Marine Private Phillip D. Scruggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman M. Scruggs of 311 S. Main St., Culver, has completed four weeks of individual combat training at the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

During his more than 200 hours of training, he learned about weapons and combat techniques from combat veteran instructors. They taught him how to conduct combat patrols, detect and remove mines and booby traps and use the standard Marine Corps infantry weapons.

He will now receive at least four weeks of specialist training before being assigned to his first permanent unit. Marines going to combat units will get detailed training in the particular combat skill they are designated for. Those who are going into technical fields will receive their advanced training at one of a variety of technical schools throughout the country.

Army Private George R. Ogden, 21, son of Mrs. Martha B. Ogden, Route 1, Culver, completed a radio operator course Feb. 3 at Ft. Jackson, S. C.

During the 10-week course, he was trained in basic radio and electrical theory and was taught the international Morse code.

The Culver Indians will head into this week's sectional with the worst record among the 10 entries. The locals sustained their 17th loss in 19 outings to a rugged and quick Mentone five, 75 to 64, in Friday night's away game.

The Indians put forth a brilliant third period rally only to have it stopped in the waning minutes. The Indians played one of their best games but couldn't match the Mentone five's first period surge. The Bulldogs scored 25 points during that stanza compared to the Tribe's 18 and managed to increase that lead one point per quarter. At one point in the third period the Indians were within two points of the Bulldogs, but three quick turnovers, which Mentone capitalized on, stopped our momentum quickly.

Paul Hatten led the Indians with 25 points as George Jewell added 18 to the Tribe's total. Rex Bowser led the Bulldogs with 24 markers.

As you all must remember, the 1963 Indians went into the sectional having won only one more regular season game than this year's brand of Indians. That team drew a relatively weak Richland Center team which they beat in an overtime by nine points.

## Park And Recreation Board To Seek Funds For Summer Park Director

The Culver Board of Parks and Recreation is making plans to employ a full-time adult director for activities at the Culver Town Park for the summer season from Memorial Day to Labor Day. Meeting at the Town Hall on February 13, the Board agreed that such a director was necessary if adequate supervision and additional programs were to be provided in the park.

The present budget for park activities does not include sufficient funds for the employment of a director. Therefore, the Board will appeal in the near future to civic and fraternal organizations, businessmen, and individuals who wish to see the park program grow and give such persons and groups an opportunity to underwrite this position for this summer.

The great interest indicated by the public in their support of the organization of the Parks and Recreation Board gave the Board the confidence that our community is willing to provide the funds needed for this park director. In addition to the director one full-time and one part-time life guard will be hired. Funds for the guards are provided by the current budget.

## Culver School Board To Inspect School Plants

Proposals and agreements for the deposit of Culver Community School funds in the State Exchange Bank and the Leiters Ford State Bank were accepted by the Board of School Trustees acting as a finance committee at their meeting last evening.

Consideration of a preliminary report on rehabilitation projects involving the roof of the Culver High School, ceilings in classrooms, study hall floor, remodeling to provide area for guidance office, and correction of settlement damage of the west wall of the elementary building was discussed.

Members of the Board later reviewed the rehabilitation proposal in an on-site inspection, following which approval was extended to carry out the work starting with that determined to be the most urgent. The superintendent was authorized to take the necessary steps.

To provide classroom space on the high school level for added enrollment for the year 1967-68, the School Board will develop plans to temporarily meet the problem. The new high school expected to be completed in September, 1968 will alleviate need for classrooms after this year, it is thought.

A revised compendium of policies of the board of trustees was presented to policy chairman Woodie McGlothlin and Dr. Oscar Wesson for study. The material, following study by the entire board, will be the basis for a proposed Board Policy Manual.

A report of the recent American Association of School Administrators was presented. Accompanying Robert Rust, superintendent, to the Atlantic City conference were school trustees Thomas Russell, Woodie McGlothlin, and Dr. Oscar Wesson, and Philip Hughey of the Culver high school faculty.

Board members will inspect school plants on March 25th preliminary to the consideration of summer maintenance projects. Other dates of the Board's calendar include public hearing on the proposed lease-rental with Holding Authority, Feb. 27; conference with the teacher's welfare committee at 7 p.m., March 1; and conference with school principals at 8:30 p.m. on the same date.

Fourteen members of the regular school staff have indicated their interest in teaching in the Summer School, Title I Project; three have applied for teaching driver training during the summer, and the names of one high school and three elementary applicants for positions were submitted by the superintendent.

A twenty-five dollar contribution from Dr. J. J. Howard for the Band Uniform Fund was reported. Three adult applications to enroll in driver training classes and one for typing class were reported.

