W. O. Osborn Named Outstanding Citizen By Jaycees

Over 100 Culver citizens braved drifting snow Friday night as the Culver Jaycees named W. O. Osborn their Outstanding Citizen for 1966. Dr. Otis Bowen, Bremen, Speaker of the House in the Indiana Legislature, was the keynote speaker at the combination award dinner and bosses night.

Mr. Osborn, president of the State Exchange Bank in Culver-Plymouth-Argos, was ill with the flu and Fred Adams, executive vice president of the bank, accepted the plaque in Osborn's absence.

A direct telephone line was connected between the speaker's table at the Inn and Osborn's home, where he conversed with Jerry Wolfe, Program Chairman; Eddie Amond, master of ceremonies; Fred Adams; and Dr. Bowen. The audience also serenaded Mr. Osborn with a chorus of "Happy Birthday," which by coincidence was celebrated Saturday.

When questioned Mr. Osborn replied "I'm 39 years old, just like Jack Benny." In hearing the applause that he had been named the 1966 Outstanding Citizen, Osborn added a comment to Dr. Bowen. "It sounds like I won that precinct!"

Bill Andrews and Bill Martin of Indiana Bell Telephone Company arranged the telephone hookup with the co-operation of James Kurz, Culver Inn Manager. Jerry Wolfe, program chairman, announced that he had received the following telegrams for Mr. Osborn, one from Frank McKinney, Chairman of the Board of the American Fletcher National Bank and Trust Co., of Indianapolis. "Sincere personal congratulations on receiving the Jaycee Outstanding Citizen Award of 1966. It is richly deserved. Few honors have deeper meaning than that of recognition by the younger generation, for they feel most the results of your years of civic contributions and they learn best by example."

Robert W. Schram, President of the Indiana Bankers Association, President of the Peru Trust Co., "It is a distinct pleasure for me to join with your many friends in honoring you for your years of distinguished service to your community. Heartiest congratulations and best wishes." Dr. Bowen added that he wanted to "congratulate Mr. Osborn

... the Award is an honor well deserved and one earned through diligent attention to duty and service." In his address, Dr. Bowen gave the audience a glimpse of the Legislature, the Speaker's duties and answered questions at the end of his talk. Dr. Bowen remarked "I am sure that we all agree on the main problems facing the 95th General Assembly and I am equally sure that we will not agree on solutions. There are always two sides to every question, moral rights and the greatest good for the greatest number probably are the two most important factors used in the determination of the solution."

The snowstorm raised havoc with the program committee plans; Jerry Wyman, Jaycee President was snowbound in Valparaiso since Thursday, and Indiana Jaycee State President Ralph Naragon of North Manchester was also unable to attend due to the weather.

Eddie Amond, Master of Ceremonies, in his remarks, said, "no, not all men are created equal, contrary to Mr. Lincoln's statement; we may be equal in the eyes of God, but we are unequal in the eyes of man. Never let us weaken the strong, by discriminating against excellence. America's strength lies in the equality of opportunity, constantly seeking truth, that we are free to be unequal . . . now we honor an unequal man, an uncommon man as Culver's Outstanding Citizen for 1966."

Don Muehlhausen, Jaycee 2nd Vice President, gave a "Kind word for the Boss," honoring Bosses Night. Ron Witkowski of Bremen, Region B Vice President, added his comments of how a Jaycee works on community projects while putting his leadership talents into practice. Latham Lawson, who served as Speaker of the House in November during the Jaycee State Mock Legislative Session, introduced Dr. Bowen, Jim Beckhart, Program vice-Chairman, led the Pledge of Allegiance and the Jaycee Creed. Rev. Lawrence White filled in for Rev. Carl Baker, who was snowed in at Chicago, praying the Invocation and the Benediction.

Woman's Club Asks Support For Retarded Children

Statistics tells us that one out of four families each year, find themselves face to face with mental illness of one of its members. This may happen to us, no matter what the social status, race, creed, rich or poor. Today more and more is being done about the retarded. Years ago it was considered a thing to be kept quiet and hid. People hid their members so afflicted, in closets, attics and basements, so that the neighbors and outsiders wouldn't find out about them. We have progressed so, that today, the stricken families need not feel shame, but instead recognize the facts of retardation and mental illness, and acquire medical help.

That one of the family is retarded and ill, is a difficult, not an easy thing to realize. Today, unlike years past, we now have help from many sources. Not only from the government and the medical professions; but help comes from the smaller institutions and private citizens.

Diagnosis plays a very important part of helping the retarded. But before a diagnosis is made, it

must be made known to the person himself that he is ill and needs help. Not all persons have the same symptoms or problems. Therefore, it is most difficult to recognize, diagnose and treat individually.

These children need special help — such as the recreation programs and the special training programs to help them develop. They need special teachers who understand the problems of retardation. Such is the program we have available at the Marshall-Starke Development Center. At the Center, the programs not only include self-care, muscular coordination and language development; but they also have plans for a "sheltered workshop" that will help these children immensely in the preparation of future employment.

The main purpose of this training program is to help them grow physically, intellectually and socially into useful, happier adults and citizens able to contribute to the community. Crafts are an important part of this training — teaching coordination of the

hands and minds in the assembling of materials.

