for their communications traffic.

The long arm of the law promises to get even longer. A 48th state, Nevada, will join the LETS system this month. Because switching equipment in the relay center was designed to accommodate 11 networks, LETS also may be extended abroad.

Not only nationally, but on the state and local levels, police are using faster, more efficient communications to combat crime. In the Indianapolis State Police headquarters, a communications officer mans a voice console that links him with all state police posts in the state. Each post maintains communications with state police cars and city and county law enforcement authorities in its area.

Communications improvements in the future will give police more advantages over lawbreakers. High speed data systems will carry information between computerized national and regional record centers and officers in the field.

Fingerprints will be transmitted over circuits from state to state. Patrolmen will carry two-way portable radio sets to keep in constant contact with their headquarters.

Indiana State Police already have equipment available to query a computer in the state office building to obtain drivers license information.

Some thought is being given to the possible development of an Indiana law enforcement teletypewriter system. Local law enforcement agencies could use the network for sending "all points bulletins" and other written communication. Another possible use would be to query computer files in Indianapolis for such things as vehicle registration and stolen vehicle reports.

Hopefully, communications technology will make crime pay less and less.

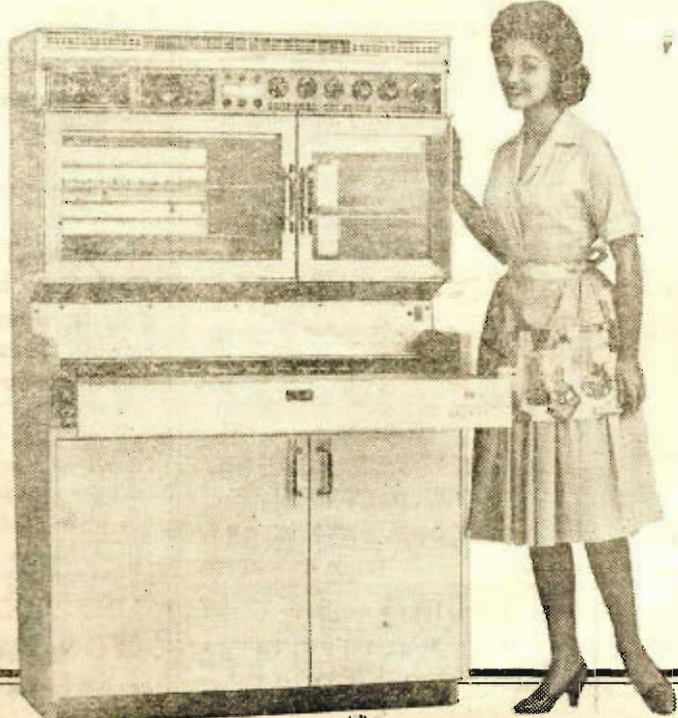
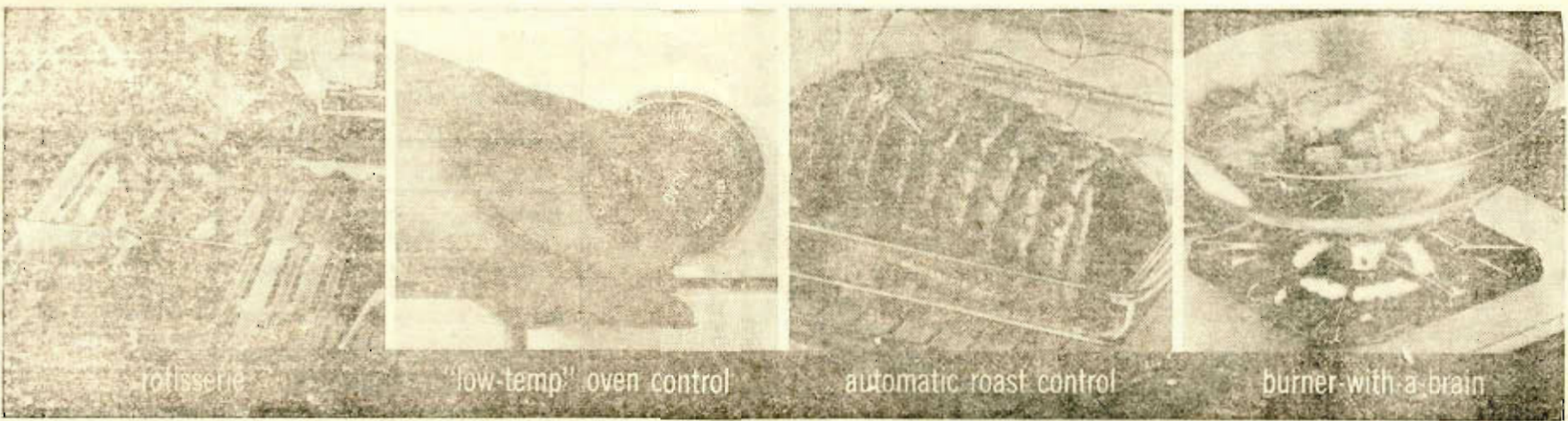