## Thomas Mont To Speak At Honor Society Banquet

Thomas A. (Tommy) Mont, head football coach at DePauw University, will be the speaker for the Culver City Club's Scholarship Recognition Banquet in honor of the National Honor Society, Thursday, March 2, at 6:30 p.m. in the Culver Community Building, according to Miss Ruth Shanks, president.

Mr. Mont who was graduated from Maryland in 1947 with the bachelor of science degree after having his college career interrupted for almost four years by World War II has been head coach at Maryland three years and at DePauw eight years.

He has served as a football consultant in three countries, beginning in 1949 when he installed the T-formation at the University of Chattanooga. He put in the split-T at the Parris Island Marine base in 1954, worked with the Calgary professional team in Canada one year later and advised at the National Polytechnic Institute in Mexico City for three summers. He was personnel director in

charge of securing all player talent for the first U.S. Bowl in Washington D.C. in 1960.

He is a popular speaker and has peddled his fictitious "Effigy Kit" and "Rent a Protest" package from Pittsburgh to Patoka and from Chicago to Clinton. Sales have been light, but in his wake the extemporizing man from Maryland has left heaps of hearty laughter and goodwill for himself and his university.

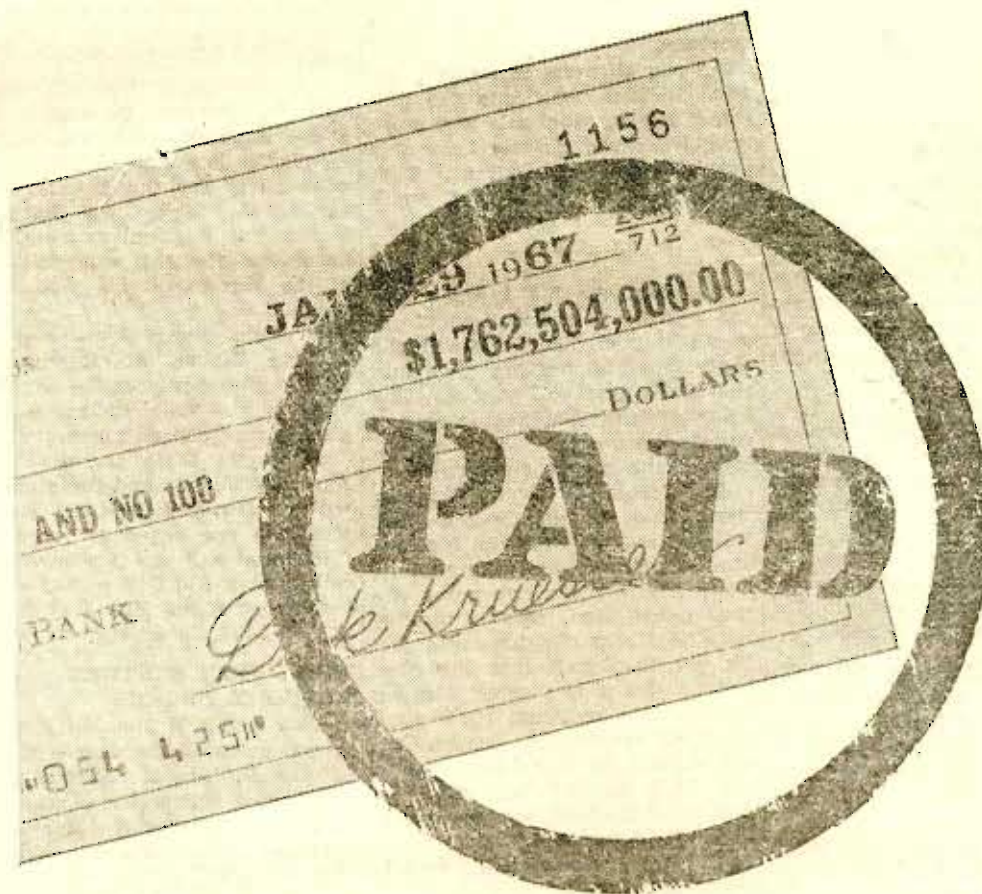

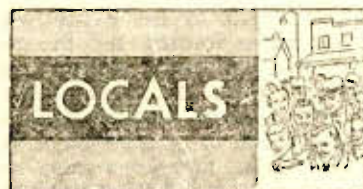

## Birch Bayh Conference

Two students and a faculty member were the guests of Birch Bayh at Lawrence High School. Susie Donnelly, a Junior, Dave Kelly, a Senior, and Mr. Lawson attended the second Birch Bayh conference in Indianapolis on Saturday, February the 11th. Two high school students and a faculty member from e-a-ch school were permitted to attend this conference on government. Senator Birch Bayh solely sponsored this one day meeting.