The President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped quotes: "In increasing numbers, the mentally retarded are demonstrating that they not only can help themselves, but they can work; and, in some jobs, they can do better than these who are not so retarded." (unquote)

You, too, can be a part of one of the most satisfying programs ever planned for serving mankind — a program aimed at preventing mental retardation and helping six million Americans already afflicted. We must support and help them — those who are helping our children.

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State Vocational Supervisors To Meet At Culver

State Department of Public Instruction Vocational Supervisors will meet with Culver Community Schools instructors Feb. 13 with Charles Bernhardt, Principal of Culver High School, in charge of arrangements, the Board of School Trustees was advised at their regular meeting last week.

The meeting is one in a series of conferences concerned with curriculum development in the Culver Community Schools. Superintendent Robert Rust announced.

In other business the Board heard a detailed financial report together with a report on building conditions and Title I project were presented at the Board meeting. The financial report detailed accounting as it pertains to the Cumulative Building Fund, established in 1965, for three years through 1968. The report disclosed that the fund balance is \$123,104.00. This fund is for building equipment in the new high school. Tuition fund balances may make necessary a tem-

porary loan in late March.

A review of building maintenance projects together with summer work was outlined. Replacement of boiler tubes at Aubbeenaubee School will be carried out during Spring Vacation, if at all possible. Final inspection of the boiler installation at Culver High School will be made this week. Among major projects under study are replacement of the roof, Culver High School and floor replacement in the Study Hall.

The Board was advised by the Superintendent that because of anticipated enrollment, 1967-68, in the Culver High School additional space will be needed. Several alternates to meet this need were discussed.

Requests for use of a bus to convey twenty home economics students to Parkview Hospital January 19, together with the awarding of bids for a new bus to Wicker Ford Sales, Culver and Kerlin Sales and Service, Silver Lake, were approved.

Mileage expense for conveying Board members to a conference with the Bond Attorney at Indianapolis, together with the mileage expense of the Superintendent were approved. Also approved was the request of the Methodist Church, M.Y.F., for the rental of the gymnasium,

March 10 or 11th, for a dance.

Approval of contracts of teacher-aides for Mrs. Dorothy Miller and Miss Carolyn Snyder, Culver Elementary; and Miss Caron Howell and Mrs. Ruth King, Aubbeenaubee were approved. Plans for procurement of personnel for summer school as it pertains to Title I summer school program and driver training were outlined. Equipment needs for the proposed high school were discussed with a view towards execution as it is related to drawing up specifications for bidding.

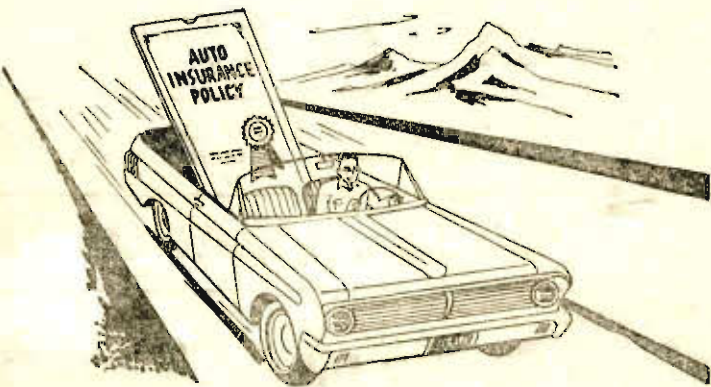

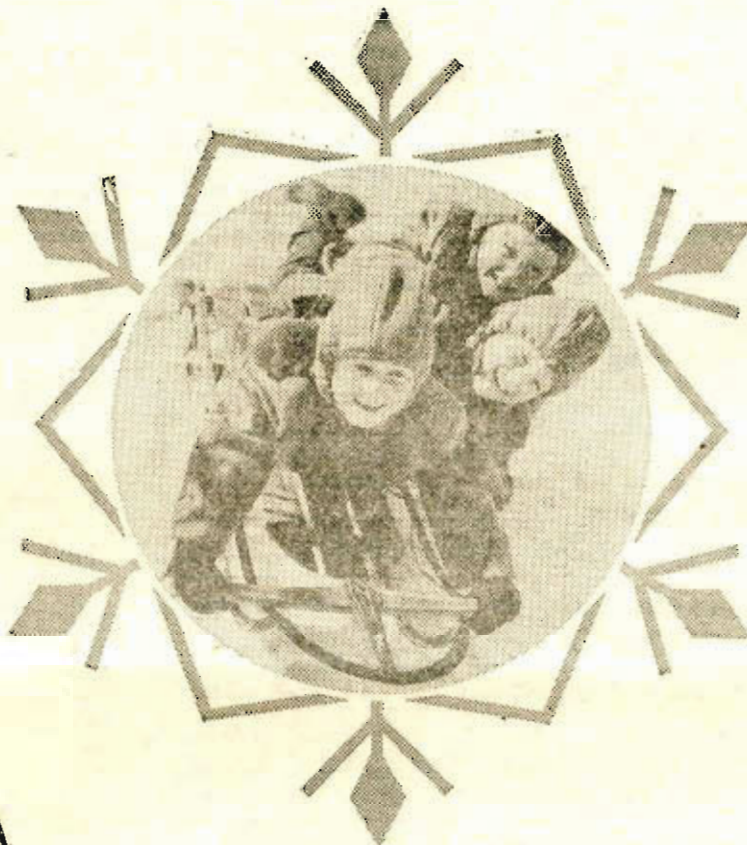
Q - Will it ever pay a couple to file separate returns?