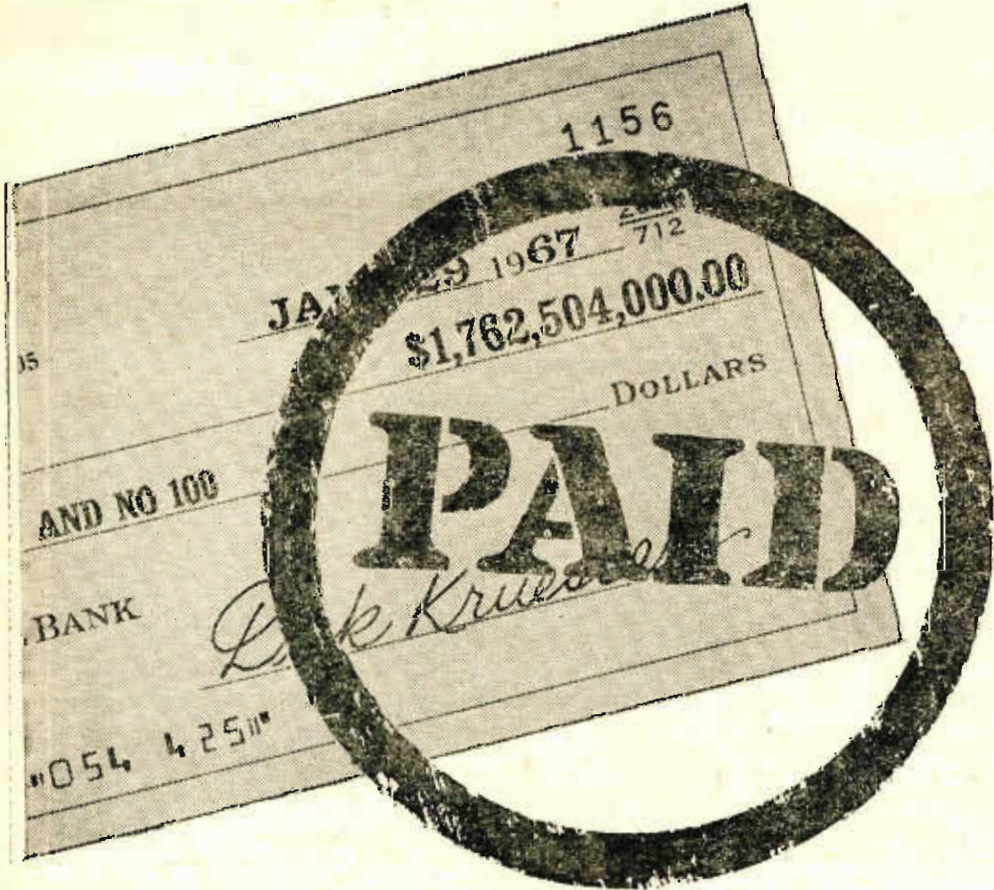