This year's session was divided into five parts. First, an opening meeting with 1,200 Indiana government students and faculty members together with Senator Bayh and four other speakers. With Senator Bayh giving the introductions, each of the four speakers gave a brief summary of their jobs and functions in Washington. After the formal gathering, the main body was then divided into four groups. Each speaker would then rotate to each group where he would answer questions about his particular job in Washington.

Culver's participants heard four excellent speakers. The four consisted of Mrs. Patsy Mink, Congresswoman from Hawaii; Mr. Jack Vaughn, Director of the Peace Corps, Supreme Court Judge Potter Stewart; and Mr. Fred Flott, personal secretary to Ambassador Lodge.

The first speaker was the Honorable Patsy Mink. Mrs. Mink is on the House committee on education and one of only 12 women in the House of Representatives. She was asked questions dealing mainly with the committee and her bills on education. During this question and answer period, only high school students were permitted to ask questions.

After a brief period for lunch, the group was faced with their

next speaker, Mr. Fred Flott, who substituted for William Bundy, was personal secretary to Ambassador Lodge in Vietnam and a secretary in far eastern affairs. Mr. Flott answered questions dealing mainly with our present Vietnam policy. Many heated questions were asked and both the students and faculty learned much from Mr. Flott's interview.

Senator Bayh paid an unexpected visit to the group while they were waiting for the next speaker. The Senator was quite pleased with the success of the conference. Of course, questions were asked of Senator Bayh, too. The most humorous one was whether he would be considered a presidential hopeful in the future elections. The Senator avoided the question quite well and left the group up in the air on that possibility.

The Director of the Peace Corps, Jack Vaughn, was the next speaker and certainly the most humorous as he addressed the group as future volunteers. The last speaker was Associate Supreme Court Judge Potter Stewart. Mr. Stewart stressed the need for constitutionality for all bills passed by Congress. The session was dismissed following Mr. Stewart's questioning.

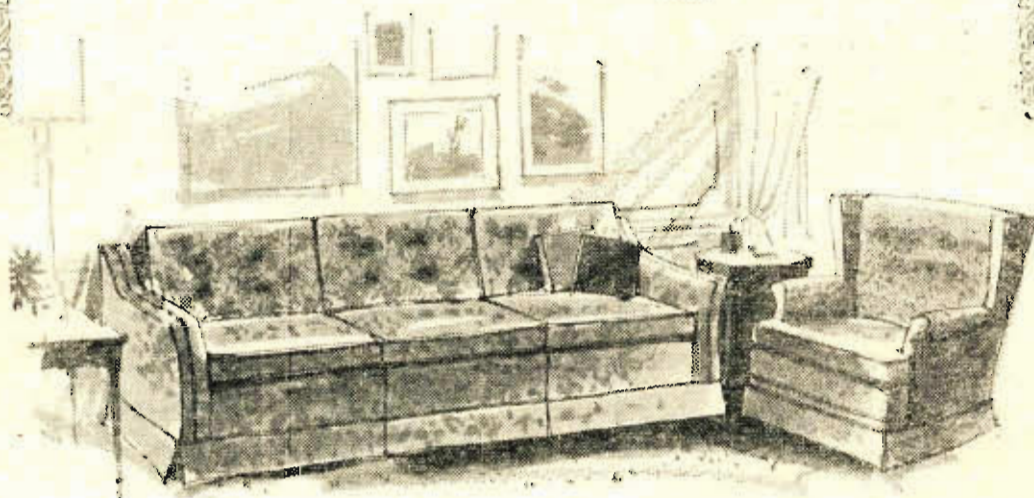

**FEDERAL TAX**  
 Q - How does the minimum standard deduction work?  
 A - The deduction amounts to \$200 plus \$100 for each exemption taken on the return including those for age and blindness. For married couples filing separately, the deduction is \$100 plus \$100 for each exemption. The maximum

that may be claimed by those using this deduction is \$1,000 but it is limited to \$500 when a married taxpayer files a separate return.  
 A married couple with two children as dependents would be entitled to a \$600 deduction when this method is used. If the income reported on the return was under \$6,000 then this method would be more to the couple's advantage than the standard deduction.

**TAXES**  
 Q - I married a widow with two young children last summer. Can I claim the children as dependents?  
 A - If you provided more than half the children's support for the year then you may claim them as dependents. If your wife provided over half their support, she can claim the children as dependents on her separate return or they may be claimed on a joint return.
